Toronto, March 24.—The case of John Doughty, accused of theft of \$105,000 in bonds from his former employer, the missing theatre owner, Ambrose Small, was given to the jury this afternoon, after Judge Denton had instructed the jury as to the law in the case. R. H. Greer, crown prosecutor, and I. F. Hellmuth, counsel for the prisoner, had previously addressed the jury to some length, the former holding that the conduct of the prisoner in the matter was not that of an honest man. The prisoner's lawyer maintained that Doughty may have been foolish in his dealings with the bonds, but that there had been no evidence of criminal intent.

Judge Denton, in his charge to the jury, pointed out that Doughty undoubtedly had the right to enter the vault of his employer's business. He was also justified in thinking that Mr. Small might reward him for service.

WAGE CUT BY STREET RAILWAY IS RUMORED

February Provides the First Deficit Under Control of the O. R. M. B.

A deficit in the operation of the street railway occurred during February for the first time since the Ontario Railway and Municipal Board took charge of it last summer. Official copies of the report are not available. It is said that the deficit is fairly small and that it may be made up by subsequent earnings. For this reason it is not likely that the board will relinquish control of the road. Regulations require the board to cease operation of a railway when the earnings are not sufficient to meet expenses.

A Vital Matter.

Dr. Michael Steele (South Perth) moved that a special committee of the House of Commons be appointed to inquire into the future of Canada. The fuel situation, Dr. Steele said, was one of the most important to be faced. Coal was a necessity both in the home and in the industries. Canada had immense coal reserves. Seventy-one per cent of the coal deposits in the British Empire were within the Dominion. In 1920 Canada had produced 16,629,958 tons of bituminous coal and exported 2,558,-174 tons, at an average production cost of \$4.65 per ton. In the same year we had imported 18,742,542 tons from the United States. Fifty-seven per cent of the coal consumed in Canada during the year 1920 was imported. The increase in our coal bill over 1919 was \$140,000,-000. This was an enormous burden for the people to carry. The price of coal per family ranged from \$50 to \$125 per year. This was greater than the taxes imposed by the Federal Government. The price of coal to the manufacturer was reflected in the price charged for every article manufactured in Canada.

Develop Resources.

Dr. Steele reminded the House of the heatless days in 1917 and 1918, and predicted that a similar condition would again arise if the natural resources were not developed. In ten years hence Canada would need 16,000,000 tons of coal more than she is using now. The railways would require 50 per cent additional equipment to handle the business. It was time the Canadian people were giving serious thought to the problem of fuel supply.

Last winter people living in the constituency of Middlesex paid as high as \$23 a ton for coal. While the price was high, the difficulty in getting coal was more important. Should trouble arise between Canada and the United States, or the miners strike, people would find it impossible to get coal at all.

The New York health commissioner has endeavored in vain to protect the people of New York city and of the country at large from a fresh accession of cooties from Europe—body lice being the carriers of typhus fever. 



LLOYD GEORGE GIVES FACTS ABOUT IRELAND

Quickly Silences Asquith Criticism Regarding Recent Rebel Executions.

ELECTIONS TO BE HELD

Fortin Charges Dept. With Negotiations Held Up Because Ireland Has No Courageous Leader.

> LONDON, March 23 .- An Irish debate was raised in House of Commons today by Francis Dyke Akland, in appealing to the Government to act with magnanimity before Easter. Former Prime Minister H. H. Asquith criticized the Government's failure to employ the same vigor in vindicating the law in Ireland against the crown forces as against the Sinn Feiners and, in suggesting that the Government again get in touch with the representatives of the Irish people, said it was useless to lay down impossible conditions in such negotiations.

WORKERS ACCEPT CUT IN WAGES

100.000 Packers Sign Agreement Following Conference At Chicago.

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 23.—
Workers in the packing industry, numbering more than one hundred thousand, accept the recent wage reductions of approximately 12½ and 15 per cent under an agreement signed late today by their spokesmen with representatives of the five leading packers.

The agreement as signed late today or the basic eight-hour day and for extension for six months, or to September 15, of the war-time Alschuler agreement for arbitration of differences.

The wage scale as agreed to corresponds with that put into effect March 7 by the big packers. It reduces the wage rate of all hourly paid employees eight cents an hour and amounts to a reduction in piecework wage rates of 12½ per cent.



Mr. Hellmuth referred to Detective Mitchell's evidence as showing that Doughty was anxious about the bonds, and wished them in order to give Mr. Small an opportunity to remunerate him for his eighteen years' service. Nothing had been advanced by the crown, Mr. Hellmuth contended, to show that the prisoner intended to deprive his employer of possession of the bonds.

Thought Them Safe.

"Jean Doughty's evidence," continued Mr. Hellmuth "showed that her brother John had told her on the eve of his departure for Montreal, that he had the bonds belonging to Mr. Small, and he told her to put them in a safety deposit box if he did not return in two or three days. Until Doughty returned to Toronto last November, there is nothing to show that he did not think they were in a safety deposit box."

Mr. Hellmuth argued that the crown had not produced any evidence to show that Doughty knew anything about trustees to the Small estate having been appointed, and he did not know, Mr. Hellmuth contended further, that there were others than Mr. Small to whom he could return the bonds. Doughty was not to be assumed to know when and how Small would return, Mr. Hellmuth said.

"Jean Doughty," continued counsel for the defence, "did nothing but what any sister would have done who had her brother's interests at heart, and also the interests of his employer. There has not been a tittle of evidence of fraudulent intent in the





Offers from two real estate firms to sell houses erected by the housing commission will come before that body at its meeting on Thursday night. It is possible that the commission may accept one of these in place of its present plan of selling through a business agent, F. B. Lavender.

The housing act will not permit the sale of houses except on a cost basis, and the commission will therefore not be able to pay the company making the sale. According to Commissioner E. R. Dennis, other arrangements can be made which will not violate the conditions of the housing act. The real estate men can act as agents for the person wishing to buy the house. They will make all arrangements for the loan and relieve the purchaser of other responsibilities. This will be a transaction between the prospective purchaser and the agent, and will have nothing to do with the housing commission. The commission will sell the houses at cost, and any fee paid to the agent will be from the purchaser. Citzens who wish to deal directly with the commission will still be permitted to do so. **QUALITY** BREAD::

Many of these are willing to pay a substantial fee to an agent to get them a house of any kind. If the agents can arrange the sale of houses built by the commission it will help that body in the disposal of its property and will also be to the advantage of the man buying the house. Mr. Dennis stated that a similar plan has been operated in St. Catharines for some time. A firm there arranged loans from the housing commission, had plans drawn, and superintended the actual building in return for fees paid to them.
