

His Excellency Major General Sir John Harvey, K. C. B. and K. C. H., Lieutenant Governor and Commander in Chief, &c. &c. &c.

Fredericton, Tuesday. 10th September, 1839.

HE House having been by several Proclamations prorogued until this day, then to meet for the despatch of business; and being met—

A Message was sent from His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, by Beverly R. Jouett, Esquire, the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, requiring the immediate attendance of the House in the Council Chamber.

The House attended, and being returned—

Mr. Partelow, by leave, presented a Petition from James T. Hanford, of the City of Saint John, Merchant, praying drawback on sixty six tierces of Sugar consumed at the great Fire at that place, on the 17th August last; which he read.

Ordered, That the said Petition be received, and lie on the Table.

The Honorable Mr. Speaker then reported, that His Excellency had been pleased to make a Speech to both Houses, of which Mr. Speaker said he had, to prevent mistakes, obtained a copy; which he read to the House, and is as followeth:—

" Mr. President, and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council, " Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly,

AVING called you together for a special purpose, at a season of the year when the absence from your homes, of some among you, may be attended with inconvenience, I will not unnecessarily prolong that absence by directing your attention at present to any other than the immediate objects for which I have deemed it my duty to convene you. These objects are to invite you to take into your consideration, as well the measure and the conditions of the relief which you may deem it expedient to extend to such of the sufferers from the effects of the late calamitous Fire, by which the City of Saint John has again been visited, as may require such assistance, as the still more important subject of devising and passing Legislative enactments, making more effectual provision for the future prevention or prompt extinction of Fires, (and the protection of property upon such occasions,) and thereby restoring confidence to the inhabitants, and upholding the commercial credit of that wealthy and enterprising City. You will, I doubt not, approach the consideration of the details of these important matters with an entire conviction of the intimate, the indissoluble connexion of the interests of its great Commercial Emporium with those of the Province at large.

"It only remains for me to renew to you the assurance of my sincere desire to co-operate with you upon this, as upon every other occasion, in devising and maturing such measures as may tend to promote the general satisfaction and prosperity of the inhabitants of this loyal Province.

"I will cause copies of several Despatches to be laid before you, by which you will find that our Gracious Sovereign is duly sensible of the loyalty and devoted attachment to Her Majesty of Her faithful subjects in this Province, and is highly gratified at observing the cordiality subsisting between all the Branches of the Provincial Legislature.

"You will also find that prompt attention has been paid by Her Majesty's Government to your representations regarding the protection of the Fisheries and other

matters connected with the welfare and interests of New Brunswick.

"I have satisfaction in acquainting you that Her Majesty's Government has recently sent out to this Province a Commission, composed of two Gentlemen of eminent scientific attainments, for the purpose of making a Topographical examination of certain parts of the Territory on the Frontier of this Province and Lower Canada, which is in dispute between Great Britain and the United States. The Commissioners have commenced their operations, and I indulge a confident hope that the result of their explorations may enable the General Governments of the two Nations to bring this long agitated question to an early and amicable determination.

"In conclusion, I will offer you my sincere congratulations upon the abundant Harvest with which it has pleased the Bountiful Giver of all good things to bless this section of the Globe,—a blessing in which this Province has largely participated."

On motion of Mr. Partelow,

Resolved, That an humble Address be presented to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, in answer to his Speech at the opening of this present Session.

Ordered, That Mr. Partelow, Mr. Weldon and Mr. Brown, be a Committee to prepare the Address.

On motion of Mr. Hayward,

Ordered, That two hundred copies of His Excellency's Speech be forthwith printed for the use of the Legislature.

On motion of Mr. End,

Ordered, That the House do to-morrow go into Committee of the whole, in consideration of the Speech from His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor.

On motion of Mr. Allen,

Whereas the Reverend James Somerville, L. L. D., the late Chaplain to this House, has, by an afflictive dispensation of Divine Providence, been rendered incapable of performing his public duties, and in consequence thereof been obliged to leave the Province; therefore

Resolved, That the Reverend John Mayne Sterling, A. M., be the Chaplain in his place.

Mr. Weldon moved for leave to bring in a Bill, to revive and continue an Act to restrain the provisions of the fifth Section of an Act, intituled "An Act for the support of the Civil Government in this Province," and to establish sundry regulations for the future disposal of Crown Lands and Timber in certain cases.

Leave granted.

On motion of Mr. End,

Resolved, That a Standing Committee be appointed, to whom may be referred all matters which may hereafter arise, that may in any way be supposed to affect the privileges of this House.

Ordered, That Mr. End, Mr. Allen, Mr. Brown, Mr. M'Leod and Mr. Woodward,

do compose the said Committee.

The House adjourned until to-morrow morning at 10 o'clock.

Wednesday, 11th September, 1839.

Prayers.

Mr. Weldon, pursuant to leave, brought in a Bill to revive and continue an Act to restrain the provisions of the fifth Section of an Act, intituled "An Act for the support of the Civil Government of this Province," and to establish sundry regulations for the future disposal of Crown Lands and Timber in certain cases; which was read a first time.

Mr. Partelow, by leave, presented a Petition from Robert F. Hazen, Esquire, and others, a Committee appointed at a Public Meeting, holden at Saint John, after the great Fire on the 17th of August last, on behalf of the inhabitants of the said City, praying that an Act may pass to restrain the erection of Wooden Buildings within certain limits in the said City; which he read.

Ordered, That the said Petition be received, and lie on the Table.

Mr. Partelow moved for leave to bring in a Bill, for the more effectual prevention of Fires in the City of Saint John.

Leave granted.

The said Bill being brought in, was read a first time.

Mr. Partelow, by leave, presented a Petition from Robert F. Hazen, Esquire, and others, of the City of Saint John, on behalf of the inhabitants thereof, praying that an Act may pass, vesting power in Commissioners to be appointed by the Executive Government, for the widening of certain Streets in the said City; which he read.

Ordered, That the said Petition be received, and lie on the Table.

Mr. Partelow moved for leave to bring in a Bill, to authorize the widening and enlarging of certain Streets in the City of Saint John, and of laying out other Streets therein.

Leave granted.

The said Bill being brought in, was read a first time.

Mr. Partelow, by leave, presented a Petition from Robert F. Hazen, Esquire, and others, of the City of Saint John, on behalf of the inhabitants thereof, praying a Loan of Money to carry into effect the contemplated rebuilding of a part of the said City, recently destroyed by Fire, with fire proof materials; which he read.

Ordered, That the said Petition be received, and lie on the Table.

Mr. Partelow moved for leave to bring in a Bill, to authorize a Loan of Money for rebuilding the District of the City of Saint John, burnt in the year 1839.

Leave granted.

The said Bill being brought in, was read a first time.

Mr. Partelow, by leave, presented a Petition from Robert F. Hazen, Esquire, and others, of the City of Jaint John, on behalf of the inhabitants thereof, praying that an Act may pass, authorizing the formation of an efficient Police Establishment; which he read.

