THE FEARFUL WHEELPOOL.—The fol-
lowing incident is related by the journal-
ist of the Exploring Expedition, and shows
with what fearful suddenness men sometimes
pass unexpectedly from time to eternity.
Mr. Ogden was descending the Columbia
river in one of the company's boats, with
ten Canadian voyagers, all well experienced
in their duties. On arriving at the Dalles,
they deemed it practicable to run them in
order to save the portage. But Mr. Ogden
determined to pass the portage on foot,
believing, nevertheless, the river was in such
a state that it was quite safe for the boat
to pass down. He was accordingly landed,
and ascended the rocks, from which he had
a full view of the water beneath, and of
the boat in the passage. At first she seemed
to skim over the waters like the flight of
a bird; but she soon perceived her stop
and the struggle of the oarsmen together
with the anxious shout of the boatmen, soon
told him that they had encountered the
whirl. Strongly they piled their oars,
and deep anxiety, if not fear, was expressed
in their movements. They began to move
not forward but with the whirl,—and they
swept with increasing velocity still strug-
gling to avoid the now evident fate that
awaited them. A few more turns, each
more rapid than the last, the boat with
her crew disappeared. So short had been
the struggle, that it was with difficulty that
Mr. Ogden could realize that all had perished.
Only one body out of the boat was seen
floating at the bottom of the Dalles,
torn and mangled by the strait had gone
through.—N. Y. Advertiser.

A GERMAN AMAZON.—The regent is hold-
ing a great review, and I suppose the last
one of troops stationed here on the fields
adjoining the new splendid railway bridge
over the river M. y. In spite of the early
hour, a great many of the Frankfurt dandies
are going to ride and drive thither, in or-
der to see, not the venerable archduke but a
youthful Figlia del Reggimento, who ac-
companies the regiment of Macklenburg
dragoons now in service at Frankfurt. It
appears that this interesting creature is
the orphan of an officer, and was left by
him here to at least a very ancient and hon-
ored family name. From love of adven-
ture, she accompanied the expedition of
which her father had been the commander
on his way from Macklenburg to this place.
Romantic stories are told about this Frau-
lein Von T. among others, that all the
officers of the regiment are bound by their
word to be, under all circumstances, her
protectors, and the defenders of her hon-
or and name. By special order of the reg-
iment, she is permitted to wear a most ele-
gant and tasteful uniform, and to ride with
the dragoons whenever she pleases. She
has lessons in riding, and has appeared at
parade in Frankfurt and been stared at
as the most wonderful spectacle ever seen by
our citizens.—Frankfort correspondent of
the Times.

BEM BECOME MUSSULMAN.
The Paris Debats, publishes a letter from
Constantinople, dated Oct. 5th, which
states—General Bem, as soon as he was
informed of the firm determination of the
Sultan to resist the demands of Russia, and
Austria, and to refuse the extradition, de-
clared that his country was his first religion,
and the Sultan having the same religion,
and the same friends as it, he was deter-
mined to become a subject of the Sultan, and

to serve under his colors, and that he would
embrace Islamism; that on quitting Hun-
gary his resolution was already taken, but
that if he had not made his profession of
faith sooner, it was because he did not wish
to have the appearance of yielding to force.
He added that he did not ask any one to
follow his example. Nevertheless, Gen-
Kunzel and Slon and about 20 officers,
would not separate from him, and they have
made the same declaration of firmness.
Kunzel, who was greatly irritated
against Bem, went immediately to the Hun-
garian Camp and informed the men that the
Porte resisted the demands of Russia and
Austria, and the England and France ap-
peared decided to assist the Porte, and
that he supplicated them not to imprint a
stain on the flag of Christian Hungary,
which they had always served with honor.
Some words from Kossuth having given
rise to the opinion that Bem and his com-
panions had yielded to the promises of the
Porte, a great agitation showed itself in the
Hungarian camp, and it was at one time
feared that a disturbance would take place.
Dumont has acted discreetly. He has
not become a Mussulman, but he has open-
ly acknowledged that the Porte has nothing
whosoever to do with the abjuration of
Bem and his companions, and he has even
written letters to the Grand Vizier and the
Serraskier, in which he expresses his grate-
ful Bem is now called Murad Pascha.—
All the refugees without distinction, are
treated with kindness and humanity. The
Governor of Widwan, Zia Pasha, has dis-
tributed shoes and other necessaries to them
of which they had much need. In the treat-
ment between the Porte and the Christian
powers, the articles with respect to extradi-
tion, or even with respect to the exchange
of prisoners, carefully reserve those who
have embraced Islamism. They became
subjects of the Sultan and cannot be claim-
ed under any pretext whatever. Thus
Murad Pascha and his companions are com-
pletely covered by the treaties. This reso-
lution on the part of General Bem has cre-
ated a great sensation at Constantinople.
