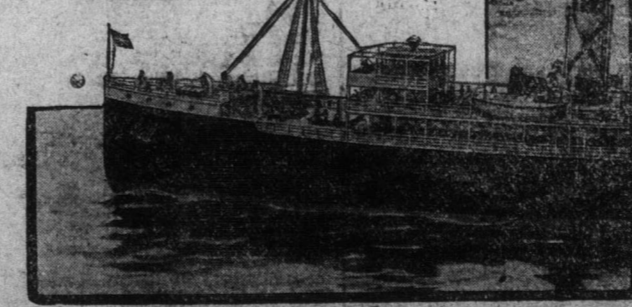

GERMANS AND AUSTRIANS OR-
 DERED TO LEAVE ITALY.

ROME, To-day.
 The German and Austrian Ambassadors have ordered the subjects of their countries to leave Italy at once. It is reported that so many German military spies have entered Italy that the General Staff has been obliged to change its mobilization plans, because there is reason to believe that some of the secrets connected with them have been revealed. Parts of the Italian police force have been detailed to keep under surveillance Germans who recently entered Italy, under what are considered suspicious circumstances.

BRITISH STEAMER TORPEDED.

LONDON, To-day.
 The British steamer Cairnorr (2,293 tons), was reported torpeded this afternoon off Beachy Head in the English Channel and sank, according to a Central News despatch from Eastbourne. The crew escaped. When the steamer was struck, rescue boats put out to her and attempted to tow her into port. The Cairnorr was bound from Newcastle for Genoa with coal.

PRaise FOR FRENCH SQUADRON.

LONDON, To-day.
 The Admiralty last night made the following announcement: Unfavorable weather interrupted the operations in the Dardanelles, and as sea-plane reconnaissances have not been possible, the amount of damage done to the forts by the bombardment of the 18th cannot be ascertained. No greater expectations should, however, be based on this as owing to the losses caused by drifting mines, the attack was not pressed to its conclusion on that day. The power of the fleet to dominate the fortresses by the superiority of fire seems to be established. Various other dangers and difficulties will have to be encountered, but nothing has happened which justifies the belief that the cost of the undertaking will exceed what has always been expected and provided for. The British casualties in personnel are sixty-one men killed, wounded and missing. Admiral Robeck has telegraphed the Admiralty as follows: "I desire to bring to the notice of Your Lordships

the splendid behaviour of the French squadron. Their heavy loss leaves them quite undaunted. They were led into close action by Rear-Admiral Guépratte with the greatest gallantry."

AIR RAID ON PARIS.

PARIS, To-day.
 Zeppelin airships raided Paris early yesterday morning and dropped a dozen bombs but the damage done was unimportant. Seven or eight persons were injured but only one seriously. Four of the aircraft started for the capital, following the Valley of the Oise, but only two reached their goal. Missiles also were dropped at Compiègne, Ribecourt and Dreuilcourt, but without serious result. Paris remained calm while the aerial invasion was in progress, and residents of the city exhibited more curiosity than fear as to the results. Trumpets gave signal that all lights must be extinguished. As soon as the warning was received of the Zeppelin approach, searchlights were turned upon the clouds. Anti-aircraft guns opened fire and aeroplanes rose to attack the Germans, but their operations were hampered by a heavy mist.

WILD SCENES IN REICHSSTAG.

LONDON, To-day.
 Wild scenes occurred in the German Reichstag on Saturday during the second reading of the budget, according to a Berlin telegram, received by Reuter's Telegram agency, by way of Amsterdam. The tumult was aroused by a speech delivered by George Ledebour, Socialist Deputy, who protested against the military administration trying to Germanize portions of the French territory, from which arises on the part of Alsace Lorraine the desire for French rule. The statement was received with angry outbursts on the part of deputies, some members shouting, "What about the Party of Peace?" Continuing, Herr Ledebour said, I endorse everything said in praise of our brave troops and their commanders, but in political performances, military authorities are not up to date. I am horrified to learn that for every German village burned by the Russians, three Russian villages shall be burned. This is barbarism, shouted Dr. Karl Liebknecht, another Socialist Deputy, while from the right came three indignant protests, one member shouting, "We won't permit the supreme military authorities to be attacked." When order had been temporarily restored Herr Ledebour continued: "Such a measure, strikes not only at Russians but at Poles and Lithuanians, on whose co-operation we must count. This statement results in renewed disturbance and cries of "fish," deputies springing from their seats and excitedly shouting for order, the Vice-President of the House meantime having declared