Ordered, That the said Petition be received, and lie on the Table.

Read a second time the following Bills:—

A Bill for the more effectual prevention of Fires in the City of Saint John:

A Bill to authorize the widening and enlarging of certain Streets in the City of Saint John, and of laying out other Streets therein: and

A Bill to authorize a Loan of Money for rebuilding the District of the City of Saint John burnt in the year 1839.

On motion of Mr. Woodward,

Ordered, That one hundred copies of these several Bills be forthwith printed for the use of the Legislature.

Mr. Woodward, by leave, presented a Petition from Henry Gilbert, Esquire, of the City of Saint John, praying that an Act may pass to authorize him to lay down Pipes for conveying Water through the City of Saint John and Parish of Portland, and adjacent thereto; which he read.

Ordered, That the said Petition be received, and lie on the Table.

Mr. Woodward moved for leave to bring in a Bill, to authorize Henry Gilbert, his Heirs and Assigns, the power to open the Roads and Streets leading into and through the City of Saint John and the Parish of Portland, and the Roads and Streets adjacent thereto, for the purpose of laying down Water Pipes under the same.

Leave granted.

The said Bill being brought in, was read a first time.

Mr. Woodward, by leave, presented a Petition from Charles M'Lauchlan, of the City of Saint John, Merchant, praying return of Duty on Sugar destroyed by fire on the 17th of August last; which he read.

Ordered, That the said Petition be received, and lie on the Table.

On motion of the Honorable Mr. Johnston,

Resolved, That the Petition from James T. Hanford, presented to the House yesterday, praying a return of Duty on articles consumed by fire, as also the aforegoing Petition from Charles M'Lauchlan, together with such others as may be presented to the House during the present Session with a similar prayer, be referred to a Select Committee to examine and report thereon.

Ordered, That Mr. End, Mr. Rankin, Mr. M'Leod, Mr. Woodward and Mr. Wel-

don, do compose the said Committee.

Mr. Partelow, from the Committee appointed to prepare an Address to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, in answer to his Speech at the opening of the Session, reported a draft thereof; which he read, and then submitted the same.

It being handed in at the Clerk's Table, was there again read; and thereupon

Ordered, To be accepted; and On motion of Mr. Partelow,

The House went into Committee of the whole, on the said draft Address.

Mr. M'Leod in the Chair of the Committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

The Chairman reported, that they had gone into consideration of the draft Address referred to them, and agreed to the same without making any amendment thereto.

Ordered, That the Report be accepted; and

On motion of Mr. End,

Resolved, unanimously, That the Address be engrossed, signed by the Speaker, and presented to His Excellency by the whole House; and further

Resolved, That a Committee be appointed to wait upon His Excellency to know

when he will be pleased to receive the House therewith.

Ordered, That Mr. End, Mr. Weldon and Mr. Hill be a Committee for that purpose.

On motion of the Honorable Mr. Johnston,

The House proceeded to the Order of the Day to go into Committee of the whole, in consideration of the Speech from His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor at the opening of the Session.

The Order of the Day being read, the House accordingly resolved itself into said

Committee.

Mr. Taylor in the Chair of the Committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

The Chairman reported, that the Committee having the matters referred to them under their consideration, had made progress therein, and he was directed to ask leave to sit again.

Ordered, That the Report be accepted, and leave granted.

The House adjourned until to-morrow morning at 10 o'clock.

Thursday, 12th Septemper, 1839.

Prayers.

Mr. Partelow, by leave, presented a Petition from James Adam, William Carvill, Elisha De Wolf Ratchford, William H. Street, David Waterbery, and 80 others, of the City of Saint John, praying that an Act may pass, authorizing the opening of a new Street from the North Market Wharf to connect with Smyth Street, so called, in said City; which he read.

Ordered, That the said Petition be received, and lie on the Table.

Read a second time-

A Bill to authorize Henry Gilbert, his Heirs and Assigns, to open the Roads and Streets leading into and through the City of Saint John and the Parish of Portland, and the Roads and Streets adjacent thereto, for the purpose of laying down Water Pipes under the same: and

A Bill to revive and continue an Act to restrain the provisions of the fifth Section of an Act, intituled "An Act for the support of the Civil Government in this Province," and to establish sundry regulations for the future disposal of Crown Lands and Tim-

ber in certain cases.

Mr. Woodward, by leave, presented a Petition from Thomas P. Crane and John M'Grath, of the City of Saint John, Merchants, praying a return of Duties on certain articles destroyed by fire on the 17th of August last; which he read.

Ordered, That the said Petition be received, and referred to the Committee appointed yesterday for taking such Petitions under consideration, to report thereon.

Mr. End, from the Committee appointed to wait upon His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, to know when he would be pleased to receive the House with their Address, in answer to His Excellency's Speech at the opening of the Session, reported, that they had attended to that duty, and that His Excellency was pleased to say, that he would receive the House with their Address at one o'clock this day, at Government House.

It being the time appointed by His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor to receive the House with their Address, they waited upon His Excellency and presented the same, which is as follows:—

The humble Address of the House of Assembly.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

WE, the Representatives of Her Majesty's Loyal Subjects, the People of New Brunswick, most respectfully thank Your Excellency for the Speech which you have

been pleased to deliver at the opening of the Session.

Sensible of the urgent necessity of immediate consideration to the present state of the City of Saint John, we cheerfully submit to the inconvenience of leaving our respective pursuits at this busy season of the year, and Your Excellency may be assured that we shall attend to the subjects connected with the late calamitous Fire, under a full conviction that the interests of the whole Province are deeply involved in the prosperity and welfare of that enterprising Commercial City, and we doubt not, that our endeavours to render ourselves worthy of the important trust reposed in us by our fellow subjects, shall at all times receive the able and effective co-operation of Your Excellency.

We know that the happiness of New Brunswick mainly depends upon the loyalty of its inhabitants, and their devoted attachment to the British Crown, and we rejoice to learn, that our reiterated expression of this principle, as well as the cordiality so happily subsisting between all the Branches of the Provincial Legislature, has attracted

the favorable notice of our beloved Sovereign.

We observe with heartfelt pleasure that Her Majesty's Government have attended to our representations concerning the Fisheries, which have ever been justly considered an object of paramount importance.

We deem the information communicated by Your Excellency, regarding the projected Topographical Survey of a part of the disputed Territory, by order of Her Majesty's

Majesty's Government, as highly important, and are glad to learn that this service has been undertaken by Gentlemen possessing such eminently scientific attainments.—That the result so confidently hoped for by Your Excellency may bring this long agitated matter to an amicable and early determination, is our most earnest wish; and we continue to rely on Her Majesty's Government that the boundaries of this Province will be preserved in their full integrity.

Good, and for which the people cannot be too grateful.

