BURNED OUT.—On 12th inst., Mr. Francis Burke's house on the Bathurst Road, near Little Barboque stream, was burned, together with all the contents, the loss of which was more than once successfully played, but the victims had always been ashamed to make any exposure. Oliver and his brother went to the Miramichi, and the former produced a bundle of \$2 Dominion notes, which he said were counterfeit, and offered to sell them for \$200 (the package contained \$2000). The elder of the Morrisons examined the notes, compared them with some genuine notes he had, and saw the alleged counterfeit. He declined to purchase them, but pretended to think the price was too high, and it was finally agreed that the package should be sold for \$100. Morrison produced that sum, but Oliver Hurd said the business was a ticklish one, and he didn't wish to have any evidence to fasten the issuing of the counterfeit on him; so he would take the \$100 and drop the package of counterfeit outside of the door as he was leaving. Morrison would not agree to this, and Hurd found he could not trade unless he handed over the package on receiving the money; so he agreed to do this, and the exchange took place. Hurd buttoned the \$100 up in his pocket, and then, drawing a revolver, presented it at the head of the elder Morrison and demanded the package of alleged counterfeit. The Nova Scotian proved game, however, and a struggle ensued which resulted in the two Hurd boys being worsted and ejected from the house. The \$2000 proved to be genuine bills, which the counterfeiter made use of as decoys. They had several times before. The Hurd boys applied to a magistrate for a warrant and had the Morrisons arrested on charges of stealing \$2000 from them, and the latter had been arrested for assault and an attempt on the elder brother's life by shooting at him with a revolver. All the parties were held to bail to appear before a magistrate in Truro, previous to being committed for trial in the supreme court which meets in November.

The interment was at the Reformed Episcopal Church burying-ground. Mr. Leston was 46 years of age.

THE Campbellton Post Office Robbery.—The two men who robbed the Campbellton Post Office have been doing their best in this vicinity for several days, and were, at last accounts, at Black Brook. Mr.

Joseph Lyons of Lower Newcastle made claim on Tuesday upon Mr. R. R. Call of Newcastle for the reward offered for the apprehension of the men. It appears that the men visited Mr. Lyons' place during the latter part of last week and on Saturday or Sunday Mr. Lyons made the fact of their whereabouts known to Mr. Call, who is acting for the authorities in the matter. Mr. Call sent the Deputy Sheriff to Lyons on Sunday, Constable Woods of Donaldson accompanying him, for the purpose of making the arrests. The men were there, but when the officers entered into conversation with them they became the questioners. They asked Deputy Forest what his business was—whether he was a captain, or a mate, etc., and, at the same time, toyed with very suggestive-looking revolvers and ended by walking out of the house and to the woods, out of sight. They appear to have crossed the river taking the boat at the party just below the Water mill for the purpose, as they were at Black Brook on Tuesday.
