"Murder in the second degree" is defined as "murder without premeditation," and in California is punishable by not less than ten years' imprisonment. California punishes murder in the first degree by hanging. The crime was a particularly sensational one. Mrs. Phillips was jealous because of attentions which her husband had paid to her victim, a girl of 20. She invited her on a motor drive, and in a lonely road attacked her with a hammer and killed her.







## London, New York and Paris Association of Fashion.

## England Will Surrender Her Portion of German War Payments.

All Parties in Commons Behind Government--Turkey Agrees to Enter League of Nations--Poisoned Chocolates Sent English Home Secretary.

### DISCUSSED REPARATIONS.

LONDON, Dec. 14. Premier Bonar Law in an important statement in the House of Commons to-day declared frankly for the policy of the Balfour note which advocated adjustment of inter-Allied debts by cancellation; England on her part surrendering her share of reparations to be paid by Germany. Another important phase of the speech was the dark picture drawn of England's economic and industrial future, should the much hoped for improvement in trade not materialize. England was burdened with very heavy taxation, which was closing down industrial enterprise, resulting in terrible unemployment—a problem that made necessary, first, that there should be no military occupation of German territory which would still further handicap European trade, and second, that compelled him frankly to face the fact that England was unable to pay the American debt if she received nothing from Europe. The strong points in the speech were the unfairness of the view that because England had made sacrifices to pay her way she should be expected to pay her debts, while others which had made no such sacrifices escaped, and the warning that too sudden deflation in Germany might produce there all the evils of unemployment from which other countries were already suffering.

Mr. Lloyd George also spoke, but confined himself to a brief expression of complete approval of Bonar Law's speech.

Mr. Ramsay MacDonald gave a complete elucidation of the policy of the Labor Party. He maintained that the United States held the key and was the only country able to give Britain any help. He differed from the Premier, however, in believing it inadvisable to mix together too much the questions of reparations and inter-Allied debts. He admitted Germany possessed "enormous industrial resources" which she must be carefully handled or she will follow Austria into bankruptcy. He declared reparations a curse both to those who paid and those who received.

There was great unanimity displayed in support of the Government throughout the debate, and the submission of questions drafted by agreement between Mr. MacDonald, Mr. Asquith and Mr. Lloyd George, was a complete novelty in parliamentary procedure, especially as the questions had been shown to the Premier in advance. After Mr. Bonar Law's speech Mr. Asquith and Mr. Lloyd George had a consultation and agreed that there was no occasion for them to speak as they were in accord with the Prime Minister's pronouncement. Mr. Lloyd George in fact tore up his notes and only spoke in reply to a Labor Member's criticism.

Mr. Bonar Law as usual spoke without notes. The opinion in the lobbies was that the unusual unanimity would not be without influence on the adjourned conference to be held in Paris on January 2nd. In the course of his address, the Prime Minister said there was almost no hope of a solution of the reparations question unless Great Britain and France acted together. The British Government he declared, could not look with equanimity upon any action by her Ally which would have the effect, not of reducing reparations, but making it more difficult if not impossible to obtain them. This was taken as a reference to the French proposals for the occupation of Ruhr.

### GERMANY NEAR COLLAPSE.

LONDON, Dec. 14. Mr. Bonar Law in the House of Commons to-day said Germany was very near collapse. The Premier declared this was the only information he could give the House on Reparations.

### TURKEY WILL JOIN LEAGUE.

LAUSANNE, Dec. 14. Turkey will join the League of Nations as soon as peace is signed, Ismet Pasha announced to-day. Ismet's announcement is interpreted as meaning that Turkey will accept the League's supervision over the Christian people of Turkey.

### ATTEMPT TO ASSASSINATE HOME SECRETARY.

LONDON, Dec. 14. An attempt has been made to assassinate Home Secretary Bridgeman by means of poisonous chocolates sent through the mail. The chocolates contained arsenic.

### EMPIRE PREFERENCE RESULTS.

MONTREAL, Dec. 14. Pres. Victor Bortram of the Overseas Trade Association at a general meeting last night declared that as far as the British West Indies were concerned, he had found the Canadian

Government Merchant Marine and subsidized lines were using Empire Preference to their own profit, and charging such exorbitant prices that his company could ship food five times as far for the same rates, while European firms could undersell Canada in these markets despite Empire Preference and short haul.

### LINERS IN COLLISION.

NEW YORK, Dec. 14. In a driving snow storm in Lower New York Bay, the Ward liner Mexico, for Havana, with one hundred and nineteen passengers, to-day collided with the Hamilton of the Old Dominion line coming in from Norfolk. The Mexico with her port side badly damaged went out a wireless call for assistance. The Hamilton proceeded to the pier a short time later under her own power, slightly damaged. The captain said the Mexico was in no immediate danger.

