TRIAL BY NEWSPAPER.

Last week the Post drew attention to the very unfair and impartial manner in which several newspapers have reported the late Moncton sensation and pointed out that with the public mind incensed and inflamed by starting headlines, it would be a matter of impossibility to select an unprejudiced jury to try Mrs. Stevens.

The gross revenue at Sackville the previous year was \$3,014.98. Dorchester \$1,718.17. Middle Sackville \$479.53. The revenue at the latter office this year was \$459.85.

In the matter of postal revenue and therefore a rank of importance Sackville stands sixth in New Brunswick; the offices having larger revenues being St. John, \$46,899.59; Fredericton, \$11,457.53; Moncton, \$11,084.68; Woodstock, \$6,226.45; Chatham, \$4,197.93.

These figures and the bearing they have on the comparative importance of Sackville in the postal service of the province, naturally suggest that it is about time something was done towards providing the most suitable quarters for the receipt and delivery of Her Majesty's mails here.

The present building is inadequate in every way for the purpose for which it is used. It was entered last summer and upwards of six hundred letters stolen, and the most clamorous complaint was made in consequence of the repainting the performance now were valuable known to be there.

This does not look as if the Post considered the prosecution the outcome of political hatred. We have yet to believe that the complainants in this case were less than honest and that it is private and holy about a home, for the sole object of gratifying political spite.

THE POST MASTER GENERAL'S REPORT.

The report of the Post master general for the year ending June 30, 1892 gives in detail the business done in the different offices throughout the Dominion, and other interesting facts connected with the service.

It is not possible to compute exactly the number of letters, cards and money orders handled by the department each year but taking the returns from the larger offices as a basis for computation there were 39,938,944 letters and postal cards and 12,961,520 money orders carried and delivered by the mails during the year.

Postoffice has been established at Cormier Village, Westmorland Co., and at Graham's Siding, Colchester Co., and Port Mulgrave station. The postoffice at Half Island Cove, N.S., has been closed.

Yesterday the government rescinded the order in council granting this favor and decided to enforce the full cattle quarantine regulations from the Atlantic to the Pacific coast.

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Dominion Parliament.

OTTAWA, FEB. 15.—The principal topic of conversation around the House this week is Mr. Foster's budget speech.

With the exception of a few of the most rapid oppositionists all agree that it was the ablest of his efforts, but when it comes to discussing the tariff the opinion is not so unanimous. The liberals see in it an evidence of weakness inasmuch as concession asked for by them have been partly granted.

The conservatives however see it as a determination to hold to the old policy remedied to suit the day. The western mousetrap at the reduction of the duty on the under twice but the coal duty men are not so happy.

In response to urgent demonstrations from the government, the United States authorities have brogated the recent quarantine regulations, so far as they would apply to cattle sent to the World's Fair, Chicago. Hon. Mr. Angers, minister of agriculture, has been diligently working for some days to secure this concession.

Feb. 16.—After routine the premier introduced a Bill to amend the Representation Act, in the direction of more clearly defining the boundaries of several electoral districts; also a bill amending the criminal code of 1892 in some minor particulars.

Hon. Mr. Haggart reached the budget debate, replying to Sir Richard Cartwright's criticism of the railway that surprised those who did not know that the minister of railways was a ready speaker.

In dealing with the ex-finance minister's strictures of the N. P. Iron Mr. Haggart showed that it had added 113 articles to the free list of the Mackenzie tariff and that working on its lines the government was steadily reducing the burdens of taxation.

Mr. Cartwright's exodus figures, and read from the United States census that the total number of Canadians in the republic in 1890 was but 216,310 more than it was in 1880 following with extracts from Sir Richard Cartwright's budget speech of 1876 to the effect that on account of the westward trend of the empire we could not expect any great increase of population in the order of 1890.

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House law fixing a minimum limit to the Inspector's salary and making the Council responsible for the travelling expenses of the Inspector and the payment of reasonable counsel fees not less than four dollars, say, in cases in which he secures a conviction, and two dollars in cases which he fails to do so, besides Council fees, etc. on appeal. The House in which Temperance men, as the majority would doubtless pass such a bill.

If it became law the Inspector would be secured immunity from loss, and his salary being determined by the amount of work done would insure energetic prosecution of violators of the Statute. Thus the carrying out of our Temperance legislation would be placed above the vicissitudes of politics or the instability of temperance sentiment within the council chamber.

The history of the act in this country and the manner in which the council has treated it, is not uninteresting. Mr. Sedgewick, appointed under the Act of the Assembly 1887 chapter 4. Five orders in all have been made by the county with reference to his salary. No. 1 was made in January session 1889 when Mr. McCully was appointed inspector at a salary of \$400.00.

Under this order the inspector could not receive more than \$200.00 and did little. Accordingly the Council passed order No. 2 at the January session 1890 by which they reduced his salary to \$100.00 and he received only \$100.00 for the difference by giving him in addition \$8.00 for every unconvicted case, \$4.00 for every convicted case, in addition to his salary of \$100.00.

According to J. B. Snowball's Miramichi Wood Trade Circular, the past season in New Brunswick was a fair average one for winter operations and the export of lumber from the port of Chatham represented 95 million superficial feet, being the largest shipment since 1888.

The stock of lumber in Chatham is, however, less than usual, and most of the outputs have shipped at their production. The exports from Nova Scotia, although slightly larger than last season, were only an average one, and appears to be about the full capacity of that province for export.

—Dunn Bros., of Musquash have imported a number of hogs from Ontario, Slipp & Flewelling have a carload now on the way. Dunn Bros. will bring in five more cars if they can be secured at a price that will allow them to make an eye out for more.

—The latest word from London is that Scotland's wool are improving slowly, although the rheumatism has not yet left them.

—Judge Kelly, of Charlottetown, P. E. I., is dead, aged 60 years. He was appointed to the bench in 1874, and served the position until his death on the 9th, Mr. J. W. Y. Smith will move the reply to the speech from the throne. Mr. Borehill will probably be the next speaker.

—The Committees of the House of Commons met last week and elected chairman as follows: Expiring laws, Dr. Cameron; Privileges, Elections, Mr. Girouard; Private Bills, Col. Denison; Railways, Canals, Telegraph Lines, Col. Tisdale; Public Accounts, Mr. DeLoraine; Appropriations, Mr. Cameron; Mr. Wood; Standing Orders, Mr. Mills (Annapolis).
