NEW BRUNSWICK TEAM WINS CHAMPIONSHIP

Defeats Nova Scotia and P. E. Island Riflemen at Charlottetown in Inter-provincial Match Thursday With a Score of 690, Islanders Second With 681--Rain and High Winds Prevented Good Marksmanship--The Scores in Detail.

Charlottetown, P. E. I., June 8--(Special) The New Brunswick riflemen, with a score of 690, won the inter-provincial match at Kensington today. As the record score for such events is 735, and as New Brunswick last year was defeated with 727, today's marksmanship was below the average. This is largely accounted for by the weather conditions. A raw, chilling easterly wind, fairly steady at the start but increasing in irregularity, with rain as the day wore on, operated against high scoring.

TRIED TO KILL VICE-PRESIDENT

Anarchist Crank About to Draw Revolver When Nabbed

SORRY HE FAILED

Would-be Assassin's Pockets Were Filled With Anarchistic Literature and Map of Fairbank's Route--His Intended Victim Undisturbed by Narrow Escape.

Flint, Mich., June 7--James McConnell, 32 years of age, and living near Flint, made an unsuccessful attempt to assassinate Vice-President Fairbanks, this afternoon, after Mr. Fairbanks had finished a masterly address to a crowd of 2,000 persons.

McConnell forced his way through the crowd up to the speaker's side, and as he reached in his hip pocket for a revolver, three detectives suddenly pounced upon him and quickly handcuffed him and later removed him to a police station.

THIRTEEN INJURED IN GRAND TRUNK FAST EXPRESS WRECK

Two or Three Likely to Die--Train Bound to Chicago--Accident Caused by Spreading Rails.

Flint, Mich., June 8--Thirteen persons were injured, two or three of them perhaps fatally, in the wrecking of the fast through train, No. 2, bound for Chicago from the east over the Grand Trunk road, ten miles east of here today. The accident occurred near Davison, and was caused by spreading rails. Three coaches were derailed. No one was killed outright, but several received serious injuries.

Of the injured, seven are from Massachusetts, including three of those who suffered most. It is feared that Mrs. Cora Watrous, of Roxbury (Mass.), is fatally injured. CZAR WILLING TO DISCUSS PEACE

Roosevelt's Friendly Offer to Help End War Cordially Received

ALL DEPENDS ON TERMS

If Mikado is Moderate in His Demands Diplomats Believe Peace is Assured--Japan Shy of Making an Offer Till She is Assured Russia Means Business--Another Account of Rojstvensky's Defeat.

Washington, June 8--The emperor of Russia has at last been heard from here and the result is not unfavorable to peace. In his recent audience with Mr. Meyer, the American ambassador, the emperor indicated a willingness to take under advisement the subject of peace and expressed a warm appreciation of the friendly words of Mr. Meyer, speaking as the personal envoy of the president.

Mr. Takahira, the Japanese minister, called by appointment at the White House this afternoon and spent half an hour with the president. He was still unable to give the president the slightest indication regarding Japan's peace terms but it is believed he was acquainted in Mr. Meyer's despatches and with this as a lever the hope is expressed here that the Mikado will meet the president half way in a friendly offer of goodwill.

STRANGE MAN OF THE WOODS AT L'TETE

People Disturbed Over Actions of Unknown Sailor-like Man.

The people of L'Tete, Charlotte county, are disturbed over the actions of a man who has been living practically in the woods in that vicinity for some days. His name is unknown for he will not tell it. A telephone message to The Telegraph last night said that the stranger is apparently a sailor. Occasionally he comes from his retreat, but not much can be learned from him. He appears to be about 33 years of age. His clothes are dark, and he wears low shoes. His weight would be about 150 pounds. He is of dark complexion with dark moustache.

RECORD RUN ON PENNSYLVANIA RAILWAY

Forty, Ind., June 8. A test train on the Pennsylvania railroad today made a record run from Chicago. The 149 miles were covered in 129 minutes. The train consisted of 12 engines, 10 passenger coaches, and 10 freight cars.

Borden Declares That Minister of Justice Has Out-Manoeuvred Sifton

AMENDED CLAUSE BAD

Its Effect Just the Same as the Original School Section, Says Opposition Leader, But Fitzpatrick Differs With Him--Laurier Denies Story About Colonial Conference.

Ottawa, June 8--(Special) The Canadian commons today got back to the autonomy bills which have not been touched upon since May 15. The leader of the opposition has been pressing for an opportunity to give his opinion of the amended clauses. Today he declared that in his opinion there was no difference between the effect of the amended and the original school clause.

