





South Bruce has justified the confident expectations of the Liberals, and Mr. Truax, their candidate, has been returning the properties of the government side. The constituency went Conservative in 1911, and, so, it constitutes a distinct gain to Sir Wilfrid Laurier, offsetting the loss in Chateaguay. The result would seem to bear out what Conservative experts freely admit—that it is hard to reduce the present Liberal representation from Ontario, and that it will surely climb again, lacking a momentous issue such as reciprocity. Whatever the local conditions—a German vote hostile to the naval contribution — a Scottish vote, by heredity, hostile to the Conservatives—the result will make the Ottawa authorities "sit up and take notice." And this will do no harm—rather will benefit follow. The fact that Sir Wilfrid has gone to the sister province and lifted a Tory scalp will give him more prestige in Quebec. Next bye-election here we may expect to hear the rallying cry of "Do as well by me as the men of South Bruce."

Theories Regarding Derivation From Greek and From the Bible

There has been much discussion concerning the origin of the word "Mephistopheles" in the past which has, moreover, as yet ended in no very satisfactory conclusion. Some very bizarre explanations had been propounded before the time of Goethe, who was himself forced to own to the Musician Zelter in a letter of Nov. 20, 1829: "I cannot give any definite answer to the question. "Whence comes the name Mephistopheles?"

According to one theory, it was a hy-

any definite answer to the question. Whence comes the name Mephistopheles?"

According to one theory, it was a hybrid Greco-Hebraic formation of mephis and tophel (the liar); according to another, its etymology was entirely Greek—very dubious Greek—mephostophilos, "he who does not love the light." Though this derivation is hardly acceptable it appears that this was the original form of the name, the second vowel being replaced by i at first in England whence it was taken into the popular German mysteries.

In the last number of the "Goethe Jahrbuch" Herr Oelhke gives an entirely novel derivation which, if far fetched, has at least the merit of originality. It is based on two names found in chapters IV and XV of the Second Book of Samuel Mephiboschetu and Architophel. He reminds us that it was customary in the Middle Ages when giving names to evil spirits to refer to the Old Testament. Hence the combination "Mephistopheles."







Present Conditions

New York, Nov. 1—At this time of year, under normal conditions, orders from the railroads for steel should come in in good volume, but these orders are thus far small and disappointing. The Steel Corporation statement for the quarter ended September 1st shows earnings \$38,450,400, only once exceeded in the same quarter. Wall street had, it appears, been led to expect over \$40,000,000, and was, consequently, disappointed. Steel orders have fallen off and prices have declined, but decrease in activity is due probably not so much to smaller demand, but because buyers believe prices will be further reduced and are holding off. And in many other trades buyers are waiting for lower prices. In most lines of dry goods quotations are firm and volume steady. The copper outlook is fairly favorable. The purchase in London of \$2,000,000 in gold for New York indicates possibilities of gold imports, if needed. \$1,350,000 gold has gone out to Canada this week. On Monday the German Bank reduced its rate from 6 per cent to 51-2 per cent.—an indication of decline in volume of business there. The Bank of England's rate remains unchanged at 5 per cent.—Both this bank and the Bank of France gained gold this week. Call mone's here went to 10 per cent. on Friday, due, it is said, to the half in collection of coupons under the income-tax complication. Time money is easy at 5 per cent.—The market is almost entirely in the hands of traders, with practically no public interest. High-grade bonds have been nearly all absorbed by strong institutions. There is plenty of investment money holding off for clearing skies.




