REFORM MEETING.—The members of the Centre Wellington Reform Association, and other friends of the party, are reminded of the meeting to be held in the Fireman's Hall, Fergus, on Thursday, löth inst, at 2 p.m. Business of importance will be brought forward, and a full attendance of the delegates who nominated Mr. McKim, is urgently requested.

DEATH OF DR. H. STRANGE.—We record with regret the death of Dr. Henry Strange, which took place at Toronto on Thursday. It will be remembered that Dr. Strange got hurt in the face more than a year ago with a cricket ball, while playing cricket at Hamilton. The injury turned out to be a serious character, resulting as it did in necrosis of the bones of the face. He took the advice of the most eminent medical men, and went to Toronto Hospital, to be near the skilful physicians attending there. Nothing that they could do, however, was of much benefit, and during the summer he kept gradually getting weaker, until at last, after enduring much snifering, death came to kis relief. Dr. Strange was the son of Henry Strange, Esq., of Rockwood, and was well known in Guelph, having studied for some time with the late Dr. Parker. After taking his degrees he commenced practice in Hamilton, where a career of good promise was before him. He was endowed with an active mind, took much interest in public affairs, and gave promise, with experience, of being a very skilftil and successful physiciar. He died at the comparatively early age of thirty-three years.

Local and Other Items.

Harriston Fair.—The regular monthly fair held here on the 2nd inst., was very largely attended. It was estimated that there were upwards of 500 head of cattle on the ground. Prices were very low, and there were not many cattle changed hands. \$18 to \$20 were the prices for milch cows.


