Change In The P. E. I. Service

S. S. Northumberland will perform Service Between Point du Chene and Summerside while S. S. P. E. Island is in Dry Dock

While S. S. Prince Edward Island is in dry dock being overhauled for the summer season, the through service between Prince Edward Island and the mainland will be continued via the Summerside and Point du Chene route.

On Wednesday April 23rd S. S. Northumberland will go on this route and continue for a period of about five weeks.

Steamer will leave Point du Chene at 5.00 p. m. daily except Tuesday after arrival of train leaving Moncton

New Town Council Holds First Meeting

April 18—The New Town Council met last night, Mayor D. P. Doyle in the chair.

Aldermen present: R. W. Crocker, W. L. Durick, C. E. Fish, T. J. Jeffrey, Perley Russell, and Charles Sargeant. Absent—A. J. Ritchie and A. H. MacKay. Ald. MacKay is ill.

The Mayor appointed Ald. Crocker, Sargeant and Durick a committee to nominate Standing Committee.

After recess, the report of the nominating committee was adopted, as follows:

Finance Committee—Ald. Russell, MacKay and Crocker.
Public Works—Ald. Ritchie, Durick and Sargeant.
Light and Water—Ald. Crocker, Durick and Sargeant.

Park and Fire—Ald. MacKay, Russell and Jeffrey.

Petitions, Bye-Laws and Licensing—Ald. Durick, Fish and Sargeant.

Police and Appointment to office—Ald. Fish, Jeffrey and Ritchie.

Mayor Doyle spoke thanking the Aldermen and people for the honor done him by electing him by acclamation and asking for their co-operation during the year.

The following new committees were appointed to look into the Better Housing Scheme: Ald. Durick, Russell and Fish.

Ald. Durick gave notice that at next meeting he would move that sub-section 3 B (relating to Dance Hall Licenses) be struck out of Bye-Law No. 9.

The sub-section 3 B, passed by last Council, reads as follows:—

"For a hall or any other place, public or private, where a dance is held and any admission charged, or collection taken, ten dollars for each night; every such dance to close not later than midnight, the penalty for such dance continuing after midnight to be Twenty-five dollars."

It was carried on July 15th last, by the casting vote of the late Mayor J. H. Troy, the vote being as follows:

Yes—Ald. Doyle (now Mayor), Ald. P. Russell, and Ald. H. H. Stuart.
No—Ald. Durick, John Russell, and Sargeant.

Absent—Ald. Crocker and Ritchie.
Ald. Fish, Durick and Crocker were appointed a committee to draw up a resolution of condolence to be forwarded to the relatives of the late Mayor Troy, and have the same printed in the local press.

Ald. Durick spoke on Daylight Saving, suggesting the taking of an informal plebiscite of the ratepayers on the matter.

On motion of Ald. Sargeant and Fish, the Question of Daylight Saving was referred to a special meeting of the Council to be called by the Mayor.

Ald. Jeffrey called attention of the Council to the side walks of Jane Street being used by teams. He was advised to have the names of offenders handed to the Town Marshall.

On motion of Ald. Fish and Durick the Town Marshall was authorized to post notices on Jane and Radio Streets forbidding teams driving on Sidewalks.
Adjourned.

The last two named were defeated. The result was a surprise to many, and the election passed off quietly.

Mr. Gaynor's majority is the largest given a majority candidate for many years.

Thos. H. Fitzpatrick, Chatham's veteran fire chief led the poll.

CIVIC ELECTION REMARK- ABLE FOR ITS QUIETNESS

It has been customary in the past to have the Citizen's Band render music from the Band Stand, and the candidates address the electorate, but this year this feature of the election programme was dispensed with.

Why this was done no one seems to know, as the newly elected Mayor and Aldermen were all prepared to appear before the public (to any great extent) put in an appearance.

Such apathy on the part of the citizen should not exist. If they do not take an interest in the welfare of the town it is impossible for our newly elected Council to put forth the necessary energy when no encouragement is shown them.

The position of Mayor or Alderman is a business one at any time but much more so when the electorate show so little interest. This year matters of grave importance to the town are to be dealt with, and the Council Board should be given all the support possible by our citizens, in order that they may feel assured, that the electorate appreciate their endeavors, to further advance the welfare of our town.

