

DIDN'T ACKNOWLEDGE THE GIFT

The Donor Got Mad and the Institution Lost \$25,000 in Consequence.

BUFFALO, March 9.—The will of Johnathan Scoville, ex-mayor of this city, devised nearly three millions of dollars to public charities, churches, educational institutions and in private bequests. Amongst the church bequests is \$5,000 to the Roman Catholic Church Society of Lawrence, Canada. A \$25,000 gift to the Buffalo Fine Arts Academy was revoked a few days before Mr. Scoville's death. The history of the revocation is as follows: Mr. Scoville sent some statuary to the Fine Arts Academy, but no acknowledgment of the gift was made; then he sent for his lawyer and had his codicil framed. The illiterateness of the Academy people knocked the institution out of a clean \$25,000. Mr. Scoville is said to have said: "I don't think I can think enough of a gift I send them to acknowledge it, why they need not have any more." So he changed the will. The Academy trustees give as an excuse that the statuary came just after the regular monthly meeting and they were waiting for the next meeting to make the official acknowledgment.

BOARD OF EDUCATION.

A Proposed New School for Brooklyn.

ATTENDANCE AT THE COL. INS.

The regular meeting of the Board of Education was held on Monday evening, Feb. 24, 1891, at 8 o'clock.

Mr. Tyler reported the attendance at the Collegiate Institute for the past month to be as follows: Form I, 24 boys, 22 girls, average attendance 22 boys, 22 girls.

A communication was read from Miss H. L. Maddock, tendering her resignation as teacher in St. David's ward school.

Mr. Watt, chairman, presented the first report of the Finance Committee as follows: With reference to the request of the Board that the Finance Committee should bring in a detailed statement of the receipts and expenditures of the Board for the year 1890.

Mr. Young, principal, presented the following report: The schools were kept open every teaching day during the month, except on the 4th February, when the teachers of St. James' Ward were obliged to dismiss for a half day for lack of fire.

Mr. Watt, chairman, reported: Pursuant to a resolution carried at the last meeting of the Board, referring the matter of procuring a banner for competition for registration in the rooms of the public schools, your committee recommend that a banner be procured for the purpose stated, the cost not to exceed \$5.

A JOINT REPORT.

The joint committee of the School Management and Sites and Buildings, to whom was referred for consideration the petition of the ratepayers of the Dundas bridge, or better known as Brooklyn, praying for school accommodation for the children of that neighborhood, reported that there was growing necessity for the erection of a one-room school in that locality.

Mr. Stewart gave notice of motion that at next meeting of the Board he would move that a committee be appointed to revise and amend the rules and regulations governing the Board and report.

It was moved by Mr. Skinner, seconded by Mr. Watt, that when the Board adjourns it stand adjourned till the evening of Friday 23rd inst. for general business.—Carried.

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
