Names of Two Judges Are Heard As Possible Members

MR. DUGAL'S SPEECH IN THE HOUSE

Opposition Member Today Formally Presented His Motion in The Legislature—Fredericton Comment on Situation—Another Caucus

(Special to Times) Fredericton, N. B., April 9.—There was great interest in the house proceedings this afternoon when Mr. Dugal formally laid his charges before the legislature. In doing so, he spoke briefly in English and asked the permission of the house to continue in his native tongue. Mr. Dugal said:—

"I am sure you, Mr. Speaker, that I would much prefer to deal with this matter in my native tongue, when I could more fully enter into details, but the electors of this province are looking not so much to eloquent speeches as to the proof that I have to submit to the committee to be named by you. I will therefore content myself with these few remarks in English and crave the indulgence of the house to speak briefly in French."

Dies as Body Of Wife Is Being Laid In Grave

John Major, Aged Resident of Queensbury, Suddenly Passes Away

Fredericton, N. B., April 9.—John Major, an aged resident of Queensbury, died suddenly at his home yesterday. His wife had died two days previously and the funeral took place yesterday. Being too feeble to attend, he was left at home and when the funeral party returned they found him dead. He was ninety years of age.

DID NOT TAKE THE BAIT

LIBERALS CHECKMATED

UNIONISTS SEEKING TO VENTILATE GRIEVANCES

London, April 9.—The Standard claims to have obtained a copy of the government's reply to the resolutions of the House of Commons on the subject of the proposed extension of the franchise. The government has definitely decided in favor of the dissolution of parliament in June, probably towards the end of that month. The general elections would take place in July.

P. E. I. FINANCES

Premier Matheson's Budget Speech and Criticism by the Opposition Leader

Charlottetown, P. E. I., April 9.—Premier Matheson delivered his budget speech in the legislature last night. Actual receipts last year were \$208,558 being \$4,777 more than estimates, and actual expenditures were \$460,987 being \$9,874 less than estimate, making an actual surplus of \$14,681. For the coming year he estimates receipts at \$629,264, and expenditures \$638,697, a surplus of \$9,067. Last year the debt was reduced by \$24,969. This year the estimated reduction is \$30,000.

TURN DOLLAR INTO \$1024 AT ROULETTE

Society Woman at Cannes Has Remarkable Run of Luck Playing "the Black"

Cannes, April 9.—A well known society woman residing at Cannes, whose name is not given and has won \$1,024 for \$1 in a "little fling" at the tables at Monte Carlo. When playing roulette she placed one five franc piece on "black" "Black" turned up and the ten franc was left.

BISHOP IS FREED

Threat Had Been To Crucify Him on Good Friday

Mexico City, April 9.—After spending more than a week in the camp of Zapata a rebel bandit, in fear of crucifixion, Bishop Campos of Chihuahua, reached Iguala today, having been saved from a terrible death. Catholics expressed the greatest relief as it was feared the threats of the rebels would certainly be carried out unless a ransom of 50,000 pesos demanded by Zapata reached the rebel camp before Good Friday, when it was declared the bishop would be crucified.

ELATED BY SUCCESS, NOW PLAN TO MAKE CHICAGO DRY CITY

Chicago, Ill., April 9.—Inspired by their victories in the Illinois local option elections the Temperance forces today issued a call for a delegate convention next Monday, to formulate plans for a wet and dry vote in Chicago at the majority election next spring.

WOMEN'S EASTER FINERY CAUSE OF TRAGEDY

New York, April 9.—Angered by the display of Easter finery which his wife and three daughters were showing him last night, William Weiss of Mount Hope, a suburb, seized a shotgun and shot himself through the head, dying instantly. When Weiss upbraided Mrs. Weiss and his daughters, they laughed at him, for getting angry.

