"What can happen?" he asks, after a moment's pause, during which Jeanne's eyes watch his as if her life depended upon his smile or frown.


"What can come between us—to-morrow?"

Household Notes. If melted paraffin is poured over the cut surface of a piece of cheese it will keep a long time. Left-over soup can be reheated and canned. It keeps very well and is nice to have on hand. If the toes of your brown shoes are skinned, coat thinly with white shellac and polish over it. Strawberries which have been rolled in granulated sugar are often used to garnish fruit cream. To be at their best, baked potatoes should be served immediately after taking from the oven. For a small family a bushel basket lined with white oilcloth makes an excellent clothes basket. Cut old bread in half-inch cubes, fry in butter and serve with sugar and cream for breakfast. Delicious. Raw carrots and apples sliced and served on lettuce with French dressing are delicious and wholesome. In an emergency, a rubber bathing cap will make an excellent ice bag. Close the opening with a rubber band. While ironing, irons may be kept smooth by rubbing them on a cloth on which a little kitchen cleanser has been sprinkled. Very small potatoes may be peeled by boiling without peeling, and used through potato ricer. The skins adhere to the top. One often wishes to make a hole in a leather strap. To do this heat a wire hairpin in the gas and jam through strap. A little canned, shredded apple added to apple butter or peach marmalade in the making makes either more delicious. Editor Evening Telegram
Dear Sir,—Your editorial article of to-day was very interesting and informative and The Telegram was congratulated upon giving to Newfoundland readers their first knowledge of the subject of a Negro Republic in Africa, and your facts will stand the closest scrutiny. In New York I met Marcus Garvey and I have to confess that he completely captured my sympathy for the cause of the Black Man. Mr. Garvey is one of the most hypnotic of men and personality is stamped on his face. Perfectly educated, amazingly well-read, possessing an encyclopaedic as well as microscopic knowledge of things, prepossessing in appearance and manner, and bearer of an irresistible eloquence of expression, Garvey is a man from whom the world has yet to hear. He is no dreamer, no idealist—at least not merely so. He is no crank filled with crazy theories—but a sane, poised, well-balanced man of action and executive ability and it is because of this that it would be short-sightedness to dismiss him with a tolerant smile. Not equally a heavy-weight intellectual, but yet a big man, is James Wehlon Johnson, secretary of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People in America. He it was who first exposed the brutal, horrifying murders of American Marines in Haiti and he it was whose persistent exposures resulted in the present commission of inquiry into the "alleged" murders being appointed. Johnson is a clever writer—perhaps more of a writer than an organizer.

Dr. W. E. Du Bois, editor of "The Crisis," is another negro who will be heard from internationally. These three men will give us (Whites) something to ponder over, one of these days. The cause of the Black Man is in good hands.

Governor Harris and the Problem of Penology.

HIS EXCELLENCY PAYS AN OFFICIAL VISIT TO THE PENITENTIARY.

On Thursday afternoon His Excellency the Governor Sir C. Alexander Harris, K.C.M.G., accompanied by his A.D.C., Captain P. Saltmarsh, paid an official visit to H. M. Penitentiary and spent an hour and a half there.

After the parade, Sir Alexander, through the Superintendent, intimated to the prisoners his willingness to hear and consider any deserving cases—if there were such—that might be brought under his notice.

Having finished his inspection of the male department, His Excellency repaired to the female ward, where he had an opportunity of not only seeing the inmates and speaking to them, but of inspecting the work-room, laundry, clothes-room and other portions of that department.

Thence Sir Alexander passed on to the Industrial Department, where he spent nearly half an hour with the Trades-warden, who explained the use and operation of the different making and cleaning appliances, in a very practical and interesting manner.

Returning to the Prison proper, a few minutes spent in the kitchen, pantry and bath-room brought the inspection to a close.

Its first impression on me was that it had been improved and got into even better order than when I was last here. I consider that the Superintendent is entitled to much commendation for the steady standard maintained.