This is the only way in which Newcastle will ever amount to anything and the sooner the citizens become imbued with this spirit the better it will be for the community.

CIVIC ELECTION RETURNS

In the Civic Election held last Tuesday only 249 electors voted, whereas last year 353 voted. The weather was very disagreeable and roads in such a condition that many could not get to the polls. The mayorality chair was not contested, and this also tended in a large degree to lessen the enthusiasm. About one third the electorate voted.

Ald. D. P. Doyle was elected Mayor by acclamation on the previous Friday, Nomination Day.

Fraser Company Ltd. Expanding Business

205 GERMAN SUBMARINES AT BOTTOM OF SEA

G. W. V. A. Appeals For Legislation

(Special to the Standard) Fredericton, April 16.—A delegation from the New Brunswick Provincial Command G. W. V. A. waited upon the government today and asked for legislation which will permit all returned soldiers, whether discharged or still on the strength of the C. E. F. to vote at any election in the municipality, of which they are bona fide residents, upon production of the same proof as required from a soldier voting in provincial elections, until such time as they have been re-established in civilian life, and have their names placed upon the voters list in the regular way. The delegation stated that many soldiers returning to the province were finding themselves disfranchised in municipal and town elections. The Premier promised it possible to deal with the matter this session.

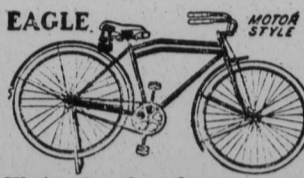

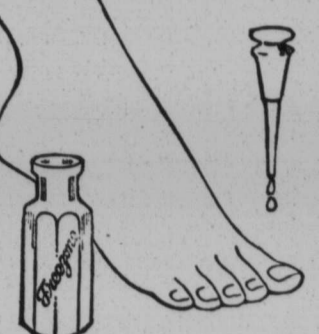

The Annual Red Triangle campaign will be held throughout Canada May 5th to 9th, 1919. The objective is \$1,100,000.

For Our Men Returning

For the soldiers and their dependents, returning from Overseas, we have provided as follows:—

1. A Red Triangle man on board every ship when it leaves Great Britain, with a full equipment of games, gramophones and records, magic lantern, literature and writing materials. Where possible, also a piano or an organ. Lectures, concerts, sing songs, instruction re Government repatriation plans, and Sunday Services.
2. Red Triangle comforts and facilities for the men on arrival at Halifax, St. John, Quebec and Montreal, including coffee stalls, with free drinks, free eatables, cigarettes, candies, etc.
3. Red Triangle men on every troop train to provide regularly free drinks, eatables and cigarettes, organize games and sing songs, and furnish information.
4. Red Triangle free canteen service, information bureau, etc., at each of the 22 Dispersal centres in Canada.
5. Red Triangle Clubs in the principal cities of Canada in the shape of large Y.M.C.A. hostels to furnish bed and board at low rates and to be a rendezvous for soldiers.
6. Seventy-five Secretaries to superintend Red Triangle service in Military Hospitals, Camps and Barracks throughout Canada.
7. Tickets entitling soldiers to full Y.M.C.A. privileges for six months at any local Y.M.C.A. furnished.

In addition to our work for the returning soldiers, we have to maintain the Red Triangle service to the full for the soldiers in Siberia, as well as the work of special secretaries in Northern Russia, Palestine and Poland.

For Canada's Manhood

The Reconstruction program of the Y. M. C. A. includes the following vitally important developments:—

1. An increased service to 300,000 teen-age boys in the Dominion—the development of Canadian Standard Efficiency training; Bible Study groups; summer camps; conferences; service for High School boys, for working boys, in the towns and cities; for boys on the farm and for boys everywhere, who have lacked opportunity for mental, moral, physical or social development.
2. Inauguration of Y.M.C.A. work in the country, and the smaller towns and villages lacking Association buildings and equipment, on a plan of county organizations. This will include the establishment of Red Triangle centres for social, recreational and educational work among boys and men, in co-operation with the churches.
3. The promotion of Y.M.C.A. work among Canada's army of workers in industrial plants, both in Y.M.C.A. buildings and in the factory buildings, organizing the social spirit among the industrial workers of our cities by meetings, entertainments, games and sports.
4. The establishment of the Red Triangle in isolated districts where lumbermen, miners and other workers hold the front trenches of industry.
5. Besides these main fields of increased activity for 1919, we have to provide for enlarged work among railway men, college students and for our campaign to encourage physical and sex education. Under all our work we place the fundamental foundation of manly Christianity.

