Magistrates and Constables. On reference to our report of the Inquest on Friday evening, it will be perceived that the question of jurisdiction of a County Magistrate over a Town (and who likewise happened to be a County)Constable, was raised by a County Magistrate, Mr. Samuel heard it asserted at the time, that by statute, supreme jurisdiction is vested his peremptory bearing, he leaves behind in the Police Magistrate (where there him a great example of vicer, energy and is one) of a town, and on further investigation this morning, we find such to be the case. It follows, therefore, from the law as it at present exists, that Mr. Hodgskin had ent exists, that Mr. Hodgskin had no legal jurisdiction over the constable in question,—that is, supposing the crime in question was one committed within the precincts of the Town,—and any constable standing upon his dignity, and acting on the strict letter of the law, may refuse to act at the request of any other than the Police Magistrate. We would fair hope that we possess no Conact at the request of any other than the Police Magistrate. We would fain hope that we possess no Constables who would so shelter themselves behind a mere technicality, as to evade what is the very duty they are appointed to perform. Still, we think it unfortunate that the words of the statute are so framed that any Constable can plead a want of competent jurisdiction as a reason why he does not feel himself calledeupon to execute the order of a Magistrate acting promptly in the interests of public justice. If the Police Magistrate's authority to act must first be necessary, how often may not grave offences go "unwhipt of justice," for w.nt of the requisite legal power on the part of Magistrates to promptly arrest the offencers, and we therefore hope that the law will speedily be so amended that this anomalous state of things will cease.

The Dundas Banner says:—In a fit of desperation the London Free Press has come down to an article giving a description of the bedding and beds used by the members of the Ontario Government who occupy apartments in the Parliamentary Buildings. The Free Press thinks two in a bed too many. Dr. Hermann von Orges, a well-known Austrian economist, has issued a pamphlet on women's work in connection with the Vienna Industrial Exhibition, where special attention will be given to the work performed by women. At the London Exhibition were seen the products of human industry, at the Paris Exhibition the instruments of human labor, and that to be held at Vienna will show who the laborers are. Information already obtained shows that in Austria women play a much more important part in all kinds of manufactures than they have hitherto been supposed to do, and that in all departments where great bodity strength is not required their work is quite as valuable as that of men.
