British Submarine E-19 Sinks German Steamer

LONDON, Oct. 10.—A Copenhagen despatch to Reuter's Telegram Company says that the German steamer Lulea, of Lubeck, has been torpedoed by the British submarine E-19, near Cleary Lightship, according to a despatch, which says that at six o'clock on Saturday evening a boat came ashore near the lighthouse, with 11 men of the Lulea's crew. They reported that the vessel had been torpedoed three hours previously, but was still floating at five o'clock. The crew of 22 men were given time to enter the boats.

One boat proceeded in the direction of a steamer coming from the west, which probably rescued the occupants.

Balkan Dilemma May Take New Turn

LONDON, Oct. 10.—Up to noon today Hadji Mischeff, the Bulgarian Minister to Britain, had taken no step towards leaving London. Mischeff takes the ground that Bulgaria had no quarrel with Britain, and any initiative as to the severance of relations must come from the latter country.

Significance is attached here to a statement from Sofia last night, that the British and French Ministers had an audience with King Ferdinand before their departure. Optimists see in these the glimmer of a possibility that the Balkan wheel may take another turn.

Invaders Suffer Heavy Losses In Capture of Belgrade

PARIS, Oct. 10.—Belgrade has fallen into the hands of the Germans, after desperate resistance. Fighting continues all along the Danube and Save fronts. The purpose of the enemy is to advance through the Moravia valley, separating Kastolac (38 miles south-east of Belgrade) from Dubravatz (on the Danube) 35 miles east of Belgrade, where his chief efforts will be concentrated.

The enemy suffered enormous losses, making unsuccessful attacks on the Lower Drina. The enemy has been thrown back on the island he occupied before opening preparations.

Serbians Confirm Capture of Belgrade

PARIS, Oct. 10.—The announcement made yesterday by the German War Office of the capture of Belgrade, is confirmed by an official communication from Nish, issued here to-day by the Serbian Legation.

The Austro-German attack on the Lower Drina, on the north-western frontier, is said to have been repulsed with enormous losses for the Teutons.

Bulgaria To Have Three Armies

LONDON, Oct. 10.—The "Times" Bucharest correspondent says he learns that eleven Bulgarian divisions will form three armies, which will be under the command of Crown Prince Boris. The First Army, under Genl. Bogatcheff, fighting against Serbia, will be directed toward Uskub, in order to cut the railway from Nish to Salonika. The Second Army, under General Torcheff, will fight against Greece, which the Third Army, under General Teodoroff, will watch Roumania's movements.
