

Bditor World: For some time past you have been agitating for cheaper railway rates. But it will never succeed unless every voter exacts a piedge from the candidate who is running in his riding to help do away with the granting of passes to members. The candidate must also be informed that if he breaks his pledge he cannot be re-elected. Every voter in the Domindon is, or ought to be, interested in cheap railway rates.

A few months ago the public were indignant on account of the way workmen were treated by the Crow's Nest Pass Railway. But they never say a word or try to remedy the evils they are submitting to every day, i.e., I refer to the laws relating to the fining and imprisonment of citizens who offer to sell the railway tickets they do not need. I believe the Dominion Government had no power to make it a crime for a person to offer or sell his railway ticket, and I think if the matter were brought before the Superior Courts by way of appeal a convicton under this absurd law would be set aside in short order. Why should it be a crime to sell an article that you have paid for? It is true that the ticket says it is not transferable, but should that give a railway company the power to land you in jail if you should break that contract? A couple of years ago doctors tried to prevent the public from using prescriptions a second timethey had evidently read the "Railway Law" on the transfer of tickets. Will you or some other person please inform me why we, as Canadians, submit to laws that are made in the linterests of corporations, who are in the habit of granting passes to members of the Dominion House, who at the same time charge the people with mileage rates?

When the railway companies secured

egislation making the sale of a partly sed ticket a criminal offence they secured a concession which is directly ontrary to the spirit of the law. The mmission of a crime involves what is called a criminal intent. Half the peonle who buy railway tickets know nothing about the law against the sale of partly used tickets. Prima facie it s no crime for one to sell an asset of any kind that has legitimately come into one's possession. It is certainly contrary to the law of the land and to ommercial usage to make it a criminal offence for one to dispose of his own property. If the railway is to have reourse against anyone for selling a ticket, that recourse should be such as the common law allows them. At most the railway company should be limited by the main line to the coast. It has been the railway company should be limited to such recourse as the law allows in regard to this peculiar form of action. A breach of contract would give the company the right to bring a civil action for damages against the individual. To make an ordinary breach of contract a criminal offence is an outrage. That the railway companies succeeded in obtaining such extraordinary powers only shows us how powerful they are at Ottawa, and how negligent to such a criminal offence are in the world. SIR WILLIAM CROOKES' ADDRESS The World has on more than one occasion suggestled that the Government should make a special survey of the wheat lands of the Dominion, showing their location, their possible fertility and their extent. All anyone seems to know in regard to the wheat fields of Western Canada is that they are "illimitable," "immense" and "capable of feeding the world." It is time that these general and indefinite estimates were reduced to definite and trustworthy statements. An accurate estimate of the extent of our wheat fields would have been of great value to Sir Wm. Crookes, President of the British Association for the Advancement of Science, on the occasion of the delivery of his inaugural address at Bristol the other day. The first half of his address related to the world's wheat production. His argument was to the effect that the possible wheat lands of the world were being rapidly taken up, that they would soon all be exhausted, while the consumption of wheat was increasing very rapidly. According to figures adduced by the learned scientist by the year 1931 it will not be possible under the present methods of cultivating wheat to produce as much as the world will need. This would have been an excellent opportunity to present to the world Canada's undeveloped resources as a wheat growing country, but Sir Wm. Crookes seems to have had no authentic information in regard to Canada's possibilities in this respect. All the wheat producing countries of the world were referred to and their possibilities detailed with more or less accuracy. 


