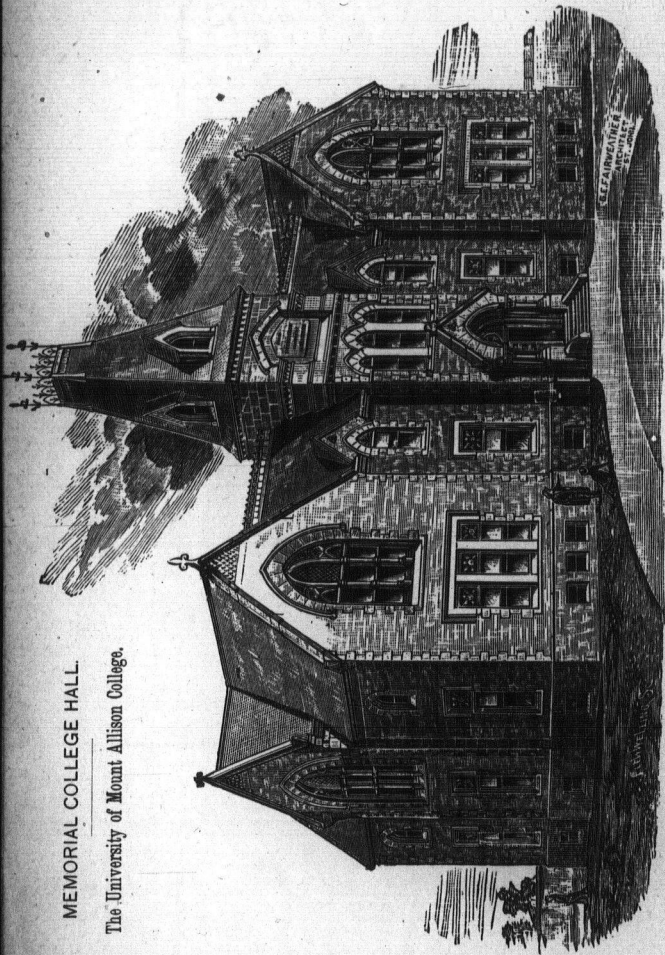

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THE MOUNT ALLISON WESLEYAN COLLEGE was organized in July, 1862, under a Charter obtained from the Legislature of New Brunswick. By virtue of this Charter it possesses full University powers. During the last session of the legislature an Act was passed amending the Charter, and changing the name of the Corporation to "The University of Mount Allison College."

The College is conducted on strictly non-sectarian principles. The general denominational control under which it is placed furnishes a sufficient guarantee that sceptical license will never be allowed within its walls, but does not imply the existence of a purpose or a wish to interfere with the conscientious convictions of any. The fullest recognition, however, is given to the truths and claims of the Christian Religion. The Bible is publicly honored, as the Word of God, and no pains are spared that the education imparted may be suitably leavened with religious principle.

Students may enter the College either as regular Undergraduates, having passed the Matriculation Examination; or as Specialists, who do not look forward to a University Degree.

For Undergraduates two complete Courses of Study are provided, viz.:

1. The regular Arts Course for the B. A. Degree.
2. A Special Course for those who prefer to substitute Modern Languages for Greek and Latin, and who may desire a greater number of elective studies than the Arts Course permits. The degree of Bachelor of Philosophy (Ph. B.) will be conferred on students who shall have completed this Course.

There are also Honor Courses in Classics, Mathematics, Science, Philosophy, and Modern Languages and Literature.



Special Students are admitted to any class or course of Lectures for which, in the judgment of the Faculty, after due examination, they are deemed prepared; and upon leaving the College, they will be entitled to receive Certificates, bearing the College Seal, and specifying the particular branches of study in which they have received instruction and passed satisfactory examinations.

Special arrangements will be made for the convenience of public school teachers who may desire to pursue a college course while continuing to teach during the summer term.

## MATRICULATION.

The Matriculation Examinations are held on the second and third days of the first Term of the Collegiate year. Supplementary Examinations for special cases may be held at other dates.

†The Greek subject for 1887 is Xenophon, *Anabasis*, Book I.

