Moscow, May 7.—In the absence of any satisfactory explanation from the German government concerning a recent police raid on the Soviet trade headquarters in Berlin, the Russian government is taking an increasingly serious view of the affairs.

M. Krestinsky, Soviet Ambassador in Berlin, is expected to return to Moscow forthwith to confer with the Government regarding further action. All the Soviet newspapers describe the incident in scare head type and publish condemnatory editorials in which they warn Germany that if adequate apology is not forthcoming, complications may ensue from which Germany will be the first to suffer.

Berlin, May 7.—Satisfaction not having yet been given by the German government for the police raid on the quarters of the Russian commercial delegation here, the Russian embassy has announced that it is temporarily putting an end to all commercial relations with Germany in addition to thosing the commercial office in Berlin.

In an interview with the United Press, Herr Hergt, a former Prussian Minister of the Interior, who recently rose to leadership of the powerful Nationalist group declared his followers would make only such concessions as it was "physically possible to meet.". Certain reservations, he added, were "unrenounceable."



In the traffic report for March, the total number of passengers carried was 726,332, as compared with 707,840 for March of last year; total car miles run were: March, 1924, 102,080; March, 1923, 92,930. Of the passengers carried 61.2 per cent. were on the \$1 a week pass, as compared with 58 per cent. for March 1928.

The number of passenger per car mile operated was 7.1, as compared with 7.6 for the same month last year. This dropping off was accounted for chiefly by the fact that the car mileage on the East St. John route had been doubled, but outside this the average had increased.


