### HISTORICAL MEMORANDA

IN CONNECTION WITH

## Crescent Street Church, Montreal

#### (FORMERLY FREE CHURCH, COTE STREET.)

- The Congregation owes its origin to the deep interest which some individuals had in the struggles of the Free Church party in Scotland, and who met together to advance Free Church principles. They were called the Free Church Committee. The Congregation was organized, and for seven years ministered to by Deputies from the Free Church of Scotland.
- 1844.—January 10. First meeting of Free Church Committee. Invitation sent to REV DR. CUNNINGHAM, then in the United States, to come to Montreal.
- " Arrival of DR. BURNS, of Paisley, the First Deputy from the Free Church.
- " May.—A call for a Minister sent to the Free Church Colonial Committee, with promise of adequate support. A call sent to REV. W, C. BURNS at the same time to come out as an Evangelist.
- " End of summer.—REV. MR. KING, of Glasgow, and REV. MR. MACNAUGHTON, of Paisley, Deputies from the Free Church arrived. REV. W. C. BURNS, arrived about the same time and preached in St. Gabriel Street Church.
- 1845.—The REV. J. BONAR, of Larbert, arrived in Spring, preached in St. Gabriel Street Church till a temporary wooden church was erected in Lagauchetiere Street He opened this Church on May 11th, and on the 25th of May inducted the first elders, viz: John Redpath, James R. Orr, David Ferguson, Evander MacIver.
- " The REV. W. ARNOT, of Glasgow, arrived about this time, and supplied the pulpit till the end of September.
- " The REV. A. N. SOMERVILLE, of Glasgow, took charge during October and November.
- The REV. W. C. BURNS, in November, received but declined a call to labour in Canada, the Congregation promising to support him. In December he was again urged to fall in with this request, but finally declined on January 19th, 1846.
- 1846 .- The REV. G. STEVENSON, of Peebles, ministered from January to April.
  - " The REV. T. MACLAUGHLIN, of Peebles, ministered during May and June.
  - The REV. J. MUNRO, of Rutherglen, ministered during July and August.

- " The REV. R. BREMNER, of Glasgow, ministered from November to April.
- 1848.-The REV. J. PATTERSON, of Tranent, ministered from May to October.
- 1849 .- The REV. J. LEWIS, of Leith, ministered from April to August.
  - The REV. J. C. BURNS, of Kirkliston, ministered from September to February, 1850.

## Annual Meeting.

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### CRESCENT STREET PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH.

#### MONTREAL, 13th January, 1893.

The Annual Meeting of the Congregation was held this evening, the Pastor, Rev. Dr. A. B. Mackay presiding. The meeting was opened with praise, reading of Scripture and prayer.

The minutes of the last Annual Meeting were read and sustained.

The report of the Deacons' Court, with the Treasurer's statements having been read, it was moved by Mr. John Stirling, and seconded by the Rev. Principal MacVicar: "That the Report of the Deacon's Court, just read, be received and adopted, and that the same be printed and circulated among the members of the congregation." Carried.

In moving the adoption of the report, Mr. Stirling spoke as follows:

The time has come around again when we make up the Church accounts and review the Church work for the past year. The Report just read shows that the work has been going on regularly and smoothly, and that we as a Congregation are in a comfortable state as regards finances.

The ordinary income of the Church—that is, the income derived from the Pew rents and from the Weekly Offering —still maintains itself at about the same figures that it attained on the adoption of the plan of the Weekly Offering, so that besides easily meeting all our ordinary expenses, we are able to keep up the allocation for the various missionary and benevolent objects at about the same rate as when we first experienced the beneficial results of this system of collecting—that was in the year 1885.

