LIGHT HOUSES.

Board of Commissioners for the several Light Houses in the Bay of Fundy.

Cape Sable Seal Island Light.—The first Light in approaching the Bay of Fundy, is on the South Point of the Seal Island. This is a plain white Light, elevated about 80 feet above high water mark, and may be seen in approaching the Island from any point of the compass. A very dangerous rock, under water, but upon which the sea always breaks, called *Blonde Rock*, lies about $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. by W. by compass, from the Light House. Between this rock and the Island, there are some dangers—the ground is rocky throughout, and large vessels, therefore, ought not to attempt passing between them.

Brier Island Light.—In advancing up the Bay, the next Light is situated on Brier Island, about half a mile N. E. from the N. W. point thereof. A plain white light.

Digby Gut Light.—The next light on the coast of Nova Scotia is placed on the west side of Digby Gut—from Brier Island North Eastward. The coast is very bold and not indented; the Light is therefore chiefly intended as a Guide into Digby Basin. A white light.

Gannet Rock Light.—This Light is intended to warn vessels of their approach to a very dangerous range of shoales and ledges, which extend from the Old Proprietor to the Seal Islands off Machias, a distance of about twenty miles. It is a flash light—*white*—twenty seconds dark and forty light in each minute. The Light House is painted in stripes, vertical, black and white.

Bearings and Distances by Compass from the Gannet Rock Light House.

The Light bears from the Light house on Brier Island, N. N. $\frac{3}{4}$ W. 22 miles

From the Gannet Rock to the Old Proprietor E. $\frac{1}{2}$ S. distance 7 miles.

From the Gannet Rock to the Black Rock, off White Head Island, N. E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E. 7 miles.

From the Gannet Rock to the South West Head of Grand Manan, N. N. W. $6\frac{1}{2}$ miles.

From the Gannet Rock to the Northernmost of the Murr Ledges, N. W. $\frac{1}{2}$ N. $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles.

To the Southermost of ditto, called St. Mary's Ledge, W. S. W. 2 miles.

From the Gannet Rock to Machias Seal Island, W. and by N. $\frac{1}{2}$ N. 13 miles.

NOTE.—Between the Northernmost and Southermost of the Murr Ledges, there is a range of dangerous rocks and shoals, many of them always above water, and which extends Westward from the Light House about four miles; from this range, farther Westerly, about six miles from the Gannet Light, lies a dangerous breaker called the Bull. This may be avoided by keeping 3 remarkable headlands near the S. W. end of Grand Manan open.

From Brier Island Light to Old Proprietor, N. and by W. $\frac{1}{4}$ W. $18\frac{1}{2}$ miles.

The Blonde Rock from the Southermost point of the Cape Sable Seal Island, S. and by W. $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles distant.

Machias Seal Island Lights.—There are two fixed *white* lights upon the Machias Seal Islands, elevated about forty-five feet above high water, and bear from each other E. S. E. and W. N. W. distant about 200 feet, by which circumstance of two Light Houses at the same station, they will be immediately distinguished from all other lights upon the coast, (British or American) Both the Buildings are painted white. The following are the bearings from them, viz:—

To the Southernmost Murr Ledge, (St. Mary's) E. S. E. easterly.

“ Gannet Rock Light, E. by S. $\frac{1}{4}$ S. 13 miles.

“ Southern Head of Grand Manan, E. by N. $\frac{1}{2}$ N.

“ Northern Head of Grand Manan, N. E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E.

“ N. E. Rock, distant 2 miles, N. E. by N.

“ Little River Head, N. by W.

“ Libby Island Light House, (American), N. W. by W.

Vessels standing to the Northward, between these Lights and the Gannet Rock, should tack or haul off the moment they bring these Lights in one, as they will not then be more than three fourths of a mile from the Murr Ledges, if more than five miles to the East of the lights.

[It is recommended that the Ship's Compasses should be well compared and adjusted (particularly in new ships,) before they leave Partridge Island, as serious errors have frequently occurred from want of attention on this point; and as the variation in the Bay of Fundy is seventeen degrees Westerly, or ($1\frac{1}{2}$ points) it will be found by the latest published Admiralty Charts, that the course from Partridge Island down the Bay (South Channel) between the Old Proprietor, and N. W. Ledge, is S. W. $\frac{1}{2}$ S., but the course to be steered must depend on the direction of the wind on leaving Partridge Island.]

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Head Harbour Light.—Next in order after passing Grand Manan and the plain white Light, (American) on West Quoddy Point, is Head Harbour Light. This is placed on the North East extremity of Campo Bello, and is a guide to vessels entering the main Channel to West Isles, Moose Island, and the inner Bay of Passamaquody; it enables vessels also at all times to enter Head Harbour—it is a fixed *white* light. The building is painted white, with a red cross on it.

Point Le Preau Lights.—Upon this projecting head land two lights are placed, one above the other, in the same house, and distant 28 feet—Both lights can be seen from every point of the compass, where they may be useful—both are fixed and *white*. The Light House is painted red and white, in stripes of five feet broad each, horizontally.