that criticism of the army administration was not permissible. Encouraged by members of his own party who shouted "Speak up in the name of your party," Herr Ledebour continued: German policy must be such that these peoples will see in Germany a shield to and a safeguard of their freedom. As a Socialist and German patriot I ought to emphasize this. I have done this in the interest of my beloved Fatherland and Europe. Herr Ledebour concluded his address in face of loud opposition and cries of "Shame." The leaders of the various parties protested against the remarks made by Deputy Ledebour. Herr Groeben, of the centre party, said that if military authorities were compelled, in view of the Russian action, to take severest reprisals in the shape of measures which are permissible under international law, they should not be hindered by representatives of the people. The Minister of the Interior, Belbrueck, asserted he would not be worthy in the present situation if he replied to Herr Ledebour's statements. For, every one present to-day, declared the minister, this hour will be among his bitterest memories. Herr Ledebour's criticism is unconstitutional and insulting in form and is directed against most honored army leaders. The estimates of the Ministries of the Interior, Colonies and Navy were agreed to, and an adjournment was taken until May 18th.

COL. FARQUHAR KILLED.

OTTAWA, To-day.
 Colonel Francis Douglas Farquhar, D.S.O., Commander of Princess Patricia's Canadian Infantry, late military Secretary of the Duke of Connaught, Governor General of Canada, has been killed in action at the front.

GERMAN STEAMER STOPPED.

SAN JUAN, To-day.
 The German steamer Olenwald, which attempted to leave port without obtaining clearance papers, was stopped, as she was passing out the harbor by two shots across her bows from a maxim. She then returned and was taken in charge by the Collector of Customs.

KITCHENER AND DOCK SLACKERS.

LIVERPOOL, To-day.
 "If this appeal has no effect, I shall have to consider steps that will have to be taken to ensure what is required at Liverpool being done, was the declaration made by Kitchener in a letter, which he personally handed to James E. Estlin, Secretary of the Dockers' Union. Kitchener, who spent the week-end inspecting the Liverpool, Manchester and Birmingham battalions of his new army, expressed surprise in his letter that there is a section among Liverpool Dockers who still refuse to work overtime during the week-end and on Saturday. I feel sure that these men can hardly realize that their action in this connection at the docks is delaying the munitions of war and the food required by our men at the front and is having a very serious and dangerous effect and must be stopped, I hope this message will put things right for the future. At this time we look to every British man, who ever may be, to do all in his power to the possible time and that a number of

RELATIONS STRAINED.

LONDON, To-day.
 Relations between Italy and Austria are believed to have reached an acute stage. A despatch from Rome says the Austrian and German subjects have been advised by their Consuls to leave Italy in the shortest possible time and that a number of Germans who recently arrived in Italy are being watched because of the suspicion that they are military spies.

ITALY PREPARING.

ROME, To-day.
 The military authorities have caused the distribution to Italian soldiers of the identification cards or badges which are worn customarily during active campaign. The incident is regarded as highly significant of Italy's preparedness for any eventuality.

THREE HUNDRED PERSONS
 DROWNED.

ALGERCIERAS, To-day.
 Four sailing vessels with Spanish deck laborers on board, were lost in a furious storm. Estimated the three hundred persons on board the vessels were drowned.

REPORTED THREE SAILORS
 DROWNED.

CONSTANTINOPLE, To-day.
 Commander William F. Bricker, of the United States converted yacht Scorpion, reports that three sailors were drowned while attempting to reach their vessel in a row-boat. The Scorpion was anchored in the Bosphorus off Constantinople.

L.O.A. Grand Lodge.