And being returned—

The Honorable Mr. Speaker reported, that His Excellency had been pleased to make the following reply thereto:—

" Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen,

"I thank you for this loyal and patriotic Address, the tenor of which is most gratifying to me, as I doubt not it will be to the inhabitants of the Province at large, as well as to those of the City of Saint John, to promote whose interests you have so cheerfully sacrificed every consideration of personal convenience.

"The result of your deliberations cannot be otherwise than highly beneficial to the

public interests."

On motion of Mr. Partelow,

Resolved, That an humble Address be presented to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, praying that he will be pleased to communicate to this House what measures have been taken by His Excellency under the Address of this House of the 13th March last, for obtaining payment of the amount due from the New Brunswick and Nova Scotia Land Company; and further, that His Excellency will be pleased to lay before the House such correspondence relating to, and information regarding the state of the claim upon the said Company, as to His Excellency may seem meet.

Ordered, That Mr. Partelow, Mr. M'Leod and Mr. Rankin, be a Committee to

wait upon His Excellency with the Address.

On motion of Mr. End,

Whereas this House, on the 20th day of March last, did address His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, praying that he would adopt such measures as might be deemed expedient, for recovery of monies due on account of purchases of Crown Lands, and Licences to cut Timber and Logs on the same; to which His Excellency was pleased to reply, that he would attend to the wishes of the House; and whereas it was not the intention of the House, in passing the said Address, that any measures should be taken, which might be distressing to the actual Settler; therefore

Resolved, That an humble Address be presented to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, praying that no coercive measures may be at present adopted against purchasers of lots of Land of two hundred acres and under, for settlement, and who are

actually settled upon and improving the same.

Ordered, That Mr. End, Mr. Hill and Mr. Freeze, be a Committee to wait upon His Excellency with the Address.

On motion of Mr. Weldon,

Whereas it is necessary that a new Bridge be erected over the Shediac River, on the line of Great Road from Dorchester to Chatham; therefore

Resolved, That an humble Address be presented to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, praying that His Excellency will be pleased to cause the necessary directions to be given to the Supervisor of the Great Road from Shediac to Richibucto, to take a contract for the erection of a new Bridge over the said River, and this House will make provision for the same at the next Session of the Legislature, out of any Grant for the Great Road from Shediac to Chatham.

Ordered, That Mr. Weldon, Mr. J. M. Wilmot and Mr. H. T. Partelow, be a

Committee to wait upon His Excellency with the Address.

On motion of Mr. Partelow,

Whereas it appears from returns before the House, that large amounts are due on Bond

Bond and otherwise by Duncan Barber, of the County of York, for the recovery of which it is especially necessary that prompt measures should be taken; therefore

Resolved, That an humble Address be presented to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, praying that His Excellency will be pleased to direct Her Majesty's Attorney General forthwith to take such legal steps for the protection of the rights of the Crown as may be necessary in the premises.

Ordered, That Mr. Partelow, Mr. Hayward and Mr. Gilbert, be a Committee to

wait upon His Excellency with the Address.

On motion of Mr. Partelow,

The House went into Committee of the whole, on a Bill for the more effectual prevention of Fires in the City of Saint John.

Mr Hayward in the Chair of the Committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

The Chairman reported, that the Committee having the Bill referred to them under their consideration, had made progress therein, and he was directed to ask leave to sit again.

Ordered, That the Report be accepted, and leave granted.

The House adjourned until to-morrow morning at 10 o'clock.

Mr. Partelow, by leave, presented a Petition from Messieurs Crookshank and Walker, of the City of Saint John, Merchants, praying a return of Duties on Wine destroyed by fire on the 17th of August last; which he read.

Ordered, That the said Petition be received, and referred to the Committee appointed on the 11th instant, to take under consideration Petitions praying a like return

of Duties, to report thereon.

Mr. Woodward, by leave, presented a Petition from Alexander Robertson, of the City of Saint John, Merchant, praying return of Duties on articles destroyed by fire on the 17th of August last; which he read.

Ordered, That the said Petition be received, and referred to the same Committee.

Mr. Partelow, from the Committee appointed to wait upon His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor with the Address of this House of yesterday, praying that His Excellency would be pleased to acquaint the House what measures had been taken under the Resolution of the 13th March last, relative to the recovery of the amount due from the New Brunswick and Nova Scotia Land Company, reported, that they had attended to that duty, and that His Excellency was pleased to say that the information sought for should be immediately laid before the House.

Mr. Partelow, from the Committee appointed to wait upon His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor with the Address of this House of yesterday, on the subject of proceedings being had against Duncan Barber, for a debt due to the Crown, reported, that they had attended to that duty, and that His Excellency was pleased to say, he would direct that the wishes of the House should be carried into immediate effect.

Mr. End, from the Committee appointed to wait upon His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor with the Address of the House of yesterday, praying His Excellency that no coercive measures should at present be adopted against actual settlers for Monies due to the Crown on purchases of Lands, reported, that they had attended to that duty, and that His Excellency was pleased to say, that the wishes of the House had been anticipated by the Government, and should be complied with.

Mr. Weldon, from the Committee appointed to wait upon His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor with the Address of this House of yesterday, relative to the erection of a new Bridge over the Shediac River, reported, that they had attended to that duty, and His Excellency was pleased to say, that the wishes of the House should be immediately complied with.

Mr.

Mr. Brown, by leave, presented a Petition from John Marks, of Saint Stephen, in the County of Charlotte, setting forth, that he had, in the year 1835, made purchase from the Crown of a large tract of Land, and had paid the first instalment, amounting to upwards of five hundred pounds, and praying to be allowed to surrender the purchase so made, upon the forfeiture of the amount already paid, and that the Bond given to secure the residue of the purchase money may be cancelled; which he read.

And upon the question, that the said Petition be received, and ordered to lie on

Whereupon it was decided in the negative.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

The Chairman reported, that the Committee having the Bill again before them, had made further progress therein, and he was directed to ask leave to sit again.

Ordered, That the Report be accepted, and leave granted.

On motion of Mr. Weldon,

The House went into Committee of the whole, on a Bill to authorize the widening and enlarging of certain Streets in the City of Saint John, and of laying out other Streets therein.

Mr. Palmer in the Chair of the Committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

The Chairman reported, that the Committee had the Bill referred to them under consideration, and agreed to the same with amendments.

Ordered, That the Report be accepted, and the Bill engrossed as amended.

The Honorable Mr. Johnston, by command of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, laid before the House copies of various documents relative to the claim against the New Brunswick and Nova Scotia Land Company, as requested by an Address from this House to His Excellency, of yesterday.

The same being then severally read at the Clerk's Table, are as follow:—

" Downing Street, 14th June, 1839.

"SIR—I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your Despatch, of the 7th May, No. 34. I received on the same day, a Letter from the New Brunswick Land Company, in answer to a communication, which, in consequence of your Despatch of the 18th March last, I directed to be addressed to them,—of this correspondence, I inclose copies for your information.

