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LAWS AND REGULATIONS
OF THE
UPPER CANADA BIBLE SOCIETY!

*As adopted at a General Meeting of the Society, held in the City of Toronto,
on the 3rd day of August, 1855.*

[UNDER THE ACT OF INCORPORATION.]

ARTICLE I. This Society shall be denominated the "UPPER CANADA BIBLE SOCIETY," having the same object in view as the British and Foreign Bible Society—that is, the circulation of the Bible, without note or comment.

II. This Society shall endeavour to unite all the different Societies in the Province, and to concentrate their operations, in order to give more efficiency to the whole.

III. This Society shall maintain, in the City of Toronto, a general depot of Bibles and Testaments, from which all the Auxiliaries and Branch Societies in connection with it shall be supplied with the Scriptures, at the lowest price at which they can be afforded.

IV. The business of this Society shall be carried on by a Board of Directors, to consist of a President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer and Secretaries, together with twenty lay members, fifteen of whom, who shall have most frequently attended, shall be eligible for re-election each year, five of whom to form a quorum. All Ministers of the Gospel, who are members of the Society, shall be entitled to a seat; and to vote with the Directors.

V. The President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, Secretaries, and Agents of all Auxiliaries and Branch Societies in connection therewith, shall be *ex officio* members of the Board.

VI. At any meeting of the Directors, the President, or, in his absence, the Vice-President first upon the list then present, and in the absence of such Vice-President, the Treasurer, and in his absence such member as shall be chosen for that purpose, shall preside.

VII. Each person paying annually one dollar shall be a member of this Society; and persons paying fifty dollars at any one time, either to this Society or to any of the Societies in connection therewith, or through them to the British and Foreign Bible Society, or who may have rendered important services, shall, at the discretion of the Directors, be declared Life Members.

VIII. That each Life Member of this Society shall be furnished with a Certificate of Membership, under the Corporate Seal of the Society, duly signed by the President and Secretaries for the time being, and shall be allowed to receive from the Depository annually, for distribution, Bibles and Testaments to the value of one dollar.

IX. That the Board of Directors for the time being shall have the appointment of Agents, Depository, Colporteurs, Bookkeeper and Assistants of the

Society, and the fixing of all salaries and allowances ; and shall have the superintendence and management of all the property, real and personal, of the Corporation, as well as the management and control of its general affairs, and the appropriation of its funds, with full power to enact such rules as may be requisite to effect the objects contemplated by the Act of Incorporation.

X. The Board of Directors shall meet for the transaction of business once in each quarter, and at any other time when called together by the Secretaries, or any three of the Directors.

XI. A General Meeting of the Society shall be held in the month of May in each and every year, or at such other times as the Directors for the time being may deem best for the interests of the Society ; when the Officers and Directors for the ensuing year shall be chosen ; a report of the proceedings for the foregoing year presented ; together with the Treasurer's and Depository's accounts, duly audited.

XII. In the Annual Report of the Society, the efforts of the several Societies in connection with it shall be distinctly mentioned, as respects the circulation of the Scriptures and the contributions to the funds, together with such other matter connected with them as may be generally interesting.

XIII. That the General Meetings of the Society shall be opened by reading a portion of the Sacred Scriptures, and with prayer.

XIV. That no alterations in this Constitution shall be made except at a General Meeting of the Society, and after one month's notice of the same has been given to the Board.

RESOLUTION PASSED BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS RELATIVE TO GRANTS TO SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

That in all applications for grants of Bibles to Sunday Schools, the applicant be requested to furnish the Secretaries with an account of the state of the School ; the number of Scholars and Teachers ; the amount of funds at the disposal of the Managers ; who are its officers ; and why it is necessary to make such application :—all which should in every case be certified by a Minister of the Gospel, or some person of known respectability. And further, this Board recommends that the Secretaries be instructed to make grants in future only to destitute settlements ; reporting the same to the next General Meeting of the Board of Directors.

RULES.

RECOMMENDED TO BRANCH SOCIETIES.

I. That a Society be formed in connection with the British and Foreign Bible Society, through the medium of the Upper Canada Bible Society, for the purpose of contributing to the circulation of the Holy Scriptures without note or comment: the English copies being of the authorized version *only*.

II. That the Society be denominated "THE _____ BRANCH BIBLE SOCIETY."

III. That all persons subscribing one dollar annually, or five dollars at one time, shall be members of this Society.

IV. That the business of this Society shall be conducted by a President, Vice-President, Treasurer, Secretary, and a Committee consisting of not less than _____ other members; five to constitute a quorum.

V. That all Ministers of the Gospel who join the Society shall be reckoned members of the Committee.

VI. That the Committee shall meet quarterly, or oftener; the time and place of meeting to be fixed by themselves.

VII. That the Committee divide their sphere of operations into Districts, and appoint visitors for each district, to solicit subscriptions and donations from the inhabitants, and also to ascertain the wants of the people regarding the Word of God.

VIII. That the whole of the subscriptions and donations received by this Society shall, after deducting incidental expenses, be remitted, yearly, to the Upper Canada Bible Society, for the purpose of translating the Word of God into the Indian languages, and for supplying other nations, through the Bar-ent Institution, with the pure Word of God; or for the purchase of Bibles and Testaments to supply the neighborhood *at cost price*, or gratuitously to those who cannot purchase.

IX. That a General Meeting of the Subscribers be held on the _____ day of _____, in each year, at _____, when the accounts shall be presented, the proceedings of the past year stated, a new Committee appointed, and a Report agreed upon; the Report to be published under the direction of the Committee if required.

X. That on the formation of a new Committee, the President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, Secretary, and such three-fourths of the other members of the Committee as have most frequently attended, shall be eligible for re-election for the ensuing year.

THIRTY-SEVENTH ANNUAL REPORT
OF THE
UPPER CANADA BIBLE SOCIETY.

Although the past twelve months have been a time of disappointment and stringency in money matters to nearly every one in our Province, the Directors of the Upper Canada Bible Society cannot begin their Report otherwise than with a note of praise to God. Whilst our Heavenly Father has withholden from us, in some measure, the temporal prosperity which we wished and expected, He has been giving very abundantly the blessing of His Holy Spirit. In some places there has been very marked religious awakening, and the harvest of souls has rejoiced the hearts of both sowers and reapers. Nor has the blessing been confined to a few places and congregations. Ministers of all churches in different parts of the country, have noticed an unusual readiness among men to be spoken to about the salvation of their souls. Another evidence that God's Spirit has been working on the minds of the people, which is of special interest to this Society, is, that whilst all kinds of other business has been depressed, there has been an increased demand for God's Word. This has been seen very plainly in the Colporteurs' Reports, which have come before the Directors from month to month; and it is very gratifying to notice that although the proceeds of sales have decreased,—and, indeed, form the only item in which there has been any falling off,—yet the number of copies issued has been greater. It is true that the issues of the Society have not increased very largely; but taking into consideration that colportage has been seriously interrupted by death and sickness, that money has been so scarce, and that the sales of Bibles by the ordinary booksellers have been larger, the Directors regard even this slight increase as encouraging.

The number of copies of the Scriptures issued by the Society during the year, is 38,174, being 603 more than in the previous twelve months. There is a large increase in the number of Bibles issued, and a falling-off in the number of Testaments and portions. This makes the total number of issues since the formation of the Society, 1,010,717.

Another cause for thankfulness is that, in such a time of stringency, the operations of the Society have not been curtailed by lack of means. The Directors would, of course, have been glad to have had more to send to the Parent Society for its great work among the millions of heathenism,

Romanism, and Mahomedanism; and they feel that our Province has not yet done as much as it ought in this matter. Nevertheless, they do feel thankful that in such a year as the past there has been no need of curtailment. It is true they have not been able to carry out all their plans of colportage, but it has been owing to other circumstances which will be explained in another part of the Report.

Having received the handsome bequest of \$2,400 from the executors of the late John Sanderson, Esq., of Woodstock, the total income of the Society has been larger than in either of the last two years. When this bequest, and another item which properly belonged to former years, are deducted, we find that the income from ordinary sources has decreased, but not in a greater degree than might have been expected. The total income has been \$32,043.61; that from ordinary sources, \$29,090.43. The income of last year was \$29,510.97. The falling-off is entirely in the proceeds of sales and interest, and it is very encouraging to find that notwithstanding the financial stringency, the free contributions from branches in direct communication with the Board, have amounted to \$362.51 more than last year.

There is thus much to cheer and encourage our hearts in the retrospect of the year just closed. We thank God, and take courage.

In reviewing the past year, however, there is one event which we cannot advert to without a feeling of sadness; although to the servant of God to whom we refer, that event was indeed great gain. We refer to the death of the Rev. Canon Baldwin, one of the Vice-Presidents of the Upper Canada Bible Society, and one of its steadfast and devoted friends. To mention the name of Canon Baldwin before a Christian assembly in Toronto, is sufficient to call forth a deep feeling of respect and affection. Perhaps no one has enjoyed in an equal degree the high regard and deep love of all evangelical Christians. Fidelity to principle, unyielding adherence to what he felt to be right, and at the same time transparent honesty of purpose, and frankness and kindness of disposition, pre-eminently distinguished Canon Baldwin. While he had an enlightened attachment to the church of which he was a devoted minister, and was ever zealous in promoting her true interests, he loved all who loved the Lord Jesus Christ, and had a large-hearted charity and catholicity of spirit which led him to take a deep interest in all institutions like the Bible Society. We no longer see his pleasant, happy, hopeful face in our gatherings, but his memory will long be fragrant in Toronto and in Canada. Truly "the memory of the just is blessed." "Blessed are the dead which die in the Lord from henceforth; yea, saith the Spirit, that they may rest from their labours, and their works do follow them."

AUXILIARY AND BRANCHES.

The report of the London Auxiliary shows, that efforts are being made to render it more efficient, and its receipts during the past year are in advance of those of previous years. Its contributions, however, towards the circulation of the Scriptures, have not advanced. Forty of its Branches have sent an aggregate sum of \$1,408.92 to this and the Parent

Society. Last year thirty-nine sent \$1,590.71. The other forty-six have sent nothing.

The Directors do not wish to undervalue the reported improvement, because there is room for so much more, nor yet to ignore the commendable efforts of those who have brought it about. But as this Society pays for all the agency, and the whole sum contributed by that field—the wealthiest part of the country—for the circulation of God's Word is so small compared with the expense, the Directors feel convinced that the present relations between the Society and its Auxiliary are radically wrong, and would respectfully recommend their successors to take the subject into their careful consideration.