The Provincial Grand Lodge of the Loal Orange Association of Newfoundland closed one of the most successful convocations in the history of the society at Carbonear on Saturday last. The meetings were marked by the large attendance and general enthusiasm of the delegates. The opening session was held on Wednesday last, at which an address of welcome from Carbonear Lodge was delivered by Worshipful Master Omond, and to which suitable replies were made by Rev. R. H. Maddock and Mr. J. E. Currie. Then followed the Grand Master's address, in which reference was made to the response made by the Association to the call of the Motherland and also to the Marine Disaster, Patriotic and other funds.

The Grand Secretary's report showed much progress both numerically and financially and the other reports presented showed the society to be in a flourishing condition. On Thursday a church parade was held, the members attending Divine Service at the Methodist Church where the Rev. F. R. Matthews, B.A., was the preacher. The service was an inspiring one and the sermon embodied the spirit of loyalty, prayer, and service. In the evening a tea and concert was held by the Ladies' Aid in honour of which event the Grand Lodge adjourned its session. During the evening addresses were given by Past Provincial Grand Master Mason and Grand Master Squires, and the entertainment was a most enjoyable one. On Friday the routine work of the Lodge was continued, and many matters of importance were discussed, notably the question of Sunday Observance, Temperance and the Permanent Disaster Fund.

On Friday night the election of officers was held, the names of whom have already appeared in the Telegram. On Saturday morning Bro. Squires, Puddister and Currie were elected as delegates to the Triennial Council meeting at Winnipeg in July next.

Roumania.

 Servia is a small country, with no resources, but it started the greatest war in the world. Roumania is also a small country, whose most notable product up to the present has been Carmen Sylvia, the poetess. But it may end the same war.

Roumania is so old that some of the larger belligerents are mere upstarts. When the Roman emperor, Trajan, in order to accommodate the Roman boundaries, he planted a colony north of the Danube River, near the Black Sea. Later, when the Roman empire went out of business, this colony continued to grow and thrive by itself. Latin is spoken in Roumania to-day, and its name has not changed in 1,800 years.

Roumania is a squarish tract of land with an ell extending northward on the west side, and is a little smaller than Illinois. It has 7,560,000 people, who are almost unanimously farmers. These farmers have, by long gradations, attained an extraordinary degree of poverty. All of Roumania's export business together, including all the grain sold outside the country, is not as large as the business which is done by one Chicago mail order house. But Roumania supports 500,000 soldiers in considerable readiness to fight. Being a European is as serious and fatiguing an operation there as it is elsewhere.

Roumania has had a long history, illuminated mostly by the departure of conquerors after there was nothing left to loot. The Tartars, Goths, Huns, Turks, Bulgarians, Magyars, Russians and Poles have all grabbed the country at one time or another, and have operated it as carelessly as a chauffeur runs a borrowed automobile. For over 1,800 years Roumania had to produce the revenues, while various neighbors tried to govern her. But in 1881 she was allowed to become a kingdom and govern herself. Two years ago Roumania suddenly waded into Bulgaria and whipped her, producing as much of a sensation thereby as a sweat shop worker would by knocking out Jack Johnson. Since then Roumania has been a real kingdom, but no insurance company would care to write a policy on it until the present general ill feeling is over.

Roumania is separated from several million fellow Roumanians in Transylvania by a boundary line, and hopes before the present war is over to shift the said boundary line to the other side of the Roumanian population.

ITALY AND THE GREAT WAR.