"You will observe that the Company decline to make any further payments until they shall be put in possession of a complete Survey of their Land—including the internal reservations. I confess that their ground of objection appears to me well entitled to consideration. Three years and a half have now passed since the Secretary of State decided that the Company were entitled to a definition of the internal reservations, as well as the exterior boundaries of their Land. During that time, the Government of New Brunswick has been repeatedly urged to expedite the matter; and on the 16th May, 1838, you reported to my predecessor that the survey had been arrested by the sudden death of the Gentleman employed on it, but that you hoped by the next Packet to present the result for Lord Glenelg's consideration. Since that date no further intelligence has been received on the subject. I trust it will be in your power to bring this long pending matter to an immediate conclusion, and to afford a satisfactory explanation of the delay which has occurred.

"GENTLEMEN—I am directed by the Marquis of Normanby to transmit to you herewith the copy of a Despatch from Sir John Harvey, accompanied by a Resolution of the Assembly of New Brunswick, praying that means may be taken to obtain payment of the remainder of the purchase money due from you, under your agreement with Her Majesty's Government, of December, 1834; I am to request that you will take immediate steps for complying with the application of the Assembly.

"MY LORD MARQUIS—We are desired by the Court of Directors of the New Brunswick and Nova Scotia Land Company, to acknowledge the receipt of Mr. Labouchere's Letter, dated the 3d instant, conveying a copy of Sir J. Harvey's Letter, with a copy enclosed of a Resolution of the House of Assembly of New Brunswick, dated in March last, praying the Lieutenant Governor to take measures to obtain payment of the balance due to the Crown for the Tract of Land purchased by this Company, upon the ground that the Grant of the Lands in question has passed the Great Seal.

"In reply to the latter observation, we are directed to state, that although a Grant has passed the Great Seal, making over to this Company a property in Land lying within certain exterior boundary lines, the Assembly has omitted a most material fact connected with the regular title to the Company's property, viz. that the Crown Survey which is to distinguish the Lands belonging to other Proprietors lying within the Company's exterior boundaries (and which is therefore absolutely re-

quired in order to define what the Company's property is,) is not yet completed.

"In expectation of the completion long ago of the Crown Survey, the New Brunswick Company has already (as the Resolution of the Assembly remarks,) paid over to Her Majesty's Government the sum of £28,125; and we are instructed by the Directors on this occasion to report the statement contained in their Letter to Lord Glenelg, dated 20th February, 1833, namely, that the New Brunswick Company would make provision for the payment of the balance due, but that the Directors would not feel justified in paying any further sums until the Crown Survey was delivered to the Company and duly examined.

"We are also instructed to state that the Company is extremely desirous that the Survey should be completed and delivered to them for examination, when they will also immediately make such arrangements for paying the balance due as the Directors trust will be satisfactory to Your Lordship.

"On the subject of the Company's arrangement for paying the balance, the Directors take this occasion to represent to Your Lordship, that although in the original Contract between the Crown and the Company, the latter was not bound to make settlements, and neither party was bound to make improvements, yet that the Company has actually expended upon improvements and settlements, a sum amounting to not less than £70,000; whilst the Crown on the other hand has not carried into effect the arrangement understood at the time for carrying out the High Road from Fredericton to the Grand Falls.

"Under these circumstances, the Directors take this occasion also to represent to Your Lordship, that in providing for paying the balance, the Company will be entitled either to an abatement, or to an engagement on the part of Her Majesty's Government to carry out the Road as originally designed.

"GENTLEMEN—I am directed by the Marquis of Normanby, to acknowledge the receipt of your Letter of the 8th instant, stating that as soon as the New Brunswick Land Company shall have received a complete survey of the land purchased by them, from Her Majesty's Government, they will be prepared to pay the remainder of the purchase money due on that account; Lord Normanby will communicate the substance of your Letter to Sir J. Harvey, (from whom on the 11th instant, he received the further Despatch herewith inclosed,) and will direct him to explain the reasons which have

delayed the completion of the Survey so long beyond the time originally expected.

"There is one part of your Letter, however, which Lord Normanby cannot pass over in silence; that, namely, in which you assume that in paying the balance of the purchase money the Company will be entitled to indulgence either by an abatement or otherwise on account of the failure of the Government to complete the Road from Fredericton to the Grand Falls, which you state was "understood" to be contemplated at the time of agreement with the Company. Lord Normanby must distinctly decline to recognize any such claim. He finds that a similar pretention having been advanced during Lord Aberdeen's tenure of Office, His Lordship after carefully examining the Records of this Department, expressed his opinion that there was no ground whatever for recognizing it, and that no such stipulation had been made between Lord Ripon and the Company at the time of the agreement. This opinion you will find in the inclosure of a Letter from Sir G. Grev, to Mr. Bainbridge, of the 9th May, 1835. Lord Normanby desires me to state that he sees no reason to doubt the correctness of the views of Lord Aberdeen. Whether the Road in question shall be immediately completed or not, is a matter on which the Legislature of the Province must decide, and on which Lord Normanby does not feel called on now to express an opinion; but His Lordship would not feel justified in pressing the matter on the Provincial Legislature on the ground that it formed a condition either expressed or implied of the original Contract between Her Majesty's Government and the New Brunswick Company.

"SIR-I have the honor to return you the enclosed Despatch from the Right Honorable the Marquis of Normanby, which you stated His Excellency had requested you to refer to me for any information I might be enabled to afford relative to the subject matter of the same.

"With r spect to the survey of the different lots of land previously granted to individuals which fell within the outline boundary of the tract granted to the Company, I think the same should have been furnished under the words of the original memorandum of the bargain, to wit, " In consideration of the sum of one thousand pounds sterling, to be paid by the Company for that purpose, on the completion of the Survey, no charge to be made to the Company for the expense of such Survey," and I presume the Commissioner of Crown Lands can explain, if there has been any delay in that respect,

why such should have been the case.

• However, be that as it may, 1 question the propriety of the Company's keeping back the payment of so large a sum of money, and thereby depriving the Province of the beneficial interest of the same, merely from the circumstance of the unfinished or unfurnished survey of those few small tracts of land, the actual expense of making which would not exceed one or two hundred pounds at the utmost: more especially when by the terms of the original agreement, the last or eighth instalment, it is particularly mentioned, shall be more or less according to the quantity of land, which, by the survey to be made, the whole tract contemplated to be granted might contain.

"And when it is further taken into consideration, that the Crown, at the particular instance of the Company, most liberally and confidentially allowed the grant of the Land to pass without requiring

any security for payment of the purchase money.

"The original minute of agreement made between Lord Stanley and Mr. Labouchere, states—cone eighth of the purchase money, amounting to £7031 5s., to be paid by the Company so soon as the Charter of Incorporation, to define the privileges and limit the liabilities of the shareholders, was passed the Great Scal, and the remainder by seven equal instalments at intervals of six months, to com-

mence from the date of the first payment made after passing the Charter.

