SIR WILFRID IN FINE FORM IN FIRST SPEECH

Mr. Borden Given a Neat Set Back in His Naval Policy Criticism—Premier Speaks on Reciprocity and Recent Bye-Election

Ottawa, Nov. 21.—Hal. McGivern, M. P. of Ottawa, moved the address in the house today and Mr. Laurier of Kamouraska seconded it. Mr. Borden followed. He said Sir Wilfrid had virtually bribed the west with promises of public works.

Sir Wilfrid followed, and was in great fighting form. He declared that the one idea today was the question of better trade relations with the United States. There could be no greater agency for peace and good understanding between the United States and Great Britain, and nothing would better promote that than improved commercial relations.

A good commercial treaty would be of benefit not only to Canada but to the mother country as well. For years Canada had been seeking better commercial relations with her great neighbor, and now that better relations had been established there were many in Canada, and all of the opposition, who declared that they should not take a step to promote the abandonment of the preference which Canada had won in Great Britain.

THE TORREY MEETINGS Judgment Day Subject Last Evening—Big Building Again Crowded

The interest in the mission being conducted by Dr. Torrey in the Queen's Hotel, continues as keen as upon the opening night and last evening the big building was again crowded to the doors. There was a larger representation of the city clergy than usual and the address of the speaker was followed with close attention throughout.

Lloyd George in Fighting Speech Speaking in the east end of London tonight, Lloyd George said the schemes for the reform of the lords the government would consider at their leisure. Under that adumbrated by Lord Lansdowne, every radical bill would be sent to a referendum. The government would have none of these schemes.

Referring to the Tories' sarcasm about the "dollar dictator," Lloyd George remarked they begged the last time was a German invasion. Since when, he asked, had the British aristocracy started despising American dollars, which had buttressed many a tottering noble's house.

In regard to the constitutional issue, he said, no country in the world would stand the British second chamber. It was like a car on the same track. The chancellor took his hearers to the House of Commons in search of a similar institution. In imagination he interviewed the Australians and inquired if they had anything like the descendants of the French filibusters in Britain. He got the reply that they had a few years ago bushrangers, who, however, only stole cattle, not land. These had been hanged before they had the opportunity of founding families. (Laughter.)

**WINNINGS IN THE AIR**

**\$85,000 IN SIX MONTHS**

He Charges \$500 for Taking a Passenger up, if Only for Ten Seconds—Was Unsuccessful Auto Racer

Philadelphia, Nov. 22.—Claude Grahame-White, the English aviator, has accumulated something like \$85,000 during the last six months through giving exhibitions with his biplane. He says he will accumulate a like amount within the next six months.

For his flights here Grahame-White will receive about \$15,000. In his recent flights at Bowdoin, he cleared up during just before coming to America he received \$2500; the Brockton fair netted him another \$15,000, while for the recent flights in New York he received about \$30,000.

White's real revenue producers are his passenger carrying flights. For these he charges the passenger \$500, no matter whether the flight lasts ten seconds or ten minutes. Before becoming an aviator White was a successful automobile racer.

LEFT OF THE SIX HUNDRED

The Balaklava Charge Survivors at Their Annual Dinner

Thirteen survivors of the famous Balaklava charge dined at the Holborn Restaurant in London lately as guests of the fund which has been raised for some years past by T. H. Roberts, the Earl of Cardigan, a kinsman of the famous officer who led the charge, cleared up during the evening the following telegram, dated "Buckingham Palace 7:20 p. m." was read: "The King and Queen warmly thank the survivors of the Balaklava Light Brigade for their kind message, and trust that those who are celebrating that event of any kind will enjoy a happy anniversary."

It was pathetic in a way, but pleasantly pathetic to watch these old men arrive. Some came by omnibus; some, more robust than the others, had journeyed by train from the country; one arrived in a taxicab, and another was wheeled in a Bath chair. One, again, had a nurse, and another limped into the room on the arm of two friends. All were smiling as they greeted each other as old friends and discussed their battles over again. There was one exception. He was an old man, a very old man; his name is Spring, and he once served in the 11th (Prince Albert's Own) Hussars. He sat alone, a melancholy figure in spite of the brave display of medals on his well-worn black coat. "Thinking of old times, Mr. Spring?" he was asked. "No," answered the old man, "not of old times but of the future. At my time of life it is perhaps just as well that I should."

