EIGHT MEN KILLED ON BOARD WARSHIP

MANHUA, Mar 28—The report that a fatal accident had occurred on the United States cruiser Charleston was confirmed today. Eight men were killed and several others slightly injured.

During practice at sea off Okinawa, the breach lock of a three inch gun blew off and in its flight across the deck cut through a steel stanchion and moved down the men in its path. Seven of the victims were instantly killed, while an eighth died as the Charleston was hurrying to Cavite.

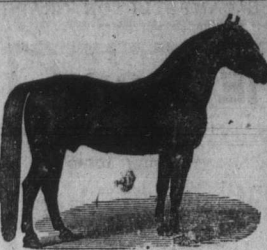
