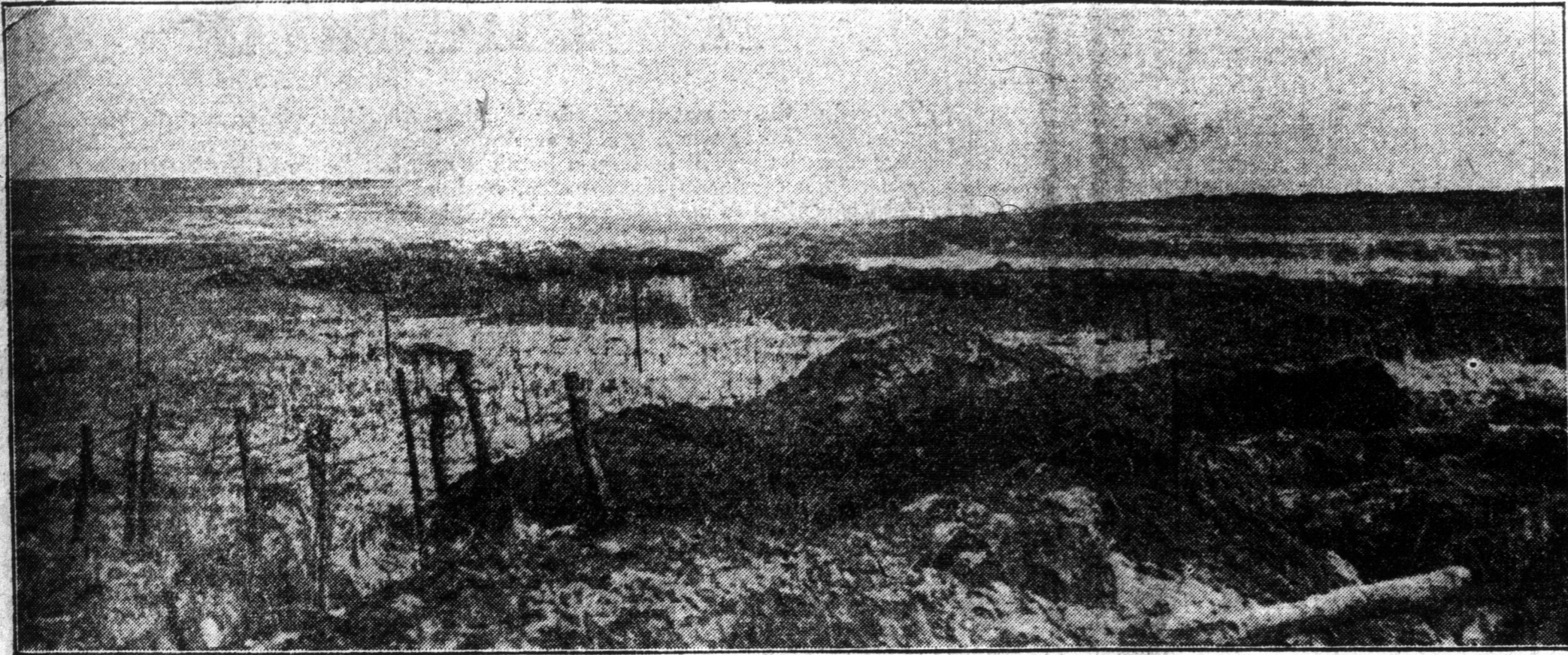

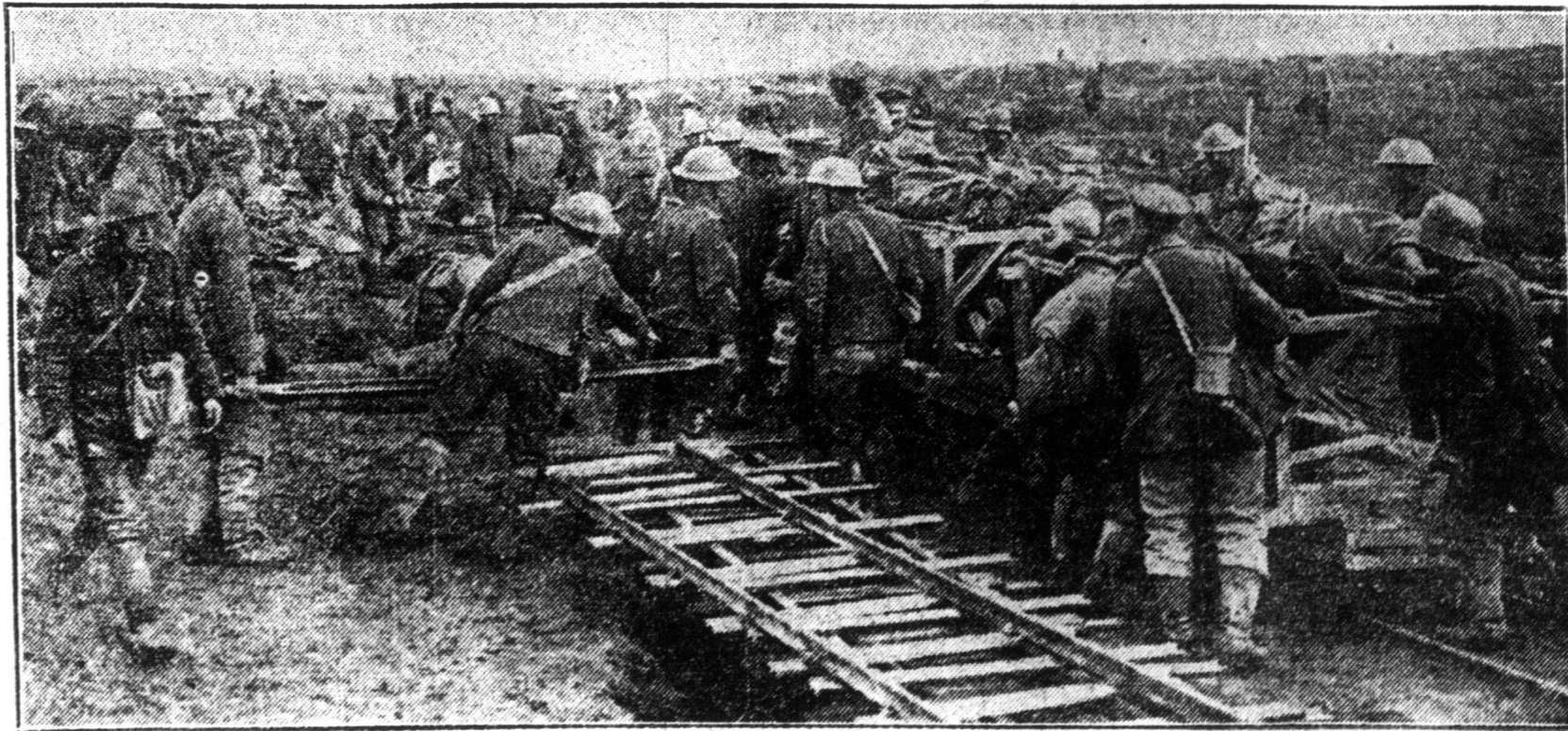

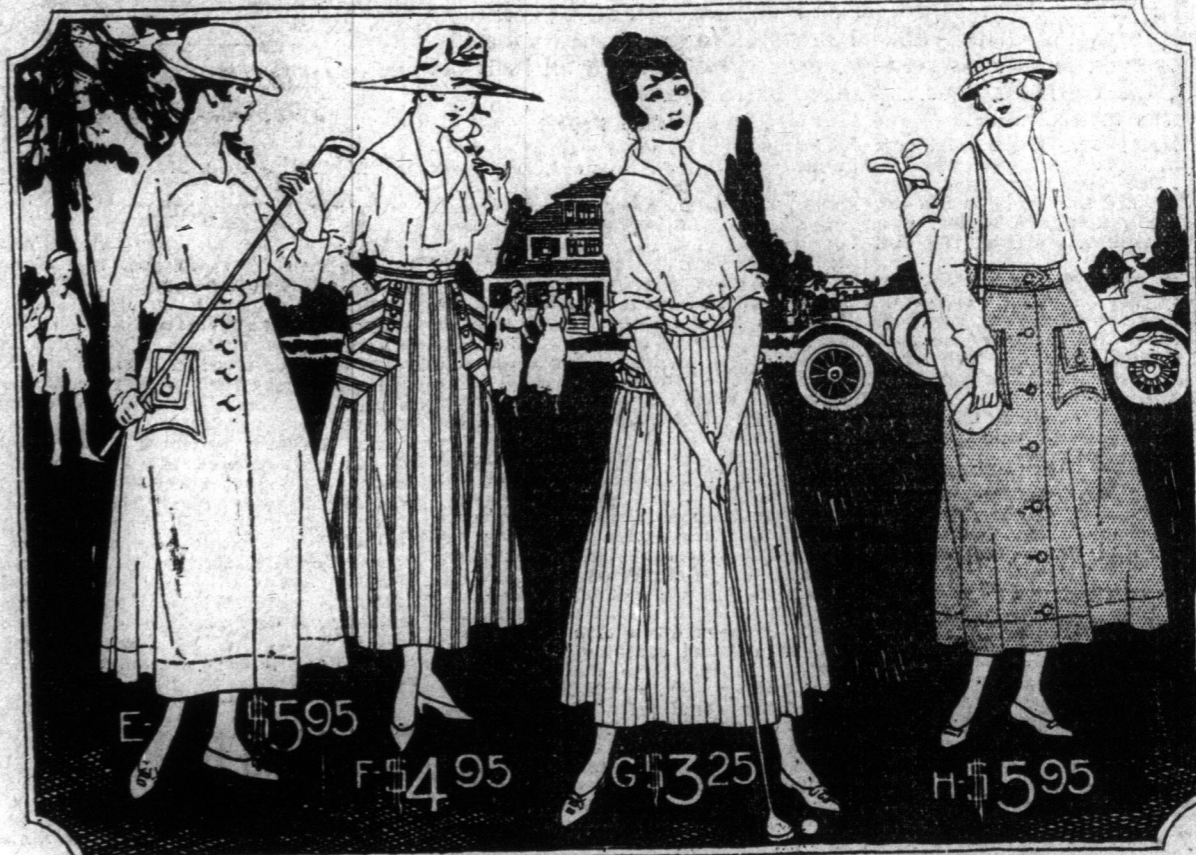

WIDENING OF ROAD WILL BE ORDERED

Railway Board Hears Application of Toronto-Hamilton Highway Commission.

"The board has pretty well reached the conclusion that the road should be widened," said Chairman McIntyre of the Railway and Municipal Board yesterday at the end of an all-day hearing of the application of the Toronto-Hamilton Highway Commission for an order authorizing them to widen the strip of the road for five miles west of Toronto from 18 to 24 feet. But he went on to add that "the apportionment of the cost was a matter of some nicety and difficulty." He was not satisfied by the apportionment of the commission. The board would endeavor to give its decision on the matter in a future so near that construction would not be long delayed, he said.