"Thus the instalments were to commence at the date of the Company's Charter of Incorporation, that is, from the time they were made capable of acting as a body, and to be continued by instalments every six months until the whole should be paid up; and the last of those instalments was to be more or less according to the quantity of land the whole tract might contain, when ascertained by actual survey. The Company, therefore, had no right to demand a title until those instalments were either paid or secured to be paid.

"It would seem to follow that the Company cannot be justified, after the Crown has so generously and confidentially given them a grant, in withholding the one half of the whole purchase money on

the plea by them set up.

"As to the credit claimed by the Company for the expenditure of £70,000 in improvements on the land, it can have no bearing on the present question; even had that expenditure been productive of

benefit in clearing up and settling the Colony.
"In a legal point of view, I am of opinion, that if payment of the consideration money of the grant so long since received by the Company, with their entire approbation, as expressed by their Agent and legal advisers here, be longer withheld, the same can be enforced by an appeal to the Courts of Justice in the Colony.

"All which is submitted for His Excellency's consideration.

"SIR-I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt, by the hands of the Provincial Secretary, of the Marquis of Normanby's Despatch to your Excellency of the 14th June, relative to the Survey of the tract of Land purchased from the Crown by the New Brunswick and Nova Scotia Land Company, and upon which Your Excellency has called for my report in explanation of the delay in the delivery of the plan or plans of which the Directors of that Company complain.

. In order to relieve the Marquis of Normanby and Your Excellency from referring to former correspondence, as well as to inform you fully upon the whole merits of the case, I will briefly state

what has already taken place with regard to the Survey in question.

"When the purchase was originally made, it was agreed that the Survey of the exterior bounds should be made by Government, the Company agreeing to pay £1000 towards the expense. This Survey was commenced in 1833, and continued as quickly as its nature would permit, the Company being in possession of the land the whole time. The Survey being completed, the Grant issued on 5th November, 1835; a Survey of the granted lands in the interior of the Company's purchase was then demanded, and although it formed no part of the agreement, yet Lord Glenelg generously directed that it should be made. It was forthwith commenced and proceeded in, but was delayed some short time by the sudden death of the Surveyor; it was, however, subsequently resumed, and was finished more than a year ago, and the Company's Commissioner was informed on 22d August, 1838, that copies of the plans were ready to be handed to him: he called and received the plans alluded to, eighteen in number, on 3d December following. It is but justice to that Gentleman, however, to state, that both previously and subsequently to that date, he took many opportunities of conversing with me on the whole subject of the Survey; and he appeared to think that the Grant was invalid, in consequence of

the discrepancy which existed in relation to the description of the courses and distances expressed on the Grant delivered to the Company, and those contained in the plans of the more recent Surveys. This discrepancy appears to have alarmed the Company as well as the Commissioner, but it is easily explained. In the early settlement of the Province, large grants were made on the margins of the Rivers, of which Rivers the Surveys were incorrect. These grants were generally described by lines drawn upon paper, but few of which were ever defined upon the ground by actual lines, metes or bounds. These grants were also made at different periods;—when, therefore, the Survey was ordered to be made, all these matters had to be duly considered, and such variations made in the courses then to be run, as under all the circumstances of the several cases, I was induced to believe would correctly describe the abuttals of the original grants, which being done, the Company's tract could not fail to

be properly bounded.
"That this Survey is strictly correct, I do not mean to assert, as I believe it to be impossible to follow by courses and distances any set or sets of lines described upon paper, forty, fifty or sixty years ago by magnetic courses, no difinition of the variation of the magnetic needle yet having been attempted, or if attempted, certainly not accomplished. The best, however, which my humble abilities, in consultation with my superiors in those matters, could effect, has been done, and the Company must be satisfied, as nothing more is possible. I beg to state that the Grant of the tract has been prepared with great care, and the description of the several courses and distances is taken from the original Grants, by which the tract is bounded; and the Grantees therefore in bringing or defending an action against the Company, would find themselves burthened with the proof of the metes and bounds of their respective lots in the event of their rejecting the Survey which has been made by order of the Government. All these matters were fully discussed in a conference which took place by your Excellency's express commands between the Company's Commissioner and Solicitor, with the Secretary of the Province, the Attorney General and myself, and, after the abundant explanations afforded by the officers of the Crown, the others expressed themselves entirely satisfied. It is, however, to be remarked, that any Survey of a Grant of Land made subsequent to the date of the Grant is not binding upon the proprietor; and it is only valuable as so much evidence of the extent and bounds of his land, and no act which the Government can do will prevent any individual so circumstanced from trying the question at law.

"If, therefore, it is the object of the Company to withhold the payment of the sum due until they get such a title as cannot be disputed in any of its metes, I imagine it must be left to other measures to enforce payment, as I do not hesitate to say, that in a wilderness country where no bounds were set up to define the limits of the old Grants at the different periods of the several patents issuing, it is utterly impossible to give such a title, and no such title has ever been given by the Government

of this Province.

"I have just learned that it is Your Excellency's wish that all the plans of the interior Surveys should be on a uniform scale: this shall be immediately attended to, and when completed I hope the Company will be satisfied, as I really do not know what more can be demanded, or what more can be done by Her Majesty's Government. The only objection I at first had in preparing the plans on a uniform scale, was, that they could not all be exact fac similes of the original returns, which I thought was desired by the Company.

"I trust Your Excellency will excuse the length of this communication, but I considered it better to state the whole case fully than to leave any point open which might call for further information. Should any part of this report appear obscure, I shall feel much pleasure in offering any expla-

nation.

On motion of Mr. Partelow,

Ordered, That the House do to-morrow go into Committee of the whole, in consideration of the several documents communicated to the House this day, by command of His Excellency.

On motion of Mr. Weldon,

The House went into Committee of the whole, on a Bill to revive and continue an Act, to restrain the provisions of the fifth section of an Act, intituled "An Act for the support of the Civil Government in this Province," and to establish sundry regulations for the future disposal of Crown Lands and Timber in certain cases.

Mr. Barberie in the Chair of the Committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

The Chairman reported, that the Committee having the Bill referred to them under their consideration, several amendments were proposed thereto, namely, to expunge the whole Bill, and substitute the following:—

"A Bill to restrain the provisions of the fifth Section of an Act, intituled 'An Act for the support of the Civil Government in this Province,' and to establish sundry regulations for the future disposal of Crown Lands and Timber in certain cases.