I found no very serious cases incarcerated; but the presence of some small boys on the male side and young girls (unfortunately incontinent) on the female side, points to the grave problem of dealing with young offenders.

able; and meanwhile I can only hope that Mr. Parsons' thought and wisdom will be devoted to making the best of present conditions.

C. ALEXANDER HARRIS, Governor.

I suggest that the visiting Justices be asked occasionally to initial this book and just show their touch with it.

Although, comparatively speaking, the percentage of juvenile inmates is not a large one, yet, as His Excellency the Governor remarks, the fact of their being here at all "points to the grave problem of dealing with young offenders."

Certainly some other place than the Penitentiary should be provided for the detention and possible reformation of wayward boys and girls, whose offences are almost entirely confined to petty larcenies and disorderly conduct.

There are forty-four prisoners here at present—thirty-eight males and six females. Some of the former work outside at Government House and the General and Fever Hospitals, keeping the roadways clear of snow-drifts for the ambulances during the winter season.

As to the treatment of offending criminals, strictly speaking, there are no "punishment cells" here. They are not necessary. Present-day criminologists maintain that separating men and putting them in dark cells tend to mental and physical injury and strongly recommend avoidance of all such methods of punishment, except in the case of incorrigibles.

Some Famous Adventuresses.

WOMEN WHO HAVE ENSLAVED MEN.

It is a type that has been known in all ages and all countries—that of the woman who lives by her wits, who, from humble beginnings, pushes her way to notoriety by means of her cleverness and beauty. The former quality is given the more emphasis in the two. Many of the famous sirens of history are said to have been not really beautiful. But, where beauty is lacking, there must be in its place that indefinable quality known as "charm"—the power to fascinate and enslave the brains and souls of men.

Nelson's "Emma."

The most celebrated adventuress of all history is, beyond a doubt, the beautiful Lady Hamilton. She owes her fame, of course, chiefly to her associations with Nelson and with Romney; but her life's story is itself intrinsically of considerable interest as what we should nowadays term a "human document."

Emma Lady Hamilton was originally Amy Lyon, the daughter of the village blacksmith at Great Neston, in Cheshire. Whatever the character of her father may have been, it is certain that Amy was not at all like the daughter of Longfellow's "Village Blacksmith." At the age of 18 or 19 she left her native village for London, and soon fell from the path of virtue. After the birth of her first child she touched the lowest depths of female degradation, and there she might have remained had she not obtained employment to appear as the Goddess of Health in an exhibition of living statuary under the auspices of a man called James Graham. Here she attracted the notice of Sir Henry

Featherstonehaugh, under whose protection she lived for a year. At the end of which time, disgusted by his discovery of her sordid and extravagant disposition, he turned her adrift.

She Becomes Lady Hamilton.

She now became the protegee of Charles Greville, second son of the Earl of Warwick, having assumed the name of Emily Hart. During the time of her association with Greville, which lasted nearly four years, she acquired a certain amount of education; and it was during that period that she sat to Romney for the numerous portraits he painted of her—"Lady Hamilton as Sybil," "Lady Hamilton as a Bacchant," "Lady Hamilton as a Sappho," "Lady Hamilton as a Spinster," being among the best known, and handing down to posterity silent but incontestable evidence of the bewitching beauty which turned Nelson's head so hopelessly.

Greville, being in financial difficulties, found Emma an expensive responsibility, and casting about for some way of ridding himself of the connection, it occurred to him to hand her over to his uncle, Sir William Hamilton, then on a visit to England from Naples, where he was British Minister. The plan was successful, though Emma, who was really fond of the heartless Greville, resisted for a time. She lived in Naples under Hamilton's protection for several years. "Sir William Hamilton," wrote Goethe at this time, "after long love and study of art, has at last discovered the most perfect of the wonders of nature and art in a beautiful young woman. She is about twenty years old. Very handsome, and of a beautiful figure. What the greatest artists have striven at is shown in perfection, in movement, in ravishing variety. Standing, kneeling, sitting, lying down, grave or sad, playful, exulting, repentant—all mental states follow rapidly one after another. With wonderful ease she puts the feeling of her veil to each expression, and with the same handkerchief makes every kind of head-dress." Sir William Hamilton had drawings made by a German artist of twelve of the "classic attitudes" thus described. In 1791 they were married, and Emma soon became intimate with the Queen of Naples, also a lady of easy morality.