The first year of our experience of it, our ordinary yearly revenue rose at once from about \$10,000 to about \$14,000, being an addition of about \$4,0.00 a year to what we ever had before—so far I have spoken of the ordinary revenue alone,-which as I have just said, consists of the income from Pew rents and Weekly Offerings. As for the extraordinry revenues-at different times-they varied During according to the magnitude of the objects aimed at. the time that this edifice was building, large amounts were raised for the building fund, and afterwards in liquidation of the debt. The final effort to liquidate the debt was taken in hand about four years ago, by our pastor, to whom the success of the effort is chiefly due. The debt at that time was about \$20,000, the interest on which, cost the church about \$1,100 a year. This was not considered a very formidable debt for this congregation, nor did the amount of yearly interest give us very much concern, but it was thought well that the debt should be cleared off; accordingly, as I have just said, our pastor took the matter in hand, and in less than a twelvemonth the debt entirely vanished and was no At that time the Organ was being put in, and the more. annual saving of interest came in very handy to help to meet the extra expense caused by the introduction of the Organ into the Church.

It seems to me as if we had arrived at a point in our congregational history. We have a large and beautiful building, situated in the right spot, fully equipped, in good condition, and free of debt, and with a large congregation worshipping there every Sunday. I can look back over its history for a long time, and it seems as if the blessing which Moses pronounced on one of the tribes of Israel has accompanied it from the beginning: "As thy days are, so shall thy strength be." We have been strengthened all along, so that not only have we increased in many ways, but also every undertaking that we ever assumed has been carried through successfully.

I have no fear for the future. Changes are going on constantly in the membership. In the course of last year we lost by death one of our standard bearers, the late Mr. Peter Nicholson, a true disciple of Christ. Though of a retiring disposition, he was in every way an example to others; especially in his integrity of character, his regular and devout attendance at all the the services on Sunday, and on Wednesday evenings, and at prayer meetings. He took the deepest interest in the whole work of this Church of every kind, and his thorough practical knowledge of everything connected with building, was found to be of great value, when any additions, alterations or improvements were being made. In 1866 he was elected a Deacon in the old Coté street Church, and in 1879 in our present building he was elected an elder. In 1882 he was appointed one of the Trustees. His loss will be long felt by those who knew him.

Notwithstanding all the changes taking place, the Lord's work is going on increasingly,—and let us see that we do what we can to keep it going on increasingly amongst ourselves, outside of ourselves, even throughout the world—

> Till o'er the whole creation, The rays of truth shall shine, And nations now in darkness, Arise to light divine.

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I will now say a few words on behalf of the Weekly offering scheme now in operation for eight years. The ease of its manipulation, its success, as shown in the large sum it produces annually, the maintenance of this large product ever since its commencement, its direct appeal to the conscience, and that without any undue pressure, in short its superiority in every respect to any plan we ever had before, for providing for missionary and benevolent purposes must commend it to every one. It provides for about twenty different objects. All those for which the General Assembly orders annual collections to be taken for, and such other objects as we think it well to promote-all of importance. I hope therefore that all will give it conscientious consideration and act accordingly. Not only should every head of a family but every member take part in it. Giving for such objects is a good habit to teach the young, and like all good habits, tends to elevate the character. Especially do I wish those who more recently have joined us, and who may not have fully realized the importance of this scheme, to consider it carefully, that they may know how much is dependent on it and their obligations to it as professing christians.

I conclude with a reference to the death of the late Dr. Donald Fraser, of London. He was the first settled pastor of this congregation. I knew him personally before he commenced to study for the ministry. Under his ministry I became an office-bearer, having been elected a Deacon in November 1852,-forty years ago, and I co-operated with him in my department of Church work until he left this country for Scotland, and I well remember the general regret felt when he severed his connection with us as our minister in 1859. I felt the tidings of his death all the more, because about a year ago I was anticipating the pleasure of seeing him in this country, as I then knew that he was an appointed delegate to the Presbyterian Alliance that met in Toronto in September last. From what I have heard and learned of him after his leaving this city, his sphere of usefulness seems to have been extending to the end of his days, so that his death may well be considered a loss to the community in general.

Dr. Mackay then addressed the meeting, and pointed out that many applications came before the Court in the course of the year, for assistance, on behalf of worthy objects, but which the Court, in view of the present returns from the Weekly Offerings, could not entertain. He also called attention to the fact that the Church was about entering upon the fiftieth year of its existence, and urged upon the Congregation, that this would be a fitting time to make an effort to increase their offerings, so that at least \$200 per week might be reached.

