

When it is known that persons have been exposed to smallpox, officers should promptarrange for the worst. Facilities for arantine and treatment should be considered. Nurses and medical attendar ould be arranged for, and, if possible conditionally engaged. For nurses, have ersons who have had smallpox, or who ar thoroughly protected by recent successfu accination (three or four scars)

Hospitals and Camps. When smallpox breaks out the question

will often arise whether the sick shall be kept and cared for in their own houses or removed to other quarters. When at all practicable to do so their removal should be dered, and the house from which they are aken should be disinfected without delay. When a house is not available as a hospital, a temporary camp or shed may quicky be built. During the summer months Persons who have been exposed to small-

ox, and persons who show uncertain symptoms, should not be confined with small-The disinfection of infected houses or cooms should be left to experts, or else done under the direct supervision of a