Later on Mr. Spring, with some outward show of tolerance accepted a cigar from Lord Cardigan's case.

Another old hero assured our representative that his right leg was the best leg on any man in England but for the fact that it was paralyzed. If it were not for that, he explained, he would be able to walk as well as any one. A third was rather doubtful about the others present. "They come up to me," he remarked, "as if they were old friends, whereas I can't remember having seen them before. The fact of it is that they are doing."

Still, this was not the case with some of the veterans present. For instance, there was Alderman J. A. Kilvert, of Wednesbury, who retired as sergeant-major. He is still hale and hearty and a busy worker in the cause of education and municipal improvement in the "Black Country." He with six others is not dependent on the fund as a matter of fact. He is a subscriber to it—and he, in spite of his three score years and twenty, talked of the days when he was a young man.


Canada Rich in Iron. It is now known positively that iron ores abound in practically every province of Canada, says Cassers Magazine. Only eight iron mines are in operation, and only one of these is producing as much as 100,000 tons of ore in a year, it is true; but active preparations are being made in the eastern provinces for exploiting the recently proved deposits of ore on a large scale.

At present the chief Canadian blast furnaces draw most of their ore from Belle Isle, in Conception Bay, near St. John's, Newfoundland.

Newfoundland is very rich in iron ores, and nearly 1,000,000 tons are mined annually, most of which is used in Canada. But enormous and rich reserves of hematite ore have been found in New Brunswick, within easy distance of large coal fields.

Deposits of large quantity and high quality have also been proved in Ontario, Quebec and Nova Scotia, in the east, and in Vancouver and British Columbia in the west.

Recent investigations conducted by the department of mines, together with private prospecting, inspire the hope that Canada is as rich in iron and steel making materials as the United States.

## The Evening Chit-Chat

By RUTH CAMERON

THE etiquette of the acknowledgement of wedding invitations and announcements is a subject about which I am so often quizzed that I am going to try to blanket the whole subject with a few simple rules.

An invitation to a home wedding or wedding reception does not require an acknowledgement if you intend to be present. It is, however, a very kind and courteous thing to send an acceptance. If you do this, the acceptance should follow the general style of the invitation. That is, if the invitation is informal, the acceptance should be the same; if the invitation is the regular third person formal affair, the acceptance should be formal as well.

Mr. and Mrs. So-and-So accept with pleasure the kind invitation of Mr. and Mrs. So-and-So to the wedding of their daughter on Wednesday evening, Oct. 17, at seven o'clock.

If you do not intend to be present, send two visiting cards to the bride's parents, mailed so as to reach her home the morning of the wedding. The idea of the two cards is that one is for the bride, the other for her mother.

It is not necessary to acknowledge an invitation to a church wedding. But in this case also it is a mark of thoughtfulness and courtesy to go through the absolute requirements and send either a regret or acceptance.

An announcement of a wedding does not require any acknowledgement. If it is the first news you have had of the marriage, and either of the principals is an intimate friend, it is courteous to write him or her an informal note of congratulation.

"Do I need to send a wedding gift in such a case?" is one of the most frequent etiquette questions that my postman brings me. And I always find it a difficult matter upon which to give advice. You never NEED to send a wedding gift. It is simply a matter of your own discretion and desire and should be looked upon in that light, much more than as a social obligation.

It is not customary to send a gift in response to an invitation to a church wedding unless one of the principals is someone whom you know very well. It is customary to send a gift in response to a home wedding, but by no means obligatory. If you are but slightly acquainted with the principals do not feel that such an invitation imposes any obligation whatever.

When for any reason, a couple have a quiet family wedding without outside guests the close neighbors and intimate friends usually send gifts despite the fact that they were not invited to the wedding. Such gifts may be sent before the wedding or on receipt of the wedding announcement.

Wedding gifts may be sent any time during the three weeks before the great event to the wedding day itself, but kindness and consideration for the bride will suggest sending the gift a few days before the event, so that will make less rush and confusion for the bride on the last day or two.