The following resolution was then unanimously agreed to :—"In acknowledgment of our thankfulness to God for His goodness to us during the first fifty years of our Congregational existence, we agree to make a special effort to raise the subscriptions by Envelope to the Weekly Offering to two hundred dollars per Sabbath."

The meeting was closed with the Benediction, and then adjourned to the Lecture Hall to partake of refreshments which had been provided, and for social intercourse.

A review of the past year is fitted to solemnize our minds, and to stir us up to work while it is day before the night cometh when no man can work. Losses sore and heavy have fallen upon us as families, and as a congregation. The first pastor of this church, Dr. Donald Fraser, has passed away, and the third pastor, Dr. Robert Burns, has been compelled to retire from the active duties of the ministry, through ill health.

The place that Dr. Fraser held in the history of the congregation is unique. A member of the Free Church Committee, from which the congregation sprang, the superintendent of the Sabbath School, and pastor of the Church for a little more than seven years, his influence for good was very great. He devoted to the service of this congregation all the fire of youthful enthusiasm, all the force of keen convictions, all the eloquence of the Celtic temperaament, and all the rare endowments which made him a leader of men. At the same time he was training himself for higher service in other spheres. He himself has told me, how helpful the work done in Montreal, was to him in all his after career. Dr. Burns, my immediate predecessor in the pastorate, with his geniality, kindliness, motherwit and readiness of speech, has a warm place in our affections, and we trust that though laid aside from that work he loved so well, his heart may be cheered by knowing that it prospers abundantly.

We also call to our remembrance, him who fell asleep on Sabbath evening, May 1st, 1892, Mr. Peter Nicholson. Though past the threescore years and ten, his physical and mental vigour gave promise of many days of increasing usefulness. He was ordained a deacon twenty-six years ago, and for a little more than half that time had been an At Point Levis, fourteen years ago next May, he, elder. along with Mr. Court, welcomed myself and family to these shores as your representatives, and I shall always consider it an honour to have been so welcomed. From that day to this my estimate of his beautiful christian character and consistent life, has grown higher and higher. How often was it the burden of his public prayers that we might be enabled to honour God in our daily lives. It was no formal phrase on his lips. This was his constant aim, and how largely it was attained we can all testify. We give thanks at the remembrance of his blameless life, his unaffected piety, his transparent and unvarying kindness of heart, his labour of love and his patience of hope. His instructions in the Sabbath School, his practical skill in the Deacons' Court, his counsels in the Session, his prayers in our weekly gatherings, have strengthened and encouraged all his brethren, and now that he rests from his labours, while we sorely miss him from his accustomed place. we comfort ourselves with the emphatic assurance of the Holy Ghost, "Blessed are the dead that die in the Lord." Who would not think it an honour and a privilege to follow in the footsteps of such a man? God incline and enable us to do so, so that when our time comes, and the place that now knows us, knows us no more, it may be truly said of us as of him "The memory of the just is blessed."

As we enter on the jubilee year of our congregational existence, do not these providences cry aloud to us. "Be stedfast, immoveable, always abounding in the work of the Lord." God incline our ears to hear, and strengthen our hands to work.

The work of our missionary in China has been somewhat impeded, through Mrs. Macvicar suffering from insomnia. Let us unite our prayers that she may be restored to perfect health, and that we may rejoice in hearing good news from this far country.

Report of the Deacons' Court

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31st DECEMBER, 1892.

In the report now to be submitted to the Congregation, the Court feels that there is continued cause for thankfulness to God for having blessed us with the means and inclined our hearts to give for the purpose of carrying on efficiently the special work undertaken by us as a people, as well as in helping forward the various schemes of the Church.

The income from all sources for the year amounts to \$16,767.10, as fully shown in the Treasurer's statements.

WEEKLY OFFERINGS.

The total receipts on this account amount to \$8,161.65 in envelopes, and \$1,469.71 by plate collections, making the weekly average \$185.21. Comparing the returns for this year with those of 1891, there is a balance of \$353.45 in favor of 1892.

The usual Thanksgiving Day Collection was taken for the benefit of the Montreal General Hospital, and amounted to \$195.35.

