COMING TO INVESTIGATE LONDON'S WATER SUPPLY

Well Driller Will Arrive Here Next Week To Carry On Operations-More Aqua Pura Must Be Found.

Investigation of the possibility of increasing London's water supply will commence next week, when a well-driller arrives in the city. New supplies are admitted to be urgently needed in order to keep pace with the city's growth. In fact, on some of the city's governing boards the statement has been made that the present water supply is not sufficient to fill the new reservoir which is being constructed at Springbank, much less the second addition of another ten million gallons which is contemplated next year.

General Manager Buchanan claims that this statement is only partially true, "We are able to pump about six and a half million gallons a day, while the consumption at most times during the year is only about five million gallons a day. In very hot and extremely cold weather the consumption increases.

Worth, or other places that have been suggested, the reservoir will be 2vail-able as a collecting point."

Along with these contemplated efforts to increase the spring water supply the utilities commission is making every effort to reduce its use for commercial purposes. The Grand Trunk is being supplied with river water for its engines. Work will shortly be commenced on a similar proposition for the C. P. R. A pump will be installed at the foot of Central avenue to the storage tanks at the end of Elias street. The line may also be used to supply water for use on the streets.

If this plan works successfully it may use a considerable amount of water. lons a day. In very hot and extremely cold weather, the consumption increases to our full numping capacity. Chicago Rifle Squad Puts End to Criminal.

Chicago, May 14.-A rifle squad of Chicago police early today cornered and shot a train robber who had robbed an Illinois Central Railroad mail car of currency estimated to total \$500,000. The train arrived at the 63rd street station about 1 o'clock, three hours late, and the train robber left the mail car there. A few blocks away two policemen accosted him, and he shot one through the head. According to reports received by the

police, the robber boarded a car on the train at Gilman, about 50 miles south of Chicago, and worked his way forward to the mail car where he compelled one of the five mail clerks to tie the hands and feet of the others. The shooting of the policeman attracted a squad of patrolmen who cornered the robber in an apartment build-ing not far away. A rifle squad was summoned and after two hours of snip-ing by both sides the robber was killed.

GRANT TO WESTERN BY ONTARIO GOVERNMENT \$79,000

Work On New Buildings To Start This Summer-Extension Plans Will Be Fully Carried Out.

"I am not at all despondent over the grant made to the university this year by the Government," said Dr. K. P. R. Neville, registrar of the Western University, Dr. Neville stated. Work will in all probability be commenced on the near very commenced on the near very commenced. Neville, registrar of the Western University today. "We have an unhesitating assurance that the grant will be more largely increased next year. Debts left the Government by their predecessors in office necessitated that they must keep this year's expenditure as low as possible, but we may expect more from them next year, after they have had an opportunity to regulate their own expenditure.

The provincial grant this year to the Western University is \$19,000 more than last year, or a total of \$79,000, made up as follows: Medical department, \$20,000; public health department, \$20,000; arts department, \$20,000; arts department (special), \$14,000; medical department (special), \$14,000; medical department (special), \$10,000. 



No word was received up till midnight. Thus the men, complying with their instructions, took a holiday until the commission meets their demand, it was announced.

Attempt Settlement.

Mr. Martin believed that the commission would meet the men as soon as possible in an effort to reach a settlement. He said the directors were anxious to play the game squarely with their employees, and that they were willing to give as much as the road could possibly stand. The commission had made the offer of four cents an hour increase with full knowledge of the finances of the road and in the firm belief that it was the most the road could afford. It, however, the conciliation board had decided that a greater increase should be given to the men, it would have been given for a year without quibbling.



RUSSIAN CO-OPERATORS.

The arrest of leading Russian co-operatives the other day by the Bolshevik Government is a symptom that a new struggle may at any moment break out in Russia. The co-operative system of business has grown to huge proportions in that country. Before the war there were some thousands of local societies, each operating a "store," federated in a few dozen sectional unions or "wholesale societies." According to a recent article in the New York Outlook, the membership of a million heads of families has grown to twenty million, or 70 evil, as in Persia it is rapidly driving out per cent of the adult male population of Russia. polygamy. These co-operatives are generally hostile to Bolshevist dictatorship, or at any rate Bolshevism hates and fears them.

The differences between Bolshevism and cooperation are in the main three. First, Cooperation does not assent to the Bolshevist ideas of violence and dictatorship. CURRIE GETS SWORD OF HONOR, TRIBUTE

Eulogistic Address Accompanies Gift From All Commands.

MONTREAL, May 13 .- Officers who served under Gen. Currie in France took advantage of his presence in Montreal today in connection with his appointment to the principalship of a sword of honor and an illuminated address at a banquet of the University Club this evening. The historic sigmificance of the latter is apparent when it is stated that it bears the signatures of every officer who held an important command or appointment in the Canadian corps when the "Cease Fire" sounded.

Fire" sounded.

