HUGHES CARRIES N. Y. IN CLOSE FIGHT TAMMANY HALL GOES BACK ON HEARST

THE LATTER ADMITS HIS DEFEAT BY OVER FIFTY THOUSAND PLURALITY Traversed-Bail Increased

Editor Ahead in Greater New York, But Not Enough to Offset Country.

Moran Loses in Massachusetts-Congress Remains Republican by Good Majority.

New York, N. Y., Nov. 7.-Charles E. Hughes, Republican, has been elected governor of the State of New York by a plurality of 54,000, according to figures available early today. William R. Hearst, his opponent, had a clear plurality in every borough of Greater New York, but Hughes' vote up-state overcame this. Hearst's total plurality in Greater New York, complete, according to unofficial returns early today, was 76,956. Mr. Hearst also polled 641 plurality in two up-state counties Hughes' plurality up-state, according to the unofficial returns, with 196 districts HARRISON...KENT missing, was 129,686, leaving a total plurality for the Republican candidate of 54,016. The missing districts may vary this general result by a few thousand votes either way.







BUG BLOWS A WHISTLE


Run of Twelve Miles.







ICE CREAM SALES ON THE SABBATH

Text of Magistrate's Finding, Which Declared Them a Violation of Law.

The following is the text of Police Magistrate Love's decision in the case of Peter P. Mandas, who was charged by Chief Williams with violating the Lord's Day Act by selling ice cream and ice cream soda:

"The complainant in this matter charges the defendant with committing a breach of the Lord's Day Act, by selling and disposing of certain goods, wares and merchandise at the city of London, on the seventh day of October last, being the Lord's Day, and upon the cause coming up for trial, the defendant, by his counsel, admitted the sale of the goods, being ice cream and ice cream soda, but contended that such sale did not constitute an infraction of the statute in question, for the reason that he was the holder of a license to sell victuals or eating house license, obtained from the city of London, that the victuals in question were food and that he was therefore entitled to sell and dispose of them under his license. "The defendant further contended that this case comes under the scope of