A wedding gift, even if it is sent by a friend of the groom who never even heard of the bride, should still be addressed to the woman in the case.

## Daily Hints for the Cook

**EGGLESS CAKE.**  
One cup maple syrup, half cup butter, one cup sour milk, one heaping teaspoon soda, quarter teaspoon salt, one cup raisins, little citron. Add a little of all kinds of spice according to your own taste. Don't get in too much. Flour to mix—about 2 1/2 cups.

**DELICIOUS JUMBLE.**  
Two cups of sugar, one cup of butter, half cup of milk or cream, two eggs beaten to a stiff froth, add a little of all kinds of a lemon, with flour enough to roll. One teaspoonful soda. Roll thin and bake quickly. If too rich for taste, take one cup of milk.

**STUFFED DATES WITH WHIPPED CREAM.**  
Remove seeds from choice dates. Fill with English walnuts and press into original shape. Steep in a little hot water, adding sugar and lemon juice at the last. Whip a cup of double cream and a cup of milk with whip churn. Remove the froth, drain and serve with the dates around it.

**COCOANUT CUSTARD PIE.**  
Scald one pint sweet milk and turn to a stiff froth on half cup hot cream. Beat two eggs, two-thirds cup sugar and a little salt together. Add this to milk and coconut. Bake in a deep plate with under crust.

**MORNING NEWS OVER THE WIRES**

Henry Bourassa, the Nationalist leader, left Montreal last evening for New York en route for Europe. He will spend about six weeks in France and Italy.

In the police court in Fredericton yesterday Daisy Wilson, formerly of St. John, was fined \$100 for conducting a disorderly house. A man found in the house was fined \$50. A druggist was fined \$50 for violation of the Scott Act and sentenced to one month imprisonment for a third offence. The latter case will be appealed.

The accounts of the late Mrs. Julius Inches were passed in the York county probate court yesterday. Receipts amounting to \$2,700 were shown. Dr. P. K. Inches, of St. John, was present as executor.

Through the generosity of an unknown donor the policemen of New York will receive turkeys. There will be \$200 distributed, costing the donor about \$10,000.

Coal shipments to the St. Lawrence from Sydney closed yesterday with the despatch of the steamers Kron Prinz Olaf and Fritz.

The coroner's jury in the inquest on the body of Edward McGregor, of Digby, yesterday brought in a verdict that death was caused by a blow from an axe found near the body, by some person or persons unknown. They recommended a thorough and searching investigation. The axe was identified by William Tebo, brother of the man under arrest, as his property.

Montreal, Nov. 21—Directors of the Royal Bank of Canada today declared a dividend at the increased rate of 12 per cent per annum. For some time the bank rate has been 11 per cent.

**SARDINE FISHING HAS BEEN FAILURE**

**Story of Big Prices Declared Absurd—Hard Winter Outlook**

Discussing the sardine fishing today, James A. Belys, K. C., president of the Charlotte County Weir Owners' Association, said that a story published some days ago to the effect that fishermen were getting a big price for hogshead for sardines as a result of a quarrel between the Eastport and Lubec fishermen was untrue.

"It is perfectly absurd, and the person who wrote it knew absolutely nothing about the conditions prevailing," said Mr. Belys. The sardine fishing this year, he said, had been a failure. There were some cases, he said, where as high as \$30 a hoghead was paid, but this was for a larger herring which in any case would command a good price. As to any harvest that was being made, he said that the season was already closed for sardines, and there were none to be had.

A peculiar feature, Mr. Belys said, was that there were plenty of fish but for some unaccountable reason the schools of fish kept away from the nets. There were banks of fish off the Wolves, but they were driven away by the silver hake and codfish.

At Deer Island, N. B., there would, he thought, be much distress this winter on account of the collapse of the fish industry. This same condition applied to Grand Island, Back Bay and other places where the fish catch was usually plentiful, and suffering must result.

### ALLAN LINER COMES DIRECT

Pomeranian Makes No Halifax Call—Was in Bay This Morning

The Allan liner Pomeranian, from London and Havre, passed Bear Island at 9 o'clock this morning bound for this port, and is expected to dock between 3 and 4 o'clock. She has about eighty passengers.