One hundred and fifteen of the stronger Branches in direct communication with the Board, were asked to hold their meetings without the help of a paid agent, if they felt they could do so without loss of efficiency. Sixty of them undertook to do so, and forty-eight of these have sent \$4,994.83, as free contributions. The others have not yet remitted, but most of them will probably do so within a short time. At the closing of accounts last year, forty-five Branches that had done without an agent had sent in \$5,210. At first sight this looks like a falling off. It should, however, be noted that several of the largest Branches, such as Guelph and Galt, helped to make up that sum last year, but are not included in the present list, as they have this year been visited by agents. This one fact more than accounts for the difference. But it is also to be remembered, that money has been still more scarce, and owing to this stringency the contributions of some of the visited Branches, as well as of many which did without help, have fallen off. On the other hand, not a few of those doing without help have sent sums equal, and even exceeding their contributions both of last year and the year before, when all were visited. Looking at these facts, the Directors feel that there is no reason to regret the policy adopted last year of developing the self-dependence of the stronger Branches, but on the contrary, regard it as decidedly successful. At the same time they think it will be well to adhere to the original intention of having each Branch visited, at least once in three years.

The Directors have desired to increase the efficiency more than the number of Branches, and have therefore checked rather than encouraged the hasty starting of new ones. Yet, whenever there appeared a good prospect for the sustenance of an efficient Branch, instructions have been given for the formation of such. In this way ten new Branches have been added to the list, seven of which have remitted handsome sums, and it is hoped that the others will very soon send their contributions. Three of these, Ayton, Preston, and Tavistock, have begun their life with great vigour, and show every sign of becoming valuable helpers. Their membership is largely German, and it is very encouraging to note the zeal and success of the Rev. Mr. Kappele, in enlisting our German brethren in the Society's work of spreading God's Word. They are entering into it with a heartiness that would rejoice the heart of the great Luther, did he witness it. News has also arrived within the last

few days of the formation of a new Branch at Emerson, in Manitoba. On the other hand there have been struck off the list eleven Branches, which have been totally unproductive for several years, so that the number on the list remains the same, but there has been a real increase of strength. There are 366 Branches in direct communication, and 86 belonging to the London Auxiliary.

AGENCY.

The visitation of the Branches has been done by one permanent and twenty-four provisional agents, at a cost of \$3,409.70, which is \$798 more than the same item last year. This, however, was expected, and is fully accounted for by the fact that it includes a whole year's salary and expenses of the Permanent Agent, whereas last year he was paid for only six months and a half.

In accordance with the original intention and in order to secure one of the valuable advantages of the provisional system, five new agents were employed in the place of gentlemen who had served the Society for several years. In this way a large number of ministers in our Province will become thoroughly acquainted with the operations of our Society, and will during the rest of their lives more actively influence the members of their respective churches in support of it. In the reports of the annual meetings of the Branches, we frequently find former agents mentioned as delivering hearty, instructive and telling addresses in the interest of the good cause.

The difficulties met by the agents in travelling have been less than usual. But the unreasonableness of some of the Branches in expecting the agents to visit them just at the time that will suit each one of them best, and the endeavours which have been made to meet their wishes, have caused trouble to the agents and expense to the Society which might have been saved. Some of the agents have also had much difficulty in getting answers to some of their communications. The Directors are glad to know that the officers of most Branches are prompt in attending to these matters; but they hope that in the coming year, all will remember that a penny saved is a penny gained, and will use their best efforts to get up good meetings at the times of the agents' proposed visits. It is worthy of notice that the postponed meetings are often great failures, both as to attendance and results.

When they look at the results of the operations of the year, and find that the free contributions from the field under the immediate supervision of the Board, have increased in such a year as the past, the Directors feel that there is much reason to regard the present plan as good, and to congratulate the Society on the general efficiency of the Agents, the Branch Officers, and the Collectors.

FINANCES.

The total income of the year has been \$32,043 61. Deducting bequests and the proceeds of a security, we find the receipts from ordinary sources, \$29,090 43.

In addition to the above contributions, the Board has voted the following grants:—

To the British and Foreign Bible Society, £500 sterling; to the Quebec Bible Society, \$700; and has placed \$500 at the disposal of the Colportage Committee for use in Manitoba. On purchase account, £3,200 has been sent to the Parent Society, leaving a balance of £1,138 6s. 5d., against which, however, there is a larger stock in hand than at the close of last year (about \$1,500 more).

Further particulars will be found in the abstract of Treasurer's account.

DISTRIBUTION.

The number of Bibles, Testaments, and Portions which have been issued from the Society's House during the twelve months is 38,174, being 603 more than the number sent out last year.

Of the above, 3,719 were sold, and 1,377 issued gratuitously at the Depository in Toronto; 27,754 sent to Branch Depositories; 5,324 to Colporteurs; 1,939 were in other languages than in English, and 19 were Portions in raised characters for the blind.

The total number of copies issued by the Society since its formation is 1,010,717.

COLPORTAGE.

The Board regrets to report that the Colportage of the Society has been seriously hindered by death, sickness, and the difficulty of getting faithful, competent, and robust men, fitted for this arduous work. Mr. W. Strain, who had been several years in the service of the Society, died in October. Although he had not been ill for any length of time before his death, yet it took several weeks to get a suitable man to fill his place; and several of the other colporteurs have been hindered by sickness and other circumstances. When these interruptions, and the

very great scarcity of money are considered, it is not surprising that the number of issues through this channel is much smaller than it was last year; nor will any one think that this decrease is owing to any lack of zeal or faithfulness on the part of the colporteurs. The time employed in this work has amounted to an aggregate of 49 months, and the number of copies circulated by this instrumentality to 5,070.

Efforts have been made through the whole year to secure the services of a competent colporteur, able to speak both French and English, to labour in the Province of Manitoba. Within the last few weeks these efforts have been successful, and the Directors trust that in the coming year much of the good seed will, by God's help, be sowed in that important field, and afterwards bear fruit to His glory in the salvation of many souls.

The Directors regret the hindrances met in this part of the Society's work all the more on account of the increased demand among the people for the Scriptures, which has been evident from the monthly reports, and they are more and more impressed with the importance of this instrumentality. It is to be remembered that the colporteurs are not mere hawkers, and that the result of their labours cannot be measured only by the number of copies circulated. They are men who by their life and conversation commend the Book they carry, and lead many who do not purchase from them to read Bibles already possessed but hitherto unused. Their reports are full of interest. Some extracts are given at page 30.

SISTER SOCIETIES.

The Directors regret that reports have not yet been received from the Kingston, Montreal, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia Bible Societies. The Ottawa Society is continuing to carry on its work with vigour. It has followed the example of this Society in employing provisional agents, and reports that "the result has so far justified the expectation that it would be beneficial," that the annual meetings were larger than formerly, and that an impulse had been imparted to the Branches, which are reported to be healthier and more promising than they were a few years ago, though some still languish. The Colportage of this Society has always been faithfully attended to, and its records are very interesting; but show that their sales have been much hindered by the stringency of the times. Owing to this and other causes, they had not employed quite so many colporteurs as in the previous year. The report of the Quebec Bible Society has not yet been received, but in a recent letter, the Secretary promises to give some particulars about their French Colportage work, which he says "thanks to your continued generosity, we have been enabled to prosecute with considerable success." In another part of his letter, he says they are almost entirely dependent upon the aid received from this Society for the maintenance of the French Canadian Colportage. Again he says: "We are so completely hedged in on all sides by those who are utterly opposed to the work in which we are engaged, that it requires a good deal of outside aid to enable us

to make any progress whatever. The colporteur we have at present in the field, a Mr. Gildas, is a fearless, whole-souled man, and prosecutes his work with much energy."

It is a great pleasure to the Directors of the Upper Canada Bible Society, to report that the Centennial year of the United States has been one of encouraging results to our neighbour and elder sister, the American Bible Society. Their report for 1876-7 has, of course, not yet been published; but the Rev. Dr. Gilman, the senior secretary, has courteously forwarded the leading figures, showing the results of their operations. It is true that the number of their issues, and the proceeds of their sales, have fallen short of the previous year; being respectively 621,726 and \$230,790 against 684,641 and \$276,205. But, considering the scarcity of money this was to be expected, and Dr. Gilman reports that their home distribution has been very satisfactory, in view of its having reached parts of their country where there was great lack. It was expected also, that when all their returns came in from foreign lands, the entire circulation abroad would prove to have been in excess of last year. Their foreign work is growing upon their hands.

It is very pleasing to find that, notwithstanding the continued dullness in commercial matters, our neighbours have, in the year of their national rejoicing, given in free contributions towards the spread of God's Word, \$61,800 more than in the preceding twelve months. It is hoped that this will prove a stimulating example to ourselves and others.

The year has also been marked by a pleasant interchange of greeting between the two Societies. Your Directors were invited by the American Bible Society to send a representative to their anniversary at Philadelphia, last May. The invitation was gladly accepted, and the Rev. Mr. Ross was sent. He was most cordially received, and when visiting the great International Building, was much gratified to find the exhibits of the American Bible Society, and of our own great parent the British and Foreign Bible Society, shown in one case; a fit emblem of the bond which should unite the two nations in this holy work of spreading God's Word among the less favoured millions of the earth. He found also, that the Pennsylvania Bible Society had a pavilion in the grounds of the Exhibition, where, before the close, many copies of the scriptures in various tongues, were sold to visitors from all lands. To-night we are favoured with the presence of a representative of the American Bible Society, in the person of its President, William H. Allen, Esq, LL.D., whom the Directors and all members of the society cordially welcome; in the first place in his official capacity, but also as the personal friend and connection of the much esteemed first agent of our Society, the late Bishop Richardson. He is accompanied by the Secretary of the Pennsylvania Bible Society, the Rev. Dr. Torrence, whom the Directors are sure will be heartily received by all friends of the cause. The Directors believe that these visits will be looked back to for many years, as occasions of both pleasure and profit.

THE BRITISH AND FOREIGN BIBLE SOCIETY.

We find the Report of our great Parent Society written in a very grateful strain and full of encouraging facts, as will be seen from the following extracts:—

The Committee desire once more to acknowledge, with profound gratitude to Him, whose is the silver and gold, the large-hearted liberality by which their efforts have been sustained during another year.

* * * * *

It is gratifying to be able to add that many assurances have been received of the most cordial approval of the course pursued by your Committee, and not a few intimations of an intention to contribute far more liberally than hitherto for the furtherance of the Society's work.

ENGLAND.

From no part of their large field of labour have the Committee derived more satisfaction during the past year than from that which is cultivated at home, by their District Secretaries. The reports from every part of the country bear strong testimony to the following facts: I. That an intelligent knowledge of the Society's principles is more extensively diffused. II. That sympathy with it in its grand, yet simple object, and in the difficulties with which it has to contend, has been largely increased. III. That not only has the liberality of many abounded, but a disposition has been evinced to make provision for any extension of work which God in His Providence may appoint.

ISSUES.—One of the most hopeful features of the present day is the extent to which the Word of God is distributed among all classes of people, both at home and abroad.

The *Total Issues* of the Society now amount to 76,432,723.

BIBLE WOMEN.—The London Bible and Domestic Female Mission reports a larger circulation of the Scriptures, through the instrumentality of the Bible women, than in any similar period. The number of copies sold within the year has reached a total of 12,269, and realized the sum of £1,659, whilst the number of subscribers yet to be supplied amounts to 7,124.

FRANCE.

