Everything that dignifies and ennobles labor is for the welfare of all. In this young country, where the inequal-

ities of older civilizations have not been reproduced in all their severity, and where the door of opportunity is open to every man, the word labor is not the badge of one class marked off from the rest of society, or designating a certain social stratum. Still, we have our problems growing out of the organization of industry, and these have created a class consciousness among the toilers, and led many of them to combine for the purpose of collective bargaining with those who would profit by their labor.

Combination is the tendency of the age. The smaller industries are combining, ostensibly to effect economies in production and distribution, frequently to fetter competition, Capitalists are pooling their resources to withstand the aggression of labor, and workingmen are combining as never his wife's mother has been there?" before to procure the maximum of advantage for themselves. That all these forces are working to some good end, no one may doubt, unless he bclieves the world is destined to grow worse instead of better, although before the solution is reached society may be shaken to its foundations by the irrepressible conflict.

The trades union movement is the most portentous fact of the last half century. Every student of the industrial history of England, which country may be taken as a type, is obliged to admit that the organization of the laboring classes has been a powerful uplift. The invention of the steam engine and the rise of the factory system destroyed the eld relations between capital and labor. An unparalleled impetus was given to production and to the accumulation of wealth, but it is an incontestable fact that the condition of the working classes in England for over half a century was most dressing all in white, but then deplorable. It was a dark and terrible chapter, which was not exaggerated by Marx in his great work "Das Kapital." Much of the improvement came bout by the growth of humanitarian sentiment, independent of the efforts of the working classes to remedy their two boys. lot, but they secured many of their elementary rights only by titanic struggles. 



# ON THE RUSSIANS

## Danger of Czar Renewing Fight.

London, Sept. 3. - Europe scarcely realizes yet the inestimable blessing of unexpected peace. The sudden end of the war is almost as great a boon to Western Europe as to the combatants themselves, for the danger of a general conflict has been steadily growing for the past ten months. How serious that peril had really become the world at large has little idea, but in France and England especially impending sword has been watched with keen apprehension

There are some who still fear that the temptation to take advantage of opportunities for aggrandizement which are not likely to soon return will lead to rash adventures in certain quarters. A majority of observers, however, believe that peace has come in time to avert any general cataclysm. The opinion grows stronger also that the statesmanlike wisdom of Japan's re-nunciation overshadows its magnanim-This impression is confirmed by the fact that Japan has insured the permanency of peace in another way. Europe did not believe that the Japanese would abandon the demand for indemnity chiefly because, as her statesmen explained, it would leave Russia sufficiently strong financially to pre-

pare for an early removal of the con-flict. This danger has been effectually removed by the terms of the new Anglo-Japanese alliance the signing of which was first announced in these dispatches. This treaty is a full defensive agreement, and a Russian attack on Japan would invoke the full power of the British Empire against aggression from the outset. The world will find in this instrument an exemplification of what must in the future be the best security against war, namely, militant peace

compacts between the great powers. Interesting information in regard to ligerents is already forthcoming. 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

Mr. D. A. McDermid, secretary of the London Temperance League, sends The Advertiser the following interesting let-

"One does not generally look for anything sensational in a Government report of agricultural fairs, but the report of the provincial superintendent for 1905, refers to conditions as start-ling as they are deplorable. He does not hesitate to characterize many ex-

hibitions as a 'public disgrace,' and "The rapid change that has taken place in the character of many of our exhibition is held the local police are first seen and, if necessary, bribed. Money is then offered the fair officials for the privilege of operating at the exhibition. The officials of one fair tried to put the detectives off the exhibitions, and which is rapidly creeping over others, requires immediate attention. Unless this insidious change can be prevented, and reforms brought about, our so-called agricultural societies are more likely to be a disgrace than a blessing to the Province.

Immoral Performances. "'Immoral performances, which are generally associated with the most depraved districts of large cities, are boldly conducted in side-shows at many Ontario exhibitions. These per formances are frequently advertised as being "for men only," although boys of tender years are freely admit-

'In addition to the side-shows, the special attractions introduced in front the grand stands are often far from elevating. Women contortionists, bal-let dancers and men who repeat vile jokes, are paid large sums to "amuse" the public. These people are generally advertised as the main features of the exhibition.

"'Accompanying these performances it will almost invariably be found that horse races (although against the law) are an important part of the after-noon's programme, that betting is carried on freely, and that gamblers and

"The worst feature of the situation lies in the fact that these features are introduced under the disguise of be-ing a benefit to our agricultural exai-tion of objectionable features, the dibitions, and that respectable people are being trapped into attending them, and into allowing their young children best public pinion."