GRAND ORANGE LODGE RESOLUTION ASKED FOR ITS WITHDRAWAL

Matter of Elementary History of Canada Purchased From Father Cormier

Hon. Mr. Clarke, in answer to Mr. Dugal's inquiry in the N. B. Legislature yesterday, said:—

Q.—Is it the intention of the government to publish the Elementary History of Canada purchased from Rev. Father Cormier for \$1,000? Answer.—Yes. Q.—Why was the manuscript which was revised by Professor Uprahl of the university staff and cost so much money not published? Answer.—Answered by question one. Q.—Did the government or any member of the government receive any profit against its introduction in the public schools? Answer.—Yes. Q.—If any protests were made, who met them and what was their nature? Answer.—The resolution of the Grand Orange Lodge of New Brunswick, asking the withdrawal of the manuscript. The \$1,000 paid for the manuscript will be returned to the revenue of the province when 10,000 copies of the history have been sold. The history referred to is being published in both French and English without any extra cost to the revenue of the province.

PROPERLY FORBIDS A BOXING TOURNAMENT FOR FRENCH WOMEN

Paris, April 9.—M. Hennion, prefect of police, today forbade the holding of a proposed boxing tournament for women to decide the world's championship. Many protests were received by the police against the tournament on the ground it would foster brutality among women. Several female boxers had given notice of their intention to participate.

EMPEROR DOWAGER OF JAPAN DIED TODAY

Tokio, April 9.—The Dowager Empress Haruko died at the imperial villa at Nanshan today. She was born in 1860.

ENGLISH REPRESENTATION IN MONTREAL COUNCIL IS ONLY TWENTY PER CENT

Montreal, April 9.—The final results of the municipal election show that the English minority has lost two seats in the city council and that, whereas it has forty per cent of the voting community, its representation is only twenty per cent.

NEW BRUNSWICK MAN RETURNS WITH SON

Eastport, April 9.—F. H. McOutcheon, of Kings county, N. B., whose sensational recovery of his infant son from his wife who ran away from her home and took refuge with friends at Lunenburg attracted considerable attention, left on the steamer Grand Manan on Monday for his home. It is understood that his wife is not to attempt to get possession of the boy.

AND THEN THEY RAN AWAY

Three New Friends of Fred Eaton Held His Money Before Showing Him Signs of Boston.

Boston, April 9.—Fred Eaton about 60 years old, who just arrived on an ocean liner from Liverpool, Eng. to visit this country, was fleece out of \$240 in cash by three confidence men in Foley street, Charlestown, Eaton was met by the three young men to whom he expressed a desire to see the places of interest in this section, including the Bunker Hill Monument.

A QUEER CASE

Interesting disclosures were made in an affidavit which was read in the city court this morning by Dr. Wallace, R. C., when the case of a former bank clerk who was used for an amount due for board and lodging for his wife was called. In this affidavit it was stated that the defendant, who is under twenty-one years of age, was forced into marriage with his wife who is sixteen years of age by the threats of her father, made through a lawyer, and that the young man lost his position in consequence of such marriage.

SUICIDE AT NIAGARA

Woman Rescued Once, Throws Herself In Again

Niagara Falls, April 9.—Mrs. Elta Nagnorn of Buffalo committed suicide here yesterday by throwing herself into the rapids of the Canadian channel, from the Third Street Hotel. The woman having been once rescued and returned successfully fought the efforts of Constable Martin who, after she threw herself in, pulled her ashore with a pile pole. When he succeeded in getting the body out of the water, life was extinct.

COURT FUNCTIONS ARE TOO EXACTING

Report Says King and Queen Will Abolish Them

TWO TO BE HELD IN MAY

King Also to Have Two Leveses—May Take Place of the Court Receptions After 1914

New York, April 9.—A cable from London to the New York American says of all the things the king and queen like least are the court functions. The long train of presentations is wearying in the extreme. An unceasing repetition of bowing and smiling to hundreds of gorgeously attired women is a trial on the nerves, which take a lot of keeping up. The late King Edward was no lover of these court ceremonials and on more than one occasion he very nearly collapsed.

It is an open secret that next year these courts will be abolished. Even the formal and strict attender for etiquette, Queen Victoria suffered severely through the court ceremonials, and she often left early commiserating the then Princess of Wales (now Queen Alexandra), to take the general presentations.

Next year the old practice of afternoon drawing rooms is likely to be revived, when a tea room will be substituted for the present supper. During next month, there will be two courts. One is to be held on a Friday, and the other on a Monday. These will be held during the first half of May and two more will be held by the king at St. James Palace in the same month.