Notwithstanding the satisfactory manner in which the Weekly Offering Fund is being maintained, the Court takes this opportunity of informing the Congregation that many applications are made for assistance by deserving objects which, owing to our limited resources, we are unable to help. We would, therefore, urge upon the Congregation the importance of not only sustaining their present liberality, but, if possible, materially increasing their contributions, so that we may have the privilege of helping forward every good work undertaken for the Master. In this connection we would also ask the careful consideration of the Weekly Offering Scheme by any who have recently joined us, as well as others who may not yet have fallen in with it. We can confidently say that no one has given this plan a fair and earnest consideration without being struck with its efficiency, simplicity, and elasticity; and as it is the only means whereby we provide for Gospel ordinances among ourselves, and for all other Missionary and Benevolent Schemes of our Church, it should commend itself to every member and adherent of the Congregation.

#### PEW RENTS.

The Revenue from this source has been \$4,465.85, being \$328.31 less than the previous year. This decrease is not owing to any falling off in seats unrented, for the number of these has considerably increased, but from the fact that included in the account for the year 1891 were amounts got in for arrears which materially increased the returns for that year. It may, however, be well to say here, that if all Pew Rents due to 31st December, 1892, had been paid in, the account would have appeared much more satisfactory, and the Court trusts that this reminder may be sufficient to prevent the recurrence of this unsatisfactory condition of things another year.

#### BUILDING OR REAL ESTATE ACCOUNT.

The receipts for the year on this account have been \$850, which with a balance of \$538.61 from Pew Rent account, has been applied in payment of former obligations, as also for further improvements during the year. It is hoped that by the payment, in 1893, of final instalments on promised subscriptions, supplemented by a surplus from Pew Rents, that this account may be finally closed.

#### FOREIGN MISSION SCHEME.

The subscriptions toward this fund during the year amounted to \$1,114.47, while the expenditure has been \$1,200. It will thus be seen that had it not been for the balance at credit of the fund at the beginning of the year, there would have been a shortage. The Court believes it is only necessary to remind the Congregation of the importance of the work in which Mr. MacVicar is engaged, to secure all that is needed to sustain him in his good work.

The following papers have been distributed during the year, among the various classes :—The "Westminster Quarterly," The "British Workman," The "Children's Friend," and the "Infants Magazine." Thirty-eight new volumes have been added to the Library, and forty old books rebound. In all, more than \$130 have been expended in providing wholesome reading for our pupils.

#### PICNIC.

The annual picnic was held at Sherringham Park, on May 28th, a date somewhat earlier than usual. We were, however, specially favoured with delightful weather, although both preceding and following days were stormy. Both pupils and teachers, of whom there was a much larger attendance than usual, seemed to enjoy themselves thoroughly. To all who helped by their contributions or labour, we tender our best thanks.

#### FINANCES.

For some time back we have been compelled to make payment for the papers of one year, with the grant for the next. In the last report the hope was expressed, that with the extra allowance from the Deacons' Court, we should be able to begin 1893 clear of debt. That hope has not been quite realized, although our indebtedness has been reduced from \$150.00 to \$9.74; with the ordinary grant and the ordinary expenditure, we should have had a considerable surplus, which might have been profitably spent in the library or elsewhere.

#### MEETINGS.

The devotional meetings of Sabbath afternoons, and the monthly business meetings have been successfully continued during the year, the average attendance at the latter being 18, as compared with 15 for 1891.

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Our library has been kept well filled with good and suitable books, and has been freely patronized by the scholars.

#### PAPERS.

The following papers have been supplied regularly during the year:—Band of Hope Review, British Workman, British Workwoman, Children's Friend, and Children's Record, and are much sought for by the scholars.

#### PRIZES.

Book prizes are as usual given to those who repeat the golden text for the year and portions of the shorter catechism, and a silver medal to the one who repeats the whole of the shorter catechism correctly. A silver medal is also given to the one bringing in the largest number of new scholars during the year.

#### DORCAS.

The lady teachers have met every Tuesday since October 4th as a Dorcas society, and clothing, shoes, etc., are distributed where most needed.

#### SINGING CLASS.

Singing classes have been held every Tuesday evening since October 4th, conducted by Mr. A. S. Ross and Miss Traquair; they have been well attended and were very interesting.