This is the first trip of this line direct to this port, as formerly the steamers have called at Halifax. Last season it was decided to make the Halifax call one way only, on the run this way, the outward call being discontinued. It may be noted that the Halifax call is to be dropped altogether, though Manager R. B. Teakle said today that he did not know if this would be done.

## BALTIC BIG COMPETITOR

### Cutting Into Canada's Spruce Market in Great Britain

#### MR. TATHAM HERE

Representative of Greatest Firm of Lumber Brokers in the World Speaks of Conditions Affecting Lumber Situation

A visitor in St. John during the last few days was T. L. C. Tatham of London, England, representative of the firm of Churchill & Sim of London and Liverpool, the largest timber brokers in the world. His visit was of much interest to local lumber operators and shipping men and, although he did not come on business, advantage has been taken of his presence in the city to discuss matters relative to the lumber trade between Canada and the motherland.

To a reporter who had a pleasant interview with Mr. Tatham yesterday he spoke of the condition of the lumber trade in England especially as it applies to Canada. "The general position of the home spruce market," he said, "is that, prices having risen due to expenses in manufacturing and other such causes, more money is being put by English capitalists into the spruce forest of Russia and consequently a larger product is being sent from Baltic ports to the British market. Year by year the amount is increasing and this naturally comes in competition with Canadian spruce."

Asked if this was seriously affecting Canadian spruce shipments to the motherland, Mr. Tatham said that at times it was affecting them seriously, but not every year.

From the Baltic to the British market, he said, was a matter of only four or five days and the freight was lower than that to be paid on shipments from Canada, but there were factors that tended to even up matters somewhat. On the whole, however, the Baltic was becoming a strong competitor with Canada in the British spruce market. The great danger to the Canadian trade, as he saw it, was that the price obtained by Baltic shippers in the British market was an excellent buying price for the Russian shippers and led to a tendency to send in heavy stocks which might overstock the British market to the detriment of the Canadian business. As an instance, he said, there were more than 200 lumber shippers at one Baltic port.

Speaking of the birch trade, Mr. Tatham said that competition had been developing in that also. It was found in a cheap mahogany which was being sent in from Africa.

The firm of Churchill & Sim has been in existence since the early part of the nineteenth century and is known in all countries as the largest firm of timber brokers in the world. They are selling agents for many of the St. John shippers. Mr. Tatham, who had spent St. John on his way to New Orleans, left for the south last evening.

### BRIDGE APPOINTMENT CAUSES PRETTY FUSS AMONG CONSERVATIVES

#### Defection From Party a Result—Candidates' Friends Speak Their Minds Over The Matter

There is insurrection in the Tory camp over the appointment of a new caretaker of the Suspension Bridge. Samuel A. Shann, having been given the position, as announced already in the Times. A strong applicant for the position was George Burns, a Conservative, son of the former caretaker whose tragic death while on duty caused such deep sympathy for his family. Had Mr. Burns been appointed, his friends say, it would mean that his mother, now eighty years old, would not have to leave the home that has been home so long and seek elsewhere a place to spend her remaining days.

Again John Britney and his friends are reported to be sorely disappointed over the way things have gone. Mr. Britney has been with the Conservative ranks for years and he and his backers feel that he has been ill used when opportunity came to reward hard and faithful work. It is openly stated today that Mr. Britney and others who were strong for his claims will be no longer allied with the Conservative party and that Lancaster will not be the only place where this will be felt.

### MATTER OF ENTRANCES TO BARS IN HOTELS

Rev. Mr. Robinson Says He Will Place The Matter Before Moral and Social Reform Council

In connection with the charges made in the police court yesterday afternoon by Rev. W. B. Robinson during the trial of the Hotel Edward, for having more than one entrance to his licensed bar, the Rev. Mr. Robinson said this morning that he was going to lay the matter before the Moral and Social Reform Council with the idea of asking the attorney-general to investigate the actions of the liquor license inspector. He declined to say anything more about the matter at the present time. Inspector Jones declined to discuss the matter.


