The Belgian Government intends to expend twenty-three millions of francs in the extension and completion of rail-ways.

The last attempt was made so late as November, and long after the elections, on which occasion Sir John A. Macdonald went to Toronto to meet McPherson and try to affect an amalgamation. The Inter-Oceanic Company rejected all overtures.

THE COMMISSIONERS AND THE WITNESSES.

the First Day of the Royal Commis sion A Glance at the Witnesses Important Testimony.

[FROM OUR OWN CORRESPONDENT.] OTTAWA, Sept. 4. Just a little before noon to-day, a few persons might have been seen wending their way through the corridors of the House of Commons and towards the Rail way Committee Room—the largest in the House of Commons. The reporters are already there, a comfortable row of desks and seats having been prepared for them directly in front of those to be occupied by the Judges. The only representatives of the Maritime press that I see present are Mr. Griffin, of the Halifax Express, and the regular Ottawa correspondent of the TRIBUNE. One by one outsiders come in till the room is about half filled. Now there is a little stir and Sir John walks in, with the old jaunty step and toss of 30 DOZEN BUCHER'S MILL SAW the head, and appearing to be in firsthis return from River du Loup he has been working from 15 to 18 hours per day. So long as he is Premier he must exercise his usual supervision over the affairs, great and small, of our Dominion, from Vancouver's to Cape Breton. After him comes Hon. Mr. Campbell of portly presence, though slightly stiff from gout. He is one of the few politicians of old Canada who has escaped even an imputation against his ability and integrity thro an extended political career. And here is a tall, finely formed Scotchman, who looks as if he didn't care whether school kept, or not." It is Andrew Allan, brother of the redoubtable Sir Hugh, the patriotic Pacific manipulator. Beside him is Hon. J. J. C. Abbott, who figures in Huntington's charges, as being the medium through which the Government conducted their negotiations with Sir Hugh and McMullen, for the sale of the Pacific Railway charter; and near him is the Hon. Henry Starnes, a modest, quiet tooking gentleman, in whose hands Sir Hugh and McMullen had deposited the mysterious packet of papers, which Huntington said with a grant metaphori-

cal rhetorical flourish, on the night when the revolutionists held their meeting, St. Lawrence." But the man who is confident of the Government's guilt; who yearns in plaintive Rhetoric, "give me half-a-day and I'll prove it," doesn't answer to his name. It would be a "violation of the privileges of Parliament" to prove on oath what he so loudly declaims as gospel from irresponsible platforms, and through the columns of a vindictive partizan press. I suppose George Washington McMullen is also induced to seek the friendly shelter of Chicago, on account of his intense anxiety/lest he should "commit a breach of the privileges" of our Canadian Parliament. Patriotic Lucius! Magnanimous McMullen! While such a precious pair exist there is yet hope that the world is not utterly demoralized, nor the millerium a hopeless dream. alized, nor the millerium a hopeless dream.

Judge Day, who questioned all the witnesses, and did it in a manner which the most rabid Grit could hardly growl at, next called the Hon. That he (Sir Francis) never received, directly or indirectly, any money, or the promise of any, from Sir Hugh Allan or, any one else in connection with the Pacific Railway, nor did he receive any money from them for any purpose; and further, he solemnly stated

That no money consideration, nor cansideration of any kind, was ever hinted at or implied during, before, or since the Pacific Railway negotiations, and that the charter never was granted for any reason other than public good. He knuw the charter never was granted for any reason other than public good. He kut wall about the negotiations from first to last, and made these statements unreservedly. He also stated that when Sir. Hugh subscribed to the election fund, he could have no possible knowledge of what course the Government might pursue.