## DEPARTMENT III.—MATHEMATICS.

Candidates for the degree of B. A. will be allowed to take Natural Philosophy and French as an equivalent for Greek, viz.:

Those who shall have completed the Pass Course, with the exception of having substituted Modern Languages for both Latin and Greek, shall be entitled to the degree of Ph. B.

The number of hours per week to be devoted to the above subjects, respectively, will be determined by the necessities of the case.

The members of the Senior Class are required to prepare and deliver two original Orations each term. All other students are required to prepare weekly an exercise either in English Composition or in Elocution.

The required Course of Study for the Bachelor's Degree may be completed in three years by such students as can prepare well for nineteen or twenty hours recitation weekly; but all who can afford to do so are earnestly advised to devote the full period of four years to their undergraduate Course of Study.





## Examinations, Degrees, &c.

At the close of the first term, all the classes of the Pass Course will be examined by the Faculty, both orally and by means of written papers. The Annual and Degree Examinations at the close of the second term are conducted in the same manner by the Faculty and duly appointed Examiners. The Examinations in the Honour Courses will be held at the close of the year.

The Degree of Master of Arts may be taken in Course by any Bachelor of Arts of three years standing who shall have taken (during his Undergraduate Course or subsequently) the full Honours in any Department, and who shall have prepared and forwarded to the President, at least three weeks before the Annual Convocation, a satisfactory thesis on some subject connected with his courses of study.

## REGULATIONS AND ANNOUNCEMENTS.

### Degree of B. D.

Candidates for this Degree must be graduates in Arts of at least two years' standing. They are required to give evidence of satisfactory acquaintance with the subjects assigned as preliminary studies.

They are required to pass a satisfactory examination in all the subjects of the three years' course of study, and to prepare for delivery a satisfactory thesis on some Biblical or Theological subject, which shall be forwarded to the Dean at least three weeks before the annual Convocation.

Persons other than graduates in Arts may pass examinations in this course, and, if successful, receive Certificates to that effect.

Special facilities are afforded to graduates in Arts who wish to reside in the College while pursuing this course.

### CANDIDATES FOR THE MINISTRY.

Candidates for the Ministry of the Methodist Church of Canada, who have been appointed to attend College, will pursue the course of study prescribed on page 192 of the Discipline of the Church.

The Educational Society of the Methodist Church makes provisions for free tuition, and aids in meeting the general expenses of young men appointed by the Conference to attend College.

## PRELIMINARY COURSE OF STUDY.

This Course of Study is designed to meet the wants of young men preparing to offer themselves to be received on trial for the Ministry. It embraces all the subjects prescribed for the preliminary and first year's examinations of the Methodist Conference, and may extend over one, two or three years, according to the previous attainments and circumstances of the student.

The Theological parts of this course may be pursued in connection with Matriculation in Arts.

The English and Classical parts of this Course are prepared in the Academy and College.

Students presenting themselves for admission to this course should bring with them letters of introduction from the Superintendent Ministers of the circuits in which they reside. If they expect to offer themselves for the Ministry at the close of the year, they must be recommended from the quarterly Meetings of their own circuits, and not from the Sackville quarterly meeting. Students bringing with them certificates of such recommendation will be exempted from fees for theological tuition. Licenses as exhorters or local preachers should also in all cases issue from the Superintendent and quarterly meeting of the circuit in which the student resides, and where his church membership and standing should be continued.

After examination at the close of the college year, all students in the preliminary course will return home in time to be presented at their own district meetings, in case they wish to be received on trial by Conference.

**THEOLOGICAL LIBRARY.**

Renewed efforts have been made during the past year to increase the value of this important aid to the Professors and Students of this department. Very generous assistance has been rendered by a contribution from Alexander Gibson, Esq., Marysville. It is earnestly desired that further contributions be made to the Library Fund, so that the latest and best results of Theological Science may be placed within the reach of our Students.

**SOCIETIES.**

Two Societies have been established, having a relation to this department. The one is designed for the benefit of the Theological Students in the College; and the other to serve as a connecting link between them and the Ministers labouring in the three Conferences of the Maritime Provinces, as well as to promote among the latter a spirit of Theological and Ministerial Culture.

