VIEWED IN THE UNITED STATES.

Progress of Hostilities Watched With keen Interest—Germany's "Loan" Discussed.

Washington, D.C., April 19.—The President and Secretary Sherman were in consultation several times during the afternoon. It is gathered unofficially that they had under consideration a telegram from Minister Terrell at Constantinople regarding the protection of American interests and the protection of Greek subjects which have been insured to the United States Minister at Athens.

The progress of hostilities is being watched with the keenest interest in military circles here. It may be said that, while the sympathies of the army officers lie largely with the Greeks, they fully expect that the Turks will prevail in the end if allowed to continue their operations.

Something has been said in the Department that the Imperial Government is not at all disposed to yield to the spirit of moderation which the fact that Greece, far from proceeding to acts of hostility against Turkey, has had to suffer during the last few days from repeated acts of aggression upon the part of the Turkish army at several points on the frontier.

The Royal Government cannot let the case in silence the fact that before it was officially notified of the rupture of diplomatic relations, and while the King's Minister at Constantinople was only notified at an advanced hour of the night, the forts at Preveza opened fire at 5 o'clock in the morning on the Greek steamer Miosodona.

In face of these facts, showing there is little foundation for the assertion of the sublime Porte to the effect that Greece committed the first act of hostility, the responsibility for the consequences can in no way rest with the King's Government.

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ROSSLAND'S LOW GRADE ORE

What the Importance of Its Treatment Is.

MANY MINES WILL PROFIT

The Cost of Mining This Ore, Valued at \$8, is Practically \$4 Per Ton,

Which Means Millions to the Owners—Reports Again Received That Le Roi Is to Have a Smelter of Its Own—A Toronto Syndicate to Manufacture Gunpowder

The C. P. R. at Work on the Crow's Nest Pass—C. C. Mining News.

The importance of Rossland to the recent successful treatment of low-grade ore from the Le Roi of course depends upon the quantity of such ore which the camp can produce, and from information to hand it would seem that the Trail Creek mines have produced and will produce lots of it. Among the properties in the camp which will have a thousand tons of low-grade free-milling ore on the dump or in sight are the Centre Star, Le Roi, War Eagle, Josie, Jumbo, Deer Park, Cliff and St. Elmo. It is estimated that the Le Roi has 35,000 tons of this kind of ore on the dump and in sight. The War Eagle probably has 20,000 tons and the Josie not much less. It is impossible to estimate the quantity in sight on the Deer Park, Jumbo or Centre Star, but very large quantities are in the Centre Star. The Cliff has a single chute of ore 30 feet long and 15 to 20 feet wide and will run about \$8 per ton. The St. Elmo has a chute of ore which is 22 feet wide and which has been traversed about 100 feet. There is every indication of its continuance. The total value of the ore in gold, silver and copper is not far from \$10 per ton.

Cost of Mining Treatment. Etc. Capt. Hall, superintendent of the Le Roi mine, estimates the cost of milling and concentration at \$1.25 per ton, the ore to be delivered at the mill and the mill to have a capacity of about 200 tons per day. The cost of mining and transportation must be added. It places the cost of mining at \$2 per ton. The cost of transportation depends, of course, upon the distance the ore will have to be carried. There are two streams near Rossland upon which this will be delivered—Little Sheep Creek and Trail Creek. There is an abundance of water in the Little Sheep below the point where the Sheep Creek flows into that stream at the foot of O. K. Mountain. This point is about three miles from the base of the Mountain and on the line of the Red Mountain Railroad. A very good mill site could be had on this stream. The best place on Trail Creek for a mill, it is said, would be on the ground of the field of Erin claim, a mile south of Rossland, and in plain view of the Columbia and Western Railways. This site is the best for a mill, as it is able to either railroad water, in order to secure the traffic, make a low rate on ore, and be cheaper to construct aerial tramways. The cost of transportation is put at a maximum figure of 75 cents per ton, making the total cost for mining, transportation and milling \$4 per ton. Capt. Hall thinks ore running \$8 per ton on this basis, yield a profit of \$2.50 per ton.

The report is again received that the great Le Roi is to have a smelter of its own. "I do not hesitate to say," says L. F. Williams, one of the Le Roi's chief owners, "that after discussing the proposition, we have come to the conclusion that either the Le Roi Company, or individual members of the company, will build a smelter this summer. The construction will commence before many weeks have elapsed to completion, and the smelter will be in operation by Oct. 1. The plans are somewhat sketchy, but the kind of plant which will be built, or its location, have not been decided upon. It will probably be on the north side of the camp, between the Le Roi and the Centre Star, and will rank with the best in the country. The capacity of the smelter has not yet been decided upon. The work of construction will be in the hands of a well-known and competent smelter man."

Smelter for Penn's Ranch. For some time past a land surveyor at Nelson has been making out surveys for the representatives of a new smelting company. There are conflicting rumors as to who are behind the scheme. The report is to the effect that a strong company of Canadian capitalists are furnishing the money, and another that the Kansas City Smelting and Refining Company will expend \$250,000 on the construction of a smelter. It is, however, evident that a smelter will be put in some place near Nelson. It was first thought that the proposed plant would be built at "Bear's Head," a place now owned by Penn's Ranch. The developments seem to point to Penn's ranch at Five Mile Point as the probable location. The party which owns Penn's ranch offers many advantages. It is situated on the main line of the C.P.R. and is well served by the C.P.R. and the Spokane River branch of the C.P.R. system. It will be directly connected by rail with all the important mining camps of Kootenay.

C. P. R. HARD AT WORK Getting Ready for the Building of the Crow's Nest Pass Railway.

J. H. N. Maplewood, civil engineer for the Canadian Pacific Railway, has charge of a large and thoroughly equipped survey party which is locating the line of the Crow's Nest Pass road westward from Lethbridge, says The Nelson Miner. The party will be in the field until all necessary work is completed, and will cross the Rocky Mountains into East Kootenay. The survey which extends from Nelson to a point where Kootenay River empties into Kootenay Lake. Work on the survey at this end of the line will be finished in a few days.

Mining men of the camp are dissatisfied over the recent advance of three cents a pound in the price of gunpowder, and are endeavoring to have a factory built in the camp, and would be glad to welcome and support a domestic factory.

The Rossland camp uses about \$100,000 worth of powder per month, or \$100,000 in the year, and the consumption is increasing, and the mine owners therefore, think that the price should not have been put up.

The advance of 3 cents, it is understood, means an increase of about \$1 per foot in the cost of development, and, where other things are so expensive as in Rossland, this is a serious matter. Something more may be heard soon regarding the new factory.
