Nearly every night the London police department plays host to any number, from one to a dozen, late arrivals or homeless travelers in the city who cannot obtain accommodation at a hotel or rooming-house for one reason or another.

No very luxurious service is offered in the Carling street transient hostelry—only a rough plank on which one may spread his greatest—if he happens to possess one. In order that thieves may not break in and pick the pockets of the guests, the doors are locked by the "bell-cop" who escorts them to their rooms. A lot of travelers, it might be said, who are accustomed to lounging at more luxurious hotels, do not disdain once in a while to apply voluntarily for shelter over-night. To know that they are used to patronizing good hotels, where night clerks stay awake to call the sleeping guests at any hour desired, instructions to this effect are invariably left at the desk. But these instructions are accidentally almost always overlooked.

The police go upon the theory that a man asks to be awakened at 7 o'clock, his reason for wanting to leave early may bear investigation, and it is always 10 o'clock before he makes his departure, after the detectives have solicitedly inquired how well he didn't sleep with the babbling and snoring of involuntary guests in the next room.

**BIRD NOTES**

(Contributed by Melvior Ornithological Club.)

Just because there are none of what are called "winter birds" this season, it must not be supposed that "no birds" have been observed during the winter months. It is quite true that our summer birds, with that lack of fore-knowledge of weather for which they are noted (among bird students) departed from us at their regular dates, and very few remained, but a few individuals of quite a number of species habitually stay the winter with us, and many of these were to be found by the earnest seeker.

So it came about that the regular "first-of-the-year" walk, which is held with religious regularity on January 1, resulted in the listing of 22 species, a surprisingly large number in the eyes of those who say "there are no birds in winter," but some of our members were disappointed at the absence of so many that have been found in other years.

This list included junco, crow, blue jay, tree sparrow, great blue heron, red-headed woodpecker, white-breasted nuthatch, ruffed grouse, red-tail hawk, purple Finch, chickadee, hairy woodpecker, downy woodpecker, cardinal, red-shouldered hawk, long-eared owl, snowflake brown creeper, golden-crowned kinglet, song sparrow, bronze grackle, great horned owl.

**BOARD APPOINTS W. A. TANNER AS NEW SECRETARY**

School Trustees Disregard Promise of Preference For Veteran.

**SELECTION A SURPRISE**

Question Raised Whether Wife of Appointee Should Re-sign As Trustee.

W. A. Tanner, who has been acting secretary to the board of education since the death of the late Secretary R. M. McElheran, was yesterday afternoon appointed secretary at a special meeting of the board, after three ballots had been taken. The result came as a surprise in view of the board's definite statement at the time that it was desired the names of applicants, to the effect that in event of any veteran being elected, several presenting qualifications equal to those of a civilian the veteran would be given the preference.

Following the announcement of the third ballot, the names of Trustees Smith and Udy, the board made the appointment of Tanner as secretary, and requested that no names of applicants be published by the papers, the plea being made that "it might injure the applicants in their present position."

On the subject of the wife of the appointee, the board's secretary, Mr. G. Greer, was named scrutineer by Chairman Coleridge. Mr. W. A. Tanner asked to be excused from voting. The roll call was as follows:

On the first poll each of the five remaining names at the head of the list were declared selected. On the second vote the result was as follows: 5, 3, 2, 1, 1, 0, the three low men were then eliminated, the third vote was recorded as 7, 3, 2, and one ballot spoiled.

### Candy Easter Eggs May Have Caused Little Girl's Death

#### Authorities Are Making Investigation Into Sale of Cheap Easter Candy in Detroit—Police Trying To Locate Store Where Child Made Her Purchase.

DETROIT, March 23.—Eunice Fancher, 14-year-old freshman at Northwestern High School, died in an automobile in her father's arms this afternoon, as a result of eating candy Easter eggs, which the coroner's office thinks were poisonous. The girl's stomach will be sent up for analysis, together with samples of Easter eggs. An autopsy has been ordered by Deputy Coroner East.

A thorough investigation of cheap candy now on sale in Detroit was made by Special Commissioner Vaughan this evening. Tests will be made of various articles being offered to determine if poisonous substances are being used.

Bought Downtown.

The eggs were purchased in a downtown store, the name of which officials have not as yet obtained. Coroner's officers are endeavoring to locate the store in an effort to learn the source of the candy and if they are found to be poisonous, prosecution will follow. The child had eaten but a few of those purchased. The remainder were seized by the officers.

Eunice was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Preston Fancher, 6115 Trumbull avenue. She had been spending Easter vacation with a girl friend in the suburbs. It is said the two girls came into town Tuesday afternoon and purchased the candy.

Became Alarmed.

The mother of Eunice's chum, with whom the Fancher girl was staying, became alarmed when the girl was stricken with severe pains in stomach and notified her parents.

