ST. JOHN, N. B., AGAIN SWEEPED BY FLAMES. Indian town, the Dock Section of the City, Wiped Out of Existence.

ABOUT 200 HOUSES BURNED. More Than a Thousand People Made Homeless—Mostly Working People.

NEARLY ALL THE BUILDINGS OF WOOD. The Loss Estimated at Half a Million Dollars, With Insurance About \$300,000.

St. John, N.B., May 25.—The greatest fire in the history of St. John, with the exception of the terrible conflagration of 1877, which completely wiped out the city, occurred this afternoon.

All Wooden Buildings. The district, with hardly an exception, contained wooden buildings.

For nine hours the flames held sway and when at 1 o'clock, the fire had burned itself out, Indian town was no more.

A Pathetic Scene. Many families of modest means lived in the large tenements and small wooden buildings along Bridge-street, and the scene on the waterfront was a pathetic one.

The Effects Destroyed. The flames decimated the fire department's water's edge, but as the embers accumulated intense heat was generated and soon fire attacked the household effects piled on the piers.

A Weird Scene. To-night the scene is a weird one, several acres of ground littered with burning embers. Shelter has been provided for those who were burned out, but many grief-stricken people are wandering among the ruins.

Old Lady Died From Shock. Mrs. Arnold Mowry of Adelaide-street, an old lady of the north end, died from shock and excitement during the fire.

THE "IMPERIAL LIMITED" IS THE FAST TRAIN

Which the Canadian Pacific Will Run From Montreal to Vancouver in Four Days.

It Will Be a Daily Service to Relieve the Present Heavy Traffic—You Can Go Over the Crow's Nest Road if You Like.

Montreal, Que., May 25.—(Special)—The new fast service on the Canadian Pacific Railway will be inaugurated about the middle of June, probably the 18th or 19th.

It will also be a daily trans-continental service, instituted owing to the vast increase of travel, and trains will leave on Sundays as well as on week days; this being absolutely necessary to relieve the present heavy traffic on Monday trains with travelers from Europe.

Sundays Not Excepted. The hour of departure from Montreal will be 9:30 a.m. and Toronto 4 hours later, and Winnipeg and many parts of Manitoba will be brought within forty-eight hours of this city, local trains that provide making close connection with the "Imperial Limited." Vancouver and Victoria will be reached on the fourth day out from Montreal.

Two Choices of Route. The Kootenay country will also be advantageously affected by the new service. A fast train on Crow's Nest Pass Railway, to Kootenay Landing, will make the alternate route to these gold fields the shortest and quickest one from the east.

Fewer Local Stops. This new fast service is to be greatly supplemented by an increased local service on different sections of the line, so that the accelerated speed will be largely obtained by the reduction of the number of local stops.

TRACKMEN'S STRIKE STILL ON IN EARDEST

Circulars Issued Calling a Mass Meeting of the Men in Toronto To-Morrow—Some Statements Are Denied by the Men.

The strike situation of the Grand Trunk trackmen underwent practically no change yesterday in Toronto. The joint members of the Brotherhood have decided to open a committee room in the city, and have selected the residence of Mr. James Irvine, 28 Tecumseh-street.

A Mass Meeting To-Morrow. Secretary Thomas Irwin of 187 Bellwood-avenue has sent out circulars to all the men within a radius of 20 miles of Toronto, calling a mass meeting for to-morrow afternoon at 2 o'clock. It is expected that every striker within the district will be present to hear the speakers.

Reports Are Coming In. Many reports have been received by the men from different points along the road. The story is told that on the holiday afternoon, near Lindsay, on the Midland, a serious accident had occurred, and was only discovered by one of the officials, who saw the condition of the track in time to flag an approaching train. This incident, so the men say, is being kept very secret, as the company do not want the public to suspect that the road is suffering already as a result of the strike.

Is This True? It was stated by the company that the company had sent an order to the Wabash Railway regarding, asking for 1000 men to be sent immediately to the middle division. To this telegram, the men say, no answer has been received, which goes to show that the men are not engaged.