#### BAND OF HOPE.

The Band of Hope resumed its meetings on Oct. 14th, and are held fortnightly. These meetings are growing in interest and attendance each year; a choice programme and an address is given each evening, and the principles and advantages of total abstinence are laid prominently before them each evening.

This year neat badges are given to all who take the pledge, and up to date 133 have signed the pledge book. And we here desire to tender our sincere thanks to kind friends who have come down and assisted us in our meetings.

#### MISSIONS.

The missionary society connected with the school has met regularly every two weeks; the attendance has been much larger than previously, a missionary address is given, and missionary items read at each meeting, and much interest is taken in the work. Letters have been received from our pupil in Pointe aux Trembles, and also an acknowledgment of our subscription for the support of a native missionary in Erromanga, these have been read to the school and help to keep up the missionary spirit.

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Our collections for missions this year amount to \$247.81 by the school, and \$26.00 by the missionary society, and are allocated as follows:

## Aazareth Street Mission.

During the year that has gone by, the Gospel has been preached at the Hall, as in former years. Two services are held each week : both are in reality preaching services. The service on Thursday is usually designated a prayer meeting, but here as on Sunday evening, the people join audibly only in the singing. None of those who attend take part in any other way. The weekly meeting has been larger than usual this year. It is usually an hour in length, and after opening exercises, an address is given on the Sabbath School lesson of the following Sunday.

We find that large numbers of the scholars of the school attend this meeting, particularly of the bible class, and appear much interested. The address given on Sabbath evening has less of an expository and more of an evangelistic character: this meeting is much more largely attended than the other.

On Wednesday evening, fortnightly, a missionary meeting is held, of which Miss Johnson is President. It is called the "Honan Mission Band," and its object is to deepen the interest of the young people in foreign work, particularly in China. Those attending help towards the interest of the meeting, by reading Missionary news, letters from missionaries proving the most acceptable entertainment that can be given. Every letter from the Rev. J. H. MacVicar is sought for and listened to with most attentive care. The students in charge of the Hall attend those meetings, and from time to time give short talks on suitable subjects. Last year the sum of \$26.00 was collected for the work in Honan. The President of this meeting deserves much praise for the interest she has created in this laudable work. The members of this "Band," are having their sympathies awakened for the great world lying beyond; they are taught to be on the look-out for missionary news; much valuable information is received regarding what has been done, and of the gigantic work still to be performed; and best of all the the young people are led to see that they can do something themselves to obey the universal command of "going into all the world."

In the winter season every alternate Friday evening the "Band of Hope" meets. This work is more intimately connected with the Sabbath school: large and interesting meetings are held: the young are instructed on the evils of intemperance. There is no doubt that a good work is being done in this gospel temperance work; saloons are the curse of Griffintown. No other form of vice is so prevalent there as drunkenness, no other form of sin brings so much sorrow and poverty into the home. We believe that the surest step towards the reformation of an intemperate community, is wisely to educate and instruct the young. The Sabbath school work at Nazareth Street is the most excellent of all, and other branches of work are but offshoots from it.

To our superintendent, Mr. Ross, is due the honour of founding, and carrying on this work for many years. His work has been done quietly and unostentatiously, but nevertheless it has been thorough and widespreading in its influence.

We cannot close our report without referring to the changes that have taken place during the year. Mr. J. W. McLeod, who last winter was appointed to the work, graduated in April, and left for a new field of labor. Mr. J. D. Anderson, B.A., began work in October, but unfortunately in the early part of January was compelled to go home because of ill health.

In May we hope to see Mr. Anderson again at Nazareth Street, in restored health, taking up the work he so reluctantly gave up, and for which he seems so well fitted.

On Saturday, the 4th inst. news reached this city of the death of Mr. Tener in California. Mr. Tener laboured at Nazareth Street for two years: during that time he faithfully and lovingly performed his work. Many are the homes that were brightened by his presence; many are the hearts that were cheered, encouraged, and helped by his words of comfort; his earnest and powerful appeals will not soon be forgotten. Our fellow-labourer has passed to his reward, but his work and memory will long be cherished in many of the homes of Griffintown.

In conclusion, we thank "the Lord of the harvest," for the privilege of working another year for the glory of His name.
