One must conclude that it was not always legitimate for the business man to take what he could get.

But good intentions to carry on business on a high and honest plane were not sufficient. The Golden Rule was a general and not a specific rule. It was essential to have wider knowledge of the complex nature and the far reaching consequences of business.

In order to prevent the recurrence of conditions through which the world was passing it would be necessary to have knowledge that would permit of a control of such things as inflation. It was in such a manner that the problem of unemployment would have to met and studied if it were hoped to devise means to avoid a like condition in the future. The significance of the application of the Golden Rule in industry and business was that it placed a Christian valuation upon life and upon the goods of life. After all personalty was the supreme thing in industry. The individual must not be used merely to multiply gains of the proprietor. The individual and his personality should be regarded as an end and not as a means. To know, understand and direct his workers to win their love and comradeship was a noble ideal for the business of man.

radeship was a noble ideal for the business of man.

Moreover, the speaker declared, this could be made to pay. He believed that the day of profit-sharing with employes was coming and a day of better relations and better understanding between employer and employe would soon dawn. He believed that that day would be brought about not by the teachers but by men of high ideals in industry itself. The principles of justice must pervade international as well as industrial relations.

If employers could carry these principles into the business of this year, if they would establish better relationships between themselves and their employes, they would be doing a greater service for the community and making a splendid contribution to the social life of Canada.

Other Speakers.

A. O. Skinner, one of the pioneer organizers of the R. M. A. in St. John, proposed the health of the association in a toast to which Robert Strain, of Woodstock, responded. During the course of his address, Mr. Strain paid tribute to the manner in which Miss F. D. 



Paris, April 8—R. E. Duke, pilot of the English plane which crashed into a French Goliath, on the Paris-London acrial express route yesterday near Thieulloy died in the hospital at Beauge consciousness. FORD TO BUILD BIG PLANT May Supply Detroit With Electrical Power for Trolleys.

Detroit, April 8—Henry Ford is planning the erection of a 10,000,000 kilowatt power plant, presumably on the River Rouge. This became known at a River Rouge. This became known at a meeting of the Detroit Common Council, when Superintendent Frank Mistersky, of the Public Lighting Commission told the council that Mayor Couzens had been negotiating with Ford for the supply of electrical power sufficient to operate the city-owned car lines and to take care of the city's extra needs in the way of street and building light.

At present the city is buying extra current from the Detroit Edison Company. The city lighting plant, producing 6,800 kilowatt power, is inadequate to meet the city's needs.

Mayor Couzens, Mr. Mistersky said, learned of the enormous electrical power plant which Ford is planning, and believed that if arrangements could be made to obtain current from this source it would obviate the necessity of the city spending \$11,000,000 or more for a municipal plant.

Negotiations with Mr. Ford hase not progressed to a definite point, however, and the Mayor, Mr. Mistersky said, wanted immediate steps taken to insure for the city sufficient current.



Lloyd George's intention is to secure a convincing majority in the House of Commons for a resolution embodying his cherished Genoa programme of European rehabilitation. This Genoa mission, on which the premier is taking his family, is regarded by him as the crowning achievement of his priemiership. He thinks the hope of Europe's peaceful and prosperous future depends on its success. After he returns from Italy, at the conclusion of this mission, Lloyd George will take a much needed rest. But one gathers that the rest might conceivably take the form of a general election campaign, on issues directly raised by his resignation. The crisis of this possibility is expected about the merry month of June.

At the moment Lloyd George presents a romantic figure to the world. He is the sole and solitary survivor of all the illustrious and distinguished men who figured conspicuously in the great politics of the war. He is alone the continuous confident of history since the strenuous confident of history since the strenuous weltpolitik of Versailles to the present day. 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