The Men Refused. When the man refused, agents of the company were sent out to re-engage some of the trackmen at an expense. Several who were approached say they were offered \$150 a day if they would consent to work. The company then resorted to hire Italian labor. Four of this nationality were taken to the scene of the small mishap. On learning the circumstances, they simply expressed themselves by saying, "No work." Hands were secured from the Union Station, and in this way the tracks were cleared, after an hour's delay. The officials admit that the time taken in removing the broken axle was exceptionally long. A gang of Italians have been engaged in the Hamilton yards, being brought from Oakville.

They Don't Get Houses. Mr. Irwin Denies That One Man in a Hundred is Provided. "Thomas" Irwin, representing the striking sectionmen, called at The World office yesterday to deny the statement in The World to the effect that the sectionmen were provided with dwellings along the line, and that they received their wages and lighting. Mr. Irwin says this is not the case and that at most there is only one man out of a hundred provided with a house.

HANGING POSTPONED A DAY AN ELOQUENT ENGLISHMAN WILL LIKELY GET THE MONEY

Death Warrant From Ottawa Had Not Reached Winnipeg Last Night. Whose Oration Before a New York Court Effected the Acquittal of a Prisoner.

CHIEF JUSTICE ORDERED DELAY BECAUSE OF QUEEN'S BIRTHDAY. VAN HORNE TO GO FARMING

Guszek is Cheerful and Says He is Ready to Die—Czuby is Quite the Reverse. Winnipeg, May 25.—(Special)—Guszek and Czuby, the Galician murderers, will not be executed to-morrow morning as expected. The death warrant did not arrive from Ottawa, and at 5 o'clock to-day, the Chief Justice instructed Sheriff Inkster to postpone the hanging for 24 hours, so that if the warrant arrives to-morrow, they will be hanged on Saturday morning. The Chief Justice, it appears, has power to do this.

Very often taken here. The arrival of the warrant, but no chance will be taken here. As the time the Galician prisoners have to live narrows now to a few hours, the prisoners only accentuate the characteristics of their personalities. Guszek is calm, resigned and even happy. He declares "I am not afraid of death. I am prepared to die at any time. I am a Christian, and I will remain with him all to-morrow in prayer. If the warrant arrives, at 5 o'clock on Saturday morning they will administer the last sacrament. Those looking after his spiritual condition say he is fully prepared to die."

Czuby is Quite the Reverse. Czuby, on the other hand, grows more violent as the end approaches. He refuses to prepare for death or talk to anyone on religious subjects. He declares "I am not gaily, and is not going to die. His two sons visited him this morning, and he is distressed that he refused to be advised by them to prepare for death. Czuby will be strapped in a chair if he continues in his present frame of mind. Peter Matukowski, who was a witness at the trial and a friend of both prisoners, visited them today, and talked with them. There will be no conversation or statement on the scaffold, and the drop will fall as soon as everything is ready. Guszek's body will be taken charge of by the priests of St. Mary's and Czuby's will be buried in a place outside the walls designated by the authorities.

Montreal, May 25.—(Special)—With reference to Detective Kellert's arrest of Jack Roach in Boston, the following details will be of interest:

Kellert's Drags Out. This was agreed to and since that hour Kellert has had his drags out. One of the drags caught a woman and she caught Roach. She was a woman who had been a great friend of Roach's when he lived in Montreal, and when she disappeared Kellert thought it worth his while to make some enquiries. He learned that she had gone to Boston, but without any distinguishing marks it was difficult to locate her. So Kellert wrote a letter. It was addressed to "My Dear Dick." ("Dick" was the lady's nickname.) It told of how sorry the writer was that she had gone away, and hoped soon to see her again, etc. The letter was signed "Your old friend Nellie," and "Here's my address." It was sent care of the general postoffice, Boston.

The Scheme Worked. Sure as fate, four days afterwards the answer came back to Montreal, and Kellert soon had it in his possession. After referring to one or two uninteresting matters, "Dick" went on to say: "And who do you think I am with, nobody else but my dear old Jack. But he had a fight a few days ago and he got mad and went away, but I know he will be back in a day or two."

Then she gave her address and Kellert wired to a detective in Boston. The rest was easy.