Many in Nebraska and Wisconsin Change From Wet to Dry Column

Fifteen Towns For Sunday Baseball Five Against—Socialist Defeated

Omaha, Neb., April 9.—The local option elections on Tuesday in Nebraska resulted in seventeen changes from wet to dry and nine changes from dry to wet in 140 townships. No less than 150 were involved. Fifteen towns voted in favor of Sunday baseball and five against.

Milwaukee, Wis., April 9.—Throughout the state interest in Tuesday's election centered in the license question. The larger cities voted wet. Out of fifty-seven places thirty-seven went wet and twenty dry. Unofficial returns did not change the estimate of Tuesday night that the city would be a dry town.

London, April 9.—The Syndicalists are taking measures to bring about a general strike in the autumn, according to the Standard, in order to procure an advance of \$1.20 in the weekly wages of all workers. So far, however, many of the responsible leaders of the trade unions oppose the idea.

THE SUFFRAGETTES

Belfast, April 9.—Militant suffragettes continued their campaign of arson in Ulster today by setting the torch to Orland, an old mansion near Carrickfergus, on Belfast Lough. The residence was burned to the ground.

A young woman also is wanted in connection with the murder.

The shooting took place last night in a cafe. Woods, Francke and the woman were said to have been drinking together when argument over equal suffrage arose.

J. Fred Belyea, Assisted by Musical Artist, Announced His Platform From King Square Bandstand

The unpleasant weather did not deter J. Fred Belyea, candidate for commissioner, and his musical announcer and megaphone artist from appearing in King Square last evening to discuss civic issues, and at times there were several hundred people gathered about the square. W. G. Bingham, the megaphone man, proved to have a powerful and rather pleasing voice, and his solos were greatly enjoyed.

There was no regular set speech, but Mr. Belyea's platform was put forward, a plank at a time, by the musical announcer. He advocated, among other things a change in the law to give all police court fines and liquor licenses to the city instead of making a division with the provincial government. He also contended that time had been wasted in holding the fisheries sale by the mayor and commissioners. His stand on the encouragement of sport was put forward at some length, and this part especially appeared to be received with favor by the younger portion of the occasional audience.

MAN DEAD FROM GAS

Wife and Niece Near Death When Neighbor Breaks In

Boston, April 8.—Giuseppe L'Eana, aged forty-five, is dead, and his wife, Vincenza, aged forty, and a niece, Miss Josephine C. Alagio, aged nineteen, are in the City Hospital as a result of gas poisoning at their home in Roxbury, a basement tenement in the three-story house.

James Scigliano, who is acquainted with the family, had occasion to visit the tenement about 10.30 a. m. and when he rapped on the door and got no response he became alarmed. There was an odor of gas about, so Scigliano went to a rear window and broke it.

He crawled through and found the tenement filled with gas. He began to open doors and windows and called to neighbors to send for a doctor. In the rear rooms were Mr. and Mrs. L'Eana, while the niece was in the front room. Between these two rooms is a kitchen. Attached to a fixture from the center of the ceiling is a gas tube connected to a stove. The tubing had become detached during the night. But the gas had been turned off at the stove, instead of at the fixture, so this allowed the gas to escape into the rooms.

Doctor Hays was called, and he pronounced the man dead. A call was sent for an ambulance, and the two unconscious women were sent to the City Hospital. While waiting for the ambulance members of Ladder 13, nearby, worked over the women, applying first-aid treatment.

Hon. J. D. Hazen will leave for St. John tomorrow, where he will spend the Easter week and endeavor to straighten out his own and the party's troubles in New Brunswick. Mr. Hazen will probably go into council with the party leaders in New Brunswick in connection with the troubles arising over the charges just made in the New Brunswick legislature against Premier Fleming.

It is stated here by the members for New Brunswick that Premier Fleming's resignation is a certainty, and that a reorganization of the provincial government must take place.

LIVELY TILTS IN BUDGET DEBATE

Mr. Turriff Scores Sir Melvin Jones

BARGAIN WITH GOVERNMENT?

Western Member Asserts Interests Have Been Granted Demands While Farmer and Consumer Are Refused - Adjourned For Easter

Ottawa, April 8.—"A raw, cold deal for the farmers and the common people, with everything for the interests," was the vigorous arraignment of the Borden-White budget by Mr. Turriff, who continued the debate in parliament today. "The manufacturers get everything. The rest of Canadians get nothing and pay more. However, I am not going to blame the premier or minister of finance. They were not elected under false colors. They are protectionists and servers of the corporations. But the people are getting a serious lesson as to what it means to elect men of that ilk to handle their public affairs."

