THE PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS.

During the past year, continued confused world-wide conditions have een a deterrent to business generaly, resulting in cautious buying and inwillingness to undertake forward perations. Yet, despite relative dullness of trade and the heavy burden of taxation imposed on financial institutions, I am happy to say we have been able to earn our dividend and bonus. Low rates of interest in world money markets have naturally affected profits, but the resourses of your Bank are so large and its earning power so constant that I feel assured you may depend upon the continuance of satisfactory profits.

While hesitating to prophesy, I am satisfied that a gradual improvement the trade situation is occurring. Statistical returns support this view. and, while there is irregularity in the novement, in the main the trend is pward. In the last seven months the excess of exorts over imports amounted to \$120, of our favorable trade balance.

I regard this increase in Canada's foreign credits as an augury of a not distant mprovement in domestic business.

IMMIGRATION.

We are fortunate in Canada in having largely escaped the succession bank failures with large liabilies that have recently been so numous in the United States and other untries.

In Canada we have had but one innce of this kind in many years, en a somewhat unimportant instia neighboring province losed its doors. Much publicity has been given to this untoward happening, out of all proportion to its effect Canada's financial structure, and it is needless to add that this failure was caused by an inexperienced management and departure from recognized banking principles. It is greatly to be regretted that fairly substantial losses were suffered by depositers who undiscriminately entrusted their money to this institution.

CONDITIONS IN EUROPE.

Taking a general view of European conditions, it is evident that decided improvement has taken place during the last year. Exchanges have gained in stability and a greater degree of confidence exists, with the result that trade is expanding and moving with more freedom. The chief causes contributing to this betterment are the efforts made by various European countries to balance their budgets, and to this end substantial help has been forthcoming through external loans issued under the auspices of the League of Nations, and in some cases partially secured by international guarantees.

Continental currencies have moved in favor of England and the pound sterling has substantially appreciated compared with the United States dollar; but what is of great importance to the international trade is the disappearance of the wide and violent fluctuations which were formerly such hindrance to business.

The recent German loan—the first step in applying the Dawes plan—was a conspicuous success and has algeneral meeting called for the purready produced a good effect on international finance.

In Great Britain, the result of the elections has proved to be the chief factor in favor of a recovery in trade, and, with the prospect of a stable government for the next few years, there is a more optimistic feeling current, and already there are distinct signs of trade revival. In this connection, between it.

however, it would not be surprising if Germany were shortly to build a wall to keep out British and other goods, unless new commercial treaties are made. She has already drafted her new tariff, with some sixteen hundred articles, all of which will call for high duties. RETURN TO SPECIE PAYMENTS

BY GREAT BRITAIN. The question of a return by Great Britain to the gold basis prevokes considerable discussion, but it can-not be practical politics until the sterling-dollar exchanges reach point nearer parity, and it does not appear that artificial measures are favored to hasten the event. It seems to me that any artificial method can have only temporary effect and that return to par by natural causes is most likely to bring enduring

It is not in the least degree probable that Great Britain will take the embargo off gold exports she has secured ample supplies of the precious metal and feels confident that, once the step is taken, continue on a gold basis. Licenses to export gold are at present sary and are only granted in exceptional cases, but when conditions appear to warrant it, licenses will no doubt be issued more freely and thus a return to a free gold -market will

As in Great Britain, some discussion has recently taken place here as to the desirability of Canada reverting to a gold basis, and while such reversion carries a sentimental appeal, the time, in inion, is not yet ripe for the resump tion of specie payments. We should not go upon a gold basis without certainty of maintaining it, and assurance of this is lacking. The reserve of gold in banks and Dominion Treas ury is approximately \$160,000,000; ten years ago it was \$154,000,000, almos as much as new. Meanwhile, both Dominion and bank note circulation have greatly increased, and it is well within probability that upon the resumption of specie payments, after ten years' discontinuance, a considerable demand for gold will occur. It is true our trade balance is favorable, but, on the other hand, our obligations arising out of foreign borrowing have grown rapidly. Exact figloans exceeds even now the amount former item is fixed and irrevocable. while the latter is variable. Unquestionably. Canada should revert to a gold basis the moment the basis can be held, but it would be financial suicide to resume a position we may be unable to maintain. 