M. Monod continues to prosecute his work with his characteristic care and energy, giving much attention to colportage. Large numbers of Testa-

ments and portions were distributed among the sufferers from the inundations. No difficulty was found in inducing the people to accept these; on the contrary, great gratitude was expressed for the kindness shown, and in not a few cases the recipients collected what money they could for the purchase of a whole Bible. Sixty-two colporteurs had been engaged for a longer or shorter period.

The total sales by colportage and through the depôts have amounted to 71,725 copies, against 64,540 in the preceding year. Those to religious societies and other agencies number 18,073, and the free grants, including the gifts to sufferers from the floods, have amounted to 5,848, giving a total of 95,646 copies.

GERMANY.

Notwithstanding the vast sums which flowed into the German exchequer after the Franco-German war, there had been much commercial depression. There had also been not a little religious excitement. Neither of these conditions is favourable to the work in which the Bible Society is engaged, though both serve to illustrate the truth which the Bible unfolds. But though the power to purchase the Scriptures had been limited, a season of adversity may not have been unfavourable to growth in grace, and if the excitement consequent upon legislative action in connection with questions of ecclesiastical policy has disturbed for a time the peace of the churches, results may yet be developed which shall prove "that the Lord hath founded Zion, and the poor of His people shall trust in it."

The circulation of the Scriptures within the limits of the agency had reached a total of 297,242 copies, consisting of 88,175 Bibles, 185,193 Testaments, and 23,874 Portions.

The Rev. G. P. Davies points out that the decrease in the German issues has taken place among Protestant populations only.

It is pleasant to be able to record that efforts which, for special reasons, had, during the year, been concentrated upon work among Roman Catholics, had been eminently successful. God has opened doors in a wonderful manner, giving facility of access to those long shrouded in the darkness of ignorance and superstition, and the same Hand through which entrance has been obtained, has supplied the means for the accomplishment of His purpose.

AUSTRIA.

Mr. Millard commences his report with an allusion to the struggles and troubles of the past year, which had induced him to anticipate a reduction in his sales. Such, however, has not been the case, for though, in some localities the number does not reach last year's amount, yet taking the agency as a whole, there is an increase in the issues of 1,853 copies. These have consisted of 26,682 Bibles, 53,184 New Testaments, and 37,444 Portions, or 117,310 volumes, and if to these are added 21,017 supplied to other agencies, a total will be reached of 138,327.

It is pleasant to find that in a province of Austria so difficult to reach as the Tyrol, as many as 4,378 copies of the Scriptures have been distributed.

Another subject of congratulation to which Mr. Millard alludes has reference to the character of his colporteurs. He feels it an honour to be connected with a body of men who, though of different calibre as regards qualifications, are yet, he believes, with one heart and one mind seeking to serve God, and are supporting the testimony of the Book they circulate, by the example of the lives which they lead. The Bible Society is thus conferring a double benefit upon the people among whom it works. The men and

the Book speak the same language, witness to the same Truth, and honour the same Lord ; and even where the Book is proscribed, and the people neglect it, there is an eloquence in the calm fortitude and meek forbearance of the men, which wins its way to hearts hitherto hard, and removes prejudices hitherto insuperable.

POLAND.

From the Depot at Warsaw a distribution has been made of 18,082 volumes, consisting of 4,312 Bibles, 5,860 Testaments, and 7,910 Portions. The use of the Russ language is becoming more general, and the Polish Jews have also bought largely. The colporteurs have to contend with a good deal of bigotry, but, at the same time, no field of labour seems to furnish more striking incidents illustrative of the sovereignty of God and the power of Divine Truth.

ITALY.

The mere mention of Italy in connection with the dissemination of God's Truth seems always to give fresh fervour to the prayer of faith, and to fan into renewed ardour the flame of holy expectation. Whatever be the motive, he who is longing for the extension of the Redeemer's kingdom looks often towards Italy for some signs of loyalty to its rightful King, as a prelude to the setting up of that kingdom of which there shall be no end. Nor is the interest which the Christian takes in this land, so famed for the maturity of its art and the refinement of its taste, without a reflex influence upon his own soul. Its present condition sounds a warning to which it is well that he should give heed. If painting, or statuary, or music or architecture could have spiritualized the carnal or vitalized the dead, here would have been found the scene of art's triumph and the proof of its power. But if amidst all that is magnificent in art, and refined in taste, the tide of sensuality is at the flood, and that of morality at the ebb, and the Gospel of the grace of God remains unheeded, what hope is there that the cultivation of æsthetics will become the channel of light and life to immortal souls. No. The way in which God works is altogether different to this. "Thy word is Truth," and "the entrance of Thy word giveth light, it giveth understanding to the simple." Such is God's purpose as regards every land, and in seeking to spread the knowledge of God's Truth among the Italians the Society may rely upon God's promise for a blessing.

The condition of Italy during the year had in some respects been favourable to the work ; it has been a year of peace and plenty, calling for gratitude to Him who crowneth the year with His goodness, and whose paths drop fatness. The colporteurs have consequently met with less difficulty in their sales through the plea of poverty, though the enemy is never wanting in devices to keep the sinner from the Saviour. Two active colporteurs had been employed in Rome, and one in the surrounding country, with a fair amount of success. The sales at the Depôt in Rome had amounted to 8,352 copies. Thirty-five colporteurs had been employed throughout the land, and by them by far the largest part of the circulation had been effected. The total distribution by colportage, from the Depôts, and by other means, had amounted to 41,194 volumes. This shows a slight increase on the issues of the previous year, but falls far short of the requirements of the population if they were willing and able to read the Word of God.

SPAIN.

Spain seems to be again closing itself against the operations of the Society,

but it is encouraging to know that, in 1875, the sales amounted to the goodly number of 5,518 Bibles, 8,628 Testaments, and 40,999 Portions, being a total of 54,545 copies, as against 50,704 in the previous year. In addition to this, 2,748 have been distributed as free gifts, and 3,000 have been forwarded to London, making the total issues from the Depot at Madrid 60,293. Fourteen colporteurs have been employed on an average during the whole year, who have succeeded in putting into circulation 35,679 copies, consisting of 3,344 Bibles, 5,071 Testaments, and 27,264 Portions. Such a record of work during a period of great trial must be considered most encouraging, and be suggestive of gratitude and praise to the Giver of all good, the more so as the increase in the circulation has extended not only to the smaller Portions, but to Bibles and Testaments.

NORWAY, SWEDEN, &C.

In both Norway and Sweden, the circulation had been about the same as in the previous year, but in both countries the fruit of former efforts is beginning to appear. In place of the apathy and indifference which prevailed a few years ago, there is proof of spiritual life and Christian enterprise, which have sprung from the seed of the Word, watered by the dew of the Holy Spirit. New churches, home missions, and Gospel tents, are appearing in various localities, showing that the work of the evangelist and the colporteur act and re-act upon each other. The Bible creates a need for the missionary, and the missionary creates a need for the Bible.

In Belgium and Holland, there had been nothing of special interest reported during the year. In Portugal, the work had been going on steadily, and the agent wrote very hopefully. The report of the work in Denmark was very encouraging; there had been a large increase in the circulation of the Scriptures, and a revival of spiritual life. In Russia, there is much to encourage the hope that the circulation of God's Word, throughout its vast extent, will be marked by a very rapid growth. In Greece, Dr. Thomson reports that there has arisen a genuine spirit of inquiry about Divine Truth, which has been mainly produced by the circulation of the Word of God. In Turkey, the operations of the Society had partaken of the general depression; but there had not been wanting interesting and encouraging incidents, some of which were inserted in the *RECORDER* of last September, and some of which seem to show that the Bible Society is the agency best fitted to reach the Mahommedans.

In Syria and Palestine, owing to the severity of the winter and the prevalence of cholera, the sales has been somewhat less than in the previous year, and considerable difficulties remain, but the Agent is not daunted, and is upheld by faith in God's promises concerning this interesting country.

INDIA.

The reports of the Auxiliaries in India are all cheering. They are continuing their extensive Colportage work with very important results, and it is acknowledged by secular newspapers that the Bible is beginning to have an immense influence all over India. Some of the interesting incidents connected with the Society's work in this densely populated country, were inserted in the *January RECORDER*.

CHINA.

Colportage, from various causes, has neither been so extensive nor so successful as in former years, and yet within the period to which Mr. Wylie's

report refers, the colporteurs have visited 34 prefectures (each prefecture being about the size of an average English county) and 7 departments, and have sold the Scriptures in 102 districts, and to the extent of 29,818 copies. If, therefore, no superstructure of an imposing character has as yet been raised to God's glory, a foundation has nevertheless been laid on which we may build securely, and to which we may fairly look for the Divine blessing.

But Colportage is not now, as it was once, a sufficient test of the progress of our work, which is assuming a different aspect through the co-operation of missionaries. Colporteurs have in many parts of the empire been the pioneers, but now that missions are extending their agency, missionaries are to a great extent taking up the work which the Bible Society initiated. They itinerate through the country, and besides preaching the Gospel, sow the good seed of the Word in a printed form, and by insisting upon the book which they distribute being sold and not given, they leave behind them some testimony to God's love which is more likely to be lasting in its character than their own words, however fitly spoken. Through every agency then, as far as they have traced, the issues within the limits of this vast empire have amounted to 100,761 volumes.

JAPAN.

The Committee have not much to report concerning the progress of Bible circulation in Japan during the past year. It is yet a day of small things, and though from some points of view the work looks hopeful, the present is at best but a seed time, and the husbandman must have long patience. Missionaries are still novices in the use and construction of the language, and only feeling their way toward the desired end—an idiomatic translation of the Scriptures in the vernacular of the country. The four Gospels have already been printed by the American Missionaries, and the stock being almost exhausted, a new edition was to be printed at the expense of our Parent Society.

SOUTH AMERICA.

Though the action of the Bible Society with reference to the vast continent of South America may appear very insignificant when compared with the extent of the field which needs to be cultivated, and the thirsty nature of its parched ground, yet it is causing heavenly doctrine to drop as the small rain upon the tender herb, and as showers upon the grass. Large communities may not be seen arising to cast off the yoke of superstition under which they have long groaned, but gradually the colporteur is bearing the message of salvation to the dead in sin, and the blessed Book which proclaims liberty to the captives, and the opening of the prison to them that are bound, is finding its way into many homes.

AFRICA.

East Africa.—Several letters have been received from the Right Rev. Bishop Steere in the course of the year, dated Zanzibar, which are of an encouraging character, both as regards the translation of the Scriptures in the Swahili language, and the progress of missionary work generally.

South Africa.—The reports of the auxiliaries at Cape Town, Graham Town, Natal, &c., are for the most part encouraging, and very interesting accounts of Missionary work in Basutoland have been received. The Sesuto New Testament was ready for the press, and more than half the Old Testament had been completed.

