How Marconi Machine Recovered \$100 For Postal Clerk.

A few minutes before eight on a recent Saturday night a stranger called at Londonderry Postoffice and asked for gold for four £5 Bank of Ireland notes. He explained that he was just leaving for Canara, a tender at the quay, close to the post-office, being timed to start at eight for the liner, which was lying at the mouth of Lough Foyle. The post-office clerk courteously took the notes and handed in exchange four notes, and handed in exchange four little piles of gold which were in front of him. Without counting the money the stranger emptied it into the pouch of his emigrant's belt which he thereupon strapped round his waist and departed.

An hour later, when he came to balance up for the night, the post-office clerk discovered his cash to be £20 short. No amount of checking made any difference; the figures would not come right. Late on in the night he sought the help of a senior official. Together they worked at the problem until three on Sunday morning. It then became clear that what had happened was that the stranger had carried away £40 instead of £20. What was to be done? The c'erk did not know the name of the visitor, or even of the ship in which he was a passenger. 

"From Every **Nation Under** Heaven."

"The Congress of the Salvation Army which has assembled in London bears striking witness to the international character of its work and the success of its spiritual appeal," says the 'Inquirer.' "People in middle life can recall the days when the first Salvationists were regarded by the public with contemptuous amusement. Now their uniform is a badge of honor. Seldom indeed has wisdom been so quickly justified of her chil-

"The day has happily gone by when educated people were blind enough to place it all to the account" of crude theology and appeals to fear. It is a fire kindled by a spark of grace. It is the passion for souls, which ignores all barriers of class and race. It has asked for obedience, disciling, It has asked for obedience, discipline, where men and women have pressed forward eagerly to obey the call.

"The older Churches, more entangled in conventionality and less spontaneous in their movements, can only look on with amazement and pay a generous tribute to the conqueror in many a field where they have failed. But there is also the possibility of gaining fresh stimulus for their own work if they follow the proceedings of this Congress of the Nations with keen intelligence and prayerful sympathy."

A Wonderful Gathering.

The great meeting in the temporary iron building erected in the Strand have revealed the thoroughly cosmopolitan character of the Army's operations. The Congress is the largest and the most representative of the widespread character of the work that has yet been organized. The delegates were drawn from thirtyfive countries, and the discussions were conducted in twenty-three different languages, to the confusion of everyone but the interpreters.

Delegates to the number of 4,000 filled the "Citadel," and, in their varied and picturesque costumes, they presented one of the most impressive spectacles that has ever been organized by the Salvation Army.

The front rows were occupied by the Army bands of Sweden and Switzerland, with their brightly attired followers in peasant costumes; to the left were Italians, and French, Koreans, and Japanese, and men and women from Java; Finlanders, Russians, Laplanders, women of Holland, some from as Tar north as Volendam and Marken Island; and in the centre men and women from Australia, in khaki and pith sun helmets. To the right of the platform were Salvation Army people from India, the men in turbans, red jackets, and cotton dhoti, and the women in picturesque garments of every hue. In the centre of the arena, forming a solid phalanx of men and women in red wide-awake hats, the men in blue uniforms and the women in mousecolored dresses, were members of the Army from the United States. Other seats were reserved for Canadians. South Americans, Patagonians, Texas cowboys, Icelanders, and Germans. Greetings and Incidents.

The King and Queen sent a cordial expression of their goodwill, and, amongst other public men, Mr. Asquith wrote.

"I desire to offer the warmest congratulations both on my own behalf and that of his Majesty'sc Government to the Salvation Army on the great International Congress which opens to-day, and to send all good wishes for the continued success of its world-wide activities which have for so long excited the admiration of Christian men and women of all denominations."

Many touching incidents were witnessed in the course of the day, but the one that seemed most to move the vast audience was the appearance on the platform of six tiny girls, children of a criminal tribe in India. Their parents were Thugs, and the children had been rescued from their evil surroundings and had come to the great West to bear testimony, in their own childish way, to the wonderful work of the Salvation Army.

Growing Activities.

During the past ten years, it was nnounced, the work of the Army had increased from fifty countries and cclonies to fifty-eight, and the propaganda was now being conducted in thirty-five different languages. Centres of work had increased to 9,560: the number of social institutions, shelters, hospitals, etc., to 1,168; the day schools to 591; officers and cadets to 16,438; men and women wholly employed in the Army's work, but not holding the rank of officers, to 5,714; cadets to 11,531; bandsmen to 25,000 and local offcers from 44,100 to 55,-520. The number of periodicals published by the Army had increased from sixty-four to eighty, and the total copies per issue was from 1,032,000 to 1,227,500.