In the Halifax Chronicle of December 10th is a message from St. John's which states that shortages aggregating \$16,-000 had been disclosed in the Customs and Postal offices in various parts of Newfoundland, and the Government had ordered the arrest of persons believed to be responsible. This is, nothing more than surmise based on an investigation which has recently been conducted by auditors into the outport post offices. Yesterday we were told by the Department of Justice that up to that time no arrests had been ordered. It is true that certain facts have come to light, but only within the past few hours, that may result in a number of prosecutions.

TORONTO, Dec. 12.-The final setlement of the purchase of the Toronto Street Railway System by the city was reached here yesterday at a conference of the civic officials and the company's representatives. The city has agreed to pay interest at the rate of 5 per cent, on the full amount as and from September, 1921, which amounts to \$1,500,000. 

How Birds Reap the Nut Harvest

The recent nut harvest in England of which many of the birds with a tendency towards vegetarianism took full avantage of, writes Captain C. W. R. Knight.

Nuthatches and great tits have, of course, been busy with the hazels, while the gorgeous pheasants, ubiwood-pigeons, and crafty rooks have taken their toll of the acorns. How ready, too, are the rooks to raid the walnut trees when no one is about—even visiting the gardens of thickly populated districts to secure such a coveted morsel as a ripe walnut.

"Very cleverely the rook fluttersalmost "hovers"—before the prize (the twig on which the walnut is growing is altogether too slender to support the bird's weight) and twists it from its hold with the sharp tip of his beak. Then away he sails with it-generally to some considerable distance, where, far from the attention of his thieving companions, he may consume the tid-bit at his leis-

The beautiful greater spotted wood-pecker—a bird that has been observed recently in one of the London parks -has a distinct penchant for hazel nuts, and the manner in which the nuts are collected and split open by the bird is remarkable.

Climbing upside down along the swaying hazel branch, until the yellow cluster of nuts at its extreme tip is reached, the woodpecker seizes one of the nuts in the tip of his beak, twists it off—in much the same manner as the rook deals with the walnut —drops fluttering through the foliage below until balance is regained, and without settling, sets off for the feed-

Pressed In A Crevice.

On reaching the trunk of a certain tree the woodpecker settles and, supported by his stiff tail feathers, he climbs upwards, in a series of spasmodic jerks, until his head is on a level with a little crevice in the bark. Into this crevice the nut is firmly pressed. If it does not fit properly it is withdrawn and tried in a different position. When it is securely wedged, the woodpecker proceeds to split it open by hammering at it with his chisel-like beak, and having consumed the contents he throws away the empty shell and goes off in search of a fresh one.

There is in the county of Kent a certain small willow tree to which greater spotted woodpeckers repair annually for the purpose of splitting open hazel nuts-a little crevice in its side is admirably suited for the purpose—and at the proper time of the year the ground beneath the tree is littered with empty nut-shells. It is on record that one of these woodpeckers took from a "bird-table" one of those imitation acorns that one sees at the end of a blindcord. It is to be hoped that the woodpecker did not suffer from a headache as the result of trying to apply the sult of trying to split it open!

TO RELIEVING OFFICERS, STIPENDIARY MAGIS-TRATES, AND OTHERS:-

The expenditure of public money upon hospitals and similar charitable institutions, the care of outside patients, and transportation to and fro has grown to alarming proportions. Disregard of instructions as to the sending of patients to St. John's from the Outports has not only increased the expenditure, but has caused inconvenience to the authorities, and unnecessary suffering for the ailing. Room in the hospitals has not, at times, been available for patients arriving here, and it has been found necessary to send to boardinghouses, to await their turn for entering a hospital, many who would have been better cared for at home during the period of waiting. These and other considerations have made it advisable to state the facts, and to repeat and add to instructions.

It is the policy of the Legislature and Government to limit, as closely as possible, the expenditure of public money in the case of the sick in public hospitals, and their transportation to and fro, to provision for those patients only who are unable to pay for their own care, and whose natural protectors are unable to pay for them. The aid given is a charity for the sick and helpless, and it should only be accepted consistently with self-respect. Those who are able to pay in whole or in part for their own treatment are expected to do so. Parents are expected to pay for the care of children, and children for the care of parents, wholly or partly, where they are able to do so.

