LIBERAL LEADER TO ANSWER MEIGHEN

Will Open Ontario Campaign on Sept. 20.

The Farmer-Labor Situation in Ontario—Reported Opponents for Lindsay Crawford in St. Ann's, Montreal.

Toronto, Sept. 10.—Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, leader of the Liberal party, will open his Ontario campaign by a mass meeting in Ravina Rink, West Toronto, on Tuesday night, Sept. 20. West Toronto is in the riding of West York. It was said that Hon. Mr. King will devote his speech to a reply to the address of Premier Meighen at London.

Woodstock, Ont., Sept. 10.—Karl Homuth, labor member in the legislature for South Waterloo, addressing a public meeting here last night under the auspices of the Independent Labor Party of this city discussed the much talked of agreement between the farmers and labor men, wherein the farmers were to support the labor nominee for the legislature and in return secure labor support in electing a member to the federal house. He pointed out to the farmers that they were in honor bound to carry out the agreement and he said that in case the labor men did not receive the promised support they had a right to throw their support elsewhere.

The labor member's remarks were devoted almost entirely to an effort to bring together the farmer and the labor forces in North Oxford.

Opponents for Lindsay Crawford.

Montreal, Sept. 10.—Lindsay Crawford, national president of the Self-Determination League of Canada, who has announced his intention to run as a candidate in the federal elections for St. Ann's division, this city, may have to fight a flock of fellow nominees according to political gossip retailed by the Gazette.

Among those whom the newspaper says have been asked to run in St. Ann's are Dr. J. J. Guerin, Dennis Tansy, former M. L. A., and Alderman Thomas O'Connell.

DAIL TO MEET ON NEXT WEDNESDAY

May Have to Widen Scope of Leaders' Powers.

Matter of the One Condition in Lloyd George's Invitation to Conference.

London, Sept. 10.—Premier Lloyd George's invitation to Eamonn De Valera and his colleagues to confer as a basis for a settlement of the Irish question must await action by the Irish republican parliament. That body will meet in secret session on next Wednesday, at which time, it is assumed, the premier's latest offer will be submitted, and a decision will be reached as to acceptance or rejection of the invitation.

It was understood when the republican parliament adjourned at Dublin recently that it had conferred plenary powers on Mr. De Valera and his colleagues. The news from Lloyd George, however, is asserted to have brought a factor into the situation which made it necessary for the Dail Eireann to meet and widen the scope of the mandate it gave its leaders.

The members of the Dail, it is pointed out, took the oath of allegiance to the Irish republic and the government of the Irish republic, and pledged themselves not to yield voluntary support to any pretended government, hostile or inimical thereto.

Thus it would appear the condition that there could be no separation of Ireland from the British Empire, which was laid down by Lloyd George, would in effect call upon Mr. De Valera and his ministry, creators of the parliament, to recognize a government, authority or power in Ireland other than that of the Dail Eireann, if they accepted his invitation. It would also seem that they must be especially empowered to meet the premier on the basis laid down in his latest note.

CONJECTURE AS TO CHOICE OF THE PRINCE FOR BRIDE

Field Narrowed by Royal Marriage Act—Rumanian and Italian Princesses Mentioned.

(Toronto Mail and Empire.) Who will be the next Queen of England? In other words, whom will the Prince of Wales marry? The question is said to be one that is frequently discussed by British statesmen, who desire that the prince shall choose a bride against the time when the crown passes to him. Every now and then the London correspondent of an American paper raises the question, and from the frequency with which these speculations are made, we gather that the American people are taking a keen interest in the subject. It may be that they have a secret hope that the prince might choose one of the daughters of their house, and thus justify in part the notion of the playwright who wrote "Just Suppose."

Wherever the prince goes on his travels he becomes immediately popular, and had he been free to choose, could have selected among millions of charming young girls. But the prince is not altogether free to carry out his own fancies in the realm of matrimony, even if he should happen to have fancies.

Changed Ideas.

Modern ideas upon the subject of royal marriages, that is to say, opinions that have grown up since August, 1914, have not been collected, but we have reason to suppose that the old views have been materially modified. Previous to that time, royal marriages had just two main objects. One was to provide heirs for the crown, the other was to draw more closely together the nations represented in the union.

Must Marry Royalty.

The British Royal Marriage Act forbids the Prince of Wales to marry any one not of royal blood. It also forbids him to marry one not a Protestant. If this act is to control the choice of the Prince of Wales, his choice would seem to be limited.

The royal families of both Norway and Sweden are without princesses. Princess Marie Jose of Belgium is only fifteen years old. Princess Juliana of Holland is only twelve years old. There are no princesses in Denmark. It is longer possible to search among the royal families of Germany, which once were numerous. The Russian royal family has been murdered by the Bolsheviks. These facts seem to narrow the choice down to Rumania and Italy, and there are two Italian princesses eligible, so far as age is concerned.

TRAVEL HEAVY.