TWO N. B. SOLDIERS IN TOWER OF LONDON

TIME FOR CHEAP

POSTAGE AGAIN

On July 1st the United States will raise its postal rates. The new postal rates will be in effect on July 1st. We suggested on Sunday that Dominion Day would be a very suitable day for Canada to take the same action.

As we said on Saturday, the return to normal postal rates would have an excellent effect in several directions. It would stimulate business and be in itself a sign, coming under every man's notice, that the war is over and that its restrictions and disabilities are in process of being removed as promptly as possible.

It should be possible for a return to be made to two-cent postage by Dominion Day. The country needs all the revenue it can get, but we fancy that the postage tax of one cent has not been, in practice, anything like the revenue producer it was expected to be.

When a war tax of one cent is imposed for mailing a two-cent letter it is an increase of fifty per cent. When a war tax of one cent is put on a one-cent postal card it is an increase of 100 per cent. This is high taxation, and when taxation goes beyond a certain point it becomes prohibitive. War postage has abolished a great deal of mail matter, tens of thousands of circulars that used to go through the mails are not so distributed now, and the use of postal cards has almost completely ceased. The tax of 100 per cent and of 50 per cent, has had its effect, and business has adapted itself to economies in postal accounts.

There is another consideration that will have weight with the Canadian postal experts. If American war postage continues to be imposed there will be a slump of postal business away from Canada—that is to say, tons of letters and circulars that

ought to be printed here and posted with Canadian stamps would be printed and posted with American stamps across the border and sent here for distribution, entailing loss in several forms. Altogether it would seem to be advisable to terminate war postage by Dominion Day, and let cheap postage work its miracles.

OBITUARY

MR THOS M STEWART

The death of Thos. M. Stewart, a well-known and respected tailor of this town, occurred at the Miramichi Hospital last Tuesday.

The deceased had been in poor health for some time and had been confined to the hospital about one month ago.

He conducted a tailoring establishment and was a member of several musical organizations of the town.

The deceased was a native of Gilmerton, Scotland, a small village outside of Edinburgh, and was born in 1831.

When a young boy his parents removed to Edinburgh, and shortly afterwards, deceased went to England where he obtained employment in Newcastle. Later he joined the British Army and served at Corfu, Gibraltar and Malta. He arrived in Fredericton in 1866 and served with the Militia there for over six years. While in the army he devoted much of his time to band work and became very proficient in the art of music.

During the years 1872-1875, he worked at the tailoring business in Fredericton and was also leader of the Fredericton Band.

In 1875, he came to Chatham and was employed by Mr. Morris for upwards of a year. He then came to Newcastle and went into business for himself.

Deceased was married twice, his first wife being a Miss Byers of Sunbury County, and his second wife Miss Jane Falconer of Newcastle.

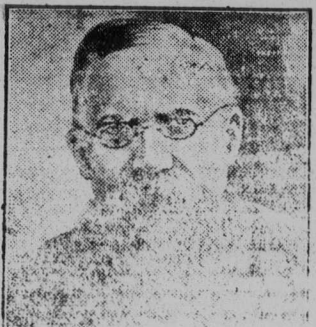
The funeral was held last Thursday afternoon. Interment in St. James' Cemetery.

Social Service Meeting

Newcastle Social Service Council met in the Police Magistrate's room Monday evening the 19th inst.

Rev. F. M. Bartram presided.

Others present were Rev. E. A. Kinley, Rev. L. H. MacLean, Messrs. F. E. Locke, J. Robinson Allison, H. D. Atkinson, T. A. Clarke, John H. Ashford and H. H. Stuart; Mrs. A. T. Pettie, Mrs. John McCortack, Mrs. T. A. Clarke, Mrs. J. A. Follansbee, and Miss Bella Falconer.