"Whereas in and by the fifth Section of an Act made and passed in the eighth year of the Reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled 'An Act for the support of the Civil Government in this Province,' It is enacted, That all disposals of any of His Majesty's lands, woods, mines and royalties within this Province, made during the continuance of the said Act, shall be utterly null and void, and of none effect, unless made at public auction to the highest bidder; And whereas it is deemed advisable to restrain the operation of the said fifth Section in certain cases;

"I. Be it therefore enacted by the Lieutenant Governor, Legislative Council and Assembly, That nothing in the aforesaid in part recited Act contained, shall extend or be construed to extend to prevent His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor or Commander in Chief for the time being, by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, at any time during the continuance of this Act, from disposing by private sale, of any tract or tracts of ungranted lands to any person or persons who shall, prior to the twenty second day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and thirty seven, have been actually settled upon and shall have improved such tract or tracts without any legal authority for so doing: Provided always, that in no case shall more than one hundred acres be granted to any one person, and that no grant be made as aforesaid for less than two shillings and six pence currency per acre for immediate payment, or three shillings currency per acre by four annual instalments, and that the names of the grantees, with a statement of the quantity of land granted to each, where situate, and the terms and conditions of sale, be laid each year, with the other Casual Revenue accounts, before the General Assembly.

"II. And be it enacted, That it shall and may be lawful for His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor or Commander in Chief for the time being, by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, if they shall see fit, to grant Licences for cutting and hauling timber, logs or other lumber immediately on their being applied for.

for, and to renew the same to the former occupant or occupants, who may have worked the same during the previous year, on his or their making timely application therefor, before the previous licence expires, and to grant the same by private sale on petition, without public auction, at the following rates, videlicet:

For square red pine Timber, two shillings and six pence per ton.

For square white or sapling Red Pine, two shillings per ton.

For square Birch, Spruce and Hemlock, one shilling and six pence per ton.

For pine and spruce Logs, two shillings and six pence per thousand superficial feet.

And for all other descriptions of wood, the sum of ten pounds upon every one hun-

dred pounds of the estimated value.

"And in case two or more persons shall apply on the same day for a new berth, if the said Lieutenant Governor or Commander in Chief, by and with the advice and consent aforesaid, shall see fit to dispose of the same, that then and in such case it shall be sold by the Commissioner of Crown Lands or his Deputy, to the highest bidder, and be competed for between the applicants only, provided that no such licence be granted for a longer term than one year, and not to extend beyond the first day of May next after the issuing thereof.

"III. And whereas cases may arise where persons licenced to cut Timber, Logs or other descriptions of Lumber may exceed the quantity so licenced; Be it therefore enacted, That it shall and may be lawful for His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor or Commander in Chief for the time being, by and with the advice aforesaid, to grant relief to the person or persons so exceeding their licence upon payment of the lawful tonnage money; provided the person so exceeding the quantity licenced make such application for such excess on or before the first day of May in each year, and pay the tonnage; And provided also, That such excess shall have been cut within the limits of his licence.

"IV. And be it enacted, That from and after the passing of this Act, it shall and may be lawful for the Lieutenant Governor or Commander in Chief for the time being, by and with the advice and consent aforesaid, to make such rules and regulations relating to the disposal of Land and the licencing of Timber, Logs and all other descriptions of Lumber, and for the guidance of applicants, agreeably to the true intent and meaning of this Act, as may be deemed expedient and proper to carry the provisions of this Act into effect, which said rules and regulations shall be published in the Royal Gazette.

"V. And whereas cases may arise where industrious emigrants or natives, not having any Land, may be desirous of procuring small allotments for immediate settlement; And whereas there are in this Province sundry tracts of ungranted Crown Lands not valuable for lumbering purposes but fit for agricultural improvements, and which should be disposed of on reasonable terms to persons of the above description, Be it enacted, That from and after the passing of this Act, it shall and may be lawful for His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor or Commander in Chief, by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, to sell and grant by private sale, to any emigrant or native, being British Subjects, not having any Land, and who shall prove to the satisfaction of the said Governor and Council that he is deserving of such privilege, and has not applied for the same for any other purpose than that of immediate settlement, and cultivation, a quantity of Land of the description mentioned in the preamble of this Section, not exceeding one hundred acres to each individual, and that an account of such disposals be annually laid before the General Assembly, specifying the names of grantees, the quantity granted to each, where situate, and the terms and conditions of sale; Provided always, That no Land shall be sold and granted as aforesaid, for less than two shillings and six pence currency per acre for simmediate payment, or three shillings currency per acre by four annual instalments.

"VI. And be it enacted, That all grants, leases, and other assurances under the Great Seal of this Province, made and entered into under and by virtue of any of the provisions of the said in part recited Act, or of this Act, shall in all cases and in all Courts of Law or Equity within this Province, be deemed and taken to be evidence, that all the requisitions of the said in part recited Act, or of this Act, as the case may be, in regard to the mode and the terms of disposing of the lands, tenements, or here-ditaments in such grants, lease, or assurances contained, have been duly observed and complied with.

"VII.

"VII. And be it enacted, That an Act made and passed in the eighth year of the Reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled 'An Act to restrain the provisions of the fifth Section of an Act, intituled "An Act for the support of the Civil Government in this Province," and to establish sundry regulations for the future disposal of Crown Lands and Timber in certain cases, be and the same is hereby repealed.

"VIII. And be it enacted, That this Act shall continue and be in force until the first day of which will be in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred

and forty---."

It was then moved—"That progress be reported on the Bill, and that leave be asked to sit again."

And upon the question the Committee divided—

A Message from His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor.

The Honorable Mr. Johnston, by command of His Excellency, delivered the following Message :-

"Message to the House of Assembly, 17th September, 1839.

"J. HARVEY, Lt. Governor.

"The Lieutenant Governor lays herewith before the House of Assembly, a copy of a Letter from the Right Honorable the Secretary of State, with copies of two Orders of Her Majesty in Council, confirming Acts of the General Assembly of this Province. "J. H."

The several documents referred to in the aforegoing Message, being read at the Clerk's Table, are as follow:—

" Downing Street, 26th July, 1839.

"SIR—I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your two Despatches, dated the 25th April and 30th May last, Nos. 27 and 42, transmitting three Acts passed by the Legislature of New Brunswick, during their recent Session. The first, (No. 1200,) making perpetual the Act passed in July, 1837, (No. 1137,) for the support of the Civil Government; the second, (No. 1201,) incorposition of the Provincial Banks and the Act of March 1992. rating the Provincial Bank; and the third, (No. 1202.) amending the Act of March, 1838, (No. 1166.) relating to the appointment of a Master of the Rolls.

"I have had much pleasure in advising Her Majesty to confirm the first mentioned Act, (No. 1200,) which exhibits a gratifying proof of the confidence reposed by the Assembly in Her Majesty's

Government.

"The second Act, No. 1201, is still under consideration.
"The Act, No. 1202, which adopts the suggestions made by my predecessor in the Act No. 1166, has likewise been confirmed, together with the former Act.

"I enclose two orders passed by Her Majesty in Council on the 11th instant, disposing of the above mentioned Acts in the manner alluded to.

A Message from His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor.

The Honorable Mr. Crane, by command of His Excellency, delivered the following Message:—

"New Brunswick.