COMMISSION CHAIRMAN ON THE COAL PROBLEM

Declares Railways Must Give Fuel and Iron Ore Preference Over All Other Traffic.

Fairfax Harrison, chairman of the executive committee of the special commission on national defence of the American Railway Association, deals with the coal situation in the United States in a statement he has recently issued, part of which is as follows: "As the welfare of the nation and the nation's defence are absolutely dependent upon an adequate supply of coal for all purposes and of iron ore for the iron and steel mills, the executive committee of the special commission on national defence has ordered all the railways of the United States to give coal and iron ore preference over all other traffic."

Story of Americans Being at Vimy Not Verified by Records

In a story published in The New York Sun an American lieutenant is cited as declaring that the "lost legions" of Americans in the Canadian Expeditionary Force took part in the engagement at Vimy Ridge. "Our battalion, the 38th," he said, "contained about ten per cent. Americans."

AWARDED DAMAGES.

In the county court yesterday Judge Denton awarded \$250 and costs to Frank Blair in his action for \$1000 from William Walker as damages for injuries sustained when his defendant's motor car collided with his horse and wagon on the Kingston road near Queen street on November 19 last. The plaintiff alleged that the car was on the wrong side of the road and going at an excessive rate of speed.

FIRST RACING LICENSE.

Application for a racing license for the Devonshire Park track at Windsor was the first of its kind ever received the provincial treasurer yesterday. It was accompanied by a cheque for \$750, and will be granted.

