PROVINCES WILL AL CO-OPERATE.

Final Conference Between Provincial Agricultural Ministers and the Food Board.

OTTAWA, Feb. 20—A willingness and determination to co-operate with the dominion government in every possible way was the feature of the final conference between representatives of the agricultural department of the eastern provinces and the food board this morning. The chief purpose of the meeting was to hear the plans of the provincial departments of agriculture explained.

Hon. J. F. Tweeddale, minister of agriculture for New Brunswick, who was present for the first time, explained the proposed activities in that province. A. D. Charron, of the Quebec department of agriculture, said that Quebec has tentative plans for the expenditure of \$250,000 on bonuses to farmers for increased acreage and increased production of pigs.

Hon. George Murray, of Nova Scotia, stated that the province were willing to do their utmost to increase food production. All that was required was direction from headquarters. The expenditure of \$1,500,000, he thought, would be a small matter as compared with the benefits that would result.

Dr. J. W. Robertson asserted that unless more food is produced this season the war will go under and 1,000,000 people will be starved. Hon. Mr. McKinnon, of Prince Edward Island, urged the necessity of the government railways providing another train in order to facilitate the carrying of seed to the farmers.

Mr. Cumming, of Nova Scotia, suggested the establishment of a crusher plant at Nappan (N. S.) to crush limestone for fertilizer.

CANADA'S FIRE LOSS OUT

Expert Reports That Sense of Responsibility is Not Fully Developed.

That Canada's fire loss per capita is far greater than that of any other country in the world, is the most amazing statement based upon the report of J. Grove Smith, fire prevention engineer of the Canadian commission of conservation, which has just been issued.

The reports shows that in the last fifty years the direct loss from fire in Canada has been \$350,000,000, exclusive of forest fire losses. Added to this, the cost of municipal protection has been \$150,000,000.

The amount of insurance premiums paid was \$197,000,000 making a total loss of \$700,000,000. Contracting Canada's fire losses each year with other countries the following comparisons are given:

In Canada the average fire loss per capita is \$2.96 compared with the United States, \$2.26; England, 64 cents; France, 74 cents; Italy, 53 cents; Austria, 32 cents; Germany, 28 cents; Switzerland, 13 cents.

The striking contrast between Canada's fire losses and other countries is due, says the commissioner, first, to the general character of the buildings in Canada. Seventy per cent of the building in Canada are frame structures, while outside of Norway, Eweden and a portion of Russia, the buildings in Europe are of solid brick and stone. Secondly, European laws punish carelessness, and thirdly, the viewpoint and civic responsibility of the individual are entirely different in Europe.

NEW PLAN OF FOOD DISTRIBUTION IN EFFECT.

LONDON, Feb. 25—The new plan of food distribution went into effect today and every person who desired to make purchases of meat, butter or margarine was required to produce a ration card. The Food Ministry announces that no complaints have been received and that the plan is working smoothly. Persons of the poorer classes appear to be well pleased with the change, because they are no longer compelled to stand in long lines at the markets.

The success of the plan, so far as it relates to conserving available supplies of meat and bring about a more even distribution among all classes, was indicated quickly. The restaurants and hotels offered meat dishes for luncheon as usual, but few purchased them. At one of the largest restaurants in the city only four meat orders were served, and at others few, if any, were dispensed. As butter and margarine virtually disappeared long ago in the restaurants, the rationing plan is little noticed except in homes, where the distribution undoubtedly is more even.

MORE ORDERS FOR MUNITIONS IN CANADA. TORONTO, Feb. 24—"Through the Imperial Munitions Board orders have been placed in Canada for \$1,100,000,000 worth of munitions, and the sum of \$875,000,000 already has been expended in respect of these orders established in every Province of Canada outside of Prince Edward Island."

This statement was made by course of an address to a number of the Privy Council, in the Hon. N. W. Rowell, president of Detroit business men, who were the guests at a dinner given by the Toronto Association Saturday night.

He said there were between 500 and 600 munitions plants in the Dominion, employing between 250,000 and 300,000 workers, including as many as 25,000 women at one time.

Provisions of Canadian North-West Land Regulations.

THE sole head of a family, or male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency) on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.

Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take expurchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months out of three years - cultivate 50 acres an acre a house worth \$300.

The acres of cultivation is subject to selection in case of rough, shrubby or any land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

TONS OF BOMBS DROP ON ZEEBRUGGE.

LONDON, Feb. 19—British naval airplanes on Sunday night dropped several tons of explosives on the docks of Zeebrugge and Bruges, the British War Office announced today. The text of the statement reads: "On Sunday night our naval aircrafts dropped several tons of explosives on the Zeebrugge Mole and docks and on the Bruges docks. Bombs fell alongside the submarine shelter and near the lock gates and quays. "Yesterday several direct hits were obtained on hangars at the Varesenaere airfield. Three enemy aircraft were destroyed during offensive patrols. All our machines returned."

RUSSIANS APPEALED TO SAVE THEIR COUNTRY FROM DESTRUCTION.

PETROGRAD, Feb. 21—The Germans have occupied the entire northern portion of the Russian front, it was reported here today. The Russians are retreating in disorder. Russian cavalry is being rushed northward.

Demands Petrograd.

LONDON, Feb. 22—Germany has demanded occupation of Petrograd as a guarantee of its peace treaty with Russia and a thirty year agreement, according to a despatch from Petrograd dated Thursday, received here to-day.