West Africa.—A very encouraging letter from the Rev. J. Zimmerman tells

of good work being done by the Rev. F. Ramseyer and others who were released by the British expedition in 1874, after 4½ years captivity in Coomasie. The letter tells of old Christians who had to use spectacles learning to read, and Mr. Z. says the Missionaries are astonished at how the young men, who never had a proper teacher before, are at home in their Bible. Mr. Zimmerman is himself engaged on the revision of the G4 Bible, which is a work of much labour, but which he hopes to see completed.

Towards the conclusion of their report, the Committee of the Parent Society refer to the loud cries for their help, coming from Russia, Persia and Japan, which they were prayerfully considering how best to respond to, with most advantage to the cause.

It will be interesting to the friends of the Society to recall the fact that during a period of little more than ten years, separate agencies have been established in Spain, Portugal, Austria, and South Russia, whilst depots have been opened at Madrid, Lisbon, Rome, Moscow, Odessa, Charkoff, and Tiflis, as well as in Vienna, Trieste, Klausenburg, Lemberg, Pesth, Prague, and Warsaw; a sufficient proof, the Committee venture to believe, that the great interests which they have been commissioned to watch over have been directed and controlled by a wisdom and power superior to their own.

The survey of their Domestic field was most encouraging, and the Committee had received most cordial approval of the course they had pursued.

The Free Income of the Society amounted to £116,802 5s. 0d., whilst the sum received for Scriptures sold both at home and abroad had risen to £105,410 2d. 3d., which, with £108 1s. 8d., received on account of a special fund for India Colportage, made a total of £222,320 8s. 11d.

The issues for the year were 2,682,185 volumes, and the total issues since the formation of the Society, amounted to 76,432,723.

These are very encouraging figures; but if any one imagine that therefore it is time to rest in this matter, let him ponder thoughtfully a remarkable paragraph which we cull from the combined report of the District Secretaries:

“ Within the last few months a statement has been made to the effect that the population of our globe increases at the rate of about *eleven millions* annually, and probably these figures are below the mark. The Scriptures circulated, not only by our Society, but by it and every other similar organization, do not amount to more than *five millions* per annum, or *not half the yearly increase* of the world's population. Add to this startling fact that there are *at least a thousand millions* who never yet possessed a copy of the Bible, and does not the command of Jehovah, delivered by His servant Moses on the shore of the Red Sea, sound forth loudly to His people again to-day; ‘ Speak unto the children of Israel that they *Go forward!* ’ ”

This shows how far Britain is from having yet accomplished her work in this her most important mission, of giving to earth's millions the Holy Bible which has so blessed her own thousands, and if there is work for Britons to do, Canadians must and will be found ready for their share of it.

EXTRACTS FROM AGENTS' REPORTS.

REV. CHARLES FISH, Monday, Nov., 1876.—“*Woodville*.—27th.—Where we have an excellent class of officers, had the largest gathering the President said he had ever seen at meeting of B. S. A divine influence pervaded, and I urged immediate collection and remittance before 1st January, 1877.

“*Eldon*, 28th.—I reached the Branch as early in the day as possible; could not find from any one that the meeting had been announced at all, though I sent notices, as to the others, about two weeks before. I proceeded at once to make my own announcement, visited the Common School, addressed scholars, and got all pledged to help me; sent a man and a boy up and down concession lines, and secured a pretty fair congregation, and best of all, the presence of the Lord. They pledged themselves to send their subscriptions, if possible, before 1st January, 1877.

“*Beaverton*, Dec. 1st.—The most efficient class of officers I have met with in all my travels; the Secretary is almost a host in himself. We had a fine audience and a glorious meeting. The several speakers who followed the Agent in a few remarks, insisted that the time had come, when, for such a noble institution, they must advance upon the former givings, which I have no doubt they will do. I have been much encouraged in my visits to the several Branches, and have reason to hope that the returns from every Branch visited will exceed the returns of last year.”

REV. DR. BELL, Nov. 1876.—“On the 21st came to *Orangerille* and spent some time calling on the office-bearers, &c. The meeting, a very interesting one, was held in the Y. M. C. A. Hall; the attendance consisted very largely of ladies, the rain and mud having probably frightened the sterner sex away. I was aided by the Presbyterian and Methodist Ministers; Depository in a drug store in excellent condition, well assorted and well kept. . . . 24th Nov., came to *Harriston*, where we had an excellent and spirited meeting, the Church of England, Methodist and Presbyterian Ministers assisting. The prospects of this Branch are very good; the books in the Depository are well assorted, in excellent condition, and beautifully exhibited in a jewellery store. . . . 27th.—Having gone home on Saturday, 25th, I left again early this morning for *Teeswater*. Here the meeting was held in the Town Hall, the two Presbyterian Ministers assisting. The attendance was large, and the Society is apparently well managed. The stock in the Depository is well assorted and well kept in the show-room of a dry goods and millinery store. . . . Jan. 23rd, 1877.—*Mount Forest*.—The weather was very cold, and in the evening a snow-storm commenced. There were several local matters which interfered with the attendance at our meeting, so that, considering the size of the place, the meeting was small. It was, however, interesting, and I think the Society is in the hands of good and true men, who will work. They promised to collect and remit within a month.”

REV. J. KAY, Oct. and Nov., 1876.—“*Tilbury East* was the next branch visited; found the Reverend Messrs. Forest and Miller with a large and in-

telligent audience waiting for me ; this branch is vigorous and successful. From thence I took train for Amherstburg, where I was cordially welcomed, and hospitably entertained by the very efficient Secretary, Rev. Mr. Smith. I remained here over Sabbath, and preached in the morning in the Presbyterian Church, and in the evening in the Methodist Church ; the meeting was, they say, excellent for Amherstburg. From thence I proceeded to Colchester, Kingsville, Mersea, and Tilbury West, at each of which places we had interesting meetings. On Saturday, 4th November, I returned home quite ill from cold and threatened fever, but with the blessing of Providence, I was in a few days able to resume my active duties."

REV. R. TORRANCE, Oct. and Nov., 1876.—“ On the 25th of September, I issued a notice to each branch, of the date of my intended visit, so that the first on my list had about a month, and the others an increasingly longer period, to make whatever preparation was considered necessary. . . . *Berrie*, Oct. 25th.—Next forenoon I visited the Depository and found an excellent selection of books on hand, but not in so prominent a place as desirable—a remark that will apply to some other branches. In all such cases I called attention to the fact, and suggested that the Committee should procure a suitable press, set it so as to attract the attention of persons calling, and get a small sign attached to it, or at the door of the above. . . . *Lucknow*.—As I had to leave by early train the following morning, I made my inspection of the Depository before the public meeting. The stock on hand was in good condition, and placed in a press in a conspicuous place. The sales last year were far in advance of those of the year before, and the Depositories, Messrs. Kerr and McKinnon, evinced the interest they took in the circulation of the Scriptures by opening a Sub or Branch Depository in another store, which they have out of Lucknow. The Branch in *Ainleyville* had not done much during the past year. There seems to have been neither Secretary, Treasurer, nor Depository appointed at the last meeting, or at least their names were not returned to the office in Toronto. If collectors were chosen, they had not acted, and it came to the knowledge of your Agent that one friend there, who had long been a supporter of the Bible Society, had remitted a liberal contribution directly to Toronto, not knowing anyone in the place through whom it could be sent. Under the circumstances it was plainly my duty to do what lay in my power to awaken dormant energies, and give as suitable advice as I could, and this I attempted to do, and in doing it, received valuable aid from Mr. Ferguson and others. Contrary to expectation, the public meeting was a tolerably fair one. The Rev. Mr. Jones, President, occupied the chair. The Rev. Mr. Armstrong of the Methodist Church, and Mr. Ferguson, in whose Church the meeting was held, were also present and took part in the proceedings. At the close, Office-bearers were chosen, and a Committee appointed, embracing, I believe, members from the different religious denominations in the place. As Mr. Jones had expressed an earnest wish to be released of the Presidency, Mr. Ferguson was called to that position. After all public business had been finished, the new President immediately called a meeting of the Committee, and required of them, in the first place, to become members of the Society by becoming subscribers to its funds. He set the example himself, and he was cheerfully and promptly followed by all present, so that a considerable amount was realized on the spot. Some other matter was transacted, when a sub-committee was chosen to examine the stock and see what was required to meet the wants of the locality, to report at an early day; there is every prospect that the Society has now entered upon a new career which it will pursue with zeal. Its office-bearers are energetic men, and they will leaven others with the same spirit. Our expecta-

tions will be greatly disappointed if Ainleyville does not soon forward^l to you a sum far above any sent on former occasions. We trust a suggestion that was made will be carried out, namely, to order a considerable number of RECORDERS and distribute them among the families in the bounds. May the little one soon become a thousand. . . . January, 1877.—After remaining here an hour or so, I left for Pine River; part of the way I got a ride, but had to walk the rest of the distance. Calling on the Reverend Mr. Graham, he extended to me a most hearty and hospitable welcome. In the evening a meeting was held in his church. Only a few persons were present, but they were unanimous in the opinion that a branch should be formed, as there was a considerable tract in the neighbourhood in which the operations could be carried on, and from which contributions might be collected for the good cause. Mr. Graham felt very much the want of such an organization, as there had been one in the place from which he came to Pine River, which had received his careful support, in whose prosperity he rejoiced, and through whose publications, as received from the head office, he had learned from time to time how the work was going on at home and abroad. The people present were of the same spirit with himself, and all the steps were taken to form a branch with Office-bearers and Committee, who will map out the district, appoint Collectors, and adopt other means to render the branch a successful, although it may be but a small one. . . . It is only just to state that in every place the people extended to me a most cordial reception, and all appeared to feel the importance of Bible circulation; their interest will become deeper as they get more fully informed as to what the Bible has done, and the necessities still existing for combined, vigorous, prayerful and liberal efforts in sending it abroad, that the ends of the earth may be enabled to hear of Him who is the true God and Eternal Life. I was particular in each place to speak of the unsectarian catholic character of the Bible Society, and to press the importance of having all religious denominations represented among its Office-bearers and Committee. All seemed to feel the propriety of such a course.

REV. J. J. RICE, Oct., Nov., and January, 1876-7.—“At *Dorchester Station* meeting, Nov. 6th, a fair gathering assembled on the most stormy evening of last autumn, thus evidencing the deep interest taken in the Branch by its friends; the meeting was in the Presbyterian Church, the Pastor of which, together with the resident C. Methodist minister was present, and the full sympathy of these brethren accounted for the good gathering. Under such unpropitious circumstances the meeting was an unexpectedly good one, and the Branch is fortunate in securing the further service of its valuable official staff.

“*London, North-west.*—Meeting was held in the C. Methodist Church, Vanneck; it was a good meeting, worthy of the excellent men in charge of it. The venerable Mr. Bell, for thirty years the efficient Secretary of the Bible Society, under different forms and names, in this neighbourhood, at length succumbing to infirmities was necessitated to resign, and a suitable record was made in the Branch minute book of the feeling of the Society towards this old and valuable servant. Mr. Robson, his successor, is a most worthy man, and will doubtless prove a very efficient officer. Rev. Mr. Thyne, Presbyterian, rendered good service at this most successful meeting.