Minutes of meetings of December 11th and January 23rd last were read and approved.

The latter meeting had been held to meet Rev. L. H. MacLean, the secretary for N. B., and P. E. I. Those present had been Revs. L. H. MacLean, F. T. Bartram, and T. A. Kinley, Messrs. Locke, Ashford and Clarke, Mrs. Clarke, Mrs. C. C. Hubbard, and Miss Falconer.

Mr. Locke explained that the present meeting had resulted from a recent meeting of some of the citizens with Rev. L. H. Buckley, organizer of Y. M. C. A. work for boys, at which meeting conditions in the local schools had been discussed and a decision reached to have the matter brought to the attention of the Trustees.

Mrs. Sollansbee asked what were the special conditions complained of.

Mr. Locke said that one was the absence of any organized play on the school grounds, which absence tended to make pupils rough.

Rev. Mr. Bartram said he understood there was a boy of twelve years of age in jail here, along with other prisoners. He should not be allowed in such company.

Rev. Mr. Kinley said that there was no fence between the jail and the school yard. The pupils can fraternize with the prisoners when not in school. It was a great oversight to have jail and school adjoining. The language of the prisoners was not always of the best.

Several said that the jail and school had adjoined as long as they could remember.

Mrs. Clarke said that boys should not be sent to jail, but somewhere they can get something. The prisoners here are so near the school that they can annoy the teachers by making the sun dance in the school

Royal Bank Makes Important Changes

(Canadian Press)

Montreal, April 16—The Royal Bank of Canada with head offices here has just concluded a close reciprocal working arrangement with the London County, Westminster, and Parr's Bank Limited of London, England. Under which the latter bank has offered to buy for investment 10,000 shares of the Royal Bank of Canada stock at \$200 per share.

The shareholders of the Royal Bank are being invited by circular from the bank's directors to facilitate the sale of the shares by renouncing their shares for the purpose.

That this close working arrangement will place the Royal Bank of Canada in a most favorable position with regard to European business.

The London County, Westminster and Parr's Bank Limited is one of the oldest, strongest and most important of the British banks. It has over seven hundred branches in England and also branches in Spain and Portugal and control an allied bank in France—the London County and Westminster Bank, Paris Limited—with numerous branches and also the Cister Bank, Ireland and of course shares it owns.

The capital and surplus of this bank are respectively £5,330,399 and £7,439,099 and its deposits amount to approximately £270,000,000 sterling. On the completion of payments on June first next of a recent issue of new stock, the capital and reserve combined will exceed £17,000,000.

In regard to the price of \$200 per share offered by the London bank, it is pointed out that the issue of shares authorized at the last annual meeting of stockholders of the Royal Bank of Canada was allotted to shareholders at the price of \$150 per share.

The substantial interest which this powerful British bank will hold in the Royal Bank will, it is claimed be a source of great strength to both banks and will enable them to render the maximum assistance in extending and developing the trade of Canada and the empire.

Mrs. Follansbee doubted the beneficial influence of reform schools.

Rev. Mr. MacLean said that provincial Reform Schools did not appear to have any good effect. A Nova Scotian officer had told him of two boys that had been sent away—the Catholic boy, sent to a Roman Catholic institution in Nantes, had come back improved—the Protestant boy, sent to the Provincial Institution had not been helped any. He thought that no discipline that did not include religious teachings would reform. A fence should be erected between the school yard and the jail.

Mr. Ashford said there were enough cells on side of jail for the school to accommodate the average number of prisoners. There were only two cells upstairs, both on side next school.

Rev. Mr. MacLean thought the jailer should be asked not to use the upper cells any more than necessary. The County Council should erect a fence around all sides of the jail.

It was moved by Rev. L. H. MacLean, seconded by Rev. E. A. Kinley and carried.

"That the County Council, through the proper authority, be asked to fence the jail property so as to protect the children of Harkins Academy from contact with the prisoners."

On motion of H. H. Stuart and T. A. Clarke, Rev. L. H. MacLean and F. E. Locke were appointed a Committee to bring this matter before the County Warden.