### GRAIN STEAMER ASHORE.

WELLAND, Dec. 14. The steamer Thunder Bay, grain laden for Port Colborne, is ashore off Morgan's Point, ten miles west of the Mouth Canal, driven there by a snow laden gale. She is now lying about half a mile from the shore on a rock ledge with a heavy storm breaking over her. Seventeen of the crew are still on board, while five escaped in the ship's boat this afternoon. The Thunder Bay is two hundred and sixty-five feet long.

### ONTARIO'S NEW U.F. LEADER.

TORONTO, Dec. 14. W. A. Amos, of Palmerston, Ont., was this afternoon elected President of the United Farmers of Ontario by acclamation, succeeding R. W. E. Burnaby, who retired. Amos was elected Vice-President last year.

## Loss of the Nordfeld.

UNUSUAL CURRENTS IN STRAITS OF BELLE ISLE.

(Western Star, Dec. 13.)

After fifteen miles trip by dogs and komatik from Flower's Cove to St. Barbe, Capt. Lundell of the steamer Nordfeld, and his crew numbering 91 in all, arrived at Curling by the S. S. Sagona on Thursday afternoon. The Nordfeld was lost on Flower Ledges, near Flower's Cove on the evening of November 22nd, as reported in a previous issue of the Western Star. The Nordfeld had on board 4800 tons of coal, and was bound from Sunderland to Gaspe, Que., said Capt. Lundell to a representative of the Western Star. She sighted Labrador coast just before dark on the evening of November 24, but being unable to get correct location, owing to the falling snow, the captain kept his ship outside until the following morning when he was able to see Belle Isle and get bearings. Shortly after entering the Straits, however, the weather thickened again, with increasing wind. The engines were reduced to half speed and later to slow. The wind was from the north-east and increased to a blizzard. Regular soundings were made in keeping in the middle of the Straits. According to the soundings, however, the captain thought the current had swept his ship towards the Labrador shore. So to avoid Point Amour, and some ice that had been reported by passing steamers, to lie between Greenley Island and Pt. Amour, Captain Lundell altered his course for fifteen minutes to take her as he thought, off Labrador coast. Soundings were again taken, when just at that time he sighted breakers on port bow. The helm was put hard to port and the engines to full speed ahead, to try and avoid the breakers, but the heavy seas and wind prevented the ship from coming up, the engines were then reversed, but by this time the seas were washing over the ship, the engines were stopped as she drifted broadside upon the rocks and filled with water immediately. This was four p.m. on the 22nd of November. The snow was falling so thick and fast that one could scarcely see the breadth of the ship, and the wind had reached a hurricane. The S.O.S. calls were sent out and rockets and blue lights were sent up. Life belts were also distributed to the men and the life boats made ready. At 6 p.m. Flower's Cove light was seen, and it was discovered that the ship was upon Flower's Ledges, about seven cables from the light. Instead of setting to the north the current had evidently carried the ship to the south. The fishermen later asserted that an unusual current was setting on the Newfoundland shore instead of the regular current which runs east and west through the Straits. The ship being fast upon the rocks it was decided safest to remain on board until the sea subsided. The night which followed was a terrible one with sea continuously breaking over the ship and the only shelter for the distressed mariners was in the cabin amidships. Next morning the sea and wind had dropped considerably and about noon two motor boats put off from the shore and offered to take the crew ashore. All except the captain and three other men went ashore. As the night came on and it was realized that nothing could be done to save the ship, and a change of wind from the westward would make it impossible to leave the ship, which might go to pieces with the possible loss of all hands, she being stranded at the worst place in the Straits of Belle Isle, the captain and the other men abandoned the ship and were taken ashore. All were given shelter in the homes of the people of Flower's Cove who were most hospitable and attentive to their care during the days which followed.

The Customs Officer at Flower's Cove, Mr. Caravan was appointed Commissioner of wrecks, and when the Sagona arrived a survey was held by Capt. Tavener and Pilot Gullage, and the ship pronounced unsalvageable.

Capt. Lundell spoke very highly of the treatment extended to himself and his crew by the people of Flower's Cove, and particularly did he express his appreciation for the numerous services shown by Rev. Richards, the Church of England Missionary for the Straits of Belle Isle, and Mrs. Richards, and the Customs Officer, Mr. Caravan. The Captain and Chief Engineer enjoyed the hospitality of the homes of the Missionary.

The Nordfeld was a ship of 2907 tons net and 3621 tons gross, being capable of carrying a cargo of 6000 tons dead weight. She was built at Newcastle-on-Tyne twenty years ago, and belonged to the Garrad Line, Christiansburg, Norway. Her crew was made up of six nationalities.

Captain Lundell and his crew joined Friday's No. 1 express enroute to Halifax.

### City Council




