With the exception of London and perhaps Paris, no city in the world is so rich in literary men. as is Edinburgh. Scott and Burns, Ramsay and Gay, and Smollett, Carlyle and Drummond, all have spent no small part of their lives in the old grey city of the Firth. But boasted as these names are and well-beloved as they have become there is one other who need yield place to none in the affection of the people. And as Edinburgh comes to mind, it is with thoughts of one of her noblest sons, Robert Louis Stevenson, the man with the poor, sick body, and the brave, soaring mind.

Stevenson was distinctly a son of the soil, of his own soil-Scotland, and of all places in that rugged isle it is Edinburgh that has made the deepest mark upon his life and writings. And conversely, street and castle, church and highway, each have their special memory, and each is stamped some recollection of this man, whose love for his fellows was the most transcendent impulse in his life.

Robert Louis Balfour Stevenson, as he was christened, though few people know of the third name, as he acquired a strange dislike to it, and hid born at No. 8 Howard Place, Edinburgh, on Nov. 13, 1850. The locality naturally made little impression on the boy, as he moved from there to No. 1 Inverleith Terrace, when he was little over 2 years of age. 

### **ADVENTURES OF** EARL OF MORLEY

### His Vessel Once Blew Up When Was Noted as Interpreter of the Crew Had Only Got 500 Yards Away.

Ottawa, Feb. 12.-The Earl of Morley, who is visiting at Government House, must not be confounded with Lord Morley of Biackburn, the secretary of state for India, and the bi-ographer of Gladstone. The patronymic of that statesman is Morley, and until his elevation to the peerage was celebrated as John Morley; whereas, the family name of the Earl of Morley is Parker. In Canada there is now a general staff, consisting of five military experts, headed by Major-General Sir Percy Lake. In England there is a similar general staff. They constitute purely advisory boards to the administrative and commanding heads. But between these two advisory bodies in Canada and Great Britain there now no organic connection. The work of Christianizing India, with its 300,000,000 people, is a problem in itself, without considering the sending of missionaries o the rest of the world. In concluding, the speaker explained the caste system, and showed how it absolutely solates the inhabitants into four classes, neither of which will intermarry with or have any dealing with the other. Much is being done a present to break up caste in India and one of the strongest means of doing it is education, particularly education of the younger people, it being impossible to dissuade the older people from their lifelong traditions and superstitions.
