Since he became ill, over six months ago, his condition has been the most jealously guarded of state secrets. For political reasons all official information con-cerning his condition has been optimis-tic. For the same reasons reports from antagonistic quarters have invari-ably been pessimistic. Hence the con-flict of reports reaching the United States. If he is suffering from gastric fever, as his physician, Dr. Revenga, states, it is merely a contributory all-ment. His real malady is more seri-ous, sometimes results fatally and sel-dom fails to leave its victim weakened in some way.