On the orders of the day, R. L. Borden drew the government's attention to a report that Sir Wilfrid Laurier had curtly refused to take part in the proposed inter-colonial conference. Mr. Borden asked to be informed if the Liberal party of Great Britain, if returned at the next election, would be likely to be called upon by the Canadian government along the lines suggested by the Canadian minister at the last colonial conference and hinted at by the Canadian finance minister two years ago when he declared in effect that unless some preference should be given to the products of the markets of Great Britain the Canadian government would withdraw the existing preference.

WAITING TO HEAR FROM JAPAN

It is not expected that the situation will change radically in the next day or two. Until some indication comes from Japan as to her attitude in the light of the spirit shown by the czar the negotiations can hardly be expected to progress. Meantime, however, the question of peace with Japan is being discussed in the highest circles that London could be relied on for active assistance in counselling moderation to Japan. These hopes have not been realized although information has been received that Great Britain will welcome peace. It is still hoped, however, that some indication comes from Japan and Paris are both giving loyal assistance to the efforts initiated in Washington and the result of Berlin's activity is already being felt.

TOW LINE AMPUTATES MAN'S LEG

Montreal, June 8--(Special) Joseph Mongeau, a deck hand on a tug in Montreal harbor, had his left leg amputated tonight by a tow line, while the tug on which he was working was towing a barge up the harbor.

CANADIAN CRUISER SINKS AMERICAN FISHERMAN

Vessel Was Unlawfully Fishing in Dominion Waters and Tried to Escape--Shots Fired Across Her Bow Had No Effect, and in the Chase She Was Struck by Pursuer--Vessel Filled and Sank at Once, Two of Her Crew Drowned.

London, Ont., June 8--(Special) A special report from Port Stanley gives the following account of the sinking of the tug Grace M., on the morning of June 7, of Lorain, Ohio, which was unlawfully fishing in Canadian waters with gill nets. First Officer Ingster, of the Vigilant, gives the following account: "We left Pigeon Bay at 6:55 a. m., June 7, toward Middle Island passage, at 9:30 we sighted the tug to the north and headed her off. We signalled her to stop, also fired some shots across her bow, but she paid no attention and ran past our stern. We put about and soon overtook her again. She again put about and dodged us. This occurred several times. She was gradually working toward the south.

REFUSED \$90 AND NOW GETS NOTHING

Dr. Irvine Beaten in Suit Against Overseers of the Poor for \$200--Supreme Court Matters--Other News of the Capital.

Fredericton, N. B., June 8--(Special) The case of Dr. W. H. Irvine vs. Overseers of the Poor for the parish of Stanley, which has been going on at the County Court since Tuesday, was finished this evening and by direction of the judge the jury returned a verdict for the defendants. Plaintiff's claim amounted to \$200 and was for professional services rendered on Frederick Palmer, who was injured by an explosion of dynamite at Stanley several years ago. The doctor gave his services on the assurance of an overseer of the poor that the parish would be responsible for the payment.

BATTLE LINE STEAMER PYDNA IN TROUBLE

Passed by Steamer Which Reports Her Deckload Shifted, Mainmast Overboard and Bilge Pumps Choked

Avonmouth, Eng., June 8--The British steamer Maxman, Captain Christie, which arrived at Avonmouth yesterday from Montreal, reports that on June 3 in latitude 49 north and longitude 22 west, she passed the British steamer Pydna, Captain Fitzpatrick, from Sydney (C.B.), May 26, for Manchester. The Pydna has stopped, her forward deckload having shifted, carrying the mainmast overboard. The steamer had a heavy list to starboard, but her master declared she was all right, excepting that the bilge pumps were choked.

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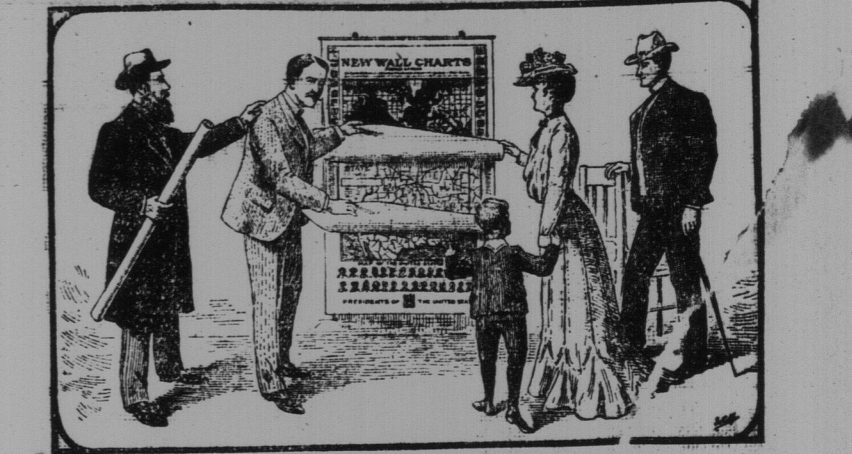