Only Relieving Officers, or Stipendiary Magistrates, acting in lieu of such Officers, have authority to send patients, at the expense of the Colony, for treatment in the public wards of hospitals.

Where a Relieving Officer resides conveniently near, he alone has authority.

Where by reason of the remoteness of a Relieving Officer, and the nature of the malady, delay until such Officer could act would seem to a Stipendiary Magistrate to be undesirable, such Magistrate may act in lieu of a Relieving Officer, but Magistrates are requested to observe as far as possible the rule that dealing with the sick at public expense is specially the province of Relieving Officers.

Clergymen and others whose attention is drawn to persons asking treatment at public expense are requested to refer such patients to Relieving Officers or Magistrates in their order (wherever such reference can be made without danger to the sick), and to refer to Mr. Bartlett only in instances in which no Relieving Officer or Magistrate is near enough to deal with the matter adequately.

It is desired that the discretion of sending forward patients shall be exercised wherever convenient by Relieving Officers and Magistrates only, in the order named, except as provided in the next following para-

Except in "Emergency cases," as herein defined, no patient may be forwarded by Relieving Officers, Magistrates or others, at public expense, unless permission has been first asked and obtained of Mr. Lewis Bartlett, Public Health Officer, St. John's. Patients suffering from serious accidents, or from appendicitis, or whose condition requires immediate surgical attention. may be forwarded without the prior consent of Mr. Bartlett, but he must be immediately notified by telegram of the coming of the patient, and of the ailment thereof. Every such instance will be strictly inquired into, and unless the condition of the patient made the forwarding thereof without prior permission reasonably necessary, the person forwarding will be considered to have acted without discretion, and be held liable to pay the cost incurred.

When application is made to forward a patient for hospital treatment, a Relieving Officer, or Stipendiary Magistrate, as the case may be, should, before complying, satisfy himself that the patient, or the person liable for the care of the patient, is not able to pay the expense of treatment, and that such expense should be a charge upon the Colony, and if it seems to such Relieving Officer or Magistzate that the financial and physical conditions of the patient call for treatment at public expense, a Doctor, where one is conveniently near, should be asked to examine and report whether hospital or other treatment is necessary or expedient. The certificate of the Relieving Officer, or Magistrate, as the case may be, that the case is one for treatment at public expense, and the report, if any, of the Doctor upon the patient's condition, should be forwarded to Mr. Bartlett, with application for permission to forward the patient. When it seems desirable to telegraph for Mr. Bartlett's permission, the telegram should indicate the effect of the Doctor's report. If a Doctor is not conveniently near, the Relieving Officer or Magistrate. or other person intervening on behalf of the patient. should state to Mr. Bartlett as fully as possible the nature of the ailment complained of.

These regulations have, of course, nothing whatever to do with transportation or treatment in hospitals of patients the charges for whom will be paid by them or their friends. But in respect of such patients, as the hospitals are frequently overcrowded, application to Mr. Bartlett to ascertain if a bed can be obtained, will be promptly replied to.

Man-Eaters of New Guinea

Mr. Merlin Moore Taylor, in his new book, "Where Cannibals Roam," says that cannibalism, observed with religious rites, still prevails in Papua, the part of New Guinea which has than forty years.

Papua is nearly twice as large as England, and is about as far from the northern tip of Australia as Edin-

burgh is from London. "Far down the trail," writes Mr. Taylor, "a litle band of warriors were speeding toward the village. As they came they shouted and waved their spears and bows and arrows aloft.

"Two of them seemed to be carrying something aloft on a pole between them. I glanced at Abaridi (a Papuan). His eyes were dilated and his mouth open in a widespread grin.

"I saw comprehension come into Humphries' (the local magistrate) eyes, and like a flash, I, too, knew what was happening. That thing trussed to a pole like a pig, and rapidly being brought to the village, was a human being, and a cannibal feast was in the making.

"The man appeared to have been

"When the women saw that the returning hunters had 'game,' they set about building a huge fire, upon which they tossed stones. While they were being heated they fell upon the body of the dead man. What happened then we could not see, but we knew." Why do the Papuans eat their enemies? One reason seems to be the usual cannibal belief that by so doing they will become abler, braver, more god-like men. They also suffer from a meat shortage. The hill tribes catch an occasional kangaroo little larger than a rat, or an emu that has strayed from the lowlands. Save pig there is no other flesh than their
