Contracting Canada's fre losses each year with other countries the following com-parisons are given: In Canada the average fire loss per capita is \$2.96 com-pared with the United States, \$2.26; England, 64 cents; France, 74 cents; Italy, 53 cts; Austria, 32 cents; Germany, 28 cents; Switzerland, 13 cents.

LONDON, Feb. 22—Germany has demanded occupation of Petrograda s a guarantee of its peace treaty with Russia and a thirty year agreement, accord-to a despatch from Petroz-rad dated Thursday, received

LONDON, Feby. 22—"Defence to the death" against Germany is ordered in the proclamation of the Russian commissioners, Reater's Petrograd correspond-ent telegraphs. The commis-sioners appeal to the soldiers to destroy railways and provi-sions, and compel the Bourg-eoise to dig trenches under penalty of death. The commissioners appeal to the country also intimates that the Germans plan to capture Petrograd.

To the Ratepayers of the Town of Kentville:—It is my pleasure to submit to you at this time, the usual yearly report of the Municipal affairs of the Town. In the separate statements of the standing Com-mittees, The School Board and Principal Trask, the Chief of Police, and Health Officer and in the Auditors report to the town officials you will be able to obtain much information as to the affairs of the town.

FINANCE.

Public Works. The only expenditure on Capital account was \$200 for a new furnace installed in the Town Hall last year. The cost of painting and other repairs therewith a-mounting to \$463,52 was charged to current expenses.

Public Service.

The total current receipts of the Town have in-creased \$417 from last year when they were \$28575 compared with \$23992 this year. Town Rates collect-ed have increased \$986, but water is down \$388 account-ed for in the Militia account.