Signs are accumulating of a crisis between Italy and Austria. Italy is a member of the Triple Alliance and her allies are Germany and Austria. But she declined to join her allies in their war against the Entente Powers on the ground that she was under no obligation to join them in aggressive warfare as the alliance was only a defensive one. For the past seven months Italy has maintained neutrality and at the same time she has been occupied in strengthening her army and navy, particularly the former, and putting them on a war footing. She has also made it plain to all the world that she intends to get something out of the war. Her policy apparently is either to remain neutral or to attack Austria, which would of course bring her into conflict with Germany and Turkey. It would appear that she has no intention of attacking the Entente Allies. Her sea-coast is so long and her navy, while of some considerable strength, is not equal to the fleet which Britain and France have in the Mediterranean. She will not join the Entente Allies in the name of sentimentalism like the romantic knight, as the Giornale d'Italia puts it, she is willing to aid Pan-Germanism. She is prepared to remain neutral if Austria will give up Trentino to her. But Austria refuses, as this means the ceding of Trieste, the most important of the few commercial ports Austria possesses and of Pola, the most important of the few naval bases which Austria has. Italy insists, however, not only from a material advantage to be obtained from the sentimental reason that this sea-coast is a portion of Italy's "Irredenta," which was unredeeded in 1866. Prince von Buelow has been in Italy for some months endeavoring to placate Italy and to satisfy her by offering Trent, an inland part of Austria north of Verona. Von Buelow's diplomacy would seem to have failed. Last Monday the Italian Minister of Posts and Telegraphs issued orders suspending the exchange of telegraphic money orders with Austria-Hungary and also suppressed the travelling post office on trains bound for the Austrian frontier. Today's messages show that the tension has increased. Germans and Austrians are leaving Italy on the advice of their consuls. It is clear a crisis has come about, and that it is a case of Austria ceding what is almost politically impossible or facing war with Italy. In view of this state of affairs the Germans have sent Bavarian troops to defend the Tyrol. We have no doubt that the bombardment of the Dardanelles has precipitated the crisis, as Italy has her eyes on part of the Asiatic territory of Turkey.

As you are aware the above ship arrived on board the "Mongolian" Captain Goodridge at once established regular discipline and routine. His maintenance consistently with great credit to himself and Petty Officers under him to my entire satisfaction. Shortly after leaving port rough and foggy weather was encountered and as ship proceeded East weather became worse each day. On 22nd and 23rd ult., a heavy gale raged from N. 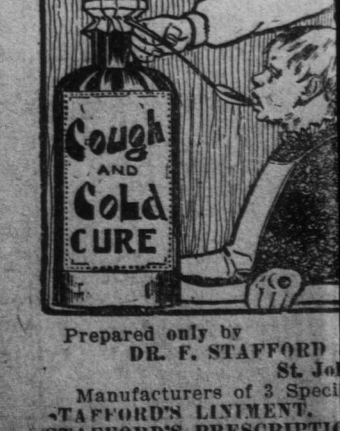
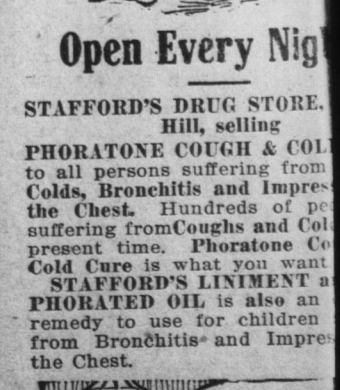

Weather Conditions.

LONDON, March 20.
Six battleships re-entered the Dardanelles Straits on Friday, according to a despatch received here from the island of Tenedos. This resumption of action after the loss on Thursday of the French battleship Bouvet and one of the British ships Irresistible and Ocean, failed to accomplish, for the reason that unfavorable weather conditions made operations impossible.

Nothing Doing.

LONDON, March 20.
Relative inaction prevails along both battle fronts in Europe which again seem to have relaxed into the condition of siege warfare which prevailed during the winter. Austrian reports, by way of Berlin, claim that the Russian offensive movement in

the Carpathians, through the Lupkow Pass has resulted in failure, but direct reports from both Vienna and Petrograd agree that Austrians as well as Russians are making attacks and counter-attacks in the Carpathians without any decisive results. Germans still are holding Osovetz, without success, according to the Russians, who claim to have destroyed the advance trenches of their antagonists. Neither side reports any action on the western front during the past week worthy to rank as important.

Only 64 Saved.

PARIS, March 20.
Only 64 members of the crew of the French battleship Bouvet escaped death when the warship was sunk. The regular crew of the Bouvet numbered 621 men.

Fifty-two Killed on Inflexible.