Her father took the child in his arms, carried her to an auto and started home shortly after 1 o'clock this afternoon.

Eunice spoke but little on the journey, and the mother blocked from her home, raised her head and moaned.

"Father, we are almost home," replied Mr. Fancher. A moment later she fell back dead.

### SARNIA LOSING CITY ENGINEER

#### John A. Baird Has Tendered Resignation To the Council.

SARNIA, March 23.—City Engineer John A. Baird has tendered his resignation to the council. City Clerk Stewart, after thirty years' service, has been granted three months' leave of absence, following which he will likely retire, according to information at the city hall tonight. City Engineer Baird's resignation is said to be the result of lack of co-operation on the part of the council, and also an offer made to him by an outside concern. So far the council has made no move to secure a new engineer.

Peter Blackburn has forwarded to the chairman of the board of education a letter tendering his resignation as treasurer. His duties as city treasurer now require his whole time. An expression of opinion was given by the board and the resignation was accepted. The arrangements whereby the treasurer was to take over the treasurership of the board of education were entered into over a year ago, but the growth of the city's business now makes it necessary for the treasurer to devote his whole time to the civic financing.

### TWENTY-FOUR ARE KILLED IN AMBUSCADES

#### Sinn Feiners Start Numerous Reprisals For Recent Executions.

DUBLIN, March 23.—Twenty-four persons were killed and nearly thirty wounded in ambushes reported today.

The men to whom the Government attribute the organization of the ambushes have not been captured.

The multiplication of the ambushes is believed to be largely due to reprisals for the recent executions. The Sinn Fein is said to regard their men as belligerents and the execution of those captured as a breach of the laws of warfare and therefore liable to reprisals. The execution of Whelan was followed by the killing of two policemen in his native town of Clifden. The deaths of the policemen were avenged in Clifden by house burnings.

The execution of Patrick Moran has been followed by the killing of two policemen in his native district of Roscommon.

For every man executed vengeance is anticipated, and as the Government has its custody many men liable to the death penalty, and is said to mean to carry out its execution on a large number of deaths on each side is considered here as inevitable.

### STEEL COMPANIES FIX DAY TO MEET

#### Shareholders Will Be Asked To Approve Merger On April 7.

MONTREAL, Que., March 23.—By Canadian Press.—Journal notices calling the special general meetings of the Dominion Steel Corporation and the Nova Scotia Steel and Coal Company for April 7 next, together with copies of agreements entered into by the directors of both enterprises with the British Empire Steel Corporation, are being forwarded to shareholders who will be asked on the date mentioned to approve of the action of their respective boards in the consummation of the merger.

The proposed stock issues of the new merger, according to the balance sheet, aggregate \$101,750,000.

The initial share capital will be divided as follows:

- Seven per cent cumulative stock, preferred series B, \$13,500,000.
- Seven per cent cumulative, second preferred series B, \$13,500,000.
- Common shares, \$24,450,000.
- Total, \$101,750,000.

The 7 per cent cumulative preferred shares, series B, are to be offered in exchange for preference shares of the companies which enter the consolidation, at the option of the holders.

ST. THOMAS, March 23.—The petition of the ratepayers on Roseberry place, and those on Curtis street, from St. Catharines to Mondamin street, for an asphalt pavement was allowed at a meeting of the council tonight.

The council on resolution to construct asphalt roadway on Railway street, from Talbot to Roseberry place, by a two-thirds vote of the members. The city engineer was directed to prepare an estimate of the cost. The council instructed the treasurer to have debentures issued in connection with the waterworks improvements, and that they be in one issue instead of sets.

### ALLEGED HE KEPT PROCEEDS OF SALE

#### Soldier-Farmer's Case Will Be Heard On Saturday.

ST. THOMAS, March 23.—John Stanton, soldier-farmer of Malahide, who was arrested at Fort Huron on a warrant charging him with disposing of the property of the Government and keeping the proceeds was before the magistrate today, and was remanded until Saturday. Stanton, about two years ago, purchased a farm, Jatta, under the Dominion land settlement act. He paid the Government \$500 as part of the consideration of \$3,800. A loan was also made of money by the Government to buy implements and stock, but about a month ago Stanton held an auction sale and is alleged to have kept the proceeds and left the country. Stanton is held in Fort Huron until the arrival of the local constable.

Constable Promoted.

The tender of Archie Macpherson for the making of eight suits of uniforms for the local constabulary has been accepted by the executive. V. J. English, Harry Wright, adviser for the county jail, will succeed Robert McCully, who leaves the service at the end of the month.

He said it probably would provide for regulation through taxation.

