



FEAR DROVE GIRL

New York, Dec. 28.—Hounded by members of the Kid Dropper gang and worried because she had been exiled by members of the underworld from the cast side, where her family lived, are are reasons which are believed to have led 17-year-old Edna Churgin to end her life by drinking lysol. This is the opinion of her brothers, Joseph and Theodore, who identified the body of their sister in the morgue and later called at the West 162d street station to take her personal effects. A week ago the girl, who had changed her name to Ada Levine and sought refuge in an apartment at 224 West 15th street, was found suffering from lysol polsoning. She was hurried to the Knickerbocker Hospital, where she died. Unclained, her body was taken to the morgue. Identification was made through an anonymous telephone tip to the police. Identification was first made by Lieutenant Ditach of the Clinton street siation, and later it was confirmed by relatives of the girl. Edna Churgin, the lieutenant remembered, had been held as a material witness—the only one—to the killing on Aug. 10 of Louis Schwattzman of 22 Rutgers street, by two members of the Kid Dropper gang. He was shot down near his home while talking to Edna Churgin and died on the steps of a synagogue with his head cradled in the arms of the girl.

The police believe that Edna Churgin was the direct cause of the shooting of Kid Dropper by Louis Cohen outside Jefferson Market Court. Gossip that came to the police was to the effect that the girl, who lived at 17 Rutgers Place, had been friendly at one time with a member of the Dropper's gang. Then she met Schwartzman, an embroiderer. Schwartzman, it was said, was not a member of any gang, but he was friendly with Hyman Orgie. Orgie is known as Little Augie, the reputed head of a gang that has long been at war with the group once led by Kid Dropper. Schwartzman was warned by gang members to leave the neighborhood, and on the day of her release he disampeared. After that, gang to see the disampeared and the total proportion of the distrib

no attention to the warning. After the shooting the girl was held in \$100 balt as a material witness. She was warned by gang members to leave the neighborhood, and on the day of her release she disappeared. After that, gang hostilities flared up and Kid Dropper was shot to death.

Her brothers said that the girl lived in fear of gang vengeance. At intervels since she went away, they said, she had communicated with them by telephone, assured them she was all right and begged them under no circumstances to reveal where she was. Since she dropped out of sight, they said, messengers, sometimes children of the neighborhood, had come to the house in Rutgers Place, inquiring for her. These inquiries, they thought ariginated with gangsters who were stitler trying to locate their sister or ho sought assurance that she had not gene back home. Sometimes the messengers, they said, brought warnings for her to stay away.

A short time ago the girl telephoned the folks that she would come home if they would move out of the east side. They did move recently, but the girl, driven to desperation, did not come home. Instead she drank lysol and was found dying by those living in the house. Her body laid for a week in the morgue unidentified.



X-RAY WONDERS.

It is estimated that the building, for which plans have been drawn by F. Neil Brodie, will cost \$350,000 and the land and equipment will cost another \$100,000. The building will have 40 class rooms and an auditorium which will seat 1,200.



BILLY GROFF vs.

WOULD IMPROVE ENGLISH RACING

London Writer Advocates That All Horses Appear in Parade.

Although with the close of the flat

is true that geldings play a useful part in the general scheme of racing, equally true that by their performances they do at times draw attention to the value of strains of blood which might otherwise have been neglected. They are however, imperfect animals at best, and by reason of their imperfection enjoy certain advantages from a trainer's point of view, inasmuch as, being less apt to develop heavy crests and tops, the strain on their joints and tendons is diminished, nor do they require so much work as entire horses.

"To these advantages we now make addition of an allowance in weight—a proceeding which is to our mind illogical and is, in fact, tantamount to putting a premium on cracked china.
"It is more or less generally assumed that, other things being equal, geldings are inferior to entire horses in courage and general racing ability. Even if this theory be accepted, we do not see why an allowance of weight should be made to the imperfect animal. Our thoroughbred horses may be bred in the hope that they will win races—but they are also bred in the hope that, having given proof of soundness of limb and constitution on the training grounds, and of the possession of speed, stamina and courage on the racecourse, they may in due course become fit reproducers of their kind. This being so, it seems to us to be another argument against the continuance, of a protective tariff in favor of geldings. For its retention there may be some valid reason unknown to us, and our suggestion being quite open to criticism, we pass on to other matters.