ATHENS, March 20.
Fifty-two men, including several officers, were killed on the British battleship Inflexible Thursday's battle in the Dardanelles.

Half Truths

A lie which is a lie may be met and fought outright. But a lie which is part of a truth is a harder matter to fight.



Like all proverbs "half a loaf is better than none" is almost as often untrue as it is true. Half a loaf is sometimes worse than none. For instance, half a truth is often much more dangerous to a right understanding of things than a downright lie. For a half truth is more insidious, more plausible and harder to fight than a downright lie. A Half Truth That Was a Whole Lie. When I was a newspaper woman I was once sent to investigate a strike in a mill where a kind of bagging was made. I was told to get both sides of the case, and went first to the employer. He told me a most plausible story. The operators he said received more per roll than any other workers in the state. I went to the employees and asked them if that were true. It was half true, but see what a different aspect the other half gives to the situation. They did receive more per roll than any other workers in the state, but the rolls were half again as large and they had to work with material which was so coarse that it continually broke their machines, and interrupted their work.

But what about December? As an argument that the country was really prosperous someone cited the fact that one of the big shops in this city had the largest sales this

year for any January in its history. I reported this to the man-who-thinks. "That is interesting," he said, "but January, I believe, is the month of sales; might not that mean that more people waited for the sales this year than usual? I should like to see their record for November and December before accepting that for an argument."

Now, of course, the before Christmas sales may have been as large as usual. Indeed, I hope so, for I am the last one to want to be pessimistic about the condition of the country. Pessimism breeds the need of pessimism, I think, and optimism helps bring good times. I only quote the case as an example of the way a half truth may lie.

Fighting Woman Suffrage With Half Truths.

Again, it is a favorite argument against woman suffrage that in Colorado, one of the oldest women suffrage states, there are no proper laws regulating the work of women in factories. Those who bring this argument forth forget to mention the other half of the truth, namely that there are scarcely any women working in factories in Colorado.

In the wild statements that are flying backward and forward about the war there are plenty of downright lies, I fear, and on top of them innumerable harmful half-truths. Beware of half-truths. When you hear a statement do not accept it as final and sufficient to base an opinion upon unless you know that it is not only the truth and nothing but the truth, but also the whole truth.

Horsemen's Ruse.

Algerians Concealed Under Bodies of Their Mounts.

A brilliant ruse, whereby the Algerian horsemen known as Goumiers succeeded in gaining a footing in that important position, the Great Dune, between the Ostend road and the sea, has just become known. The German position appeared most impregnable, the sappers attempting to mine their position. The French advance was slow, until the Goumiers imagined a little plan. One morning, six fine Arab horses wandered, apparently quite accidentally, between the French and German lines. The enemy were careful not to fire on them, preferring to capture the animals when they got near enough to their trenches.

On the following day, towards night-fall, 24 horses appeared on the same ground. In the half light the Germans were only able to distinguish their vague outlines, and to see that they were unmounted. They were preparing to welcome them as another useful capture, when, in response to a sharp cry, the two dozen horses, kicking up their heels, galloped back to the French trenches. Thereupon 24 grey forms rose from the ground to throw themselves into the German trenches.

Concealing themselves in Eastern fashion under the bellies of their mounts, the Goumiers had arrived almost at the edge of the hostile trenches, which they proceeded to attack with fury. The second German line did not dare to fire for fear of shooting their own men in the uncertain light, and the Germans wavered. At this moment the French infantrymen arrived to support their dusky comrades. At ten o'clock in the evening they had gained possession of the Great Dune, with but small losses.

Durango 81-2 Days from Halifax.

REPORTS ICEBERGS PLENTIFUL.

After an exceptionally long and tedious trip from Halifax, the S. S. Durango, Capt. Chambers, docked at the Furness Withy pier, Saturday afternoon.

She left the Nova Scotian port eight and a half days previously and though there were occasional strong head winds good headway was made up to Monday last. The ship was then off Cape St. Mary's where she met the first ice which was very heavy. Capt. Chambers stopped his ship and remained in that vicinity for practically four days dodging the floe. The ice was packed tightly and it was useless for the Durango to try to push through it. On Friday evening last the wind changed to S. S. W. which loosened the blockade and the ship came along.

