





MARYSVILLE DAM IN GREAT DANGER

River Has Come Up Eight Feet Since Saturday

Grops Under Water - I. C. R. Train Service Suspended-Fredericton

The rain which set in here on Friday that t last still continues with no sign of abating and during the whole of last night and most of this morning the rain has fallen in torrents, accompanied by a high northeasterly gale. The streets in the back part of the town ied by a high northeasterly gale. The streets in the back part of the town are experiencing great difficulty, at many corners the crossings being under water. The C. P. R. trains are running on good time today, and though the track in several places is under water, it has not been of sufficient depth to impede traffic so far. For about one hundred yards below the Fredericton station the track is under water, an occurrence which has never happened in the history of this road. The I. C. R. trains are all held up and there will be no through traffic today. At Cross Creek the track is reported as being entirely submerged owing to the great rise in the Nashwaak. This branch of the St. John has never had such a freshet, the water in the past three or four days having come up over twelve feet. There is a great rush of water at Marysville and the dam at that place is being put to a severe test. Should it give way several millions of feet of lumber will go loose, besides other serious damage. The main river rose over two feet last night, making a total rise of about eight fect since last Saturday. Crops planted on the intervals and low lands are in many places under water and it is feared that in many instances the results will be disastrous, especially to potatoes. Unless there is a change very soon the agricultural interests will suffer severely.

There are a number of matters relating chiefly to the development of the harbor in which the Minister of Public Works is interested and these will be discussed this afternoon. One of the most pressing matters to be taken up is the question of the future use of the western side of Courtenay Bay. The aldermen have before them the application from F. C. Durant for a site for a proposed sugar refinery to be erected near the mouth of the bay. The application carries with it a request that all the shore of the bay stretching down to the Marsh Creek be granted to the company also. This would tie up the place which it is thought the G. T. E. will eventually want for docks for their eastern terminus.

In view of the interest which the Minister has taken in the development of Courtenay Bay the council decided to lay the matter before him pending any decision as to the application.

No Apparent Reason for Hostility, But He Feels That Britain Should be Ready for Anything—The German Program as Announced is

Misleading

to the study of European changes than are those of the United

There is an impression in this country that some hostility exists between the people of Great Britain and of United Germany.

"I know the Germans intimately. From childhood I have travelled extensively throughout most of the German states, I have many German family connections and I venture to say that outside the usual body of Anglophobes one meets in every country, there is little hostility to the British on the part of the Germans and on the other hand, there is in England no dislike of Germany. On the contrary, our statesmen are adopting German legislation to our needs and if imitation be the sincerest form of flattery, the Germans must be well pleased with our proposed reproduction of their workingmen's insurance, the labor bureau and a great many other legislative improvements that it appears to me would be just as vital to the United States as they seem to be to Great Britain.

"Why then, if so happy a state of affairs exists between the two nations, should there be any section of people in England to suggest the possibility of war?"

in England to suggest the possibility of war?

"Turn back to 1869. Was there any friction between France and Prussia? There was no hostility on either side. But any reader of Russaches Bismarck, or other standard authority on the great German empire builder will acknowledge there was immense preparation on the part of Germany, a preparation that was kept secret as far as possible, and which also as far as possible, is being kept secret by Germany today.

"As to that which is transpiring in

"As to that which is transpiring in the German shipbuilding, yards, new more or less know that by 1912 Ger-many in ships of the super-Dread-naught class, will be the equal of Eng-

"We have today a superb navy. We have in the line of battle such warships as the Indomitable or the Inflexible now in New York, which are as efficient in their sphere as our Mauretanias or Lusitanias are to theirs. We are not wasting time on aeroplanes and gas bags, but are developing submarines and wireless. marines and wireless.

"Why then worry? Those of our people who think as I do are looking ahead. The official figures of the German naval programme up to 1912 are serious enough but we know that these figures are just as inaccurate as were the figures made public by Germany prior to the Franco-Prussian war of 1871. We know that the German press, unlike that of the United States and Great Britain, is prohibited from telling the truth about these matters. We know that at the Hague peace conference, Germany declined to direct the limitation of armament, or the use of floating mines at sea. of floating mines at sea.

"These are a few of the reasons why many of us think it time that Great Britain should respond effectively to the naval programme of Germany."

SPAIN'S SUCCESS.

The Moroccan war has reached an end. The Moorish tribesmen surround ed on Mount Gurgua have no course The country in which the fighting has been going on has been laid waste, villages burned, crops destroyed and no doubt thousands of residents deprived of all their possessions. The subjugation of those of the hostile tribes who took up arms against the Spaniards finishes a campaign which in the beginning looked rather hopeless for the European nation.

The dispute arose over certain mining privileges. A Spanish company operating mines on the Riff Coast became involved in a dispute as to terms with the chiefs of some of the tribes. A number of the company's employes were way laid and murdered. The ment and when satisfaction was not forthcoming troops were sent to Mor-occo. The Spanish arms in the earlier stages of the campaign met with a series of reverses and for a time the very existence of the column was emmed in by the tribesmen. Reinforcements turned the scale and with omething like 60,000 men in the field. the Spanish officers have been able to essume the offensive and have by Melilla district and gathering their enemies together on Mount Gurgua, etely surrounded them. Shut off from supplies and deprived of whatever assistance friends might bring, the Moors found themselves in a rather hopeless situation. Surrender was the only resource and they have decided that in this case, at least, discretion is

the better part of valor. The completeness of the success attending this campaign justifies the government's promises to the dissatisned element at home and will go far towards stopping that revolt in Barce lona and other sections which for the time were almost the aspect of a revolution. The Moroccan victory is a welcome change to the Spanish people who have for so many years been accustomed to little else than defeat.

Living in a little village of their own, the "Brown Tribe," as they call themselves, are known throughout the district for their strange ways. They live the simplest sort of outdoor life, and no hardship is too great for them.

To the townsfolk of Athens, near Skowhegan, which is the nearest village, the "Brown Tribe" is a puzzle which they never can wholly solve.

Descended from an ancient Indian family, the Brewns are as proud of their pedigree as any blueblooded descendants of the Mayflower Pilgrims. Although too illiterate to trace this descent in any way but by word of mouth, they nevertheless keep alive the traditions of their ancestors.
