

BONE DRY NEW BRUNSWICK

On Monday of last week the Province of New Brunswick voted by a big majority for prohibition of the importation of liquor for personal use. New Brunswick therefore ranges itself with the majority of the Provinces in voting itself as "bone dry" as it can under the laws as at pre-sent existing. Coming at a time when some people are saying that the tide of public sentiment fo prohibition was on the ebb, the result of the referendum was doubly encouraging. The people of New Brunswick have fought a good fight through the stages of local option, provincial prohibition, and now prohibition of importation. They have shown their determination to use every lawful means available against the enemy. Their reward is to be their call to greater service and still greater sacrifice. New Brunswick is safe as far as provincial powers can secure its safety. But so long as our dear Canada lags behind her neighbor in totally outlawing the traffic the disease survives. The permitted manufacture of liquor for beverage purposes is a blot on the good name of our country, making her abhorred as a plague spot. Conversely New Brunswick and the other provinces that have gained the victory must look on them-selves as points of vantage from which to attack the citadel of the liquor power

TIPS ON COOKING

Meat cut up for cooking purpose gives a richer gravy than when cooked It is a good plan to leave in one piece. one solid piece of meat to slice cold if to Great Britain. the supply is sufficient for two meals.

The cold meat should be left in the tock until it is ready to serve, so as to retain the moisture, but any vegetables that are in stock must be removed or the flavor will be too strong.

Emergency biscuits may be made by slightly increasing the amount of liquid and dropping the dough from a spoon on to a greased baking sheet or into small muffin pans.

In this way time is saved that is other wise used for rolling and cutting, and the biscuits are more tender.

One often puts too much salt in food while cooking. To remove the salt place wet cloth over the top of the vessel which the food is cooking, and the steam will draw the salt into the



CANADIAN AND AMERICAN RAIL-

Canadian railways as a whole operated in July at a lower ratio than for any of the six previous months of 1921. The figures were 93.67 per cent for July of this year, against 161.71 per cent for July 1920, and 94.53 per cent for June.

In the first eight months of this year New England railroads were operating at a deficit totalling \$8,786,122 against \$29,210,712 for the corresponding period of 1920. There were gains in both freight and passenger receipts, due entirely to the higher rates, but mail and express business suffered heavily. The operating ratio of the roads for the period 1921 was 96.79 per cent against 108.53 per cent in 1920.