"The refusal of the finance minister to do anything reasonable or fair for the farmers in the matter of agricultural implements synchronizes with the party flip over of Senator Jones," said Mr. Turriff. "If there was any man in Canada who had good reason to stand by the Liberal party, it was this man. When some years ago the Liberal government decided to make some reductions in the tariff he was granted a drawback, and last year the Massey-Harris Company, according to the auditor general's report, received some \$185,000 in drawbacks. But because Liberalism believes that the time has come to grant free implements to the farmers, this man, who has had all the favors, turns upon them. He was made senator and knighted by the kindly offices of the former government. I don't know that the present leader of the opposition put the hyphen in his name, but he did almost everything else for him. And now when Liberalism seeks to do something deserved and overdue for the farmers of Canada, this man goes to our friends opposite and makes a deal under which no more than ninety cents per year is to be given each farmer, and he will transfer his allegiance from the Liberal to the Conservative party. We know who gets the benefit of the deal, but the farmers of Canada are paying for the support of Senator Jones to the Conservative party."

Mr. Turriff figured out that the "top of so-called reduction" given to the farmers on two implements amounted to \$5 on the cost of a binder and \$2 to \$2.50 on the cost of a mower. It was equivalent to 80 cents a year for each Canadian farmer in every province. He noted that the government had selected the two implements upon which the Canadian farmer paid the least of the general higher percentage for his implements paid by him over that paid by the American farmer.

Canadian farmers paid 64 per cent. more than American farmers for their corn binders; 29 per cent. more for their reapers and mowers; 37 per cent. higher for their hay rakes; 39 per cent. higher for their spreaders; 69 per cent. higher for their disc drills; 65 per cent. higher for their disc harrowers; 28 per cent. higher for their ploughs, and 88 1/2 per cent. higher for their ruggens. Why was not justice done them upon these implements?

"The trouble is," he said, "that the finance minister turns a deaf ear to the farmer and a ready ear to the railways and the manufacturer. Moreover, it stands also to the disadvantage of the farmer that this government, deliberately and with malice aforethought has degraded the Transcontinental—which was built to ensure the farmer low freight rates—and has degraded it at the instigation and for the benefit of the Canadian Pacific Railway."

Cockshutt Satisfied.

W. F. Cockshutt (Brantford), after criticizing the Liberal course in connection with the Transcontinental and making reference to several alleged scandals under Liberal rule, paid a lengthy tribute to the policy of protection. He cited speeches by Unionist politicians in England and laid stress upon what he claimed to be the satisfactory position of Canadian working men and Canadian farmers.

these firms, as otherwise inquiry would be worthless.

Hon. W. T. White said that where necessary he had inquired into this matter. As to home companies, however, there was no question of watered stock, since no dividends whatever were paid on the stock.

Mr. Turriff said that evidently this inquiry had applied to only some of the companies. He instanced the case of the Massey-Harris merger, he said, had represented only fifty per cent. on the dollar, out of date machines being listed at full price to account for the inflation.

Mr. Turriff then read a list of American and Canadian agricultural implement prices which showed that the Minneapolis quotations were lower than those in Winnipeg. In the case of an eight foot binder the Minneapolis quotation was \$150 and the Winnipeg one \$164.

Hon. W. T. White asked what the difference was in freight rates between Hamilton or Toronto and Winnipeg and Chicago and Minneapolis.

Mr. Turriff said that it was evidently not too great to allow the Cockshutt Plow Company to ship 1,000 miles west of Minneapolis to compete with American made plows, after they had paid the duty. He went on to emphasize the great difference between the American and Canadian figures for agricultural implements.

Mr. Turriff said it was impossible to do away with depression by increasing the burdens of the people.

"What is the remedy, free trade?" asked Major Sharpe.


Mr. Turriff said, no. There was no man in Canada less anxious to hurt the manufacturer than he was, but let the farmer sell his wheat to the best advantage and he could buy from the manufacturer enough to keep him busy.

The Liberal party, he said, would welcome another election on reciprocity.