Delaware Branch held its meeting, 23rd January, in the Town Hall, the President in the chair; the weather was severe, but the attendance was on the whole good. The resident Presbyterian Minister gave an excellent speech, and the choir of the Episcopalian Church, with the clergyman's lady as organist, furnished music. Dr. Francis, for several years the efficient Secretary of this Branch, retired, and was succeeded by Aaron Vail, Esq. The President,

Mr. Hughson, is evidently the right man for the place. This Branch is in hands that will ensure for it continued success. . . . Of the twelve Branches confided to me for visitation the above are all I could do anything with. The Branch at *St. John's* is considered by its Secretary out of existence, and he would not announce for a meeting, intimating that all attempts to hold meetings of late years had signally failed.

"*Nissouri, Harrietsville, and Siloam Branches.*—Although I addressed the several officers of each as designated in the Report, I could get no word from them and I assume no such Branches exist. I purpose at my earliest convenience and at my own cost visiting these localities, and having done so, I will communicate to you the result of my inquiry on the spot. In conclusion I beg to assure you that I found in all the localities visited, many warm friends of the Bible Society, and, as a rule, the Branch Offices are very worthily filled, and I trust the labours of my brethren in the work of visitation may have been more abundantly successful and not less agreeable than have been my own."

REV. JAMES GRANT, Feb. 7th, 1877.—I have had very considerable trouble in getting the different Branches allotted to me to decide on a night for the Annual Meeting of the Bible Society.

"*Holbrook.*—This Branch I visited on Monday, January 22nd, but the meeting was poorly attended, owing to bad roads; those who were present however, were very enthusiastic and were glad to have your agent call upon them. They said they would do their utmost to increase their subscription to the Society this year,—I am positive they will; very little was done at the Depository, but I strongly urged them to develop its usefulness as much as possible. The collectors were being sent out, and the officers assured me that the money would be sent on to Toronto as soon as brought in.

REV. ALEX. YOUNG, 1876.—"On receiving the appointment of Agent of the Upper Canada Bible Society, I sent out the usual notices to the Branches I was expected to visit. *Percy.*—The Officers were re-elected, and Collectors appointed to go to work immediately after the meeting. There is a good deal of life manifest here, the Officers and Committee are earnest and energetic, and I have no doubt will do their utmost to increase the funds of the Society. The collection at the meeting amounted to \$6.37. This with other funds in the Treasurer's hands will be forwarded along with the subscriptions to Toronto. . . . On Sunday forenoon, November 26th, I preached at Eddystone, in the Christian Church, and in the evening in the Baptist Church, at Wicklow three miles distant, both these places within the territory of the Vernonville Branch. The day was stormy, but the attendance was fair in both places; the work of the Society was explained, and the collection of \$2.83 handed to the Secretary of the Vernonville Branch to be reckoned as part of its funds.

Coldsprings.—Collectors were appointed and intended to have their work done on or before the 29th December, it was also resolved that the whole amount of their subscriptions be given as a free contribution to the Upper Canada Bible Society Collection \$4.40.

"*Vernonville.*—This Branch is only in its infancy, but promises well. The Rev. J. W. Smith, Presbyterian, came from Grafton to assist us, and spoke warmly on behalf of the Society. After the services of the Sunday previous the Collectors had commenced their work, but had not completed; the returns, however, so far, although little more than half done, were already in excess of last year. Sales for the year, \$8.05; stock on hand \$7.10; collections taken on the Sunday previous, and at the meeting, amounted to \$4.48. The Collectors were urged to complete their work without delay. The Officers were appointed, and intended to forward the funds to Toronto, which they

promised to do. . . . On the whole, with only two or three exceptions, the meetings were well attended, the practical interest taken in the Society's work encouraging, and the people seem to appreciate more and more the object it has in view, as they learn to love and study the Book of God for themselves; they are becoming more convinced by comparing the lands where it is circulated, and read, and believed, with those who have it not, that no country can prosper without it. Let the labourers strengthen each others hands, take new courage, and work on till our Dominion be truly a land of Bibles, and God alone have all the glory."

Rev. S. KAPPEL, 1876-7.—“On the 30th Oct., I visited *Hamburg*. From several unforeseen occurrences the meeting was almost a failure, and I almost decided to re-visit that Branch and arrange for another meeting, but after I addressed the few present, mostly the officers and committee, also the German evangelical minister, and saw the earnestness of spirit and the hearty will of those present, I felt that the good work will not suffer so much as I feared at first. The officers and collectors were appointed, and with hearty encouragement I left the work in the hands of the officers of the branch, with the hope that they may be more successful with the meeting next year. The Depository is in a very good place, and well kept. . . . I left Crediton on the 22nd of November, for Tavistock, where a meeting was announced for me that evening, but this time I nearly overreached my ambition, as I had no idea of the distance, nor of the state of the roads. I was very near disappointing the meeting, but by the help of God, and the holding out of my horse, I reached Tavistock, although in the dark night, but yet early enough for the meeting. Hungry and cold, and much covered with mud, I was kindly welcomed by the evangelical minister of this place, and entertained for the night. I found a good congregation, mostly Germans, with a few English people,—the result you know already. With proper care I hope to see this a very prosperous and useful branch. . . . On the 11th January, 1877, I attended the public meeting in Guelph; the friends say that this was the best attended meeting they had had for a long time. Everything connected with this branch seems to be encouraging. The ministers, the officers and committee all seem to be the best of men in their places; the financial result for the year is cause for joy and thankfulness. . . . At Berlin, the Lutheran, Evangelical, Presbyterian, United Brethren, and Methodist ministers were present. The meeting was much larger than last year, the sales in the depository have increased wonderfully last year, the free contributions are in advance,—thank God for this success. I addressed the meeting in both languages, and all the ministers supported me. . . . I hope my poor but hearty efforts to serve the interest of the Society may prove to be blessed from the Lord. I have been encouraged in my work by the success I have witnessed, and also by the kindness of the friends of the Bible cause. I have not preached on Sunday at any branch. I have laboured in the time spent as much as possible, and at every branch I did my best to rouse the people to activity and liberality in the Bible cause.

REV. WM. F. CLARKE.—1876, Dec. 14th.—“*Selkirk*.—Another small meeting in the Baptist Church; little interest is felt in the Bible cause here; only about \$9 were obtained last year by the collectors, but the work was not thoroughly done—the village and neighbourhood well canvassed ought to give a respectable contribution. The depository appears to be well kept, and is the only healthy feature of this branch; \$15.07 proceeds of sales were on hand, and were paid to the Agent on purchase account. The Rev. Messrs. Fearnside (Baptist) and Thomson (Primitive Methodist), assisted at the meeting.

“*Dunnville*, Dec. 15th.—A wild, cold, wintry night, consequently there

was but a small meeting in the Methodist Church ; this Branch has sustained a great loss in the death of its President, the late Wm. Cook, Esq., who took a warm interest in Bible work, and spent a large amount of time in promoting the interests of the Branch. M. Gash, Esq., formerly Vice-President, was appointed President."

REV. GEORGE BURSON, 1877, April 5th.—"I sent cards to the twelve branches in the beginning of October last, inquiring of them the most convenient time for their meetings. I received replies from all except Thorold, which, I learn from the General Secretary, has decided to do without a visit.

"Niagara.—This Branch is in the hands of interested and competent officers, the meetings are very well attended, and, judging from the very admirable report read by the Secretary, I think they will be in advance of last year.

"Drummondville.—This Branch is in admirable order and doing a good work. We had an interesting meeting, and I expect their proceeds will be up to the past year. Clifton is doing well, interest increasing. It cannot be otherwise, with such officers and ministers hearty in its support."

EXTRACTS FROM COLPORTEURS' REPORTS.

MR. JOHN LOWRY, Oct. 1876.—"I have travelled 357 miles, 160 by rail, and walked 197, which is the most that I have walked in one month. I went one day to Newtonbrook and back, made forty visits and sold twenty copies of the Scriptures. I left home in the morning, before eight o'clock. I visited all the houses along the Kingston road on each side to Norway. I have visited Don Mount, Danford road, Chester Village, Todmorden, and the 2nd concession, up Yonge Street as far as York Mills. I have sold ninety Bibles and one hundred and eleven Testaments, exclusive of three Bibles and four Testaments with Psalms. I have found six families without Bibles. I gave away four, one a Reference Bible, and also a seventy cent Bible to a poor widow woman. . . . Had it not been for the scarcity of money, I could have sold a great number more copies. I have travelled more in this month than I could continue to do ; the roads being good, I was anxious to do all I could on the outskirts of the city and villages not far distant, as on account of family affliction, I was not able to do any work in the summer. I promised to call with several that were not prepared to buy in November. This month was the most delightful and encouraging in the Master's work. May the Lord give me more of the Spirit of my Divine Master in pointing sinners to the Lamb of God that taketh away the sins of the world.

"November.—Altogether these two months, the Lord has opened up a large and an effectual door for the circulation of His own word. The following is a summary of my labours for the past two months—miles travelled, 755 ; visits, two thousand and fifty ; Scriptures sold, 453 ; Scriptures with Psalms, thirty-nine ; sold to Romanists eight copies Scriptures, given ten copies."

MR. WM. MCPHAIL, May 1876.—"I could not venture too far from home on account of the precarious state of my complaint, the doctor advising me not to venture too far from home, lest I should get wet and the sciatica return again. I came over to the township again on the fifteenth, and worked hard. The demand for Bibles and Testaments is good, but money is very

scarce. . . . September.—I found the people showing great earnestness in buying Bibles and Testaments, but the dulness felt all over is seen in the buying of Bibles, as well as in other business. Very few houses showed apathy or want of interest in the Bible Society.

“October.—There is a real demand for Bibles, but there is no prospect for getting money. There are many who expressed their approbation and thanks to the Society for affording them a chance to know not only of the cheapness of the Bibles and Testaments, but especially of the motives of the Society, of which they were quite ignorant. Many asked how much per cent. I was allowed on the sale. I always carry the invoice, and if any one asks deduction in the price, I show them the invoice and explain the motives of the Society. I do all I can to show them what the Society is doing, not only at home, but throughout the whole world.”

