

S. L. Hertzburg, who was of-ficer commanding the Canadian Engi-neers in Vladivostok; Major J. F. Adams and Captain F. A. Dallon, formerly of headquarters staff of the expeditionary force.

of the terrible ravages wrought Some of the terrible ravages wrought by typhus fever among the Siberian peo-ple were told of by Captain Dailon, who rave as an indication of the extent of the disease a part of the report of a Red Cross worker, which showed that in the jail at Omsk, which normally held three bundred, there were 847 prisoners, most of whom had the dread disease. The work of the engineers in Vladi-vostok was related by Major Herzburs. It consisted, he said, chiefly of building barracks and keeping them in repair which was no easy task in view of con-ditions.

ditions. Major Adams told of the awful politi-cal conditions prevailing at the time. When a man was arrested, he said, he fully expected to be executed, or at least tortured. All the old tortures were used. Shootings in restaurants and public places were common events, he caid, and political prisoners were ex-ecuted daily without trial.





ULSTER DELEGATES AT EMPIRE CLUB

Missionaries Against Sinn Fein Declare Britain Guiltless of Tyranny.

IRELAND PAMPERED

For enthusiasm and willingness to sit out a prolonged session, the Empire Club luncheon broke the record when William Coote, M.P. for South Tyrone; Rev. Charles Wesley Maguire and Rev. A. Wylie Blue spoke as repre-sentatives of the Ulster delegation now touring the continent.

Mr. Coote dealt solely with the reasons that weighed with Ulster in the endeavor to maintain the British imperial connection, and was uncompromising on that issue.

"If there is one thing more than an-other that this club stands for, it is a

"If there is, one thing more than an-other that this club stands for, it is a united British Empire," said President Hewitt, in introducing Mr. Coote to the Empire Club. Their guests, said Mr. Hewitt, were on a missionary jour-ney, and he was satisfied that they were conscientious in their convic-tions. The club desired to view the truth from all angles, and he asked such a sympathetic hearing that their guests would be glad they had come to Toronto. Mr. Coote had no further doubts about the Irishmen present when he heard the cheer they gave. They had fought together to make the world fore, and now that they had defeated the monster of tyranny they were to fight on to preserve the liborites of the empire for posterity.