Partridge Island Light.—This light at the entrance of the River and Harbour of Saint John, having been established upwards of forty years, requires no particular notice, further than that it is a fixed *white* light, and that the Light House is red and white, in vertical stripes.

A *Fog Horn* or Steam Whistle (the first of the kind ever used for this purpose) was placed on Partridge Island, near the Light House, in Sept. 1860, and is sounded at intervals of 10 seconds in every minute, during the prevalence of Fogs and Snow Storms. The whistle can be distinctly heard at a distance of four to six miles.

There is also a *Bell Buoy* anchored at extremity of the Ledge at the eastern end of the Island, which is very useful to vessels in thick or rough weather. The sound of the Bell can be heard three miles distant.

Beacon Light.—Within Partridge Island, and upon a Spit or Bar which extends about half a mile S. S. E. off Sand Point, and which dries at two thirds ebb, stands the Beacon Tower. Upon this Tower a light is established, which is eminently useful to the coasting trade of Saint John, and to all other vessels having pilots on board, as it enables them to enter the harbour at all hours of the night. A fixed *white* light. The house is white and black, in stripes vertically.

Quaco.—A revolving *white* light is placed on a small rock off Quaco Head, showing twice full and twice dark in a minute. This light can be seen from any quarter where a vessel can approach. The Light House is painted white and red in horizontal stripes.

Cape Enrage Light.—On the point of that name, in Westmorland, nearly opposite Apple River Harbour, N. S. A plain *white* light. The House is painted white, and is about 120 feet above tide mark.

West Quoddy Light.—This is an American Light, and is placed on the West side of the entrance into the Saint Croix by Lubec and Eastport.

Cape Forchu Light.—On Cape Forchu, on the western side of the entrance to Yarmouth (Nova Scotia,) in lat. 43, 39, N. long. 66, S. W. It exhibits a plain revolving light—visible one minute and a quarter, and invisible half a minute. The building is painted white and is elevated 135 feet above the level of the sea.

Grindstone Island Light.—An Octagonal Tower, sixty feet above the level of high water on Grindstone Island in Chignecto Bay, in lat. 45° 43' 13" N. long. 64° 37' 25" W. The Tower is painted white, as is also the Keeper's house, one story, situate about 50 feet to the Eastward of the Tower.

Bearings and distances of several places from the above Light House, as follows:—

Cape Enrage Light by compass, S. 61½ W. 10 1-7 miles.

Highest point of St. Mary's Ledge by compass, N. 40 W., 6-10 miles.

The point of low water off the Light House, by compass, S. 78 W., 2-10 mile.

Jones' Ledge, N. 10 W., 3-10 mile, it dries at low springs and has about 2½ fathoms on it at half tide.

The Sand Bank, S. 15 W., 3-10 mile, it has 1½ fathoms on its shoalest part at low water Springs.

Grand Manan.—There is a Light House and Keeper's House at the "Swallow Tail" on the North Eastern part of the Island of Grand Manan, in the Bay of Fundy. The Light is 45 feet from Base to Deck; the point on which it stands is 103 feet above high water, making 148 feet elevation. This is a conspicuous mark in the South Channel between Brier Island and Grand Manan. Both Houses are painted white.

Richibucto Head Light.—This is a fixed White Light, situated on Richibucto Head, Northumberland Strait, in the Gulf of Saint Lawrence. The light is placed at an elevation of 70 feet above high water, and should be seen in clear weather from a distance of 14 miles. The illuminating apparatus is dioptric or by lenses of the fourth order. The tower is square, about 50 feet high from base to vane, painted white, and stands in lat. 46° 39' 40" N., long. 64° 43' 30" W. of Greenwich.

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Signals Displayed at Partridge Island,

ON THE APPROACH OF VESSELS TO THE HARBOUR OF ST. JOHN.

- One Ball close, for one square-rigged vessel.
 One Ball half-hoisted, for two square-rigged vessels.
 Two Balls close, for three square-rigged vessels.
 Two Balls separated, for four square-rigged vessels.
 A Pendant of any color, for five square-rigged vessels.
 A Pendant, under a Ball, for six square-rigged vessels.
 A Pendant, over a Ball half hoisted, for seven square-rigged vessels.
 A Pendant, under two Balls close, for eight square-rigged vessels.
 A Pendant, between two Balls separate, for nine square-rigged vessels.
 A Flag of any color, for ten or more square-rigged vessels.

The above are displayed at the East or West yard-arm, according to the direction in which the vessels are at first observed, and as soon as their rig can be distinguished descriptive colors will be hoisted at the mast-head, in the following order :

- A Union Jack, for a Flag Ship, with or without a squadron.
 " " with a Red Pendant over, for a two-decker.
 " " with a Blue Pendant over, for a Frigate.
 " " with a White Pendant over, for a small armed vessel.
 A Blue Pendant, for a Merchant Ship.
 A Red Pendant, for a Merchant Brig.
 A White and Blue Pendant, for a Foreign vessel.
 A White Pendant, without a Ball, for a Topsail Schooner or Sloop.
 A Blue Flag, pierced White, for a Steamboat from St. Andrews or Eastport.
 A Red Flag, pierced White, for a Steamboat from Digby.
 A Red Flag, with a White Square, for a Steamboat from Boston.
 A Ball at the mast-head, vessel is on shore or in distress.