MR. WM. STRAIN, June, 1876.—“Having been obliged by delicate health to remain in Flesherton, in the county of Grey, I was able to start again on Thursday, 1st of June, and arrived in Paisley the next day, and found my stock of books in good order, under the care of a Christian gentleman who made no charge for storage. I received a kind invitation from persons in the township of Eldersley, in which Paisley stands. I complied with their wishes, as they wanted books, and afterwards I have laboured in parts of Bruce township, and have found the people kind. Owing to the scarcity of money at this season I made as many sales as I could have reasonably expected. The people are chiefly Highland Scotch, and much the larger portions of my sales were Bibles and Testaments with Psalms. I got a good serviceable horse and buggy, at a reasonable rate. I have been to see Rev. Dr. Bell, of Walkerton. He is a worthy gentleman. He took much interest in my work, and thinks that Bruce, Huron and Kincardine will require my services. . . . August.—The same day, when returning to my field of labour, I was overtaken with a heavy shower of rain at Patrick K——’s gate, and was obliged to take shelter in his house. He asked me if I believed the Pope to be Anti-Christ, but I thought it best to give an evasive answer. I said we were both big-feeling Irishmen, and if we entered on that subject we would be sure to use words and arguments that would rouse bitter resentment on both sides, and I thought it best not to commence. Patrick’s wife agreed that I was right. He then said, Well, you are a very forgiving man, to shelter in my house after the manner in which I spoke to you at the fence in the early part of the day. I said that was nothing, and we parted good friends. His sons got out my horse, fixed me up, opened the gate, and I went on my way rejoicing, thinking of the trials and opposition the Blessed Master and Saint Paul had to endure. . . . September.—At the commencement I had got through the townships of Kincardine and Huron, and other parts about Lucknow, but I had recollected that when in Brant and Bruce many families urged me to visit them after harvest, when they expected to have the means of buying my books. Accordingly, I moved to Walkerton, and had a word with Rev. Dr. Bell, who advised me to try, he remarking there is nothing like trying. I went to work and have met with the usual kind reception, and have done reasonably well, all things considered, as the crops have not turned out as well as expected in the earlier part of the summer.”

REV. R. STEPHENSON, May, 1876.—“On May first I was again to work, but on the fourth was too unwell to travel. I tried again on the fifth and sixth, but the weather being unfavourable I felt worse on the eighth; had to cease on account of sickness, and did not feel able to recommence until the fifteenth. . . . June.—During the month scarce anything took place to

make many remarks about ; found some kind friends and but few enemies to myself or the work in which I was engaged in. Many said to me "you are engaged in a good work." . . . September.—The people generally gave me a kind reception, and in many instances seemed anxious to obtain the Word of God. We found four families without the Bible. One woman said she always intended to get one, and your agent had the pleasure of supplying her with perhaps the first one she ever owned. Another said she had been married nearly four years and never had a Bible, but had given an order for a large Family Bible. It is a pity that some who possess Family Bibles do not use them oftener. I saw often the Family Bible brought out of its hiding-place and shown to me with pride, but seldom used or even another used in its place. We think that your Society is doing a good work in supplying every-day Bibles. A Roman Catholic woman would, I think, have purchased a Testament, but was dissuaded by a neighbour declaring it is not the right kind for you. Another case was that of a family who owned about half of a Bible (Brevier type), and we, as your agent, presented them with one for their children, which seemed to be thankfully received. They also promised that if we return, and they have means to purchase one with a large type, they will do so. It is pleasing to notice how gladly the children welcome our visits. Some of them will run to bring out their long hoarded store of copiers, and tender them for payment of a Testament when it is perhaps not more than half the price of one, then their mothers come to their help and the price is made up, and their joy is great. We have enjoyed being employed by your excellent Society in the noble work of spreading God's Truth, but in consequence of a severe cold caught some time since, and subsequent weakness, we shall be compelled to rest for a time, but if in the future we are able we shall be very happy to serve your Society and the cause of Truth again. Hoping that God's richest blessing may rest more abundantly upon the Society and its agents, we are yours faithfully."

MR. EDWARD ROTHWELL, July, 1876.—"The fall I had was a bad one, but I am improving every day and will be on the road again next Monday. . . . October.—Many expressed great desire to buy but lacked the means, consequently the amount of gratis distribution exceeds that of any previous month. I only gave under the prescribed circumstances. I still meet the cry, Why not go to the back counties. I meet it by showing how much destitution exists in the old townships, even round the large towns. Who would search out these cases of want and supply them if the Society did not? I am satisfied that nobody would, nor would one out of ten of the parties avail themselves of the benefit through the depositories. I should say from what I see, that a visit once in five or six years will always be required, chiefly in the interest of the poor. 'The poor you have always with you,' is as true now as in our Lord's ministry, and nowhere is the truth more palpable than in the richest districts. I felt an honest pride in being able to send so much last month, and have often wished that my initiatory year had been one of prosperity that I might do more for the Society, but I feel, if anything, a greater satisfaction in giving to an old man or woman living by the roadside and having only a small smoke-dimmed copy of the Bible, to be able to give such a clear, bright copy. To see how eagerly they open, how they read, to bear their blessings on me and the Society. This, I must say, goes far to reconcile me to the hardships of the work. May God give me strength to bear and ability to do the work committed to me. . . . October.—I have met many cases of destitution, as shown in my report, and many more not shown, who had only a mere excuse, as a small Testament; most of those bought Bibles. One woman had not had a Bible for thirteen years. Another, married

six years, had never had a Bible but one. Another, four, bought a small one, and but for want of cash, I could sell four to one. I have given, where the circumstances warranted my doing so. The small Testaments were mostly to orphan children. Three boys bought little Testaments, a fourth stood by quite forlorn-looking. What is the matter, boy? Is he not your son? He is a poor orphan. I keep him. He must have one; the Blessed Saviour provided for such as he."

MR. R. MCINTYRE, April, 1876.—“They were greatly in favour of the Bible Society, and one man will be very happy to do what he can to help on the work of the Bible Society; also, Rev. Mr. Beattie thought he could sell quite a number of Bibles, and will write to Mr. Baldwin about it. You will see that I have not sold many of the Society Bibles, people did not want them without the metrical psalms. I have sold, as you will see, \$50 worth of Tract Society books. When I told Mr. McIntosh, the school Inspector, that I had sold close on 700 Bibles and Testaments, he did not think I could have sold near so many. He is a warm friend to the Bible Society, and entertains me in his house often. You would be astonished to see the many warm friends you have got in North Hastings. Had it not been for the bad times I could have sold quite a number more. . . . January, 1877.—Many ask where does the money go to. I sit down and tell them how the Bible Society sends men out to the heathen lands to spread the blessed word of God, and also the work that is carried on at home (in Canada). I must say that there are a great many warm-hearted people in the above township for the Bible Society. I would sell more, but the people have not much money.

MR. JOHN MOODIE, Oct. 1876.—“Dr. Brewster, of Ridgeway Branch, was very kind to me, the resident minister as well, Mr. Mooney. Hard times and bad roads will account for the meagre sales, also I could not get forward in time to make up my report, owing to the rain, raining almost every day. . . . November.—I am ashamed of this report, but I find it almost impossible to get orders for your 70c. Bible, on account of want of money, far less daily sales.”

MR. PHILIP SPARLING, Feb. and March, 1877.—“I find a good deal of difficulty to sell in consequence of hard times. Money in those back settlements is very scarce. I found an instance or two where in my judgment it was needful to make a reduction; the people are willing to buy if they had money.

ANNIVERSARY MEETING.

The thirty-seventh anniversary meeting of the Upper Canada Bible Society took place on Wednesday evening, 2nd May, in the Metropolitan Church, Rev. Dr. Ryerson in the chair. There was a large audience, and great interest was manifested in the proceedings.

The meeting was opened by the singing of the hymn, "The heavens declare Thy glory, Lord," followed by reading of Scripture and prayer by the Rev. W. H. Briggs.

The Chairman, in his introductory remarks, said that he was deeply sensible of the honour conferred upon him by the Board of the Upper Canada Bible Society in requesting him to preside in the absence of the honourable and honoured President, the Hon. G. W. Allan, to whose introductory and expository remarks at the commencement of each anniversary meeting they had listened with so much edification and so much delight. The senior Vice-President, Dean Grasett, was also absent, whose illness on his recent voyage to England excited so much anxiety, and whose recovery on his arrival in England, after his life had been despaired of, afforded so great an amount of thankfulness. He felt a great deal of melancholy in rising to address them in the recollection that one of the Vice-Presidents, a near relative of the Very Rev. Dean Grasett, and whose labours and influence had ever been identified with the Society, had been called from the scene of labour to the scene of reward. He referred to the Rev. Canon Baldwin. He hoped they would be stimulated to imitate the labour of love of their departed friend. He came before them not as a new advocate of the Bible Society. He happened the other day to come across an old speech, the only speech which he ever wrote before deliverance. Its endorsement was as follows:— "My first speech at a Bible Society meeting on a vote of thanks to the Hon. J. H. Dunn, at the anniversary meeting in May, 1830." During nearly half a century he had been identified with the work of the Bible Society, and had witnessed its operations in this country, and to some extent in the old country, with deep interest, great delight, and fervent gratitude. During the past year he had made his last trip to Europe, and arriving there the first week in June and leaving the first week in February, he had an opportunity during the eight months of making some observations on the operation and extending influence of Bible distribution and Bible reading. During none of his eight previous visits had he ever seen so many Bibles for sale in London, or in the churches, or so much Bible reading in the congregations of those churches. Never had he seen such indications of the vigour and earnestness, and fervent piety and aggressiveness of the Protestants generally in England as during his recent visit. He believed that at no period of English History had there been so much piety, so much extensive benevolence, so much earnest aggression upon the errors and vices of the day, so much exertion in the distribution of God's Holy Word, so much faithfulness in the ministry of the Word, as at this present hour. He believed that Protestant England was stronger and more earnest and more extensive in all its benevolent institutions and religious labours than ever before. He rejoiced that in this country the operations of the Bible Society, instead of meeting with any check or with any degree of decline, still prospered in the work of distributing the Word of God throughout the land. It was not the duty or the province of the chairman of a meeting to make what was called a speech, and he had sought for many years in his little addresses at public meetings to merit the blessing invoked by the woman who, on the conclusion of a meeting in England, said, "God bless the man who made the

short speech." He had no doubt that the speakers who were to follow would expound the principles and claims of this Society in a way he would not hope to rival.

Mr. Baldwin, the Permanent Secretary, then moved the adoption of the report, which will be found elsewhere.

Dr. Geikie seconded the motion, which was carried.

Mr C. A. Morse moved the following resolution:—"That thanks be given to the officers, committees, and collectors of the various branches throughout the country, to whose zeal and energy the Society is so much indebted, and that the following gentlemen be officers and directors for the ensuing year.—(See names, page 5.)

Rev. Dr. Robb seconded the resolution, which was carried.

W. H. Allen, LL.D., President of the American Bible Society, then addressed the meeting.

Mr. President and Gentlemen of the Upper Canada Bible Society.

When the Managers of the American Bible Society tendered me the honour of presenting their salutations to your Society, I requested them to send you a good platform speaker, in preference to one who is no orator; one who, like Moses, is slow of speech and of a slow tongue, however unlike him in other respects. I was the more desirous that such an one should be selected, that we might reciprocate the compliment which you paid us last year by sending us as your representative a very eloquent and brilliant speaker, to whom we listened with delight. But I was informed that your secretary had done me the honour to suggest my name as one that would be acceptable to your Society. I know no reason for so kind a suggestion, (unless it be that some forty years ago I invaded your city and carried off a subject of Her Majesty the Queen, and made her a sovereign in my own country. I am, therefore, not only your brother in Bible-work, but, in some sense, your brother-in-law.