ANOTHER GREAT DEAL IN LONDON PROPERTY

Lord Howard de Walden Sells 62 Acres—S.P. Derbyshire Apparently Intends to Develop Them

London, April 9.—Another great London land deal has been concluded by which S. P. Derbyshire acquired the whole of Lord Howard de Walden's Regent's Park estate for more than \$2,000,000.

In point of size this is said to be the largest transfer of London property that has for a century taken place, for the total extent of the estate is 62 1/2 acres. It contains 750 houses, divided among some twenty streets. A police station, St. Stephen's church, four large schools and eight public houses are within the area.

Mr. Derbyshire is a director of several companies and senior partner of a firm of chartered accountants, but in this purchase he is acting for himself alone. Apparently his intention is to demolish the old-fashioned buildings and convert this part of London into a new Mayfair.

Whole Council Sent to Jail. Munich, April 9.—All members of the Municipal Council of Partendkirchen, in Upper Bavaria, have been sent to jail for insulting a woman teacher with whom they had a dispute in reference to her place of residence. The woman sued the members of the council for insulting her. The court decided in her favor and sentenced the burgomaster and the three members of the council to two days' imprisonment.

Spokane, Wash., April 9.—Robed in flowing baptismal raiment of silk, Mrs. Christina Johnson, aged sixty-one, wife of an engineer; Mrs. Rhoda Howarth, aged fifty-six, wife of an iron moulder, and George Spencer Bennett, aged ten, were immersed in the swimming pool at the St. Nicholas Hotel at 7:30 o'clock on a recent morning and admitted membership in the Church of Latter Day Saints by Spencer Madison, presiding elder of the local congregation of the organization.

Arrangements for the baptism had been made early in the week with Col. H. P. Whaley, chief clerk at the St. Nicholas Hotel, and the women's rest room in the St. Nicholas Turkish bath adjoining the pool, was set aside for the use of the converts, where they were prepared for the ceremony by women members of the local church. Following the baptism the neophytes were confirmed by Elder Madson, the full ritual of the Mormons being followed.

About fifty persons, including members of the church, guests and attaches of the hotel lined the edge of the big tank, filled with 65,000 gallons of tempered water. Among the witnesses were several young women teachers from schools in central Washington towns, who heard that the baptism was to take place and remained in the city to witness the ceremony.

This is the second baptism of Latter Day Saint converts that has taken place in the St. Nicholas bath in the last few weeks, and others are being arranged for.

VALLEY RAILWAY BILL IS HELD UP; WILL BE INQUIRY

Governor Wood Hears Whole Story; Legislature Will Probe Charges

HOUSE TO ADJOURN TODAY

At Long Caucus All Ask For Investigation Into Serious Charges—Statement That One Estate Paid \$1,830—Valley Railway Bill Laid Aside Till After Easter

Fredericton, April 8.—The timber bonus and Valley railway charges, in spite of the brave parade last evening in the House, will be fully investigated.

The House, which was to meet at 8 this evening to rush the Valley bill through, did not meet until 10.45—and it did not touch the Valley legislation then.

From 8 till 10.45 the government members were in caucus and after nearly 3 hours of grave deliberation the following official statement was given out by the government:

"The government called their supporters in the legislature together this evening and announced to them that they had determined to have the fullest and most searching investigation of all the charges pertaining to both the Crown Land Department and the St. John Valley Railway which had been preferred in the House by Mr. Dugal.

"The announcement of the course to be pursued by the government received the most emphatic approval of the members present.

"The House will be adjourned on Thursday for the Easter recess until some day next week which has not as yet been definitely decided upon."

The House was only in session a few minutes after the caucus adjourned.

No statement was made as to when the Valley railway bill will be considered again, but it is thought not until after the Easter recess.

A CHANGE IN THE WIND.

Wiser counsel prevailed this afternoon and evening among the members of the legislature, and instead of the Valley railway legislation being forced through the House, as was predicted and expected, the session was not convened at the hour named, 8.30 p. m., the members being in caucus until nearly 11 p. m.

It is reported that consideration of the charges made by Mr. Dugal took up most of the time. Many of the representatives, who were swayed greatly by the appearance and reception to the premier last night and who had determined almost to ignore the charges made against him in regard to the bonuses and in connection with the construction of the Valley railway, changed their minds today and thought it best that the air should be cleared.