Rates of Pilotage.

Established by a Law or Ordinance of the Common Council of the City of Saint John.

One Dollar per foot, for bringing any Ship or Vessel into the Harbor of Saint John, and mooring her into a safe place or berth, or securing her alongside of one of the Wharves; and \$1 per foot for removing and taking any Ship or Vessel out of the Harbor.

In case where Pilots shall be detained on board of Vessels, under and by Virtue of the Quarantine or Health Laws of the Province, they shall be entitled to demand and receive from Masters of such Vessels, the sum of \$2 per day, for every day of such detention, in addition to the allowance aforesaid.

Coasting Vessels, going from one part of the Bay of Fundy to another, British Steam Boats, or British Vessels drawing under six feet of water, are not compelled to take pilots; when employed, they are to be paid according to the rate above mentioned.

For removing Vessels from any mooring ground to any Wharf, or from one Wharf to another Wharf, and seeing them properly moored or secured, the following rates: For Vessels not exceeding One Hundred Tons, \$1 50c.; for Vessels over One Hundred and not exceeding Two Hundred Tons, \$2; for Vessels over Two Hundred and not exceeding Three Hundred Tons, \$3; and for all Vessels over Three Hundred Tons, and not exceeding Four Hundred Tons, \$4; and 25c. for every Fifty Tons such Vessel may measure over Four Hundred Tons.

First Distance.—From Partridge Island to Musquash Cove Head, bearing Northwest, \$1 per foot.

Second Distance.—From Musquash Head to Point LePreaux, bearing Northwest, \$1.25 per foot.

Third Distance.—From Point LePreaux to North Head of Grand Manan, bearing North West—or North Channel, bearing South East, \$1 50c. per foot.

Fourth Distance.—From the North Head of Grand Manan—or North Channel as aforesaid—to Machias Seal Island, bearing South or Brier Island bearing South-Southeast, \$1.75 per foot.

Fifth District.—Any where outside the aforesaid distance, \$2 per foot.

Harbour Master's Fees.

On Vessels of 30 Tons and under 50, 50c.; Vessels of 50 Tons and under 75, 75c.; 75 and under 100 tons, \$1.; 100 and under 150 tons, \$1 25; 150 and under 200 tons, \$1 50; 200 and under 300 tons, \$2; 300 and under 400 tons, \$2 50; 400 and upwards, \$3; Decked Vessels under 100 tons, owned and registered at Saint John, and all British Vessels under that tonnage trading within the Bay of Fundy, or arriving from Ports to the Northward of Cape Cod, or the Westward of Cape Canso, or from any Port in Nova Scotia, to pay annually as follows; Under 30 tons, 75c.; over 30 and under 50 tons, \$1; over 50 and under 75 tons, \$1 20; over 75 and under 80 tons, \$2.

Rates of Wharfage.

For every Decked Vessel, or Woodboat, of the burthen of 40 tons and under, 30c. per day; above 40 tons, and under 50, 35c.; above 50 and under 60, 40c.; above 60, and under 70, 45c.; above 70, and under 80, 50c.; above 80, and under 90, 55c.; above 90, and under 100, 60c.; above 100, and under 120, 70c.; above 120, and under 150, 80c.; above 150 and under 180, 90c.; above 180, and under 200, \$1; above 200, and under 220, \$1 10; above 220, and under 240, \$1 20; above 240, and under 260, \$1 30; above 260, and under 280, \$1 40; above 280, and under 300, \$1 50; above 300, and under 320, \$1 60; above 320, and under 340, \$1 70; above 340, and under 360, \$1 80; above 360, and under 380, \$1 90; above 380, and under 400, \$2; above 400, and under 450, \$2 25; above 450, and under 500, \$2 50; and 25c. for every additional 50 tons.

The Court of Chancery was abolished, and the Master of the Rolls appointed a Judge of the Supreme Court, by Act of Assembly 17 Vict. c. 67. All causes heretofore cognizable by the Court of Chancery are to be determined in the "Equity side of the Supreme Court."

LETTER RATES.

The postage on letters mailed in New Brunswick, addressed to any place within the Province, is 5c. per half oz. if prepaid; if not prepaid, it is 7c. On letters to all parts of the United States the postage is 10c. per half oz.

Letters to and from England, per Cunard packets via Halifax, are charged 6d. sterling or 12½ cents currency per ½ oz., and via New York, 8d. sterling or 17 cents currency per ½ oz., if prepaid. If mailed unpaid they are charged 6d. sterling additional on delivery.

Letters to and from England, per Canadian packets via Quebec, are charged 6d. sterling or 12½ cents currency per ½ oz.; and via Portland, 8d. sterling or 17 cents currency per ½ oz., if prepaid. If mailed unpaid they are charged 6d. sterling additional on delivery.

REGISTRATION.

The system of registration is applicable to all description of letters without distinction, whether they contain articles of value or not. It also applies to parcels. The charge, in addition to postage, is 5 cents when prepaid; and 10 cents, in addition to postage, when unpaid. The charge for registration of letters for the United Kingdom is 12½ cents.