I am happy to say, however, that the Pennsylvania Bible Society has remedied the mistake of the Managers of the Parent Society, by associating with me its worthy Secretary, a gentleman eloquent of speech.

If, then, you will accept the plain words of one who does not blow a silver trumpet, I have the pleasure to tender to you the fraternal greetings of the American Bible Society—a Society, second only, in age and the magnitude of its work, to the British and Foreign Bible Society. We salute you as brethren beloved—co-workers with us in distributing the Word of God among men; labouring, as we labour, for human emancipation, and civilization, and salvation; prosecuting with equal zeal, and as your report proves, with equal success, an enterprise unsurpassed in grandeur by any philanthropic effort of this nineteenth century.

At the recent Centennial Exposition in Philadelphia, where the Dominion of Canada made exhibits which gratified all visitors, and surprised many who had been previously uninformed of the productions and wealth of your country;—at that Exposition the British and Foreign united with the American Bible Society, and exhibited the Bible, or parts of the Bible, in two hundred languages.

Who can estimate the brain-work and hand-work of which that exhibit was the exponent? What time and study in the mastery of those two hundred languages preparatory to the work of translation! What thorough scholarship in making the translations! What anxiety to render the exact meaning of the Word of God! What critical scrutiny in the revision! What carefulness in the correction of the proof sheets! What fear to add to the Holy Book, or to subtract from it a single thought or shade of thought, lest God should "take away their part out of the book of life!" And when the

finished volume in each language and dialect, the work of ten, fifteen, or twenty years, was sent forth for distribution, what earnest prayers that God would bless the effort to send light to the dark places of the earth, and that his servants who go forth weeping, bearing precious seed, may come again with rejoicing, bringing their sheaves with them.

In this great enterprise the British and Foreign Society has taken the lead, and its younger sister, the American, has followed in the same path. Both have one object, one method, a similar system of auxiliaries and branches, and similar agencies for distribution at home and abroad; and I may add, both are determined to work on until every family on earth shall be supplied with a Bible, and shall be able to read it in their native tongue.

It is noteworthy that these two Societies print and distribute more Bibles every three years than the world contained at the beginning of the present century. And recently, as you know, the gates of countries which for ages had been closed and barred against the Bible, have swung wide open to receive it. Wherever commerce has found or made a way, the Bible has gone, the missionary has gone, the schoolmaster has gone, the printing press has gone, and the seeds of a better civilization have been sown beside all waters.

These societies do not limit their operations by geographical boundaries. Their field is the world. History informs us that the Pope divided all newly discovered countries between Spain and Portugal by a certain meridian. But the English and Dutch had no very profound respect for the title which His Holiness had given. They disputed his right to convey the world in fee simple. But these societies, with their thousands of auxiliaries, are dividing the nations between them by warrant of Him who said "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature." Experience has proved that the printed Word of God is the most effective of preachers. It is not only the armory from which the missionary draws his choicest weapons, it is the most successful of missionaries. It is itself the gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ. No burden of commentaries, no learned exegesis can make the ten commandments or the sermon on the mount one whit plainer to the common mind than the simple text itself.

Let me say further, that the Bible is not only the best of Gospel teachers to instruct men in the way of salvation, it is also the best of moral teachers. True, the book is not a systematic treatise on moral philosophy, but it tells men what they ought to do, and what they ought not to do, in their intercourse with one another. It commands what is right and forbids what is wrong, with divine authority. The Greek moralists set in order all the principles of their science, and illustrated them in language of Attic beauty; but they failed to check the progress of vice. They could instruct men how they ought to live, but could not persuade them to live as they ought. They held no warrant signed and sealed in the chancery of heaven. They offered no motives, either of hope of good, or fear of ill in the future life, which were powerful enough to check avarice, ambition, and lust. Like Macbeth, they who wished to sin, would "jump the life to come," if they could but escape the judgment here, "on this bank and shoal of time." The Bible, and the Bible only, confronts the temptation to sin with the retributions of Jehovah's law, and these reach forward to the eternal world.

Some twelve or fifteen years ago we had on the other side of your boundary what our newspapers allude to as "the late unpleasantness." It is true that many unpleasant things happened at that time in the States. To my unmilitary mind it was unpleasant to see a million men doing their utmost to kill one another. I never could highly appreciate the minstrel who consoled the dying Highland Chieftain by singing of his martial Clan Alpine,

" 'Twere worth ten years of peaceful life
One glance at their array."

But all was not unpleasantness. Along a line of a thousand miles no challenge of the sleepless cordon of sentinels repelled the incursions of the American Bible Society. With impartial hand that Society distributed the Word of God to Confederate and Union soldiers alike. And on a score of battle fields many a dying soldier of both parties clasped the precious gift to his heart while darkness was shrouding his eyes. In war as in peace, the Society knew no North, no South, no foe. It recognized both armies as composed of men created in the image of God, having similar hopes and fears, redeemed with the same blood, and pressing forward to the same eternity. The love of God was stronger than the hatred of men, and its "still small voice," unheard in the rush and din of battle, whispered to the hearts of the combatants in hours of silent reflection, "Ye are brethren, love one another." "If a man love not his brother whom he hath seen, how can he love God whom he hath not seen."

Pardon me, my friends, I am giving our Bible Society credit which belongs of right to the Bible. It was not the Society which had power to pass unchallenged through hostile lines; it was the Bible. The Bible carried the agents through, not the agents the Bible. Such is its power to-day, and such has been its power through the ages. It has conquered men who waged war against one another, and conquered men who waged war against it.

Some years ago literary scepticism tried to prove that no such city as ancient Troy ever existed; that there never was an angry Achilles, nor an arrogant Agamemnon, nor a wily Ulysses. Even "the blind old man of Scio's rocky isle" was not an individual; he was multiform. But the discoveries of Schliemann have battered down all such arguments with the solid shot of facts. In like manner religious scepticism has assailed the Bible in whole and in parts with all sorts of weapons drawn from the armories of literature and science. The subtleties of wit and logic, the brutalities of ignorance, and the polished shafts of learning have been hurled against it, but it has parried all blows and stands to-day unscathed in its divine integrity. Modern researches in Egypt, and Palestine, and on the sites of Babylon and Nineveh, have demonstrated the authenticity of much of the Old Testament history, and shed new light on some obscure passages of the Sacred Record.

Now, latest of all, our modern science, whether called cosmological, or geological, or biological, or anthropological, or any other names, till the Greek Lexicon is exhausted, enters the anti-biblical lists, marshals its array of fossil monsters, and sounds its notes of triumph. Mr. Huxley makes covert sneers at the Bible over the shoulders of John Milton, before an intelligent audience, and with subtle irony admires the marvellous flexibility of the Hebrew language, which admits such attempts as commentators have made to reconcile the cosmogony of the book of Genesis with discoveries in geology; and his intelligent audience laughed and applauded.

Professor Hækel, the German apostle of evolution, alleges that in all ages they who adhere to what he calls the monistic theory of the universe, that is, that the universe is *one*, pervaded by one force by which all phenomena are effects of causes acting under one universal law, are the only progressive and reformatory part of mankind. On the contrary, those who hold to the dualistic theory, that is, God and nature—God working in and through matter with an intelligent purpose and for a definite end, are the conservative, or rather the obstructive part of mankind, incapable of reform or progress.

I have no quarrel with Darwin's "law of natural selection," nor with Spencer's "survival of the fittest," nor with Huxley's and Hækel's theory of evolution so far as these have truth in them;—and like most theories they doubtless have some truth in them. But when Huxley declares that the evidence in favour of his theory is demonstrative, and that evolution rests on

as secure a basis of facts as the Copernican system ; and when Hækel discourses of law without a lawgiver, and ignores the existence of final causes, and makes some undefinable force in matter his efficient cause of all vegetable and animal forms, we are reminded of the poet Thomson's "critic fly whose feeble ray scarce spreads an inch around" giving its opinion of "a full-proportioned dome on swelling columns heaved," and explaining how the dome raised itself up according to law, but without a lawgiver, by a certain polarity of its atoms, and for no purpose, use, or end, unless it were for the critic fly to speculate upon.

No, no, when we admit a universal law we must accept a universal Lawgiver ; one who sees the end from the beginning. Then the monism of Hækelian skepticism becomes the dualism of Christian faith. Call this Lawgiver by whatever name you please, he is one and the same, the SUPREME. Among the Hindoos he was the Underived, the Being without a beginning, the First Life ; among the Persians the First Light ; among the Hebrews, the Self-existent, the I AM ; among the Greeks, the First Intelligence. It was reserved for the Anglo-Saxon tongue to give a more endearing name to the Supreme Being, the Good, the First Good. He is what all these terms imply, and more, for "who by searching can find out God ? Who can find out the Almighty to perfection ?" He is the First Life and the giver of life ; the First Light and the dispenser of light ; the self-existent source of all being ; the First Intelligence, author of all intellect and reason, of whom wisdom was born ; and best name of all, the Good,—expressing the Christian belief that God is love, the well-spring of love and blessing, who has revealed to us his will and our duty in this sacred volume, who has made it possible to restore in us the divine image in which man was created, but which sin has defaced, and who cheers us in the scenes of earthly trial and conflict, with the full assurance that this corruptible shall put on incorruption, and this mortal shall put on immortality. "For God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten son, that whosoever believeth in him might not perish, but have everlasting life."

Rev. W. H. Tilley, rector of the Memorial Church, London, Ont., said :—

After listening to the interesting speech of our dear friend and brother from the other side of the lines, I am sure that this meeting will welcome a resolution which takes up the noble society of which he is the honored President, and after making it join hands with its older and its younger sister, thanks God for all that He has done through their united instrumentality. I have therefore much pleasure in moving the following resolution—"That this meeting rejoices and desires to thank God for all that He has done through the British and Foreign Bible Society, the American Bible Society, and our own Society, in spreading His Holy Scriptures. At the same time they desire to remember the immense number of mankind still without the life-giving Word, and they trust that Canadians will show themselves ready to do their share in the work of disseminating the Bible, which work God appears so largely to have committed to the British and American people."

You all remember, dear friends, the deep excitement that pervaded this country during the winter of 1861, when an untoward incident threatened to disturb the peace and harmony which always should exist between the British and American people. I was then living on the seaboard and saw the different regiments arrive, intended for the defence of Canada. There were the choicest household troops, regiments of guards, batteries of artillery, and veteran corps that had won laurels in almost every quarter of the globe. But you also remember that with these old historic troops there was also a young and modern corps called the Military Train, to which was committed an important branch of the service.

Now, Mr. Chairman, the Society under whose auspices we are met this evening has not the divine origin, the apostolic commission, the grand associations of the Church of Christ. Strictly speaking, it cannot claim the memories of Wycliff, or Tyndal, or Cranmer, to whom more than to any others the readers of the English Bible are indebted. But when, about the beginning of the present century, English-speaking Christians began to realize God's purpose in establishing the Christian Church, that it was to be the little leaven leavening the whole lump, when they began to organize in determined war against the powers of darkness and error, then the British and Foreign Bible Society had its birth. It was natural for those who believed the Word of God to be the sword of the Spirit and mighty through God to the pulling down of strongholds—on principles of military economy and efficiency it was natural—not to burden infant missionary associations with the task of translating and printing and circulating the Word, but that an army corps should be formed to whom this work should be committed.