It was heavy Arctic ice that Capt. Chambers reports he met, extending from Cape Race to Cape St. Mary's. He also passed from twelve to twenty icebergs, some of them being of large size. The ship brought a large mail and a thousand tons of cargo, besides a deck load of seals, which will be taken to Liverpool.

Laid To Rest.

The funeral of the late Mr. John Syme took place yesterday afternoon and was attended by a large concourse of citizens, including a guard of honour from the District Grand Lodge of Scotland of which deceased was an honoured member. The remains were interred at the General Protestant Cemetery, the Rev. J. S. Sutherland, of St. Andrew's Church, officiating at the graveside.

Edinburgh Castle Garrison.

NEWFOUNDLAND TROOPS—ARRIVAL OF ADVANCE PARTY.

A new chapter falls to be entered upon in the chequered history of Edinburgh Castle.

Hitherto, the garrison regiment has been one of the Scottish kilted corps, the exception being the Royal Scots, whose military duty in the Capital was justified by local associations.

Of late years efforts have been made to widen the rota of regiments available for garrison duty, and suggestions have been made for the utilization of the Scots Guards from London, and the King's Own Scottish Borderers from Berwick-on-Tweed, the latter regiment alone of the regiments of the British Army having the right to march through the streets of the Capital with bayonets fixed.

The war with Germany has, however, caused an alteration to be made as to the regiments selected for garrison duty, and from yesterday the change was inaugurated.

Since the departure of the 15th Battalion of the Royal Scots, under the command of Colonel Urmost, for brigade training, the Castle has been garrisoned by another section of the numerous battalions of the Royal Scots, and to-day their period of occupancy will come to an end.

The advance party of a Newfoundland Regiment have arrived at the Castle, and their advent to the city is of more than passing interest.

The main body of the regiment will be coming to the Castle by the end of the week, and from the preliminary indications it is manifest that the new garrison regiment will be one of which the Capital will not be ashamed.

The members of the advance party are a fine looking, well set-up, and stalwart body of men, and, with the exception of their head-dress, which is of a knitted khaki-colored material, there is nothing to tell of the difference between the British Regulars and Territorials and themselves.

The advance party took the way to the Castle from the railway station in a style which showed that their training has been in excellent hands, and during the day, from what was seen of them on the streets, it was apparent that they would soon be thoroughly at home.

Another stone to the cairn of Edinburgh Castle's historic associations thus falls to be added, and it is appropriate that the addition should fall to be made from Canada and Newfoundland.

The war has done many wonderful things, and not the least wonderful is the coming of the Canadian and Newfoundland descendants, mostly of Scotchmen to the Grey Metropolis of the North.

The above clipping is from the Glasgow Daily Record and Mail of Feb. 18. It is quite evident from the reference to the head-dress of the boys of the Second Contingent that they were mistaken for an advance party of the 1st Nfld. Regiment then on the way from Fort George. In the same issue of the paper from which the foregoing is taken is a splendid photograph of eight of our soldiers. With the picture before us we can easily recognize Sergeants Wilfred Ayre and Cyril Oke, Privates Ralph Herder, H. Dewling, Gus Summers, Cecil Chitt, W. Ryall and Max Churchill.

YOUR BOYS AND GIRLS

The first three months of the baby's life is spent in long clothes. At the end of this time he should be put in short clothes so that he may kick and develop his legs. Don't make this change in cold weather. In early life baby needs the protection of the long flannel skirt and dress. Twenty seven inches is the best length for long clothes and later, if the baby has not grown too stout, you can cut off the long dresses and make them into short ones. It is most important that the new baby's clothes should fit the body and be neither too tight or too loose, for the free movement of the chest in breathing is apt to be restricted and his digestion interfered with if the clothing is tight. A pressure on the stomach sometimes causes the baby to vomit soon after swallowing his food. On the other hand, if the clothing is too loose, it works into folds and bunches, causing much discomfort.




