A TERRIBLE **EXPERIENCE**

Account of the Earthquake

A FORMER CHATHAM BOY

The Planet has received many accounts of the recent earthquake in San Francisco, but none have appeared which are more accurate and interesting than the one sent to us by Dr. A. F. Dollin, a former Chathamite, who went through the terrible experience. Mr. Dollin's letter to The Planet is as follows :-

San Francisco, Cal,,

For the Chatham Weekly Planet: Dear Sirs,—I am going to write a few lines to you giving you my ex experiences and a few facts of the experiences and a few facts of the carthquake which shook this city on the 18th of April, at 5.13 a. m. At that hour mostly every one was in bed, and the early risers, who had to go some distance to work, were at nome preparing to leave, when a sort of a distant rumble was heard, then the house began to sway like a wave conds, though the time seemed like two or three minutes. Chimneys f. I', houses collapsed, and I guess the majority of the residents of San Francisco thought the judgment day rannisco thought the Judgment day had come. The nearest way I could compare the force would be to take a big strong man, and give him a tea chest with a few small boxes in-side, and toss it back and forth. Well

tea chest with a few small boxes inside, and toss it back and forth. Well San Francisco was tossed by the unseen force with as much ease as the man would toss the box.

On the morning of the quake the rumbling woke me up, and immediately following came an easy motion which gradually increased till the house shook and swayed. I arose and went to my mother, who has not been in the city very long. I thought that there was a heavy shock coming, and I feared for her owing to her thealth, but she stood it fine, and now says she thinks she would rather stand an earthquake than some of those thunder storms around Chatthm. After the quake stopped, I dressed and went out, and some horibe sights were to be seen. Houses with foundations gone, others with the chimney broken through the roof. While out, came the mews of fire. The first fire I came to was at 22nd and Mission streets, where several stores and houses were destroyed. This fire was supposed to have started from defective wiring. From here I walked on towards town and at 18th and Valencia streets. 



BANKS IN A FIRE CITY

THE PRESSING NEED OF MONEY IN A STRICKEN COMMUNITY.

Experience of a Chicago Financial House In 1871—Greed of Depositors and How It Showed Itself—An Unexpected Proposition.

Whenever a great fire devastates a large city the first effort of those concerned with the work of restoration is to get the banks open so that the pressing needs of a homeless population may be cared for. At such times business is done on a strictly cash basis, and everything sells at a premium. The consequence is an extraordinary demand for hand to hand money, since the merchant can use the poor man's dollar to better advantage than the rich man's credit in buying supplies to

replenish his flame emptied warehouse.
The struggle that ensues to obtain all the cash in sight is full of human interest. It has its picturesque features. On Monday, Oct. 10, 1871, when all Chicago trudged downtown to see what was left of the city, great crowds besieged the banks. Some men were crying, others talked incoherently, and everybody seemed half dazed. An officer of one of Chicago's greatest banks, who fought his way through the smoldering embers to the white marble hall which surrounded his vault, gave the following description of what occurred:

"Although the iron door of the vault had been somewhat expanded by heat, I found that the combination perfectly. That reassured me, and after hunting about the debris I fished out one or two iron crowbars and by wedging them in finally opened the vault door. The inclosure smelled smoky, but I soon found that the cash was all right, and so were our books. That made me feel good, and I got down to work in short order. Quebec, June 12.—Although the end had been expected since Sunday, the news of Sir Hector Louis Langevin's death last evening, at 9.15, created sorrow throughout the city. He was one of the fathers of confederation. Sir Hector Langevin, since his retifement from the Thompson Cabinet, and, later on, from public life, had lived in absolute retirement with his son-in-law, Horn Thos Chanais.

He was beloved by his family, yet his circle of close friends was limited, and when the ex-Minister of Public Works took his daily walks he was generally unaccompanied. Up to a year ago he took a very lively interest in public affairs. public affairs.

His Career. Hos. Sir Hector Langevin, K.C.M.G., C.B., K.C., was born at Quebec in 1826. He was a son of Lleut.-Col. Jean Lan-gevin, assistant civil secretary under the Earl of Gosford and Lord Sydenham. He received his education at Que ham. He received his education at Quebec Seminary, leaving at the age of 20 to study law in the office of the late Hon. A. N. Morin, Montreal. Having completed his law studies under the late Geo. E. Carter, he began practice as a barrister in Montreal in 1850, respectively.