Among the Students it is proposed, by means of Essays, Exegetical Papers, and oral discussions, to stimulate enquiry as to the best Methods of Ministerial efficiency and so to assist in preparing each other for the great work of preaching the Gospel, and feeding the flock of Christ.

The Ministers' Theological Union will meet at the close of each Collegiate year, and, in addition to the consideration of topics of interest belonging to their work, will have an annual Sermon preached, and a Theological Lecture delivered. The Rev. B. Chappell, A. M., will preach the annual Sermon, and the Rev. Wm. C. Brown will deliver the annual Lecture in 1886.

### General Governmental Regulations, &c.

Students, both regular and special, are expected to conduct themselves with propriety, and to observe all the regulations of the Faculty as announced from time to time. Students whose conduct or progress in study shall continue, after suitable admonition, to be unsatisfactory, will not be allowed to remain in the Institution.

Regular and punctual attendance at their classes shall be imperative on all Students. Professors will mark the presence or absence of Students immediately before commencing the work of the class, and will note as absent those who enter thereafter, unless satisfactory reasons for tardiness be assigned.

No Student shall be absent from the College after ten o'clock at night, without special permission of the President.

All Students are expected to attend Divine Service on Sunday, and to be punctual in attendance at daily prayers in the College Chapel.

No Student shall resort to any tavern or place where intoxicating liquors are sold, without special permission of the President; and no Student who is known to use intoxicating drinks will be allowed to retain his connection with the College.

The use of tobacco on the College premises is not permitted.

Undergraduates are expected to provide themselves with College caps and gowns, and to wear them at classes and Lectures, at Church, and at all public Collegiate exercises and anniversaries.



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**LIBRARY, APPARATUS, MUSEUM, &c.**

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In the course of the last two or three years valuable additions have been made to the Library and to the Chemical and Physical Apparatus of the Science department.

The Library is kept regularly supplied with the leading Reviews, such as the *Edinburgh, London Quarterly, Westminster, Contemporary, Nineteenth Century, Fortnightly, Princeton, Bibliotheca Sacra, etc., etc.*

The attention of the friends of the College is earnestly directed to the needs of the Library, and to the importance of establishing some permanent fund to secure its steady increase. There is no way in which money can be spent to better advantage in securing the sound development of the College as an institution of learning. Gifts of books or of money will be thankfully received and acknowledged.

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**READING ROOM.**

A Reading Room, in which are to be found most of the leading Periodicals of the Dominion of Canada, as well as some of the principal newspapers of Great Britain and the United States, is accessible to all the Students upon the payment of a moderate fee.

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**THE EURHETORIAN SOCIETY.**

This is a voluntary Literary Society, the history of which reaches back for more than twenty years. Its special objects are the acquisition of readiness and power in debate, and the cultivation of a pure literary taste. Not a few of the Alumni of the Institution who are to-day prominent in the professional and legislative circles of the several Provinces of the Dominion, have been enrolled in its membership. It has a well furnished room in the College in which its meetings are held weekly.

An additional charge for the use of Apparatus, for Chemicals, and for breakage, covering the actual cost, will be made to Students in Chemistry and Experimental Physics.

Students who, upon examination, may be admitted to an advanced position in the Undergraduate Course, and non-residents, who may apply for examination, will be charged the usual Class Fee in each subject.

### **BOARD, WASHING, FURNITURE, &c.**

For Board in the Academy, and for Washing, the charge to College Students will be \$40.00 for the first term, and \$52.50 for the second term, or \$92.50 for the collegiate year.

The College dormitories will be provided with stove, bed and bedding, table, chairs, wash-stand, and book-shelves. *All other articles needed or desired, including lamps and oil, must be provided by the students.*

The Steward will keep on hand, and supply to the students at cost, such articles of furniture as they may require. Upon the return to the Steward at the end of the year of any such articles, undamaged, he will refund seventy-five per cent. of the original charge.

Students will be charged for any damage to the rooms or furniture, caused during their occupancy.