Mr. Ashford said that the boy in jail had been there several months. He was to have been sent to the Reform School and was sent to jail temporarily until arrangements could be made to send him elsewhere. The case was in the hands of the magistrate. The boy had till very recently been in the same cell as older prisoners, but had been removed to a room by himself.

Mrs. Clarke asked if any of the clergyman visited the jail.

Those present replied that it did not appear that any of the prisoners there since they had come to town belonged to their denominations. If any of their co-religionists should be there they would attend to them.

The following was adopted, on motion of Rev. L. H. MacLean and Mr. H. R. Atkinson: That the attention of the Police Magistrate be drawn to



Rev. L. H. MacLean argued that better remuneration was due the Teachers. Teaching must be made a profession, not a mere stepping stone to something else.

Canadian Soldiers To Return

London, April 16—In the House of Commons Mr. Archibald Hurd asked: Will the Secretary for War arrange that Canadian troops now awaiting repatriation be sent home upon British warships, in view of the scarcity of merchantmen? Mr. Wilson replied that the Admiralty had agreed to place a certain number of warships at the disposal of the authorities for the repatriation of troops. The difficult question of manning was being discussed between the Admiralty and the ministry of shipping. Anyhow, no difficulty was now being experienced in providing sufficient tonnage for the repatriation of Canadian authorities.

Steamers Crash In English Channel

London, April 16—(Reuters)—During bad weather in the Channel, a serious collision occurred, off Deal, between the Dutch steamer Delta, bound from Philadelphia to Amsterdam, and the Canadian Pacific Ocean Steamship Mottisfont. The Delta, which had a cargo of flour, sustained so much damage to her port bow that her stern tanks had to be flooded to keep the boat raised so as to prevent

the water rushing through the hole. The Delta took the assistance of Deal, but the Mottisfont, which was heavily tilted and leaking, proceeded slowly under her own steam. The Mottisfont is expected to reach London docks this afternoon.

Two Airmen Ready To Fly Across Ocean

St. John's Nfld., April 16—Favored by inclement weather which for five days prevented Harry G. Hawker, his Australian rival, from taking the air with his Sopwith biplane in competition for the \$50,000 trans-Atlantic flight prize offered by the London Daily Mail, Captain Frederick P. Raynham, British aviator, had his Martyn side machine all assembled tonight ready to "hop off" with the man from the antipodes as soon as the skies clear.

Indeed, the contest has reached a stage where it is no longer merely a race for preparedness, but one in which it seems probable the two planes will speed across the ocean, throbbles wide open, in a dash which calls not only for endurance but speed.

The race also calls for a test of two different air courses. The route plotted by Commander Mackenzie Grieve Hawke's navigator, turns south from here and later slings northeast toward the Irish coast. Major C. W. Morgan, Raynham's navigator, on the other hand, had laid a course directly for Ireland.

Both pilots, however, plan to land at Brooklands, in England, and for each the course is approximately 2,000 miles. Both planes plan to start late in the afternoon, in order to reduce the number of hours of night flying

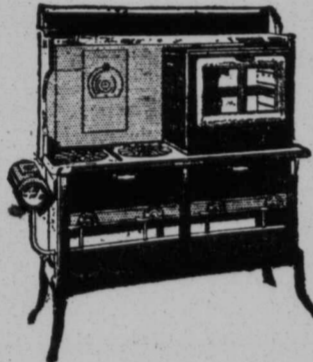

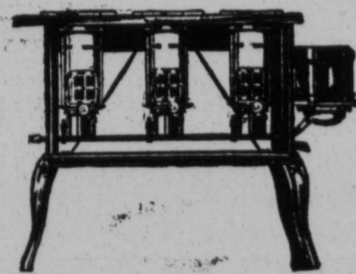

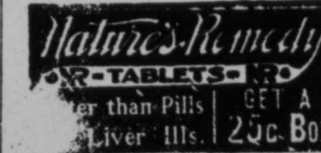

S., April 8—At the meeting of the Baptist Mission Boards of New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island today it was unanimously decided that the three Boards amalgamate and become one.