ATTRIBUTE HIS SUICIDE TO EXCITEMENT

Raid on Ship at New York a Big Affair—The Captured Goods Worth \$200,000 to \$1,000,000.

New York, Sept. 10.—Investigation of the suicide of Frank J. Fitzpatrick, chief narcotics agent of the Inland Revenue Department for New York, following a spectacular drug and whiskey raid yesterday on the Greek steamship King Alexander, was begun today by Col. O. G. Farrer, executive assistant to the chief of the narcotic division.

Fitzpatrick shot himself twice soon after the raiders had fought a battle in which five men were wounded, and had seized drugs and whiskey valued from \$200,000 to \$1,000,000.

His associates could explain the suicide only by saying that Fitzpatrick had been in ill health for some time and that he might have become temporarily deranged by excitement induced by the thrilling encounter with members of the King Alexander's crew.

Harbor police were grappling near the King Alexander today for the body of Sotiris Mentinis, fourth officer of the ship, who was reported to have fallen overboard after he had been struck with a belaying pin.

Frank White Won Championship of Canada in 100 Yards Dash 29 Years Ago.

A happy co-incidence is the fact that the maritime athletic championships this year will be held on the same date as, twenty-nine years ago, Frank White, who will act as starter, won the 100-yard race in the local baseball firmament.

TRINIDAD HIT BY STORM; MUCH DAMAGE IS DONE

Port of Spain, Trinidad, Sept. 10.—A tropical storm on Thursday caused two deaths and did damage to shipping estimated at \$100,000. The damage from the storm, which was principally confined to the harbor, it was the worst weather within the memory of the oldest inhabitants.

TRANSPORTATION COMPANIES GET WORD OF REPROOF

Deputy Minister of Commerce Cites Complaints of Some Exporters.

Ottawa, Sept. 10.—(Canadian Press)—A word of reproof for Canadian transportation companies is contained in a report by F. C. T. O'Hara, deputy minister of trade and commerce, to Sir Geo. E. Foster, minister of trade and commerce.

"Criticism," he remarks, "is frequently directed towards the export method adopted by various manufacturers and exporters. In fact, throughout the commercial world exporters have to bear the brunt of much severe censure which is levelled at them from time to time in many commercial publications. While much of it doubtless is deserved, yet exporters are frequently condemned when they are in no way to blame."

"Transportation companies apparently have entirely escaped a reproof. Evidence has been adduced of the shortcomings of certain Canadian steamship companies upon various occasions. Lack of appreciation of the value of the goods of exporters has been shown as well as discourtesy. This is especially unfortunate. One Canadian exporter states that the way in which the Duchy of Cornwall is treated through New York rather than through Canadian channels. As a general rule the exporter naturally hesitates to give the name of the steamship company concerning which he makes complaint, fearing discrimination."

TURKS AS WELL AS THE GREEKS HAVE FOUND THE PACE TOO SWIFT

Greek General Headquarters in Asia Minor, Sept. 10.—Hostilities between the Greeks and Turks ceased on Tuesday for the first time after many weeks of operations. Both armies are taking a respite from the arduous fighting that has been taking place since the beginning of the offensive.

Brussels, Sept. 10.—A Belgian detachment, sent into occupied Germany some time ago, with a view to the occupation of the Ruhr Basin, has been recalled with the consent of the Allies. The detachment will return to Belgium on September 15.

PRINCE HANDLING PROPERTY WELL

Tribute to Good Work He is Doing for Tenants in the Duchy of Cornwall.

London, Sept. 9.—(By Mail, Canadian Press)—Tribute to the manner in which the Prince of Wales is carrying out his duties in regard to the property as Duke of Cornwall, he controls in the borough of Lambeth, is paid by the medical officer for Lambeth, in his annual health report to the Lambeth Council.

PITTSBURGS AND GIANTS CLOSE

Only Fraction Separates the National Leaders.

Ruth Has Equalled His Record of Last Year in Home Runs—Great Contest by Heavy Hitting Four.

New York, Sept. 10.—For all practical purposes the New York Giants and the Pittsburgh Pirates were tied today for first place in the National League. But to the expert baseball mathematician, the Pennsylvania team were leading by the margin of .002. It was a victory by the Giants over Brooklyn that brought out the closeness of the struggle.

Pittsburg's percentage was .640 by virtue of eighty games won and 52 lost, while New York's standing was .608, on the basis of 83 wins and 54 defeats.

In the American League, the Yankees took advantage of the opportunity to better their place standing by winning from Philadelphia while the Indians were forced to idle in St. Louis, due to rain. Twelve points separated the pacemakers from the runners-up.

The Heavy Hitters.

Chicago, Sept. 10.—With more than three weeks of the 1921 season of the major leagues remaining, Babe Ruth has equalled his 1920 home run record and bids fair to set a new record for circuit drives. Ruth's 34th homer was scored off Naylor of the Athletics yesterday. His last three homers in 1920 were also off Philadelphia pitchers, the 54th of last season coming on September 29. The slugger also increased his total base record to 893, the result of 176 hits. Besides his homers he has made thirty-nine doubles and twelve triples.