ONE MAN WHO PAID \$1,830.

There were some who thought that the charges in connection with the lumber bonuses were not sufficiently explicit, and that the names of some of the holders of timber limits who were "held up" should have been given. They seemed to forget that the license-holders are not on trial, and that it is not usual to give the names of witnesses before the trial; but in order to satisfy those who wish more specific information, it may be stated that the Timothy Lynch Company, which holds 122 1/2 miles of crown timber lands under license, paid \$1,830 into the blackmail fund.

Mr. Lynch, a well known lumberman died some years ago, and the lumber company of which he was the head included the most of his property. Two of his executors are Judge Barry of this city and James Robinson of Millerton.

The money was paid upon demand and found its way through the usual channel to headquarters.

It is said that these and many other facts were placed before Governor Wood today, and there is not any doubt but the Chief Executive will do what he thinks right and proper under the circumstances.

FULL INQUIRY DEMANDED.

There was a decided revolt among the more prominent men in the legislature. They demand the fullest inquiry into both charges made. They are not disposed to listen to technical objections that the charges are not specific. They are plain enough for the most rigid investigation. How that investigation will be conducted in what must be thought out and determined. Not a few of the members are in favor of a royal commission, and the adjournment of the legislature until the report is ready.

This is a busy season; the session has been protracted, and they would rather return home than wait here adjourning from day to day while the inquiries are in progress.

In the meantime, of course, the Valley railway legislation must wait; but it is the opinion that this delay may save the province hundreds of thousands of dollars.

IT MUST COME OUT ANYWAY.

F. B. Carvell, M. P., who is solicitor of the estate of the late Timothy Lynch, states that no matter what is decided on he has authority to begin suit at once for the recovery of the money extorted from his client for the blackmail fund. He will not mince matters, but join in the suit for recovery Premier Fleming, superintendent of Scales Berry, the manager of a bank and others connected with the transactions.

In the meantime a flood of information regarding Valley railway affairs is pouring into the hands of the opposition. The revelations will be surprising, and those members of the legislature who have placed faith in their leaders and their officials will be astounded at the way they have been hoodwinked.

There is increasing sentiment that the autocrat from Maine shall have nothing more to do with New Brunswick's affairs or the Valley railway.

AN OTTAWA INQUIRY TOO.

The federal parliament, in view of the turn affairs have taken, will no doubt demand a full explanation, for it is to give additional aid for the big bridges.

The appointment of a Royal Commission to investigate what has been the cost of the road would no doubt be most satisfactory, in that quarter.

It is stated that the caucus tonight also considered several amendments to the highway act. This legislation was passed last session and has not proved satisfactory. What the amendments are, or when they will be brought down, are not spoken of.

BOTTOMLESS LAKE

Discovery Made by Foresters of Canadian Department in Rockies

In the heart of the snow-clad Rockies, hundreds of miles west of Edmonton, lies a lake whose waters are always troubled, into which a large river flows but out of which there is no visible exit. The leader of a forest survey party sent out by the Dominion Forestry Branch to examine the forests in this wild region says that the Indians shun this lake as the abode of evil spirits, and give credence to the superstition, from time to time deep rumblings may be heard where far below the surface the water swirls through the hidden outlet. The river that enters the lake runs down the valley, the portal of which no man has ever yet passed.

This summer the Dominion Forestry Branch sent eight survey-parties into the forests of the far west, and the story of their experiences reads like fiction. One party spent the summer in the wild region of northern Manitoba; three parties were in the hill country of Saskatchewan north of Prince Albert; one party was in the Rockies all summer; another was cut off from civilization for several months in the low-lying muskeg region of northern Alberta near Lesser Slave Lake, and two parties explored the remote upland plateaus of the railway belt in British Columbia. As one of the party chiefs writes: "A forester needs to be here, besides all other professional titles, a real bushman, an axe-man and a jumper."

The total area examined last summer was 11,000,000 acres, yet this is but one branch of the Dominion Forestry Branch's work of segregating and securing for the proper use of the present generation and posterity, the vast areas of mature timber, young reproduction and fire-scarred brule lying between the prairies and the barren lands in the great north west.