The sword bears on its blade the following inscription:

"To Gen. Sir Arthur William Currie, G.C.M.G., K.C.B., commanding Canadian Army Corps, from officers holding commands and staff appointments on November 11, 1918, as a token of their regard and deep admiration for his magnificent services to Canada and the Empire in the great war."

The address is signed by some six major-generals, 22 brigadier-generals, nine colonels and 109 lieutenant-colonels, and it praises not only "his military knowledge" and "unquestionable judgment," but also the "human feeling" as evidenced in the "marked care displayed at all times" for the comfort and wellbeing of his men.

Shows Appreciation.

General Currie, in his acknowledgment showed a profound appreciation of this esteem and suggested that the inen who had passed through these experiences would be equal to playing their part in the tests of the future. The problems of today, General Currie continued, were grave and difficult in many respects, but approached in a spirit of good will and tolerance and sympathy and with the same ideals as had actuated them overseas, there was The sword bears on its blade the

TRIBUNAL TO PROBE CASES OF PRISONERS **HELD WITHOUT TRIAL**

Coalition Govt. Accedes To Irish Demands.

LONDON, May 13.—Nothing is yet disclosed as to the outcome of the conference between Viscount French, viceroy of Ireland, and Andrew Bonar Law, the Government leader, today, and the cabinet council yesterday, on the new policy for Ireland. Moreover, the new Irish secretary, Sir Hamar Greenwood, declared yesterday that since his appointment

tary. Sir Hamar Greenwood, declared yesterday that since his appointment he had signed no deportation orders and had released many prisoners arrested on suspicion, among them Ald. O'Brien, secretary of the Irish Trade Union Congress.

It is also worthy of note that there has of late been a surcease of nocturnal raids and less military display in Dublin.

OFFICIAL TOTAL FIFTY.
DUBLIN, May 13.—Fifty police baracks were destroyed in the raids Wedacks were destroyed in the rains wednesday night, according to an official statement issued from Dublin Castle its evening. Twenty income tax offices were raided and the documents burned and seven courthouses were also atacked.

The destruction of police barracks, as shown by the castle communication, was almost on as great an organized scale as similar attacks last Easter, when more than sixty barracks were attacked. Most of the barracks in the present case had been abandoned, and no loss of life was entailed.

Several attacks occurred in the counties of Antrim, Cork, Leitrim and Wexford, for one or two barracks were burned, including those at Cavan, Londonderry, Galway, Limerick, Meath, Donegal and Tyrone. The procedure in all cases was alike. Where caretakers were in charge, they were first removed, then inflammable materials or explosives were applied to the huts and the buildings were partially or wholly destroyed. The destruction of police barracks, as

lestroyed.

Among the courthouses attacked were those at Cashel and Ballinamore. These were completely destroyed, with all documents. 

In 1919, for instance, one lot of Irish Cobbler yielded at the rate of 378 bushels per acre and another 37 bushels per acre. The best Green Mountain stock yielded 330 bushels per acre, and one of the poorest 46 bushels per acre. The Matter of Seed. If possible, one should know where the seed was grown the previous year that he is about to use. If it came from a crop, the plants of which grew visorously until cut down by frost, then, if free from disease, it will. as a rule, yield a much better crop than if it is from a crop, the plants of which withered in the middle of summer and the tubers lay in hot soil the rest of the season. This year, when the price of potatoes is so high there will be a temptation to use small potatoes for seed. If these small potatoes come from a good crop the previous year the results are likely to be satisfactory if the season is favorable, but if they are from a small crop the previous year when the plants dried up early, the plants this year are likely to be weak and the yield not very good. Good-sized sets of from one and a half to two ounces have been found the most satisfactory, taking one year with another, although if the season is particularly favorable smaller sets will produce a good crop, but one cannot tell what the season will be, hence it is better to be on the safe side. The distance of planting, which has been found most economical in most places in Canada is rows two and a half to three feet apart and sets twelve to fourteen inches apart in the rows. While quite shallow planting has given the highest average yields at Ottawa, it is necessary to plant about four inches deep for field culture to enable one to harrow before the potatoes are up without pulling up the sets. The varieties which have been most generally satisfactory in Canada are Irish Cobbler as an early potato and Green Mountain as a main crop or later

Cattle are still showing the effects of the long winter on dry feed, and in most localities the grass is not yet fully ready for pasture. There is little move-ment in fat storm or stockers, largely on account of the rush of field opera

Milk is keeping up surprisingly well for the season, but there are some complaints that some of it is hardly up to the standard in butter-fat. Cheese sold on the Picton board on Friday at 31 13-16 cents a pound. Glen-garry quotes sales at 32 3-16 cents a

Dairy cows, in good form, are bring-\$120 to \$200 in Carleton, but wer prices are quoted elsewhere. Sales of hogs are somewhat slow at from \$18 to \$20.50 a hundredweight, and

from \$18 to \$20.50 a hundredweight, and some of them are being marketed too light in weight. Brood sows are bringing from \$65 to \$100 in Lanark, as they are now much scarcer than last year. 