PARCELS.

Parcels closed at the ends and sides can be sent by mail, throughout the Province, at a rate of 25 cents per lb. The weight of each parcel is not to exceed 3 lbs., nor the size to exceed 1 foot in length or breadth, or 6 inches in thickness. The parcel must not contain any glass, liquid, nor any substance liable to do injury to the mail, under the penalty of a forfeiture of the parcel if discovered. The parcel is not to contain any writing. Registration fee 5 cents. Parcels must be pre-paid by stamps. The sender, by writing his name on the outside, can have the parcel returned in case of failure to reach the person addressed.

NEWSPAPERS AND PERIODICALS.

Newspapers published in the Province, as well as transient papers, are forwarded through the Provinces, and to England (via Halifax), free of postage. If sent to England by way of the United States, the postage (2 cents) is collected at their destination.

NEWSPAPERS TO OR FROM ENGLAND.

If by way of Halifax, per Cunard steamer, free. By way of the United States, 2 cents each on delivery, being the American transit charge.

BOOKS, PERIODICALS, PRINTED MATTER, &c.

The above pass through the Post Office free, if under 2 oz. in weight, if 2 oz. or upwards, at the rate of 1 cent per oz., and must be prepaid.

All Printed Books, Magazines, Reviews, Pamphlets, or Packets of Patterns, Newspapers, or other matter, intended for transmission by Post be-

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tween New Brunswick and the United Kingdom, must be restricted to two feet in length, and one foot in width and depth.

Printed circulars, in unsealed envelopes, not exceeding $\frac{1}{2}$ oz., are charged 1 cent each, and must be prepaid. Circulars from other countries are liable to a tax of 1 cent each, which is collected on delivery.

POSTAGE STAMPS.

Postage stamps are provided at the respective values of 1 cent for circulars; 2 cents for drop letters; 5 cents for ordinary Provincial letters; 10 cents for United States rate; $12\frac{1}{2}$ cents per Cunard steamer, via Halifax; 17 cents, via United States, for England.

During the week ending 1st Aug., 1865, 18,248 letters passed through the Post Office in the city of St. John, N. B., and 34,519 newspapers.

When Money Orders exceeding \$100 in aggregate amount, are issued in one day and to the same person, by one or more offices upon another office, the Postmaster of the office drawn upon (if necessary) may delay the payment of such Orders for six days.

All Money Orders shall be drawn upon printed forms supplied by the Post Office Department; and no Order will be valid or payable unless given upon the regular printed forms.

Persons applying for Money Orders will be required to state the particulars upon a Form of Application provided for that purpose. Parties procuring Money Orders should examine them carefully, to see that they are properly filled up and stamped. This caution will appear sufficiently important when it is understood that an Order defective in any important respect will throw difficulties in the way of its payment.

Postmasters will not pay an order to a second person without the written endorsement of the Payee thus:—“Pay to the Order of — (the name of the second person to fill the blank) for value received.”

The Commission charged for Money Orders, drawn and payable in New Brunswick, is as follows:—

TOP-WHARFAGE LAW.

An Act to continue and amend an Act to regulate Dockage, Wharfage and Cranage in the City of St. John and in the Parish of Portland.—Passed 12th April, 1855.

The above to be paid each trip, and if any such Vessel remains over six days, an additional duty to be paid of from 50c. to \$1 daily, according to the burthen. Other Boats and Vessels without decks, and having fixed or standing masts, and all Scows, to pay 30c. each trip and 30c. additional per day, if suffered to remain over three days.

RATES OF TOLLS FOR CROSSING THE SAINT JOHN SUSPENSION BRIDGE.

For every foot passenger, (excepting children under five years of age)' 4c.; horse, mare, gelding, mule, ass, ox, cow, or other large animal, 7c each; elephant or camels, 50c.; carriages, sleigh, waggon, cart, sled, or other vehicle, drawn by one horse or beast of draught with one person, with or without load, 13c., horse or beast of draught, more than one, with a carriage or other vehicle, 7c. each; sheep, calf, hog, or goat, 1c.

TIME FOR GOING THROUGH THE FALLS.

(NEAR ST. JOHN.)

The Falls are level or still water at or about three and a half hours on the *flood*, and about two and a half on the *ebb*, so that they are passable four times in 24 hours, about 10 or 15 minutes each time. No other rule can be given, as much depends on the floods in the River Saint John, and the time of high water or full sea, which is often hastened by high winds, and in proportion to the height of them.

RATES AT THE PUBLIC WEIGHING MACHINES.

Every load not exceeding One Thousand Pounds Weight, One Shilling; and One Penny for every additional Hundred Weight; payable, half by the seller, and half by the purchaser.

HACKNEY COACH FARES.