In 1793 she met Nelson as her husband's guest, for a few days only, and after the Battle of the Nile she seized the opportunity to write him a preposterously emotional letter, in which she said she "could not die till she had embraced the victor of the Nile," and that "her ear-rings were Nelson's anchors." When the Vanguard arrived at Naples she threw herself literally upon Nelson's breast, and he, always susceptible both to flattery and emotion, succumbed to her wiles. The rest of the story is matter of history.

A Man's Woman.

It is interesting to note contemporary opinions upon this extraordinary woman. Hamilton himself said of her—"Her behaviour is irreproachable, but her temper unequal." Lady Malmebury said that "she behaves quite wonderfully, considering her origin and education." Sir George Elliot describes her manners as "very easy, not with the ease of good-breeding, but of a barmaid." "Her person," he says, "is nothing short of monstrous for its enormity, and is growing every day. Her face is beautiful." And a feminine critic speaks of her dress as frightful, her hair dirty, her feet hideous, her complexion coarse.

The truth of the matter seems to be that Emma was essentially a man's woman, and that those who were not under her spell could not see in what it consisted.

"La Maupin."

La Maupin was a singer at the Opera, being the daughter of what we should now call a lower-middle class family. Early in life she married a man named Maupin, whom she very soon deserted for a fencing-master. From him she acquired the remarkable proficiency in swordsmanship of which she availed herself so dramatically in her subsequent career.

During a theatrical tour in which she took male parts on the stage, the idea occurred to her of persuading the foolish daughter of a wealthy Marcellus merchant to elope with her, and thus gaining possession of her dupe's fortune. The runaway couple took refuge in a convent for a time, but, finding things were getting a little too hot to be comfortable, La Maupin contrived her companion's escape by substituting her for the baby of a dead inmate which was awaiting burial. By this time, however, the heiress was beginning to repent of her rashness, and after an attempt had been made to rescue her, in the course of which La Maupin used her skill with the sword so effectively as to kill or dangerously wound three of her attackers, she fled to her parents. La Maupin was captured and sentenced to be burned alive. Infundus, however, secured her escape, and she took up her adventurous career once more. After a series of ups and downs in Paris and Brussels—among them four duels, in which she came off the victor—she tried to take up again her work as a singer. But her wild and reckless life had made her old before her time. She retired from the stage and returned to her long-neglected husband, who allowed his injured honor to be salved by the riches she had accumulated from her various admirers. She died in a convent two years later at the age of 32.

A Famous Female Spy.

Women are often more dangerous in intrigue than men, and the annals of the Secret Service during the Great War reveal many stories of the machinations of the female spy. Notable among these was the Oriental dancer, Mata Hari, who paid the penalty of her activities before a French firing party. The daughter of a Dutch father and a Japanese woman, her father died at an early age, and her mother placed her in a Buddhist temple as a dancing-girl. There, at the age of fourteen, she met a British officer, who, after her escape from the temple, made her his wife. It was not long, however, before she left him and made her way to Paris, where she soon gained some reputation as a dancer, and a less desirable one among the fast folk of the Paris night-world. She also became connected with a German agent, who was no doubt responsible for her taking up the role of a spy on the outbreak of the war. She had more than one narrow escape, and was finally arrested with incriminating documents upon her. She went to her fate wearing her smartest toilette and waving her long white gloves to the firing-party. The description given of her is: "She was not beautiful, but she had much charm."—Glasgow Weekly Herald.

S.S. Sagona on her last trip across the Cabot Straits met with very stormy weather and was several hours late in reaching Port aux Basques.