I should like, Mr. Chairman, to have gathered some statistics as to how far all English-speaking Protestant Missions are indebted for the supply of the Word of the Spirit to the three societies mentioned in the resolution. This has been beyond my reach, but this much I have been able to discover, that the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, formed at the beginning of the last century and ~~carrying~~ carrying on missionary operations in twenty-five languages and dialects, depends on the B. & F. B. S. for seventeen, and the Church Missionary Society, dating from the commencement of the present century, and using forty different languages, is indebted to the Society in no less than thirty-six cases. Allowing for those languages which are common to both, I find that the two great Missionary Societies of the Church of England, carrying on missionary operations in fifty-five languages, look, in the performance of their work, to this Society for translations of the Holy Scriptures in no less than forty-six different tongues; and, as a clergyman of that church, I am thankful that I am permitted to stand here and express our great obligations, and I take it that if each of the brethren upon this platform, who may have information to which I have not access, could speak concerning the operations of their respective denominations, it would be found that at least a similar proportion, or three-fourths of all the missionary work, depends for its supply of the written Word upon the societies whose names are coupled together in this resolution. When, therefore, we are asked to thank God for what he has done through this instrumentality, we are not only to think of the cheapness of Bibles and Testaments among ourselves, though that is much, nor yet merely of work done in circulating by means of colporteurs, though that is more. We may go forth to India with Carey, and Marshman, and Duff; we may sail through the isles of the Pacific with Williams and Patteson; we may watch the work of Samuel Marsden in New Zealand, or Golgiby in Ceylon, or Hunt and his associates in Fiji; we may follow the steps of Moffat or Crowther in Africa. Aye, as Canadians looking at work done in our own Dominion, we may go out to the plains of the Saskatchewan where McDougall fought and fell, or to the banks of the McKenzie where Bishop Bompas toils in his self-made exile, or to the shores of the Arctic Sea where McDonald watches over his Tukudh flock, or to the coasts of Hudson Bay where Kirkby is sowing the seed, and in each case we may feel that the Bible Society has a share in the grand ingathering of souls.

But this is only one aspect of the Society's work. Last Autumn at a missionary meeting in the City of Philadelphia, I had the pleasure of meeting some representatives of the "Church of Jesus" in Mexico. So little is known of the reformation in that land, that I may be permitted here briefly to refer to it. With the Spanish conqueror came the Roman priest

and the Spanish inquisitor. The religion of the country speedily changed, but with the tact which Rome so often displays, the change for the poor Mexican was made as easy as possible. In many cases it consisted in substituting the image of the Virgin for some Aztec deity which had stood in the temple niche before, and for three centuries spiritual darkness prevailed. By and bye new political ideas were borrowed from the United States, and when an attempt was made to seat Maximilian upon the throne, advantage was taken, and the Scriptures in the Spanish tongue were introduced. They fell into the hands of the priests, and a work like that in the convent at Erfurth was the result. The first teachers of the new faith were priests who had renounced the old, and the Church of Jesus in Mexico to-day, with its martyrs, its fifty-seven congregations, its noble old church of San José de Gracia (now a Protestant place of worship) its theological school, (formerly the Convent of San Antonio Abad) is an instance, and a remarkable one, of what God is pleased to do by means of the circulation of His Word.

I confess, Mr. Chairman, that I have no sympathy with those who refuse to assist Bible Societies because the Church must go first, or with those who decline to send the missionary because they trust to the circulation of the word. We must send the living voice, for Christ has said, 'preach the Gospel to every creature.' We must give the copy of the written revelation, for the same high authority has said 'search the scriptures.' What God has joined together, let not man put asunder. Sometimes it pleases the Almighty to plant by means of the ministry, and water by a later gift of the Bible, as in the cases of the Apostolical Churches founded while the canon of the New Testament was being completed. Sometimes it pleases God to lay the foundation, as in Mexico, by the simple reading of His Book, and to build up by the later teaching of the ministry. In the one case or in the other, if the work is to be permanent, there must be access to the oracles in the vernacular of the people, and if we believe that missionary enterprises are still in their infancy, if we feel that the souls already won are only the heavy drops that precede the refreshing shower, we must see to it that this important branch of the Church's service is still more efficiently equipped for its work.

The Resolution, which speaks of the duty of Canadians assisting in this effort, alludes to the vast influence of the British and American people. I presume that there is no one here who regards that influence as accidental. If God's hand is visible anywhere it is in history. I want you to notice it at one particular time. How was it that during the first century the Gospel of Christ met with such marvellous success. Because (we speak it reverently) God had made great preparations for its extension. He chose but one particular nation to whom He revealed Himself, and when the time came for spreading the monotheistic idea which He had communicated to them, they were scattered among the idolatrous nations, carrying with them His written word. Then, a few centuries before the Christian era there came the glory of the Grecian monarchy; only for a day it lasted, but leaving in its decay the rich and widespread language in which for all time the Gospel was to be written, and in which through much of Europe, Asia, and Africa, it could be preached and understood. There was one element more in God's fulness of times. If the Babel voices were in a measure stilled before the almost universal tongue of Greece, so, when the Roman Empire arose, the multitude of petty rival nations became blended into one great civil power, and through the world thus united and made accessible, by means of a widespread language, to a people among whom had been planted the fundamental thought of all true religion—the knowledge of one true God—the Gospel of Christ began its triumphs. Is it for no purpose that God seems to be combining now the same three elements of influence. To the Anglo-Saxon is committed the political power of the

present century. The United States and Canada have to themselves almost the whole of this northern continent, and from a Christian standpoint they only represent one power; for, if we never felt it before, the presence of our friends here this evening shows us that the Niagara River does not sever Christian sympathy. England stands in the forefront of European nations; her Queen is the Empress of 180,000,000 heathen and Mohammedan subjects, and beyond this, Sir Charles Dilke has taught us to look for a 'Greater Britain.' What a marvellous power is this? With an organization like the British and Foreign Bible Society, the question of *language* is not as important as it was 1,800 years ago, but surely it is a noticeable thing that in so many countries the language of these British and American people is spoken and understood. And then lastly, but by no means the least important is the fact that what the Jews were before Christ as the conservators of a pure religion for the world, this mighty and widespread people to a great extent is now. To them are committed the oracles of God. Among them are the strongest and purest branches of the Church of Christ. From them have gone forth the most determined and successful missionary enterprises. It is a solemn thing to have entrusted to us the responsibility of worldly power and spiritual knowledge, and we may be sure that if we do not use them for God's glory, great will be our loss and curse. I have no need to enlarge upon this, but will simply tell you what I once heard from an old Christian Indian, and which I have ever since thought of as illustrating the economy, the political wisdom, of Christian Missions.

Some four years ago, a deputation from the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States, was appointed to inspect the Indian Mission in the west. They happened to pass through London while our Synod was in session, and were present at a social meeting held during the week. We had among our number three clergymen—Indians, who, with their lay delegates, made up a band of nearly a dozen. With their old love of speech-making they proposed an address, and the old man who was chosen spokesman, tendered most affectionately their greetings to their red brethren in the west. He then very touchingly alluded to the tales of bloodshed that were coming from the far west, and compared the struggles of years on that side of the border with the peace and harmony on Canadian soil. Then turning to the leading member of the deputation, he said, "Ah, sir, you did not send the Indian the Gospel early enough." Some time after, Mr. Chairman, I was looking over some old Bible Society records, and I found that during the first year of the Society's existence, when her income amounted to only a few hundred pounds, a grant had been made towards translating the Gospel into the language of the Six Nation Indians on the Grand River, in Upper Canada. That tribe was largely represented at the time this incident took place, and I felt that the old Indian was right, it *pays* socially and naturally to scatter the Word. If you, dear friends, are of the same mind, let us from feelings of political wisdom, as well as from loyalty to Christ, thank God for what He has been pleased to do, and at the same time seek to be used in even greater triumphs of love.

Mr. W. Kennedy seconded the motion, which was carried.

A collection was then taken up, and the hymn "Let everlasting glories crown," was sung.

Rev. Dr. Torrance then moved the following resolution:—"That believing the Holy Scriptures to be still, as in the past, God's chief means of making men wise unto salvation, and believing also that Bible Societies are pre-eminently adapted to bring all Christians of every nation into closer bonds of charity, and make them more successful in spreading the Word of God, we hereby pledge ourselves as a meeting to more earnest support of these

Societies." After some introductory remarks he referred to Dr. Allen's connection with Girard College, and to the fact that notwithstanding the efforts made at the inception of that institution by the apostles of "modern culture" to exclude the Bible from its teachings, that Book was now an accepted text book within its walls. The devotees of modern science asked that the Bible should be cast aside, but they gave them no other standard of religion or morals in its place—nothing but a set of dry scientific theories, which were but huaks to the hungry soul. The ever-changing beauties of the seasons never raised the soul of the infidel "from nature up to nature's God;" they never aroused in him those thoughts which enable the Christian to see in all the glories of nature the hand of a Divine Father. Nor was the death-bed of the atheist calculated to produce a feeling of admiration for his creed, as it was a leap into the dark, uncheered by the bright hopes that accompanied the Christian in his passage across the river of death. He proceeded to give some statistics showing the immense progress made by the various Bible Societies of the world in distributing the Scriptures among the nations of the earth, and remarked that there now were few languages or dialect in which the Bible was not printed. If the Czar of Russia were to make Constantinople his capital to-day, he would find there a Bible Society, and a Bible House erected by the concentrated efforts of the British and American Societies, and aided by the contributions of Christians generally. He referred also to the unsuccessful attempts made at the Centennial Exhibition to keep the grounds and buildings open to the public on the Sabbath day, and said that these efforts had been made by the scepticism of the United States. He also dwelt upon the far-reaching effects of the display of Bibles at the Centennial Exhibition, remarking that already it had led to inquiries from many parts of the globe. He concluded by extending to the Upper Canada Bible Society the cordial greetings of the American body.

Rev. W. W. Ross seconded the motion, which was carried.

Hon. W. McMaster, seconded by Dr. Hodgins, moved, "That the hearty thanks of this meeting be presented to the Rev. Alex. Topp, D.D. and the trustees of Knox Church, for its use on Sabbath evening last, and to the Very Rev. Principal Caven, D.D., for the instructive sermon which he preached in the interests of the Society on that occasion." Carried.

Rev. J. M. Cameron, seconded by Vice-Chancellor Blake, moved "That the hearty thanks of this meeting be presented to the pastor and trustees of this Church for its use on the present occasion, and to the organist and choir for their valuable services in connection with this annual meeting." Carried.

The proceedings closed with the doxology and benediction.