For conveying one passenger from any public stand to any part of the City, or from any one part of the City to any other part thereof, 20c. ; and for every passenger exceeding one, 10c. additional; and if any driver, of any Carriage or other vehicle, shall be detained at any place by any passenger, or shall make any agreement for carrying any passenger by the hours, he shall be entitled to ask, and receive the following rates, viz :— For any time not exceeding half an hour, 25c. ; and in that proportion for every half hour that such Carriage, or other vehicle shall be detained or employed. Provided always, that in case any driver shall be required to cross the Ferry to Carleton, he shall, in addition to the foregoing fares, be entitled to demand and receive the ferriage for himself, his carriage and horses, both going and returning.

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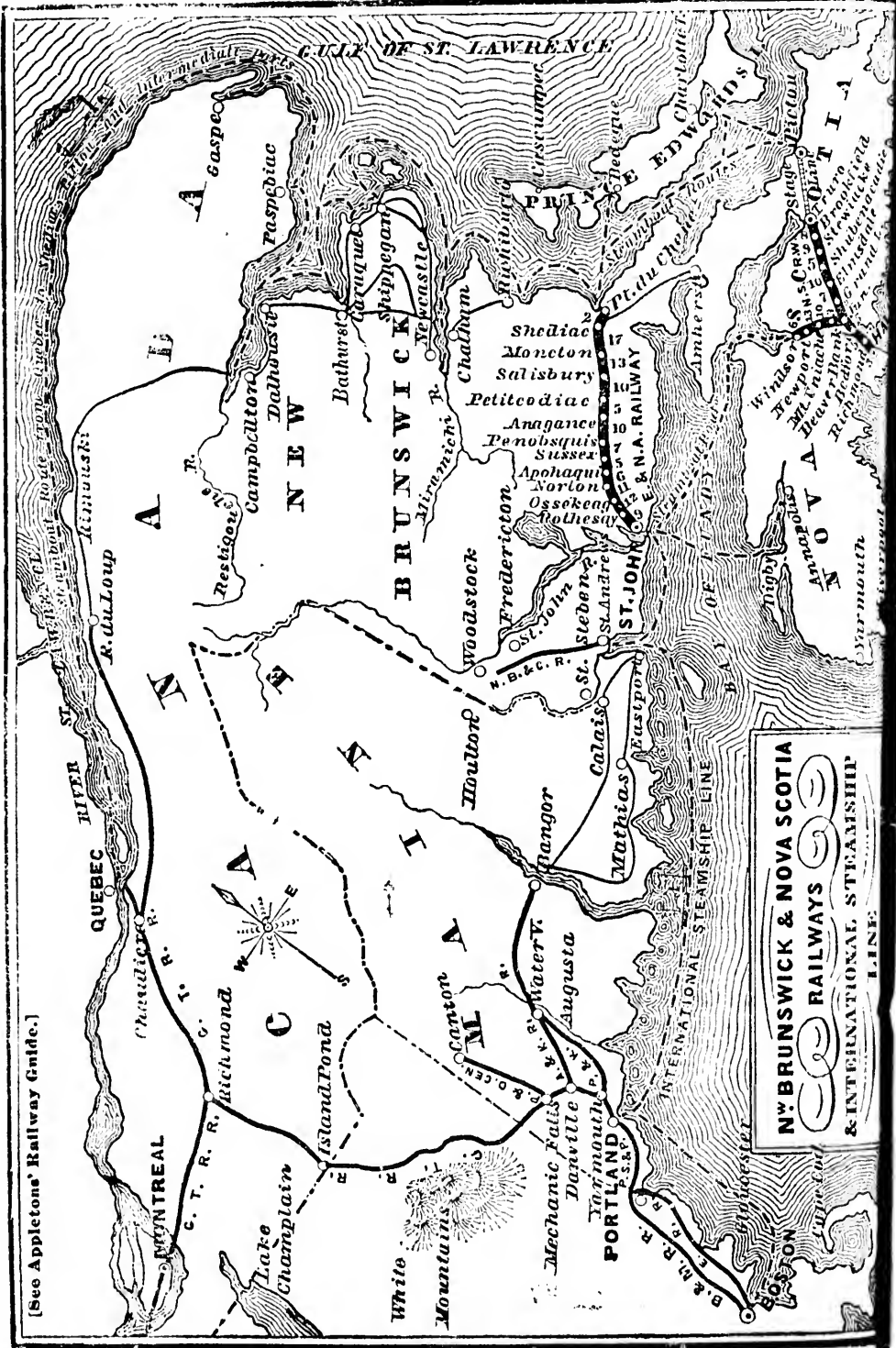

This Line of Railway connects the City of St. John, on the Bay of Fundy with Shediac, on the Gulf of St. Lawrence. It is 108 miles in length, and is considered the best and most perfectly constructed Railway in America. Trains pass daily each way, between the Termini, and an additional Train runs daily throughout the year, to and from Sussex.

From Moncton, 93 miles from St. John, travellers are conveyed daily, by four-horse coaches, 100 miles to Truro, and thence, 64 miles, by railway to Halifax, Nova Scotia.

HINTS TO FARMERS.

January.

Winter is the Farmer's seed-time for ideas. When the labors of the year press, and the mind is oppressed with the daily and hourly details of farm work, and the management of hands, many an idea occurs to one which he must wait until Winter to develop and inform himself upon. His mind may then be freshly enriched from books and contact with other minds, and is in a fit state for the profitable development of the thought-germs gathered during his season of labor.