S.S. Dario is still detained in port, until an agreement in connection with the salvage charges have been made with the owners of the Storborg.

Conditions in Fish Industry of East.

Experiment of Government Guarantees in Newfoundland—No Failures in N.S.

Halifax—Newfoundland has suffered heavily in respect to business failure owing to the demoralized condition of the fish trade and the decline in the foreign markets. The report from Newfoundland is that there were 44 failures with liabilities of \$1,722,365, compared with which were assets of \$1,063,784.

The government's guarantee that Newfoundland exporters should not be allowed to lose at any figure bought below \$8 per quintal has helped the situation there, but how long this will last or how much it will save in the long run remains to be seen.

Almost the same conditions prevail in the fish trade of Nova Scotia as in Newfoundland, but so far no failures are reported. The firms engaged in the business are strongly entrenched and accumulated resources during the good years of the war. Lunenburg is a heavy loser this year, but no part of the province is better able to stand a period of depression and even of loss than the thrifty and shrewd men who are engaged in the bank fishery and the business of outfitting there. The savings bank deposits in Lunenburg are greater per capita than anywhere else in the province and the past three years were wonderfully profitable.

The above article taken from the Financial Post of Jan. 17th, may be characterized as another blue ruin article, and will perhaps arouse the ire of our Trade Commissioner in the great metropolis of the U.S.A. It may, however, put things in a truer light to state that the cause of the great failures, which occurred, chiefly on the West Coast, was not the decline in the foreign market, but rather that the great suppliers there were hampered by the Fish Regulations, which imposed unfair restrictions. These restrictions closed the markets to the usual consumption, hence the demoralized conditions.

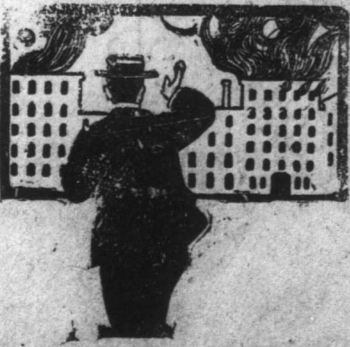

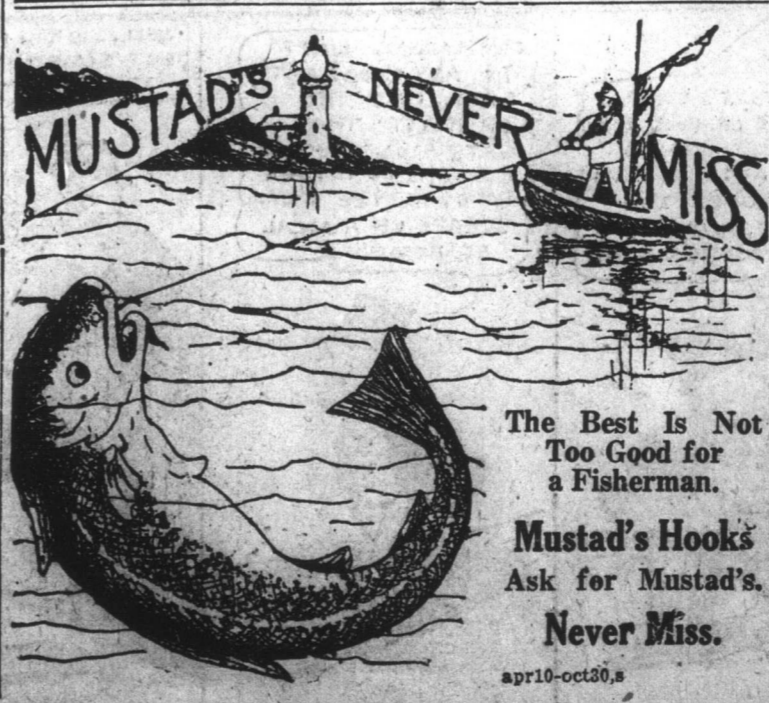
