

TOWN COUNCIL. The regular meeting of the Town Council was held last (Monday) night. The Mayor in the chair. Present, Messrs. Buckland, McCurry, Holliday, Harvey, Bruce, Mitchell, Robertson, Wood, Allan, Sayers, Howard, Day, Chadwick, and Goldie.

Minutes of last meeting read and confirmed.

The Clerk reported that the municipality would have to pay the costs, amounting to \$41.17, for the care and conveyance of a lunatic, Mary McMahon, to Rockwood Asylum, and thence to Kingston, an order to this effect having been given by the Judge and proven by two magistrates. Referred to Finance Committee.

The Clerk also read a communication from the Executive Committee of the Red River Relief Fund praying for further aid, which was referred to the Benevolent Committee.

A petition was read from the Good Templars' Lodge of Guelph praying the Council not to grant saloon licenses for the sale of intoxicating liquors during the current year.

Petitions to same effect were read from some of the ministers, teachers, and ladies of the town—all of which were referred to the Finance Committee.

A petition from J. W. Conlon praying for transfer of license to the Crown Hotel, Woolwich street, and also a petition from John Hower, praying for transfer of license to the Western Hotel, Wyndham street, were received and read.

Mr. Chadwick submitted the report of the Finance Committee, which stated that Mr. Conlon had obtained a license for transfer of license to the Crown Hotel, Woolwich street, and also a petition from John Hower, praying for transfer of license to the Western Hotel, Wyndham street, were received and read.

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the Fire and Water Committee.—Carried. Mr. Buckland in the chair.

The report was then taken clause by clause, and discussed upon for some time.

Mr. McCurry wished to know what the extra charges for were, how they were ordered, and whether the balance due to Mr. Armstrong was considered as a final payment for all demands.

Mr. Robertson stated that he had been informed by Mr. Armstrong that he (Mr. A.) had been instructed by some of the members of the old committee to make alterations and extras.

Mr. Harvey said he gave no orders to change the original contract, except in the furnishing of tar for the tanks. He further stated that the present committee had brought up an old account for settlement.

Mayor.—There is nothing in the report, but what was expended during 1868.

Mr. McCurry thought that, under the circumstances, Mr. Armstrong's bill was very moderate, and should be paid. What he complained of was that the committee recommended the payment of \$300 out on account of the old committee.

Mr. Harvey persisted in his former statement that he gave no orders to alter the contract, and complained that the old committee had not been fairly dealt with. Mr. Sayers, for instance, had stated to a gentleman then present in the body of the chamber that they had gone out of office \$3,000 in debt, which was not so, for they came out with clean hands, and could show how they expended the money grants in every particular, and were not in debt.

Mr. Sayers thought that if the ex-chairman of the former committee had displayed the same amount of energy in the performance of his duties when in office as he had tonight, there would have been none of this difficulty.

OR THE LILY OF THE STRATH.