AGRICULTURAL READING—Place at least one good farmer's paper, better three or four, upon your centre table in the sitting room. Encourage every member of the family to read. Keep a pleasant fire, bright light and quiet there, so that every one may read who will. The little it costs will be a most profitable investment. But rather those books which treat thoroughly of one subject, than those which profess to contain a little of almost every thing in small compass.

CATTLE—Feed no more than you can keep well. Give good bedding to all. Keep milch cows and fattening cattle still; they need little or no exercise. Young stock and working oxen should spend some hours daily in the open air unless it is very stormy, but when stabled should be warm and comfortable. Never feed on the ground, but in racks. Cattle kept in yards, (a poor practice at best) should have roomy and warm sheds. Provide if you can lumps of rock salt for cattle to lick when they please, otherwise, salt them once a week. If you suspect lice, rub a little unguentum (mercurial ointment) mixed with lard, behind the horns, and tie up for some days. Feed roots finely sliced; turnips first, beets, mangels, &c. Beef animals need the assiduous care of the *owner* now more than at any other season.

February.

This month and the following are the most critical for all kinds of domestic animals, and the stock farmer has enough to occupy his time even though winter reigns in full rigor through the whole of February. The long evenings invite to sociability and neighborly intercourse, and the approaching summer campaign affords a topic for discussion among farmers when they meet.

Hogs should be kept hard at work upon the manure in barn cellars if possible, otherwise secure them warm quarters and feed them so as to keep them growing and healthy. Do not let the troughs fill up with frozen swill. Breeding sows should be kept separate and have warm retired nests, where they can be easily got at. Feed raw sliced roots occasionally; it prevents constipation and the tendency to devour their young.

MANURES—Fine composts, with soil, head lands, or muck, well incorporated, may be hauled to the field while the ground is frozen. See that all sorts are well mixed and composted as it accumulates. Keep frost out of the manure heaps if practicable.

Sheep must not be allowed to fall off in condition.—They will relish hemlock branches and they are good food for them in limited quantities. Feed breeding ewes a quart of sliced raw potatoes with a very little meal upon them, daily. Never let sheep lack water or salt—and above all feed regularly.

March.

DRAINS—Should be examined as soon as the frost is out of the ground to see that there are no obstructions. Wet spots in drained land indicate stoppages in drains, which can seldom be repaired before the season is dryer. A perfect system of surface drains is essential at least where under-drains are not laid, and it is more important to have them clear now than at any other season. If possible get in some new drains where needed; it will make the land 3 to 6 weeks earlier.

GRASS LANDS—Pull out bushes and briars by the roots, remove stones and roll heaved land as soon as the ground will bear the teams. Top dress before rolling.

HORSES—Groom thoroughly; feed carrots (4 qts. a day) to make them shed their coats well and get them in good condition for Spring work. Be particularly careful to guard against colds taken by exposure, when unblanketed, and against galls and sores.

April.

April with us is not the rainy month it is in England, where the proverb "April showers bring May flowers," originated, and like other proverbs has a foundation in truth. We frequently experience a period covering three to five weeks in March and April of comparative exemption from rain. Our roads become settled, the fields fit for the plow, the ground warm and ready for the seed—in short we have a *seed time*, when grass, grain, potatoes, and carrots, may be profitably put in, and much land prepared for crops. We counsel all farmers to bear this most important fact in mind, and to make good use of this period, which may be short. Remember, too, the cold rains which follow, and often last during the whole month of May, when plowing can not be done, when nearly all the seed rots in the ground, and farmers are busy replanting, or with their hands in their pockets, mourning over the yellow, spindling blades here and there in their corn fields. Some land is never fit for the plow before the first of June, or still later.

PLOWING—Study and plan how to have the fewest dead furrows except on wet land, in which case make narrow lands. Back furrowing leaves fields which are tolerably regular, free from dead furrows altogether. It is done by striking a shallow furrow through the exact centre of the field and plowing around it. It requires close calculation to avoid carrying the plow far across the ends. Lay out the field beforehand on paper and you will see.

POTATOES—The best success generally follows early planting, even for the main crop. There is a chance also of being able to sell new potatoes at a high price. Where rot is usual, use no fermenting manure, plant on an inverted sod with a little wood ashes in the hill, and plant an early maturing sort.

May.

BONES—Collect from far and near with jealous care; pound them up or put them in with the horse manure.

FENCES—Keep all in repair, particularly boundary and road fences, and around pasture lots where young cattle are confined. Good fences make quiet cattle. If they once become unruly, no ordinary fence will restrain them.

LIME—Always apply it on land after plowing deeper than before, and upon the surface, for it works down. Keep a supply on hand for composting with weeds, sods, etc., 30 bushels to the acre, after plowing in other manure, is an excellent preparation for corn.

OATS—A crop may sometimes be got if sowed late, but they do not fill well. If the ground is in perfect order and you can put on nothing else conveniently, sow oats about the first of this month; but if rains come on, devote the land to corn or other crop. If your object is to seed down to grass, sow any time this month, and cut the oats for hay.