SUPREME COURT DECISION NOT LIKED BY JOHNSTON

City Solicitor May Take Murch Case Before Privy Council Judicial Committee.

City Solicitor Johnston is not very well pleased with the text of the judgment of the Supreme Court of Canada on the appeal in the action of Frederick Murch against the city. The judgment holds that the city made a mistake when it paid \$7000 for land expropriated from Murch to the latter's solicitor, A. F. Lobb. Murch did not receive the money, as Lobb absconded soon after being paid the \$7000 for his client.

Russian Soldiers Stay in Jail Until Battalion Goes Overseas

Guilty of wounding Policeman Marshall and Ernest Alto on the evening of April 17 on Queen street, five Russian soldiers, Fred Measick, Harry Bobook, Bill Bobook, Adner Versall and Abraham Grinobuk, were remanded in jail until May 15. The magistrate said that if they fought in France like they did on the street they would be good soldiers. The five men will appear on May 15, when Col. Denison will decide whether or not they will be allowed to go. Harry Bobook was the one who stabbed the policeman with

Rev. A. Strother, of the parish of Mineview and Midhurst, was yesterday transferred by the Toronto Synod to the parish of Creemore, Banda and Lisle, Ont.

Two Drivers Found Guilty Of Stealing Milk Tickets

In the general sessions yesterday a jury found John Fordyce and Thomas Calladine guilty on the charge of stealing milk and cream tickets to the value of \$6,000 from S. Caulfield & Sons, by whom they were employed as drivers. The jury added a recommendation for mercy, and Judge Coatsworth remanded the prisoners in custody till Monday for sentence.

TRAIN MEN EXONERATED ON NEGLIGENCE CHARGE

Men Are Not Held Responsible for Death of Late Col. Macdonald. In the sessions yesterday the jury found John Rose and Patrick Hickey not guilty on a charge of criminal negligence laid against them in connection with the death of Col. W. C. Macdonald on January 21 last at the Union Station.

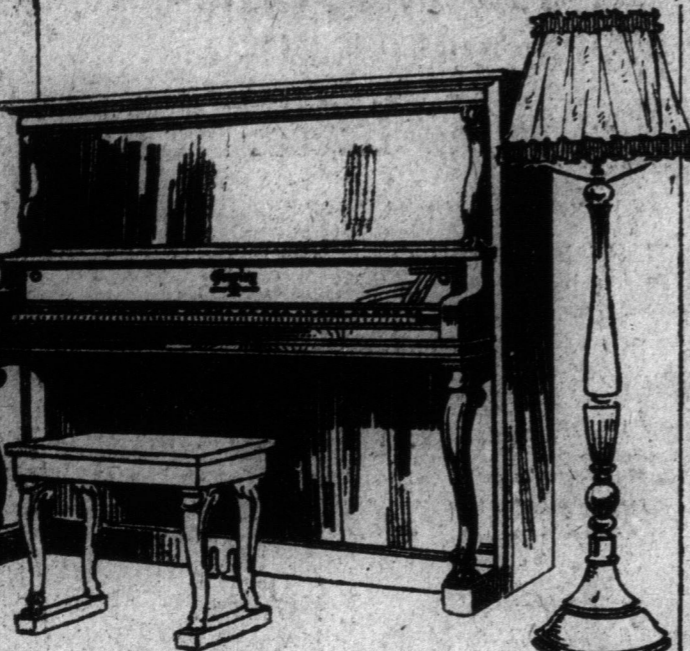

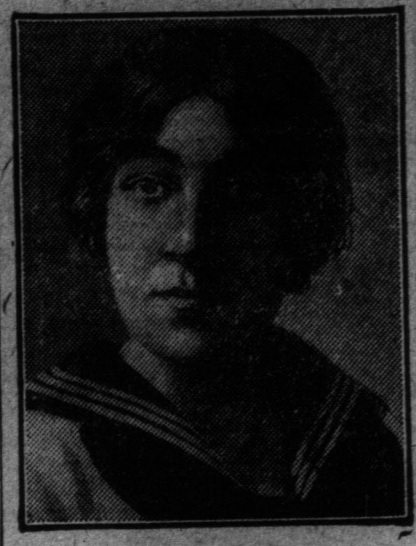