A RAPID RECOVERY.  
When the after war depression was at its peak in Czechoslovakia the American Relief Administration was feeding 500,000 children, nearly one-fifth of the entire child population of the country. Today, so rapid has Czechoslovakia recovered, the relief is extended to less than 200,000 children, and Mr. J. H. Wallis, one of the officials in charge, says this number soon will be greatly reduced.

Two years ago in Prague there was a building known as "The Dead House." Its function was to house dying babies. Into this "Dead House" were put sick babies from one to two years old, whose condition appeared hopeless. There the little ones, who had had but a brief glimpse of human life, lay till death took them; lay without food, without medicine, cared for by nurses who could endure for only a few days at a time the deep, continual horror of "The Dead House."

"Here is another picture. It is Sunday, May 15, 1921. Through the streets of Prague flows a great parade. A hundred and fifty thousand farmers make up the vast procession. They are members of the Agrarian party, the second largest political party in Czechoslovakia, and are in Prague to attend the great agricultural fair and exposition. That exhibition lasted for five days and was visited by at least 2,000,000 people. It is said that the total number of visitors who came from outside Prague for the occasion was 300,000. The exhibit of machinery was particularly significant. The larger machinery was exhibited in the open air, the smaller in a huge hall. Americans, who thoughtlessly believe that all the world's modern farm machinery is manufactured in the United States, would have had their eyes opened if they had visited the exposition at Prague. Practically everything needed for modern farming was included in the scope of the exposition—and it was all manufactured in Czechoslovakia. Many Americans do not realize that this new republic is a great manufacturing nation. A visit to the Prague exposition would have convinced them of the fact. And it would further have convinced them that a part, at least, of the life of this nation had returned to normal."

Conditions in Czechoslovakia are not normal, but the recovery is rapid and steady. Mr. Wallis was told by the Minister of Finance that "the government of Czechoslovakia is stable and secure; everyone is satisfied with the republic; no one wants a monarchy and no one wants Bolshevism." Other prominent men, including the President of the Chamber of Commerce, declared that





**COLLAPSED AS HE WAS SOLD**

Excitement at Boston Common "Slave" Auction.

Women Hysterical as Young Soldier Crumples Up—Another Who Lived Two Weeks on Coffee and Doughnuts.

Boston, Sept. 10.—Excitement ruled at today's "slave" auction of the unemployed on the Boston Commons by Urban Ledoux, better known here as Mr. Zero. The increased interest and marked excitement were sharp contrast to the lethargy that prevailed yesterday. Today women became hysterical and threw money on the auction block when Ledoux put up for sale Edward Dixon, a young ex-serviceman from Philadelphia, who was so faint from hunger and lack of sleep that he collapsed while being sold.

Dixon, a slender, black-haired youth, in a greasy khaki shirt, without jacket, and torn trousers held up with a strap, broke down and cried as Mr. Zero, in sonorous voice, recounted the boy's history.

As the sobb welled into the lad's throat and tears streamed down his cheeks, he collapsed and would have fallen had not Mr. Zero caught him in his arms.

The next on the block was Harry Pridham, seventeen years of age, of New York, who said he was strong, and grimaced.

A thrill of the dramatic swept over the audience. Here, within sight of the statue of Abraham Lincoln freeing the slaves and that of Wendell Phillips, the picture of the ancient slave block was brought into mental perspective.

The "slave" continued to grin. For two weeks, the man, interdicted, the boy had lived on coffee and doughnuts once a day.

"How much as I offered?" The cry from Zero's lips went ringing through the air.

There was a sudden hush, then bids rained rapidly. The lad was finally knocked down to a Cambridge man for a week's lodging and board.

**SECOND DEATH IN ROXBURY TRAGEDY**

Lawyer Shot by Wells Succumbs — Wedding Ring Tied to Revolver With a Black String.

Boston, Sept. 10.—Passengers on a crowded street car in the west Roxbury district, many of them women, yesterday saw Chase A. Wells shoot his divorced wife, Ella A. Wells, and her counsel, A. Louis Altmeyer today. The woman died almost instantly and the attorney soon after arriving at a hospital. Five shots were fired from a revolver to which Wells had tied a wedding ring with a piece of black string. The operator of the car threw open the doors. While some of the panic-stricken passengers fled, others seized Wells and turned him over to the police. He expressed no sorrow of his act to the officers, telling them he had purchased the weapon a week ago with the intention of killing his former wife and Altmeyer. The latter acted as counsel for Mrs. Wells in her recent divorce proceedings. They were on their way to court yesterday to press alimony proceedings and to seek action against Wells who is alleged to have been annoying his former wife.

Mrs. Wells obtained her divorce on the grounds of cruelty and abusive treatment.
