





This is the highest test of loyalty to truth. So that whether that which you have in your soul today, which burns like a living flame, shall be accepted by the race or not-if you lay down your own good for the good of a race that shall be, then you have manifested the greatest loyalty to truth that can be manifested by anyone, and the truth has come, and your reward shall be the love of the people.

Do not now say I lift the standard too high. The standard of God cannot be lifted too high. The standard of truth/must ever be

high above the standards of the world, and the standard-bearers of truth must ever be in advance of the great march of the world be hind them. Therefore, do not lower your standard one inch. Do not stay your progress one moment. "Do I need to send a wedding gift in such and such a case?" is one of the most frequent etiquette questions that my postman brings me. And I always find it a difficult matter upon which to give advice. You never NEED to send a wedding gift. It is simply a matter of your own discretion and desire and should be looked upon in that light much more than it is now.

It is not customary to send a gift in response to an invitation to a church wedding unless one of the principals is someone whom you know very well.