In truth, stage cleaning has not concerned itself with the classics of the English theatre and there is no observable difference in the text of "Hamlet" as it was played at the Manhattan Opera House and its verbal form last season. Arthur Hopkins did not hesitate to restore the classics when he thought that a fuller text than usual would be more effective. He put into his revival of "Macbeth" so much of the speech of the Porter, which is usually deleted, that he found it necessary to follow the general course and remove from the text the realistic lines after the first production.

Locutions that survived from the Elizabethan era, through the Carolinian and Restoration plays, were found too pungent for the dramatists of the early nineteenth century who were even a little shocked at Sheridan. So dialogue became so refined that the reappearance of ugly words could almost be recorded as they took their places again in the vocabulary of the actors. The first production of "La Dame de Chez Maxim" in Paris marked an epoch in the language of the French stage. Then a word which had never before been spoken in a theatre was delivered by

a word which had never before been spoken in a theatre was delivered by the heroine.

In the text of the comedy "Pygmalion" there is a word which until the first performance of this play had never heen used in a play. It was spoken by an actress no less popular than Mrs. Patrick Campbell. Whether the word was ever used again has not been recorded. It served its purpose, however, in providing the shock to the public the author had so carefully planned.

It is more than ten years ago that "Pygmalion" was first acted. Since that time stage dialogue has been enriched or degraded, as the listener may view the result, by so many words previously unheard in stage talk since the Elizabethan days that it is not possible to recall when and how they were once more brought to the ears of audiences. "Rain" has its own special colloquialism. "Roger Bloomer" restored to the spoken text an old English noun which had hitherto needed the authority of Shakespeare or some other great ancient to excuse its use. There is at least one strong term in "The Failures."

So liberally has stage talk been supplied with hitherto inhibited words and phrases that count has been lost even by earnest statisticians of the drama. A history of the contemporaneous flood of expressive words in stage dialogue could not easily be compiled. The texts of the authors abound now in phrases that a score of years ago would have been found inexcusably shocking.

These occur, however, not in the reviews and farces but in the serious dramas, in spite of the compaint that departure from the strictest propriety on the English speaking stage was permitted in frivolous performances, although in serious plays the highest standards of propriety must be observed.



Was Prominent Druggist, in Business Here for Many Years.

The sudden death of Silas McDiarnid, proprietor of the Royal Pharmacy, of his daughter, Mrs. Harold W. Rising, Leinster street. Silas McDiarmid was born at Mascarene, near St. George, in Charlotte county, about 70 years ago, a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Archibald McDiarmid. In 1872, when he was about 20 years of age, he came to St. John and entered the employ of E. J. Mahoney, who kept a pharmacy in Indiantown. After serving about four years with Mr. Mahoney, Mr. McDiarmid went into business for himself, establishing a drug store at the corner of Charlotte and Duke streets, which he transferred after four or five years to Hazen J. Dick, who was married to Mr. McDiarmid's sister-in-law.

Mr. McDiarmid then opened a store in the Royal block at the corner of King and Germain streets, in the same building as the present business, but located on the street co-ner, now occupied by the C. N. R. ticket office. He also established a wholesale business in the same building, but later removed that part of his enterprise to Market Squarc, where it was known as the McDiarmid Drug Co., and was later taken over by the National Drug and Chemical Co., when that company was formed. Mr. McDiarmid then confined his whole attention to the retail business in the Royal block.

Last winter, however, Mr. McDiarmid was taken ill and since that time he had been in the store only at intervals, the business in the meantime bervals, the business in the meantime bervals and the meantim





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
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