From the above table of charges it will be seen that the total expenses for Board, Washing, Fuel, and Instruction to a student who takes four classes (the average number) each term, will be \$150.50 for the collegiate year. For less than a term, the charge will be *pro rata*.

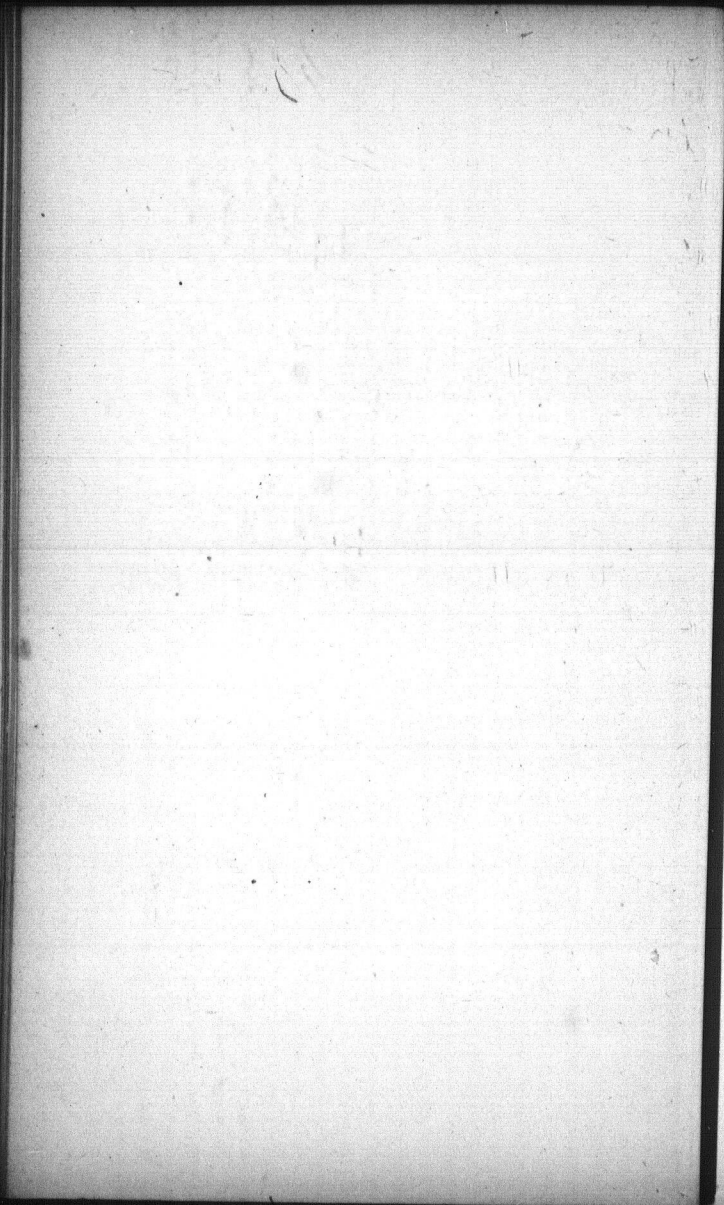
#### TERMS OF PAYMENT.

*An advance payment of \$20 on College Fees, etc., and of \$40 on account of Board, is strictly required at the beginning of each term.*