LONDON, Feb. 22—"Defence to the death" against Germany is ordered in the proclamation of the Russian commissioners, Reuter's Petrograd correspondent telegraphs. The commissioners appeal to the soldiers to destroy railways and provisions, and compel the Bourgeoisie to dig trenches under penalty of death.

The commissioners appeal to the country also intimates that the Germans plan to capture Petrograd.

"The German Generals," it says, "desire to establish their own order in Petrograd and Kiev. The Republic is in the gravest danger. The duty of Russian workmen and peas-

MONTREAL'S 275th BIRTHDAY.

MONTREAL is proud to celebrate its 275th birthday this year. On May 18th, 1642, Paul de Chomedey, Sieur de Maisonneuve, brought his little flat-bottomed pinnace to anchor close to the site selected by Samuel de Champlain thirty-one years previously, and the great banking companies and the world-wide enterprise, the Canadian Pacific Railway. But all this springs from the landing of Maisonneuve and his associates in May, 1642.

The long bustling across the Atlantic in his cockleshell of a boat had not daunted his courage or that of his companions, nor did the almost equally perilous passage up the uncharted St. Lawrence, which occupied them ten days. He and his associates had their duty to do and they went on and did it.

It was a beautiful afternoon when they first sighted the island, with the forest-clad mountain rising steeply against the sky. The pinnace fetched up by the side of a rivulet running into the St. Lawrence. There was a stretch of meadowland along the shore, with patches of brightly colored birds darting to and fro. Beyond the meadowland lay the forest with who knew what secrets hidden in its mysterious depths. De Champlain had told them of the palmeto-plant of Hochelaga which stood opposite the present McGill University.

De Maisonneuve was the first to spring ashore, followed by Governor Montagny from Quebec, Pere Vimont, Maitre Jean Meeus, Madame de La Peltrie and her servant, Charlotte Barre, and about a dozen farmers, artisans and laborers. A guard was hurriedly set to watch the forest paths. Tents were landed and set up, and the baggage and stores were brought ashore. And then having provided for their immediate safety and comfort, an altar was raised and Divine Service was held.

The sun was sinking as Pere Vimont pronounced the last words of his solemn exhortation and the fires were twinkling in thousands about the meadow. The colonists caught them and hung them in place about the altar, where they glared for a little time and then faded one by one into the darkness. Whereupon the little company, having lighted watchfires and strengthened their weary limbs, lay quietly down to sleep on the grassy slopes of what is now Place Royale. From the heroism of those early Canadians to the heroism of those who have immortalized the names of Ypres, Concreville, Giverny and Vimy Ridge, in a long way as time goes, but it shows that the spirit of Maisonneuve and those who helped him to found the city of Montreal still survives.

The bride looked particularly charming in a tailored suit of beige cloth, with hat to match.

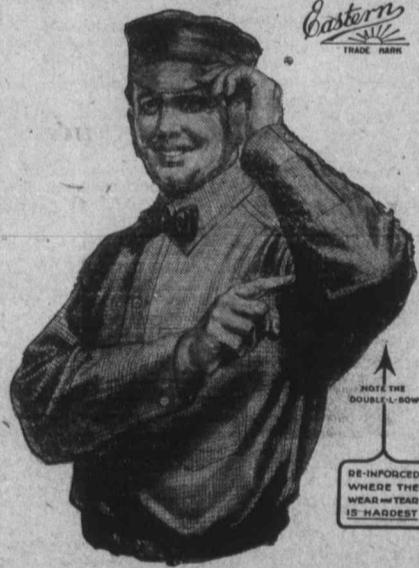
The drawing room was prettily decorated with yellow double narcissus and ferns. Rev. F. Friggins, pastor of the Methodist Church, performed the ceremony.

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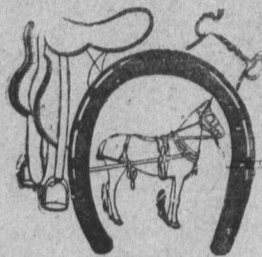

BRITISH DOWNED ENEMY AIRPLANES.

LONDON, Feb. 19.—An official statement on the British aerial operations issued tonight says:

"Air fighting was continuous on Monday, resulting in eleven hostile machines being brought down and six others driven down out of control. Two of our machines are missing.

"Our night flying squadrons after dark again attacked Treves and Thionville from a low height with good results. In a second raid on Thionville a large fire was started. One of our machines failed to return.

"On Tuesday another raid was made in broad daylight, making the third within thirty-six hours carried out against Treves. Over a ton of bombs were dropped on the objectives. Three good fires were started. One of our machines is so far unaccounted for."

MAYORS REPORT FOR 1917.

To the Ratepayers of the Town of Kentville:—It is my pleasure to submit to you at this time, the usual yearly report of the Municipal affairs of the Town.

In the separate statements of the standing Committees, The School Board and Principal Trask, the Chief of Police, and Health Officer and in the Auditors report to the town officials you will be able to obtain much information as to the affairs of the town.

FINANCE.

Public Works.

The only expenditure on Capital account was \$200 for a new furnace installed in the Town Hall last year. The cost of painting and other repairs therewith amounting to \$463.52 was charged to current expenses.

Public Service.

The total current receipts of the Town have increased \$417 from last year when they were \$28575 compared with \$23992 this year. Town Rates collected have increased \$986, but water is down \$388 accounted for in the Militia account.

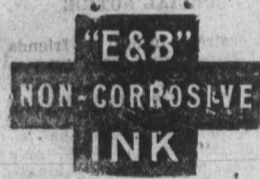
