The latter steamer, with bow crumpled and otherwise damaged, was slowly grop- ing her way into Norfolk, early to-day with about 85 survivors. The Monroe carrier 54 passengers and 73 crew. It is possible the Old Dominion liner Hamilton, which was near the scene, may have picked up some of the missing; also the revenue cutter, which hurried to the scene.	Captain Johnson of the Monroe is reported rescued. This leads to the belief that the passengers, roused in the dead of night, had no time to pre- pare to leave. The Nantucket is half the tonnage of the Monroe, and probably rammed a hole in the hull. The tragedy was over in less than an hour. The Monroe was built at Newport News in 1903.