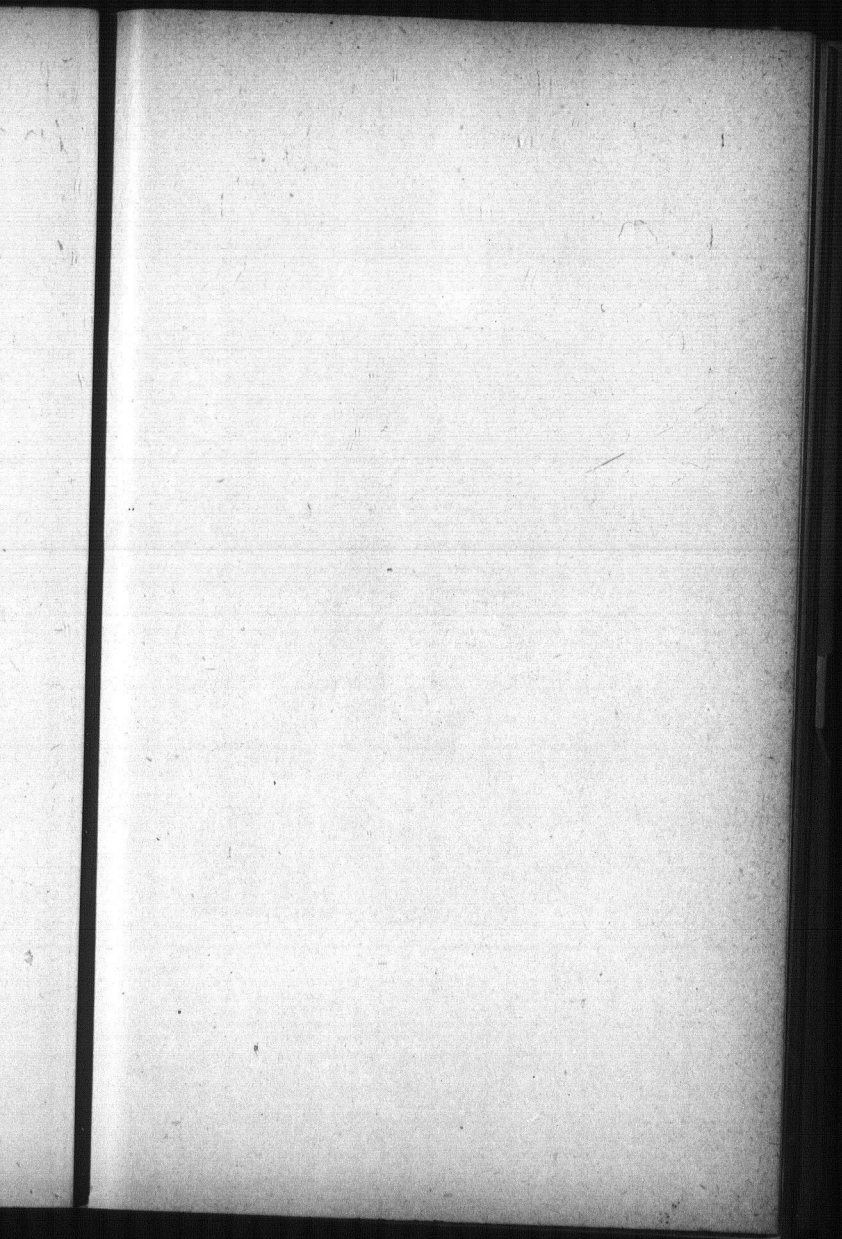
*The balance of the first Term's account is payable on the 15th day of November; and of the second Term's account on the 1st day of May in each year.*

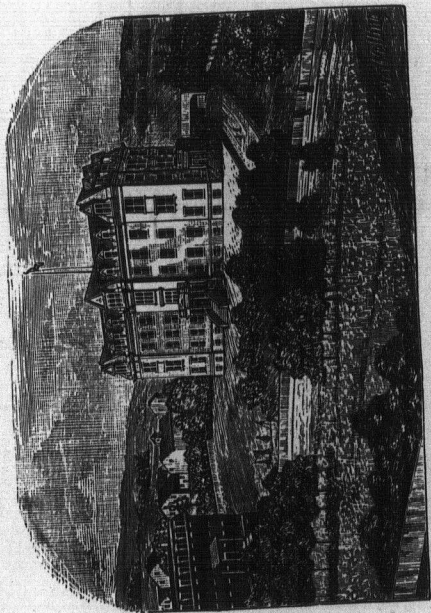

## Course of Study, Classification, etc.

The course of study is designed to secure to the student thorough preparation for College matriculation or for entrance upon a course, either of special training for agricultural, mechanical, or commercial pursuits, or of specific study for professional life.