"Message to the House of Assembly, 18th September, 1839.

"J. HARVEY, Lt. Governor.

"The Lieutenant Governor lays before the House of Assembly a copy of a Despatch received from the Most Noble the Marquis of Normanby, dated 27th July, 1839,

1839, acknowledging the receipt of the Reports from the Gentlemen charged with the superintendence of the Aboriginal Inhabitants of New Brunswick.

The document communicated by the aforegoing Message, was then read at the Clerk's Table, and is as follows:—

" Downing Street, 27th July, 1839.

"SIR—I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your Despatch of the 14th May, No. 38, enclosing Reports from the Gentlemen charged with the superintendence of the Aboriginal Inhabitants of New Branswick, in answer to the inquiries contained in my predecessor's Despatch of the

"I have read the Reports and your Despatch with considerable interest. It gives me great satisfaction to know that the Legislature of New Brunswick are anxious to adopt any measures calculated to promote the welfare of these hapless people; and that with that view, they have, during the last Session, granted a Salary for the Missionary recently appointed to instruct the principal Tribe. 1 am also gratified to learn that the improved morality and temperance introduced of late years amongst

these people, has led to an increase of their numbers.

"Your local knowledge, and that of the Legislature, will enable you to judge so much more correctly than myself, of the measures most conducive to the well being of the Indians, that I do not venture to give you any instructions on the subject. But I wish to commend these people to your careful superintendence, and I would beg you to consider attentively the suggestions of the Commissioners, that the Indian Reserves, or a part of them, should be sold for their benefit. A similar measure has been adopted with advantage in other Colonies; and recommended as it is by the unanimous opinion of the Commissioners, it would, I think, be productive of benefit in New Brunswick.

"In regard to their settlement on the Land, and the introduction among them of the arts and habits of civilized life, no immediate or rapid progress can probably be expected. But it is an object which should be constantly kept in view, as the only means of permanently improving their condition, and rescuing them from the sufferings to which a vagrant and precarious mode of life necessarily subjects them. That there is no inherent inaptitude in the Indian for the cultivation of the soil, has been proved by the settlement of some of the Lower Canada Tribes; and I do not therefore despair of the introduction of a similar system into New Brunswick. I should wish you to bring the subject under the consideration of your Executive Council, and to consult also any other persons whose knowledge of the Indian character may entitle their opinions to weight, and if the result should convince you that any measure could be successfully adopted, you would have the goodness to report it to me, in order that I might consider whether it should be recommended to the Provincial Legislature. "I have, &c.

At F. in Section VIII. expunge the words "the inhabitants of the said City," and insert the words "upon that part of the said City which lies on the Eastern side of the Harbour."

At G. in Section X. insert the words " and the lots of ground adjoining thereto."

The Bill to authorize the widening and enlarging of certain Streets in the City of Saint John, and of laying out other Streets therein.

The amendments being read, are as follow:-

At A. in the Preamble, expunge the remainder of the Preamble, and insert as follows: "To widen and enlarge the following Streets in the said Districts, that is to say, Dock Street and Nelson Street, and also to open and lay out a new Street in the said District, in continuation of Smyth Street, southwardly, until it meets the North Market Wharf."

At B. in Section I. insert "and also to re-appoint and supply as it may be necessary or expedient."

At C. expunge the Sections II. and III. and insert as follows:—

"II. And be it enacted, That it shall be the duty of such Commissioners forthwith to enter on the duties of their appointment, and cause a Survey and Plan of the said District to be made and prepared, and to fix and decide upon the best mode and method of widening, extending, altering, straightening and enlarging Dock Street Street and Nelson Street aforesaid, and also of laying out and opening the said new Street, in continuation of Smyth Street, southwardly, until it meets the North Market Wharf; and for that purpose the said Commissioners shall have power and authrity to enter into and upon the lands and tenements in the said District, and to determine and decide where, and in what manner, such Streets, respectively, are to be widened, extended, altered, straightened, enlarged, opened and laid out.

"III. And be it enacted, That the said Commissioners, so soon as they shall have caused such Survey and Plan to be made, and shall have decided where and in what manner such Streets, respectively, are to be widened, extended, altered, straightened, enlarged, opened and laid out, shall proceed to make a just and equitable estimate and assessment of the value of the lands, tenements and hereditaments required for widening, extending, altering, straightening, enlarging, opening and laying out such Streets, respectively, and shall assess and apportion three fourth parts of the amount of such estimated value on all the parties interested in any lands, tenements and hereditaments within the said district, including the parties interested in such lands, tenements, and hereditaments required for the purposes of such Streets, respectively, according to their best discretion, in proportion to the benefit accruing to such parties respectively from the improvement of the said Streets, and shall thereupon file the said Plan with the common Clerk of the said City, as and for a Record of their doings in that respect, and shall forthwith report their proceedings and all matters and things connected with their duties as such Commissioners to the Common Council of the said City; And in the said report, the Commissioners who shall make the same, shall set forth thenames of the respective owners, lessees, parties and persons entitled unto, or interested in such lands, tenements, hereditaments and premises mentioned in the said report, and each and every part and parcel thereof, as far forth as the same shall be ascertained by them, and an apt and sufficient designation or description of the respective lots or parcels of land and other tenements, hereditaments and premises that may be required for the purpose of widening, extending, altering, straightening, enlarging or laying out such Streets respectively, and also of the said respective lots or parcels of land and other tenements, hereditaments and premises within the said District so assessed by the said Commissioners' for the said benefit as aforesaid, and also the several and respective sums estimated and assessed as and for the compensation and recompense or the allowance to be made for the value of the land and other tenements, hereditaments and premises so taken for the purposes aforesaid, as also the sums assessed upon the same for the benefit and advantage of the respective owners of the fees or inheritance of such lands, tenements, hereditaments and premises, respectively, or for the compensation or damage and for the assessment for the benefit of the respective owners of the leasehold estate or other interest therein, separately; but in all and each and every case and cases where the owners and parties interested, or their respective estates and interests are unknown or not fully known to the said Commissioners, it shall be sufficient for them to estimate and assess and to set forth in their said report in general terms, the respective sums to be allowed and paid to or by the owners or proprietors generally of such lands, tenements, hereditaments and premises, and parties interested therein for the compensation and damage, and for the assessment for the benefit and advantage to such owners, proprietors and parties interested, in respect of the whole estate and interest of whomsoever may be entitled unto or interested in the said lands, tenements, hereditaments and premises respectively, by and in consequence of the widening, enlarging, extending, altering, straightening, opening and laving out such Streets respectively, without specifying the names or the estates or interests of such owners, proprietors and parties interested, or of any or either of them; And upon the coming in and filing of such report, the same shall be final and conclusive, as well upon the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of Saint John, as upon the owners, lessees, parties or persons, interested in and entitled unto the lands, tenements, hereditaments and premises mentioned in the said report; And the said Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty shall become possessed of all the said lands, tenements, hereditaments and premises in the said report mentioned, that shall or may be so required for the purpose of widening, extending, altering, straightening, enlarging, opening and laying out such Streets, the same to be appropriated, converted and used to and for such said purposes accordingly, and for none other whatsoever; And thereupon the said Mayor, Aldermen and Common alty

Commonalty, or any person or persons acting under their authority, may immediately or at any time or times thereafter, take possession of the same, or any part or parts thereof, without any suit or proceeding at law for that purpose, and may at any time thereafter take down and remove all buildings or parts of buildings, erections or improvements of any description whatsoever on the said lands, tenements, hereditaments and premises, Provided, that it shall not be lawful for the said Commissioners to allow any sum or compensation whatsoever for any building or buildings which may, after the passing of this Act, be built, placed or erected in part or in the whole, on such part or parts of the said lands, tenements, hereditaments and premises that may be required for the widening, extending, altering, straightening, enlarging and laying out such Streets respectively."