GRAIN FIELDS—A top dressing of plaster, nitrate of soda, or guano will often prove beneficial on both Winter and Spring grain. Guano, lime, or wood ashes, sown liberally before the seed is covered, will benefit heavy soils. Keep all stock from grain fields, and pull out weeds as soon as plainly visible before the grain is too large.

June.

Tillage is the great work of this month. If a man is skeptical of Jethro Tull's philosophy, he can dissipate his doubts by stirring the soil early and late. Cultivate, harrow, hoe, plow, and by all methods, stir and comminute the soil. This allows the air free access to all the surface particles, saves every drop of dew and rain, and puts the growing crops upon their best behavior. It subdues the weeds, exterminates foul seeds, and cleans the lands for future crops. It is a substitute for manure, and at the same time makes the most of the manure that is put into the soil.

BUTTER, if well made and packed during this month, will keep throughout the year. Cleanliness and thorough working are the two essential points to be observed. The milk room should be well ventilated, cool, and free from dust, insects, and offensive smells. In sending butter to market, have the cask or pail look neat and inviting, and plainly marked. New tubs should be well scalded with buttermilk and brine before packing, to remove the flavor of the wood.

July.

CABBAGE should be more largely cultivated upon the farm. It is a good succession crop to early potatoes, and does well oftentimes, where from any cause the first crop fails. They may be planted at once in the hills where they are to grow, or transplanted from the seed bed a little later. It is of great value as a succulent fodder for cows, and will last well stored until Spring. It is excellent for pigs and poultry.

POTATOES—The ground should not be disturbed after blossoming until digging. Dig early varieties as they mature and sow turnips or set cabbages. There is ample time for a good crop of either if manure be used. There is often a difference of fifty per cent in the price of potatoes this month and the next—hence market early.

TIMBER cut during this and the following months is considered more durable than that felled in Winter, particularly those kinds that abound in sap. Anticipate the wants of next season by cutting now.

TURNIPS—Sow largely all vacant places where other crops are removed, and between the rows of corn. Transplant rock and French turnips. There is still time for a good crop. A spoonful of bone dust or superphosphate to each plant will make a crop on almost any tillable land. Cattle are very fond of all kinds of turnips, and thrive on them—the best proof of their value.

August.

When the grass is fit to cut, haying must take the precedence of every thing else. The few days of cultivation that remain should be improved to the utmost.

GRAIN, especially that which cannot be put under good shelter, should be thrashed at the earliest convenience. Make thorough work of cleaning whether for seed or market. It is usually better to sell as soon as the market is fairly fixed. Use all that can be turned to account in fattening stock.

HAY—Cut any remaining. Gather coarse wild grasses for bedding for animals. Secure salt marsh hay and sedge, during the low tides of August, and remove to safe quarters. Surround stacks with good fences to keep cattle from wasting.

September.

The important work of underdraining heavy soils may be advantageously attended to this month. Gathering fruit, and other maturing products, is another important matter to be considered, in laying out farm work for the month. A good crop must be well taken care of, to bring full returns. All kinds of stock should be kept in good flesh. The regaining of lost flesh is always expensive.

Agricultural Fairs and Cattle Shows—Every man gains something by attendance at these gatherings, aside from the recreation and social enjoyment. No one can tell what he loses by staying away. It may be worth \$100 to any man—one spends a dollar, goes and gets the benefit; another earns a dollar by staying at home—which is the best off?

BUCKWHEAT—Shells badly if allowed to become to ripe before harvesting.

HARVESTING—Is a very important branch of farming. Good crops of any kind poorly harvested, are often less profitable than poor crops well harvested.

BUTTER—This month and next put down for winter use, and for market. But it is about as well to throw it away as to pack it so that it will not keep. The amount that is annually lost to the country in spoiled butter is immense—all the result of ignorance or carelessness.

October.

The leaves are falling, Autumn is fading into winter. Farmers must therefore be busy; and as Winter *will* make them an annual visit, they should be prepared to receive and entertain him. The best way to do this is to leave nothing undone that will tend to their own comfort and that of their stock. Buildings and fences must be put in repair; corn must at least be cut up and placed into stooks; buildings must be erected, repaired and put in a good state of preservation; implements must be housed for a season of rest, and cleaned, painted and oiled to preserve them from decay and rust; stock must have extra feed to prevent loss of flesh, etc., etc. The women folks must see to the wardrobe—socks, mitts, flannel shirts, drawers, blankets, &c., must be renewed or the old ones darned and furnished up; and thus by *all* preparing for his visit, Winter, even in these Northern regions may be divested of his mask of sternness, and made not only a welcome but a jolly guest; bringing, if preparation be made to receive him aright, health, happiness and pleasure; and with his clear cold nights, the merry sleigh ride, or the jovial skating party. Smiling faces, rosy cheeks, and elastic limbs being the attendants of his bracing air. Prepare for him, and then—let him come, by all means!

Forest leaves are excellent for absorbing liquid manure and for mulching. Gather freely when available.

November.