New Deputy Minister. J. U. Vincent, former assistant deputy minister of inland revenue, has been appointed acting deputy minister. An order-in-council creating the appointment was made at Ottawa yesterday succeeding Wm. Hinworth, superannuated.

London, April 8.—Lieut. General Sir Henry Crichton Slater has been appointed adjutant general to succeed General Sir John Ewart, who resigned with Field Marshal Sir John French, because of the Ulster difficulties.



EDUCATE YOUR STOMACH

Hot Bath Before Dinner Urged to Prevent Indigestion

An interesting pronouncement on indigestion was delivered recently at the Institute of Hygiene in London, by Dr. W. Solkan Fenwick.

Dr. Fenwick dealt with the question in a thoroughly scientific way, pointing out that small errors in diet, or even in hygiene, were allowed for by nature and need not arouse grave anxiety. In the liver nature had provided an "inspector" for the system. The liver tested all the products of nutrition before these were allowed to enter the blood stream proper and threw out the

harmful ones. Unhappily, in certain instances the liver was unable to perform its work efficiently.

In such cases the general health of course suffered. The stomach then began to deteriorate as an organ of digestion. The action of the stomach was under nervous control, and undoubtedly nervous people tended to suffer from indigestion. But it was absurd to say that all indigestion was nervous. Anything which affected the general vitality affected this process.

Indigestion could often be traced to overfeeding after a serious illness before the body had had time to recover itself. It was necessary to educate the stomach. Those who lived on rich foods and pre-digested foods tended to suffer for it.

Delicate children often had their digestion ruined by the very efforts which were designed to conserve them.

Another common cause of indigestion was a slipping downward of the organs of the body on account of lax support. This accounted for about 10 per cent of the indigestion in London. In this respect the "straight fronted" corset was a greater advance on its predecessor which had a narrow waist line, and hence tended to increase the trouble. A hot bath before dinner was often a great help to appetite and hence to digestion.

Miss Frost's exchange, from building taken over by C. P. R. to 116 Charlotte street.

R. J. Logan, who moved from the same building, is now located in the Telegraph building, corner of Canterbury and Church streets.

The new building for the Bank of British North America is nearing completion, but while the upstairs offices will be ready by May 1, the ground floor will not be ready for the bank until later in the summer.

The new C. P. R. building is being erected rapidly as possible, and as soon as the ground floor is ready the city ticket office, from the Royal Hotel building, and the Dominion Express Company, from the lower block in King street, will move in. Later on, when the upper portion of the building is ready, the C. P. R. general offices, from the Bank of Montreal building, and the C. P. R. Telegraph Company, from Prince William street, will make the move to their own building. These changes will all lead to other shifts to fill the offices vacated by the railway and express companies.

F. J. Roche's Company, from the Foster building, are now in the Hall building, King street, and next year expect to move to Charlotte street, near King.

Rond's restaurant has secured the premises now occupied by Arnold's department store, but will not move for a year or two, and when they do their store will be taken by Walter He Bell, who has purchased the building.

THE PINKERTONS; AN EXPLANATION

In the Times last evening was published a statement telling of local banks receiving a circular letter issued by the Pinkerton National Detective Agency of New York warning the public that collectors for Pinkerton and Company's United States Detective Agency have been calling on bank officials, merchants and manufacturers attempting to secure contracts for handling collections, and setting forth that the last named agency had been endeavoring to secure business on the strength of the name and reputation of the Pinkerton National Detective Agency. The circular also referred to a bill reported to be filed in the circuit court of Cook county, Illinois, to restrain and enjoin people who have been soliciting collections under the name of Pinkertons, from continuing the scheme. The statement also was made that this case was pending trial.

The Times today is informed by Fred Cobolan, maritime province representative of the Pinkerton & Co., United States Detective Agency that this article was misleading—that the fact is that the suit referred to was dealt with in December, 1913, by Judge Tutthill, of the circuit court of Cook county, and his honor ruled "that the application for a temporary injunction was granted for in said bill of complaint be and the same is hereby overruled, and a temporary injunction denied."

Following this judgment, it is learned from papers shown by Mr. Cobolan that Pinkerton & Co., United States Detective Agency have brought an action for \$100,000 damages against Pinkerton National Detective Agency, in the circuit court of Cook county.