## GIVEN FIVE YEARS FOR ATTACKING CHILD

### James Williams Is Found Guilty of Serious Charge At Guelph.

GUELPH, March 23.—James Williams of this city was found guilty at the spring assizes of attempting to commit rape on a 7-year-old girl, and sentenced to five years in Kingston penitentiary.

J. A. Mowat, acting for Mrs. Nellie Beisel of Maryboro Township, against whom there is an indictment for the murder of her infant illegitimate child, made application this afternoon to have her trial proceed with at once. The application was opposed by Crown Prosecutor Jeffrey, on the ground that the case took a new turn when Colonel Laughan was tried for the murder of the child of Mrs. Beisel, and was found guilty of birth concealment, and also because the entire jury panel had heard the evidence in the Laughan case. Justice Masten denied Mr. Mowat's application, and ordered Mrs. Beisel's trial to proceed on the fall sittings. She was allowed out on \$15,000 bail.

## GOAL SHORTAGE WAS RESULT OF GOVT. INACTION

### Duncan Ross Scores Borden and Meighen For Indifference.

### SITUATION IS ACUTE

### Committee May Be Appointed To Investigate Country's Fuel Problem.

OTTAWA, March 23.—(By Canadian Press).—A discussion of ways and means whereby Canada may insure an adequate supply of coal for the future featured today's sitting of the House of Commons. It was private members' day, and after the preliminaries were disposed of, the Hon. Mr. Meighen gave a detailed discussion of some of the proposals suggested from other than Government sources.

Dr. Michael Steele of South Perth was responsible for the discussion on Canada's fuel supply when he moved that a special committee of the House be appointed to investigate the situation. He emphasized the gravity of the situation, the tremendous increase in coal prices, and the difficulty in getting a supply for the winter.

Future prospects were that Canada would require more rather than less coal. Every effort, therefore, should be made to conserve the present supply and develop new fuel sources. Electrification of steam railways, and the establishing of central heating plants were suggested by Dr. Steele as means for conserving coal. He also advised the adoption of some plan for testing coal in order to see that the consumer got the grade for which he paid.

Major Redman, seconding the resolution, emphasized the importance of improving transportation facilities in order to get Alberta coal to the East. It would compete with the Pennsylvania product brought to Ontario, Plenty in Nova Scotia.

D. D. McKenzie of North Cape Breton declared that the supply of coal in Nova Scotia was extremely large, and that some means should be found for bringing it up to Ontario. He suggested that ships carrying coal overseas might get a cargo of coal in Scotland on their return voyage and bring it up to Montreal for distribution in Ontario.

Debate on Dr. Steele's resolution was eventually adjourned, the prime minister postponing appointment of the parliamentary committee proposed.

Given First Reading. A bill to amend the physiology of the railway act in certain minor respects was introduced by H. H. Stevens (New Brunswick), when the House opened this afternoon. It was given first reading.

Premier Meighen, replying to a question asked by Jacques Bureau (Three Rivers), said that the Government had received no communications from the International Joint Commission in regard to the Lake of the Woods levels, since 1918.

Presented and announced that the Government had decided, in view of increased salaries resulting from reclassification and reductions in the cost of living, to reduce the civil service bonus for financial year 21 per cent. Mr. Meighen explained that the bonus had been given to meet the abnormal increase in living costs. Last year it aggregated \$12,500,000, bringing the total appropriation for the civil service up to \$66,000,000.

Articultural Grants. J. Archambault (Yercheles) brought up the question of the grants by the department of agriculture to the agricultural societies which have spent a minimum amount of \$2,000 of their own money in their preceding year. The grants for 1920 are entitled to a minimum grant of \$2,500. Mr. Archambault moved that the minimum be reduced to \$2,000, the amount expended in the previous year, the total being given as a grant providing that the amount expended is at least \$2,000.

Dr. J. W. Edwards (Frontenac) said county fairs received grants from the respective provincial governments. He argued that the Dominion Government should grant a dollar for every dollar with the provincial governments.

Supports Resolution. Dr. P. F. Johnston (South) supported the principle of the resolution, and thought the suggestion of Dr. Edwards regarding the province and municipalities bearing equal shares was a good one.

E. W. Nesbitt (North Oxford) opposed the resolution, declaring that the county fairs should afford additional grants to fall fairs.

J. F. Johnston (Last Mountain) also opposed the resolution on the ground of economy.

Dr. P. F. Johnston explained that the agriculture department confined its grants largely to interprovincial and national shows. The annual show appeared to be more the responsibility of the provincial authorities in Canada. He wished to minimize the value of the small shows, which was very large. He detailed what the department was doing to aid the live stock industry.

Mr. Archambault, in closing the debate, said he thought the ministry would have accepted his resolution. He hoped they would be in a better frame of mind when he came back with it next year. He then withdrew his resolution.

