SPANIARDS FIGHT, HUN

Thrilling Encounter Between Trawlers and U-Boat.

TWO FRENCH VESSELS SENT TO BOTTOM.

First Time Vessels of Spain Have Combatted Germans.

Paris, May 7—A despatch to the Havas Agency from San Sebastian. Spain, tells of a fight between a submarine and Spanish and French trawlers, in which two French trawlers, with small-calibre guns, battled for some time with the submarine, but finaly were sunk. Two of the Spanish trawlers also were sent to the bottom. The despatch says:

"A submarine attacked the fishing feet, consisting of a number of Spanish and French craft, including the French steamers Verdun and Marne, both of which were armed with small calibre guns. These guns were used so effectively that the submarine was compelled to plunge. Later it reappeared and the fight was resumed. It lasted for an hour, and the Verdun and Marne were gradually overcome and sunk. Seven sailors from the vessels are missing.

"Two Spanish fishing craft also were sunk during the engagement."

"If we are to win this war, and before we deserve to win it, we at home must, individually and collectively, strive to serve as devotedly as those on active service. How can I best serve, now? This is the vital question each must ask himself.

"We are told in no uncertain sound, by those in a position to speak, that the most urgent need is greater food production, in order to feed, not only the millions on active and semi-active service but the great civilian populations a swell. This war has taken possibly 40,000,000 men for active service besides the millions more as munition workers. These have ceased to be producers, but are heavy consumers, and we can readily understand what the effect of this is upon the production of foods and other necessities of life. It is estimated that the world's shortage of food during the current year will be so great that there will possibly be four to five millions of people die of sheer starvation.

Winter storms, which might be disastrous to herds grazing on flat prairie, are eliminated as a factor in the situation. owing to the rolling nature of the ground and the thick undergrowth on the hillsides. Disease will be guarded against by an arrangement whereby the Government of Alberta assures the Company of free veterinary inspection of every beast before it is placed on a ranch, and a free monthly inspection thereafter.

Need is Greater Than Ever for Supplies of All Kinds-Report Shows Cood Work Done in St. John.

That there is an imperative need for continued activity in all departsments of Red Cross work is a fact that must not be forgotten, no matter how accellent may be the reports read at the meetings of branches, circles or clubs where Red Cross supplies are made. This was the message from headquarters and from overseas that was emphasized at the regular monthly meeting of the Local Red Cross Branch, held on Monday afternoon, at the rooms on Chipman Hill. It is difficult to realize that the work done in St. John effects the upkeep of the hospitals in France, but such is a fact; any falling off here means that a a promise to send 5,000 cases monthly to France from the Canadian office in London cannib to sustained. Its fulfillment depends upon the continual effort of the women in Canada.