FUEL—It takes the heat of almost one half of green or soggy wood to burn up the other half. Water in changing to vapor absorbs and conceals a thousand degrees of heat. A cord of charcoal gives out more heat in burning, than a cord of wood. A cord of thoroughly dry wood loses a thousand times less heat in the smoky vapor, than if burned when green. Therefore, get the Winter's fuel to drying out, under cover, as soon as possible. It saves time, vexation, and health, and is a mercy to the housewife.

Hogs—They fatten most on the same food when the weather is warm. The heat of all animals is sustained by the internal (oxydization) of the fat-producing elements. As soon as the fire goes out (in death) the flesh becomes cold. In cold weather 20 to 90 per cent. of the food, and often the whole of it, goes to keeping up the animal heat. As cold comes on, give the hogs a warm pen, or a warm nest of straw, and see them lay on fat. Increase their bulk by feeding the coarse food first, and then finish off by filling up the tissues with fat furnished abundantly by corn. For early pigs, turn in the males now.

HORSES, next to man, need clean, well ventilated, well lighted quarters. The currycomb and brush do more than make them look well; a clean skin promotes health. It is cruel, and bad economy, to drive a horse until he sweats, and then let him stand five minutes with a half blanket across the middle of the back. The cover should go well over the shoulders and hips, and down far enough to ward off currents of cold air from the thighs, belly, and shoulders.

December.

Vegetation is now taking its long nap, beneath the spotless, fleecy blanket which with motherly care good Dame Nature spreads over her offspring. During all the past season, while we have labored, and while we have rested and slept, the grasses and grains, the trees and fruits, the vegetables and the flowers, have pushed steadily forward; now they enjoy continuous repose. Not so with us. Our hands may be less active, but the mind will be more so. We are shut up from tilling the fields; the time is auspicious for *cultivating the mind.*"

FODDER—When hay is scarce and dear, which is often the case, in many parts of the country, it becomes doubly important to be economical in its use. We have known horses and cattle to be kept in good condition when their principal food was corn-stalks, cut very short and wet up with a little bran for the cows, and a mixture of bran, shorts, ground oats, and corn for the horses. Racks or other contrivances are essential to keep animals from wasting hay. It pays to cut up all hay and straw and wet it before feeding.

TOOLS—There is a wide difference between working with and without implements. The amount of the difference depends upon the perfection of the implements. One man costing \$1 a day for board and wages, will cut as much wood with a first-rate axe, as two men costing \$2 a day can cut with poor axes. This is six dollars a week. Does it pay to buy a poor axe because it costs 25 cents or 50 cents less? The same reasoning applies to all other implements. Are all the tools well taken care of? Housing and greasing the plow, which may take ten minutes time now, may save half a day next Spring in hunting after, fixing up, getting the rust off, and starting it well to work. That half a day may prevent the putting in of half an acre of corn or other crop. The wood work if exposed to the weather, may give way at a critical time. Take care of the tools this forenoon; something may hinder the work in the afternoon. Coat all iron and steel implements with a thin film (rubbed on with a cloth) of 3 parts lard, and 1 part resin melted together.

USEFUL.

TO CLEAN PAPER UPON WALLS.—Few things can be devised better for this purpose than the old-fashioned one of rubbing with stale bread; but when the paper is greasy, occasioned by persons reclining their heads against the wall, it is advisable to use a piece of flannel wetted with spirits of wine, or a mixture of turpentine and essence of lemon.

LIGHTNING.—To avoid accidents from lightning during a thunder storm, sit or stand as near the middle of the room as possible. Avoid going near the windows or walls, and put knives, scissors, and all kinds of steel utensils out of the way. Avoid standing near iron railings or other metallic bodies, and if caught in a storm in the country do not shelter yourself under trees. On an open heath or barren where no house shelter can be obtained, the safest plan is to lie down flat on the ground.

STROKE OF LIGHTNING.—Throw cold water upon a person struck by lightning. It is said to be a very great benefit, if not a positive cure.

SWELLING IN THE NECK.—Fourteen or fifteen nettle seeds ground into powder and taken daily, will cure the swelling in the neck known as goitre without in any way injuring the general habit.

TO DESTROY COCKROACHES.—Strew the floor, in that part of the house infested with the vermin, with the parings of green cucumbers.

TO MAKE BOOTS WATER-PROOF.—To half a pint of drying oil add one ounce of turpentine, and half ounce of Burgundy pitch; mix them carefully together in a glazed pipkin over a slow fire; lay the mixture on the boot with a sponge or soft brush, while yet warm, and when dry repeat the process, until the leather will hold no more; the boots must then be put away and not worn until perfectly dry and elastic.

TO PROTECT CHILDREN FROM BEING BURNED.—Add one ounce of alum to the last water used to rinse children's dresses, and they will be rendered unflammable, or so slightly combustible that they would take fire very slowly, if at all, and would not flame. This is a simple precaution which may be adopted in families of children.

SORE THROAT OR QUINSY.—Three drachms of powdered galls, of boiling rose-water three ounces, and infuse for three hours. Then filter and pour off the liquor and add three ounces of spirits of nutmeg. Hold a little of this frequently against the very bottom of your mouth.