A Vital Matter. Dr. Michael Steele (South Perth) moved that a special committee of the House of Commons be appointed to inquire into the fuel situation. The fuel situation, Dr. Steele said, was one of the most important to be faced. Coal was a necessity both in the home and in the industries. Canada had immense coal reserves. Seventy-seven per cent of the coal deposits in the British Empire were within the Dominion. In 1920 Canada had produced 16,225,000 tons of bituminous coal and exported 2,568,174 tons at an average production cost of \$4.65 per ton. In the same year she had imported 15,742,542 tons from the United States. Fifty-seven per cent of the coal consumed in Canada during the year 1920 was imported. The increase in our coal bill over 1918 was \$40,000,000. This was an enormous burden for the people to carry. The price of coal per family ranged from \$50 to \$125 per year. This was greater than the taxes imposed by the Federal Government. The price of coal to the manufacturer was reflected in the price charged for every article manufactured in Canada.

Develop Resources. Dr. Steele reminded the House of the heatless days in 1917 and 1918, and predicted that a similar condition would again arise if the natural resources were not developed. In ten years hence Canada would need 15,000,000 tons of coal more than she is using now. The railways would require 50 per cent additional equipment to insure the transportation of coal from the mine to the consumer were supplied. In past winters lack of cars was given as one of the primary causes for coal shortage.

Alberta's Resources. Major D. L. Redman (East Calgary),

In seconding the resolution, a well particularly on Alberta's fuel resources. D. C. Ross (Middlesex) charged the present Government and that of Sir Robert Borden with having galled with the fuel conservation question, and with having permitted it to become steadily worse. In the older portions of Ontario, he said, wood fuel was disappearing, with the result that the rural districts were daily growing more dependent upon outside coal.

In spite of the fact that Canada had 10 per cent of the coal supply of the world, this country was forced to take the humiliating position of asking the United States for enough coal to keep the wheels of industry turning, and the people from freezing. Last winter people living in the constituency of Middlesex paid as high as \$23 a ton for coal. While the price was high, the difficulty in getting coal was more important. Should trouble arise between Canada and the United States, or the miners strike, people would find it impossible to get coal at all.

Up to Government. It was the duty of the Government to see that the people secured coal at a reasonable price, even if money was lost in solving the problem.

W. D. Ensworth (North) declared the coal question was one which particularly interested Ontario and Quebec, in view of the lack of coal deposits in these provinces. He strongly supported the resolution.

H. B. Morphy (North Perth) thought the Government could seriously consider the nationalization of the coal industry. In twenty years it might be termed a failure for not having done so. He would also give attention to the advisability of bonusing the industry.

The Big Question. The prime minister, after referring to the great coal resources in the west, and the success which attended the experiments in briquetting, said the great question was that of freight. He believed that while the power would go a long way to help solve the fuel problem, it could not solve it. He would give the fuel problem for the eastern provinces. As he had said, he was delighted with the success of the briquetting scheme, but the cost of transportation had next to be dealt with.

Turning to the resolution, the premier said such a committee could do a lot of good if it brought the attention of this, one of Canada's most important problems. As there were several others to speak on the resolution, however, he thought it better to give them an opportunity to do so.

J. D. Bouché (Cape Breton) moved the adjournment of the House at 6:12 P.M.

Hon. W. S. Fielding, before the House rose for the Easter recess, urged Sir Henry Drayton to give, when the House reassembled on Tuesday, an idea as to when that minister would be brought down. This, he said, would greatly facilitate the business yet to be transacted in the House, who was in his seat at this time, made no reply.

### WILL PAY FOR BOOKS THAT WERE BURNED

ST. THOMAS, March 23.—The board of health has acknowledged its responsibility for the destruction of books of children who were found to be suffering with smallpox, although a protest was made by the little ones, parents against the burning of the books and the school supplies hereafter found on the children affected with communicable diseases be fumigated.





### London is Vitaly Affected by New Bill Proposed in Ontario Legislature—Any Orders Issued Would Be Binding For Five Years.

[Special to The Advertiser.]  
Toronto, March 23.—Absolute control by the Ontario Railway and Municipal Board of electric railway fares throughout the whole province is proposed in a measure introduced for first reading into the Ontario Legislature today by Charles McCrea, Conservative member for Sudbury. The bill is similar to that proposed by Mr. McCrea at the last session, and which on that occasion was regarded as an effort to secure increased fares on the Toronto Street Railway. It is suggested on this occasion that the measure is directed at the electric railway situation in London. Included in the terms of the bill are important proposals which first makes all electric railway fares subject to the approval of the Ontario Railway Board; the second makes it possible for the council of any municipality, with the approval of the board, to enter into agreement with a railway company without a vote of the people on matters affecting other than franchise rights.