At D. in Section V. insert the words "deducting in such case any sum or sums that such parties respectively, may, in the said report and assessment of the Commissioners, be declared liable to pay, by reason of the benefit to them respectively accruing from

the improvement of such Streets."

At E. expunge the words "in any proper form of action," and insert "in an action of debt or assumpsit."

At F. in Section VI. expunge the Section and insert as follows:—

"And be it enacted, That the respective sums or assessments so to be assessed and reported by the said Commissioners, as and for the allowance to be made by the parties and persons, respectively, in the said Report mentioned, as owners and proprietors of or parties interested in lands and tenements deemed to be benefitted by the widening, extending, altering, straightening, enlarging, opening and laying out of the said respective Streets mentioned in the said Report, shall be borne, reimbursed and paid to the said Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty by the said parties and persons respectively; and the remainder of all the monies which the said Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty shall pay, disburse and expend, or become liable or bound to pay, disburse or expend, in discharge, or on account of the sums or estimates of compensation and recompense that may be reported by the Commissioners in favor of the respective persons and parties deemed to be entitled thereto; and also all expenses, disbursements and charges which may arise or be incurred in consequence of the provisions of this Act, shall and may be assessed upon that part of the said City of Saint John which lies on the Eastern side of the Harbour, excluding from this assessment the lands, tenements and hereditaments within the District hercinbefore described, which may have been already assessed in the Report of the said Commissioners; and the said Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty, in Common Council convened, are hereby authorized and required to order and direct the said residue and remainder of the said monies, and the expenses hereinbefore mentioned, together with the charges of assessing, levying and collecting the same, to be assessed, levied, collected and paid in such proportions and in the same manner as any rates for public charges are or may be assessed, levied, collected and paid under and by virtue of any Act or Acts of Assembly made or to be made for assessing, levying and collecting rates for public charges."

At G. in Section VII. expunge the words "the respective sums or assessment so to be assessed and reported by the said Commissioners, as and for the allowance to be made by the parties and persons, respectively, in the said report mentioned or referred to, and intended as owners or proprietors of, or parties interested in, lands and premises deemed to be benefitted by the widening, extending, altering, straightening, enlarging and laying out such Streets mentioned in the said report," and insert as follows: "The several and respective sums or assessments hereinbefore directed

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to be reimbursed to the said Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty."

At I. expunge the words "as the case may be." At I. expunge the words "as the case may be."

At K. insert a new Section as follows:-

"IX. And be it enacted, That if the owner or owners, parties and persons interested in the Water Lots lying to the westward of Nelson and Smyth Streets, between the south line of Union Street and the north line of Lots, leased by the Corporation, fronting on the North Market Wharf, shall be permitted by the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of Saint John to extend their Wharves and erections into the Harbour, then and in such case the said Commissioners shall be at liberty

liberty to take such extension into consideration, in their assessment for loss and damages arising from the opening and extending of Smyth Street to the North Market Wharf as aforesaid.

A Message from His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, by Beverly R. Jouett, Esquire, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, requiring the immediate attendance of the House in the Council Chamber.

The House attended, and being returned-

Mr. Speaker reported, that he had addressed His Excellency to the following effect:—

"May it please Your Excellency,

"The Assembly have, this Session, directed their close attention almost exclusively to the several objects recommended in Your Excellency's opening Speech.

"Bills have been passed, which, in their operation, cannot fail to give much greater security than heretofore to property in Saint John, thereby improving the commercial

credit of that enterprising and rapidly increasing City.

"In order to give more early effect to measures adopted by the Legislature, and afford relief to many of the sufferers by the late destructive Fire, the Assembly have passed a Bill, authorizing Your Excellency to make Loans for encouraging the erection of Brick and Stone Buildings. In this Bill, provision is made for raising the sum required, by the issue of Provincial Debentures, and therefore not interfering in the slightest degree with the annual appropriations for public improvement.

"This Bill, which bears the Title of

"A Bill, intituled 'An Act to authorize the issue of Treasury Debentures, to raise Money for the purpose of being loaned for the rebuilding a part of the District of the City of Saint John burnt in the month of August in this present year,' I now present to Your Excellency, in the name and on behalf of Her Majesty's faithful and loyal subjects, the Commons of New Brunswick, and pray that you will be pleased to give your assent to it."

That His Excellency was then pleased to give his assent to the Bill presented by the House, and also to the following, intituled—

An Act for the more effectual prevention of Fires in the City of Saint John:

An Act to authorize the widening and enlarging of certain Streets in the City of Saint John, and of laying out other Streets therein:

An Act to authorize the use of part of the Building erected for a Market House in

the City of Saint John, for other purposes than as a Market: and

An Act to revive and continue an Act to restrain the provisions of the fifth Section of an Act, intituled "An Act for the support of the Civil Government in this Province," and to establish sundry regulations for the future disposal of Crown Lands and Timber in certain cases.

And His Excellency was then further pleased to make the following Speech to both Houses:—

"Mr. President, and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council, "Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly,

"The expectations which I had entertained in calling you together have not been disappointed.

"The measures which you have presented for my approval, and which have become Law, are calculated to satisfy the wishes of the Country, and I am sanguine in the hope and the belief that this short Session will be hereafter looked back to, by the People of this Province, as most deeply connected with the best interests of its Com-

mercial Capital, and consequently with those of the Province at large.

"In now closing the Session, it only remains for me to assure you, that no delay shall take place, on the part of the Executive Government, in giving effect to the Legislative measures which have been adopted,—and I take my leave of you with the expression of my sincere desire, that the brief interval which may elapse before we again meet in Provincial Parliament, may be marked by a continuance of the tranquil and prosperous state of public affairs which now happily prevails throughout the Province."

That His Honor the President of the Legislative Council then said—

"Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council,
"Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly,

"It is His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor's will and pleasure that this General Assembly be prorogued until the third Tuesday in December next, and this General Assembly is accordingly prorogued until the third Tuesday in December next, then here to be holden."