The students being classified according to their respective scholastic attainments, are arranged in two Departments. Each Department is subdivided into classes, and has assigned to it its own appropriate portion of the Course of Study, as follows, viz.:

### I.—PRIMARY DEPARTMENT.

This is designed as a Preparatory School for such of the more youthful pupils as may not be prepared for the exercises of the classes in the Higher Departments. The course of study in this Department includes—

Reading and Spelling, Penmanship, Elementary Arithmetic, Geography, Elementary Grammar and Composition.

### II.—INTERMEDIATE DEPARTMENT.—TIME, TWO YEARS.

#### Studies.

*First Term.*—History, English Grammar, Arithmetic, Greek Grammar, Latin Grammar.

*Second Term.*—History, Arithmetic, Analysis, Latin Reader, Greek Reader.

### SECOND YEAR — FIRST CLASS.

*First Term.*—Cæsar, Xenophon, Geometry, French.

*Second Term.*—Cæsar or Virgil, Xenophon or Homer, Algebra, Natural Philosophy, French.

**NOTE**—Weekly exercises alternately in Composition and Declamation are required from all the students.

Students not preparing for Matriculation may substitute Book-keeping and Commercial Arithmetic for Greek and Latin.



## Department of Music.

A talented Professor of Music has charge of this Department. The course of instruction embraces a thorough training in Instrumental Music (Pianoforte and Organ), Vocal Culture, Class and Solo Singing, Harmony, Thorough Bass, and Composition.



**CIRCULAR.**

THE MOUNT ALLISON WESLEYAN ACADEMY has been in successful operation upwards of thirty years. The arrangements which were made for the accomplishment of the important object for which it was founded, were such as obtained for it a high position in the public estimation very early in its history; and those upon whom the direction of its affairs has devolved have been stimulated and encouraged, by its prosperity, to continued efforts to render it, in all its departments, increasingly efficient and deserving of patronage. Each year has therefore been marked by valuable additions to its educational facilities, and by more or less extensive general improvement throughout the establishment.

The new Academy Hall, opened January, 1883, is commodious and well adapted to the purposes for which it was intended. It is heated throughout in a most efficient manner by hot water. The rooms are provided with necessary furniture, so that students need not bring furniture or bedding with them. Students are responsible for damage to their rooms during the period of their occupancy.

The College Library is accessible, under prescribed regulations, to all the students.

A full supply of all Text Books, Stationery, etc., needed by students, is kept constantly for sale at the Institution, at the lowest possible prices.

Students can, if they desire, take in the College special classes while attending the Academy.

### Requirements.

The general principle insisted on is *obedience to proper authority*. No one will be allowed to continue in the Academy whose habits are damaging to good morals, or who persistently disregards its rules. In cases in which it appears necessary to take steps towards severing the connexion of a Student with the Institution, preliminary notice will be given to the parents or guardians, if the gravity of the offence does not require instant action.

Punctuality and regularity in attendance upon school duties, industrious application to study, chasteness of speech, proper observance of the Sabbath, a careful refraining from injury to the buildings and property of the Institution, and a strict abstinence from tobacco and from intoxicating drinks and places where they are sold, are especially insisted on.

Students are required to attend service each Sunday at the Church to which they belong.

### Remarks.

All who design to become students of the Institution should enter, if at all possible, at the commencement of the Term, as the regular classes are then organized; pupils will, however, be received at any time. The only prerequisites for admission into the Primary department are a good moral character, ability to read and spell, and age sufficient to enable the pupil to prepare regularly for recitation.

Students in good standing can receive an honorable dismissal from the Institution at the end of the examination at the close of any term, and at no other time, except in special cases.

Parents and guardians are respectfully requested to write to the Head Master, should they find it necessary to recall a student in Term time.

Parents are particularly requested to send every article of clothing marked with the name of the pupil in full. Initials are worthless.

If parents wish to aid us in our efforts to promote the health of the students, they will do well to heed our *earnest request* that no eatables, except perhaps fresh fruit, be sent to those under our care. We suggest also that spending money, beyond actual needs, is injurious in its influence on students, and should not be furnished.

### Announcement.

The first term of the Academic Year 1885-6, will begin on Thursday, August 19th, and close on Wednesday, December 22nd. The second term will begin on Thursday, January 6th, 1886, and close Wednesday, June 1st.
